yet out, it is probable that, as anticipated, it will show a large balance on the wrong side. It is therefore as imperative as ever to cut down expenses. The issue of *Literaturo* has been discontinued pro tem, we are endeavouring to carry on with a reduced staff, and propaganda campaigns involving large expense must for the moment be undertaken less frequently. I am sure that Members, especially Guarantors, will appreciate the motive for this retrenchment—we are consolidating our forces in preparation for the next advance.

Subscriptions.—In view of the financial position, and of the fact that this year we have to meet a greatly increased rent, and must in December find new premises, it was decided by an overwhelming majority of Members present in general meeting, that the proposed reduction of the subscription was premature. Membership subscription therefore remains at 10/-. At the same time it is strongly desired to reduce the subscription to 5/- as soon as this is possible, and every new Member brings us nearer this goal. Vorto sufiĉas al la saĝulo. In this connection I cannot forbear to mention the valuable work done for the cause by Mr. C. C. Goldsmith, and another, who have recently brought us several recruits. Who will follow this example?

It is true that Members do not get much for their money. The Membership fee we regard not as money spent for corresponding personal benefit, but as a donation to the upkeep of the Association and its work. Members are the "Inner Circle"; those who actively support the Movement they believe in, instead of being mere lookers-on. All honour to them!

Those who find 10/- beyond their means are by no means debarred from forming part of the Association, and contributing their share to the support of the Movement. The sum of 5/- covers subscription as Associate, and a year's subscription to *International Language*.

U.E.A.—By mutual consent between the B.E.A. and the U.E.A., the "combined subscription" has been discontinued. Members of the U.E.A. are now asked, where possible, to pay their subscription by preference to the U.E.A. direct, or through their local Delegate, instead of through the B.E.A. Where there is no Delegate, however, or where this is so desired, the U.E.A. subscription may be paid through the B.E.A. as last year. As the U.E.A. subscription is now reduced, the new arrangement will cost Members no more than last year, and it will save delay and possible causes of complaint, while relieving the B.E.A. staff of a large amount of labour and complication.

This new arrangement does not in any sense signify want of agreement between the B.E.A. and the U.E.A., between whom the most cordial relations exist. It is simply a simplification of working, for the advantage of both parties. It is the duty of every Esperantist, according to his power, first and foremost to support his national Association, and thus take part in the movement in his own country; and, secondly, to support the U.EA., and thus take part in the international movement also. Membership of

the U.E.A. is 4/- (including Yearbook): with the

magazine Esperanto, 10/-.

New Service to Members .- In order to compensate Members to some extent for the loss of Literaturo, arrangements have been made to supply them with books free of postage. Every paid-up Member receives with this issue a sheet of coupons. The sheet contains full details of the scheme, which is, roughly, that by attaching to his order a coupon for every 5/- worth of books ordered, he will receive them free of postage. A Member who purchases books as he should, will thus save his membership fee in postage.

Book Sales .-- Apart from subscriptions, the Association is dependent for its existence largely on receipts from the sale of books. Every issue of the The British Esperantist contains a list of new books. A full booklist is issued from time to time, and a copy will be sent to anyone on application. We have a literature to be proud The best way to become proficient in of. Esperanto is to read this literature. It is much to the discredit of Esperantists generally that they do not realise their duty in this matter, both to themselves, and also to the publishers, who complain with reason of the lack of that support

which they have a right to expect.

"International Language."-Under the new Editor this magazine is maintaining its high standard of excellence. It is an amazing fact that there are still some Members who never see it or make use of it. When the remaining third of the heavy preliminary expenses (£210) is paid off, as it will be during 1926, we shall be better able to undertake a fresh advertising cam-Meantime we rely on Members and Groups to increase the circulation by personal and collective endeavour. The Technical Hall, a fine building with a large hall and hundreds of class-rooms, has been acquired for the meetings. Divine Service will be be held in the Parish Church.

The Mayor of Huddersfield will attend one of

the meetings, and there is every prospect of an official reception.

Excursions will be made to the Yorkshire Moors, to Ilkey, the beauty spot of Yorkshire, and to a Cloth Mill.

The Clerk, January, contains an interesting article, "Language and Labour," by Mark Starr. Auckland Labour News, December, prints a translation by C. H. Parker from Literaturo.

Medicine. The B.E.A. Office has received and can lend an interesting report on the increasing use now made of Esperanto in Japanese medical circles. Several doctors in Japan have published medical treatises in Esperanto only; nine Esperanto groups exist among students in various universities, or medical colleges; many eminent professors advocate Esperanto. The Eskapulida Klubo, of Tokio Imperial University, has recently published two Esperanto works: Medicina Krestomatio, and Farmakologia Praktiko.

January brought the first number of a new 60-page magazine: Internacia Medicina Revuo. This should be supported energetically by all interested in medicine. Subscription, One Dollar, or equivalent, payable to D-ro Briquet, 31 Rue de La Bassee, Lille, France. The list of medical contributors is drawn from all parts of the world.

Science. The first Bulteno de la Internacia Scienca Asocio has just appeared. Subscription half a dollar, or equivalent, payable to S-ro Rollet de l'Isle, 35, Rue du Sommerard, Paris, who will also give information concerning the Esperantist International Scientific Association. He would be glad, for the I.S.A. Library, to receive gifts of technical or scientific works in Esperanto, and, if necessary, to purchase wanted books.

Technics. The German League of Technical and Scientific Associations will issue a Technical Magazine in Esperanto, if satisfied that it would have a sufficient number of interested readers.
