"LITERATURA MONDO."

This magazine is a high-class literary production, profusely illustrated, well printed on good paper, and an ornament to any home, and has been produced for three years by heavy personal sacrifices on the part of the Editors. It is astounding that a magazine of this kind meets with no encouragement. *Tra la Mondo, Universo, Bela Mondo*, all died from want of support. We put wreaths on the tombs, and wished we had treated them better. Now after three years of struggle, *Literatura Mondo* has gained just 444 subscribers—(21 in Britain). It will disappear in December if Esperantists continue to neglect their duty. Every group should subscribe for a copy, 8/6 a year, from the B.E.A.
