ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE B.E.A.

Minutes of Annual General Meeting of the Association held on Saturday, 30 May, 1925, at 7 p.m., in the Urquhart Hall, Leamington Spa.

In the Chair: Mr. John Merchant. About 150 Fellows and Members were present. The Secretary read the list of Group Representatives, and called for and read proxy forms.

Minutes. The Minutes of the previous meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Apologies for Absence. Apologies were received from various members unable to attend.

Matters arising from Minutes. (a). *Auditors.* Messrs. H. S. Baker and Co., who had been appointed Auditors for 1924, did not take up the appointment, and the vacancy was filled by the Council, who appointed Messrs. Fitzpatrick Graham and Co. (b). *Co-operation of B.E.A. and U.E.A.* A contract had been signed with the U.E.A. on the lines approved, the undertaking with regard to land-names having been given. A resolution on the lines of the B.E.A. attitude with regard to land-names had been passed by the Vienna Congress, but the Lingva Komitato had not taken up the matter so far.

Annual Report, Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet. Various questions on points of detail were asked and answered. Mr. Auty proposed the adoption of the Report and Balance Sheet, and expressed hearty thanks to Messrs. Edmonds and Long for the admirable way in which they had edited the magazine *International*

Language and Literaturo respectively. The motion was seconded by Mr. Clayton and carried unanimously.

Ballot for new Officers and Councillors. The Secretary as Returning Officer reported the result of the Ballot as follows:—

Hon. Secretary: Charles H. Edmonds.

Hon. Treasurer: C. A. Fairman.

Councillors (retiring in 1928): Miss E. O'Brien, Wm. Harvey, J. T. Holmes, F. E. Wadham.

Auditors. Mr. Robertson moved, Capt. Nicholson seconded, and it was unanimously carried, that Messrs. Fitzpatrick, Graham and Co. be thanked for their services during the past year, and be elected Auditors for the year ending 31st December 1925.

Guarantee Matters. The Secretary reported that £550 15 0 had been paid on behalf of the 1924 guarantee, that £18 more was required to complete the Guarantee Supplementary Fund, and that £20 was required to complete the £500 necessary to make the 1925 guarantee operative.

In response to an appeal by the President, those present subscribed sufficient to complete the two Funds.

Place of next Annual General Meeting. A discussion was held on the question whether, in view of the fact that the Universal Congress would be held in Edinburgh, it would be desirable to hold any British Congress in 1926. It was, however, decided that for various reasons it would be advisable to hold a Congress, and on a motion by Mr. Auty, seconded by Mr. Clayton, the meeting accepted an invitation given by Mr. W. H. Hirst on behalf of the Huddersfield Esperanto Society, for the B.E.A. to hold its 1926 Annual Meeting during a British Congress in Huddersfield.

Committee on the Future of the Association. An interim Report was read and discussed. A letter from Mr. Page was read. On the motion of Mr. Elliott, seconded by Mr. Bredall, it was decided to adopt the report and to give the powers and instructions asked for therein.

21st Anniversary of the Association, October, 1925. Suggestions were invited as to the best means of celebrating this event. Those received included:—(a) A Dinner with eminent educationists and others as guests; (b) To ask local groups to organise festivals and give the profits to the B.E.A.; (c) An "Esperanto Week" of propaganda similar to those already carried out in other countries. (d) A propaganda tour by Andreo Ĉe whom the Centra Komitato offered to send to this country; (e) A Press Campaign.

Mr. Edmonds proposed, Mr. Clayton seconded, and it was agreed, that arrangements should be made for Mr. Ĉe to tour the country in the autumn or early winter on behalf of the B.E.A.

Election of Trustee of B.M.M.F. Mr. Millidge, retiring by rotation, was re-elected.

John Pollen Prize Fund. It was reported that the sum subscribed to date was £31 18 6, and an appeal was made to members to raise this total by the end of the year to the £100 required for the carrying out of the full scheme which had been prepared.

B.E.A. Literary Competitions, 1924-5. Mr. Shelton, as Secretary of the Literary Committee, reported on the results of the Literary Competitions just closed.

Other Matters. At the conclusion of the business Mr. Edmonds gave details of the Esperanto Gramophone Records then being made.

Dr. Edward Privat, at the invitation of the President, addressed the meeting on the present state of the Esperanto movement.

MONTH BY MONTH.

A meeting of the Council of the Association was held on Saturday, May 30th, in the Urquhart Hall, Leamington Spa, at the conclusion of the Annual General Meeting of the Association.

Present.—The President (Mr. Merchant) in the chair. Misses Blake, Drinkwater, Hogg and Taylor, Mrs. Clayton, Messrs. Applebaum, Appleby, Auty, Boll, Edmonds, Fairman, Holmes, Long, Robertson, Robinson, Shelton, A. E. Smith, Wadham and Wright.

Owing to the lateness of the hour the meeting was adjourned until 10.30 the following morning, when there were present:

The President (Mr. Merchant) in the Chair. Misses Blake, Hogg and Taylor, Mrs. Clayton and Mrs. Blaise. Messrs. Applebaum, Appleby, Birkett, Boll, Edmonds, Farmer, Holmes, Long, Marriott, Robertson, Robinson, Shelton, A. E. Smith, Wadham and Wright.

In attendance:—The Secretary.

Dr. Edward Privat was present during the meeting by invitation of the Council.

Minutes. The minutes of the meetings held on 8th December, 10th January, and 28th February, were read and confirmed.

Standing Committees for 1925-26 were appointed as follows:—

Executive Committee. The President, the Hon. Secretary, the Hon. Treasurer, Miss Blake, Messrs. Boll, Long, Robertson, Shelton, Wadham, Yelland. No quorum fixed: meetings to be held as necessary.

Propaganda Committee. It was decided not to appoint this Committee, but to charge the Executive Committee with its work, leaving the Executive Committee to deal with the Propaganda Fund as it thought advisable.

Publications Committee. Messrs. Boll, Clayton, Edmonds, Page, Robertson, Yelland. (Secretary: Mr. Boll).

Examination Committee. Miss Baird, Miss Caw, Messrs Harvey, Page and Senior. (Secretary: Mr. Harvey).

Instruction Committee. Mrs. Clayton, Messrs. Clayton, G. D. Lewis and T. J. Richards (Secretary: Mrs. Clayton) with power to coopt.

Literary Committee. Messrs. Edmonds, Harvey, and Shelton (Secretary: Mr. Shelton) with power to coopt.

Censor Committee. Mr. Long, in accordance with notice given, moved that this Committee be not re-appointed. Miss Baird wrote that she advocated retention unless reasons were shown to the contrary. Dr. Privat on being asked stated that he knew of no other national association with a similar committee. Mrs. Clayton said that if the Committee were not re-appointed there must be some provision for supervision and responsibility. Several members thought the committee unnecessary under present circumstances, though necessary in the past. Finally Mr. Long moved, Mr. Shelton seconded, and it was carried unanimously "That the Censor Committee be not re-appointed, but that in future the individual or Committee responsible for the publication of any literary work be responsible to the Council for the Esperanto contained therein." The Secretary was asked to write to the members of the Censor Committee thanking them for their services.

Congress Committee. Messrs. Goldsmith, Harvey, Holmes, Long (Secretary: Mr. Long).

Radio Committee. Messrs. Boll, Edmonds, Epton, G. T. Smith, Wadham (Secretary: G. T. Smith).

Pointer Fund Trustees. Messrs. Chatterton, Clayton, Fairman.

Gramophone Records. The Hon. Secretary submitted a contract entered into with the Linguaphone Institute for the production of Esperanto Records. A vote of thanks passed was to Mr. Edmonds for his conduct of the matter and also to Dr. Privat for the co-operation he had

shown. It was agreed that the sub-committee of the Council appointed to examine the question of Esperanto Gramophone Records be dissolved, and that arrangements for the advertising and sale of records be in the hands of the Executive Committee. On the motion of Mr. Applebaum, seconded by Mr. Marriott, it was agreed that authority be given by the Council for special withdrawal from the Capital Fund of an amount not exceeding £100 at any one time, at the discretion of the Executive Committee, to enable stocks of records to be maintained and extra discounts secured.

Committee on Co-operation with U.E.A. In view of the contract signed with the U.E.A. this Committee was discharged as no longer needed, it being agreed that the Committee on the future of the Association would report on the working of the contract in due course.

Universal Congress in 1926. The President reported that following on correspondence with Dr. Privat on behalf of the C.K., that body had agreed to waive two of the three suggested conditions for future Congresses, and on behalf of the Association he had agreed to accept the third condition, viz., that the C.K. should receive 20% of Congress subscriptions. These arrangements had the approval of the Edinburgh Society, and Dr. Privat had now intimated to the Association that the C.K. had accepted the invitation for the Congress to be held in Edinburgh. The Council congratulated the President on the result of his negotiation, and Mr. Long moved, Mrs. Clayton seconded, and it was carried unanimously "That on hearing the report as to the acceptance by the C.K. of the invitation made by the Association for the Congress to be held in Edinburgh, the Council establish the memorandum drawn up at its meeting of the 10th January, 1925, as the procedure to be followed."

Dr. Privat gave the text of a formal letter of acceptance about to be sent by the C.K., in which the hope was expressed that although in this particular instance the C.K. had expressed its willingness to cede its desire to establish an increased Congress subscription for persons who were not members both of their National Association and of the the Universal Association, the B.E.A. should nevertheless suggest to the Edinburgh Society that it reconsider the matter with a view to the objection to the difference in subscription being withdrawn. A number of Councillors spoke on this suggestion and a resolution was moved recommending to the Edinburgh Society the reconsideration of the question, with a view to an intimation being made to the C.K. that the arrangement may be instituted for the Edinburgh Congress.

At this point the meeting was adjourned until 3 p.m. and on resumption the following were present:—

The President (Mr. Merchant) in the chair. Mrs. Blaise, Messrs. Applebaum, Boll, Edmonds, Holmes, Long, Shelton, Wadham.

Further discussion took place on the resolution of recommendation to the Edinburgh Society, which was eventually withdrawn, and it was decided to pass on to the Edinburgh Society the letter from the C.K. advising acceptance of the invitation, with a recommendation that they reconsider, favourably if possible, the question of differing Congress subscriptions.

Subscription to K.R. for 1925. Mr. Boll moved, Mr. Applebaum seconded, and it was carried unanimously, that the subscription of £30 for 1200 members be paid to the K.R.

Internal Rules of K.R. A draft of these as circulated by the officers of K.R. was agreed with one slight alteration of wording.

New member of C.K. It was announced that Mr. Kenn was returning to China, and a vacancy was thus created in the C.K. Mrs. Isbrucker had been proposed subject to confirmation, and it was agreed to vote for her election.

S.A.T. In view of recent alterations in the Statutes of S.A.T. the decisions of the Council regarding the sale of

S.A.T. publications, and of publications recommending S.A.T. were rescinded.

Vienna Congress Deficit. A complaint was brought forward that numerous members had sent sums of money to the Vienna Congress Committee without receiving any reply. It was agreed to ask the K.R. to place the matter on the agenda of its meeting during the Geneva Congress.

Votes of Thanks. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded to Mrs. Alfred Mudie and Miss Clark for generous donations to the funds of the Association.
