ANNUAL REPORT.

REPORT of the Council to be presented to the Members at the Twenty-second Annual Meeting, to be held in the Technical Hall, Huddersfield, on Saturday, 22nd May, 1926, at 7 p.m.

The Council has the honour to present its Report upon the "Coming-of-Age" Year of the Association, ended 31st December, 1925.

In what should have been entirely a year of rejoicing, there has most regretfully to be recorded an especially heavy loss of members by death. Among the very good friends of whose support our Association and Movement have been deprived, are Mr. Thomas Ainsworth, Rev. H. C. Bond, Mr. J. W. Boys, Mr. W. R. E. Coles, Capt. A. B. Colville, Mrs. L. E. Doran, Dr. J. E. Esslemont, Mr. H. C. Jack, Dr. D. Rhys Jones, Mr. H. F. Locke-King, Mr. W. J. Lewis, Mr. A. P. H. Rollason, Mr. W. H. Scott, Mr. Thomas Smith, and Dr. M. Sturge.

In addition to this long list the Association has lost other valuable direct help. Our Business Manager, Mr. Harry A. Epton, who has given ungrudging labour and thought to the Association's affairs for the past six years and a half, was obliged, in the interests of his family and of his future prospects, to accept a more promising position. We are happy to say that upon the Executive Committee the Association still has the benefit of Mr. Epton's unabated fervour and long experience. A few weeks later

our Honorary Secretary, Mr. C. H. Edmonds,—whose devotion to the work of the Association has been beyond telling—together with Messrs. H. Boll, F. Rickett Shelton, G. T. Smith, and F. E. Wadham (for reasons already fully reported in *The British Esperantist*, January 1926), retired from the various offices they had so well filled. The Council feel assured that the whole Membership will join with them in heartiest thanks for the past work of all the gentlemen named. Among other things, Mr. Edmonds leaves lasting memorials of his term of office in our 50,000 Shillings Fund and *International Language*.

Officers.—The already large indebtedness of the Association to its President became greatly increased by the prompt and effective manner in which—in spite of his being at the time in ill health—he dealt with the difficulties which arose towards the close of the year. All will wish him better health and smoother sailing henceforth. The changes necessitated in officering and Staff will come before the Annual Meeting for acceptance or alteration.

Finances.—These always claim the gravest attention of all responsible for the conduct of the Association. The figures of the accompanying Revenue Account and Balance Sheet are an object lesson in the need for greater thought on the part of those whom the Association represents.

It will be noted that there is a slightly reduced revenue from Subscriptions and Affiliation Fees—reflecting the time of monetary difficulties through

which the world is still passing—and that other receipts show a better tendency. They are in no way, however, equal to the needs of expenditure, which, despite the best intentions and efforts at economy, are necessarily in many instances also on the upgrade, particularly with regard to *International Language*, our most valuable propaganda organ. It is obvious that unless our friends make some solid effort to increase its sales, this will have to suffer by essential economies. Vorto al saĝulo sufiĉas!

As a result of the extra charge of this item upon our funds; of the fact that the support from our Guarantors is somewhat less than that of 1924; and of an increase in our general indebtedness, our final balance is extremely unsatisfactory.

Generally, we have every reason to be thankful for the past year's progress. In every important country (Great Britain alone excepted) substantial progress has been made in the radio world; the list of broadcastings lengthens monthly. The reports of the International Amateur Radio Conference; the international Conferences on the use of Esperanto in Pure and Applied Science, and in Commerce and Industry (recognised by many Governments); and especially the recognition of our language by the International Telegraphic Union:—a glance at these should enthuse the most pessimistic, and lead them to realise that an adverse balance should be but an encouragement to fuller and more eager and more sustained effort.

Members and Fellows.—There has again been a steady addition to our Roll. If, however, the Association is to reach the position of being self-supporting, much earnest and persistent effort in recruiting must be undertaken by the Members individually and by Groups.

Subscription.—A recommendation by the Committee on the Future of the Association that the subscription should be reduced to 7/6 was passed by a meeting on the 20th November, but in consequence of the loss of organising power above referred to, the matter was reconsidered by one of the largest and most representative meetings which the Association has yet held (apart from Annual Meetings), and the change was rescinded by an overwhelming majority, those present accepting the loss of *Literaturo*, without an equivalent, as a necessary sacrifice in aid of the Association's funds.

It is, however, generally felt and believed that a reduction of the subscription to 5/- should, with the cordial help of all interested, lead to a very large increase of the membership, and this matter is being practically considered.

Book Sales.—The profit on this department shows an encouraging growth, and the introduction of the "Coupon Postage System" should

secure an even better result for future reports. The following statistics for 1925 may be found interesting: Copies sold of *The Esperanto Teacher*, 3795; *First Steps*, 3818; *Esperanto for All*, 5405; *other English Text Books*, 5155; *Keys*, 8800; *Dictionaries*, 1953; *Badges*, 950.

Gramophone Records.—Probably the greatest event of the Association's year was the successful issue, in the last month, of the long-looked-for gramophone records spoken by Dr. Edmond Privat and produced by the Linguaphone Institute in collaboration with the Association. These,—with the accompanying special Text Books and Wall Tablets for the Instructional Course—should do much to aid teachers (especially any who lack experience or the "gift" of teaching); and these records, and the Advanced (or Literary) set, will serve to assure all who use them—especially isolated students—that they are requiring an excellent standard of pronunciation and style.

As the Association is authorised to deal in these records throughout the World, it is anticipated that the sales will materially benefit the funds, and a good beginning has been made.

Federations and Groups.—As usual, the Federations and Groups have laboured with varying degrees of energy and success, and on the whole much good work has been done. An increase in communion and emulation between Groups would lead to very much greater results.

An Irish Esperanto Association has been formed which, though not affiliated to the B.E.A., will work in harmony with it and necessarily help it indirectly.

"British Esperantist."—This has continued to epitomise events in "our World" and its affairs generally, to the enlightenment and encouragement of our Members.

"International Language."—Under the Editorship of Mr. C. H. Edmonds throughout the year, not only were the high quality and interest maintained, but the quantity was increased. 72,000 copies were issued: an average of 6,000 per month.

There is no doubt that this is the Association's greatest propaganda effort. For that reason it deserves and requires very much greater support than it at present receives. The fact that our Balance Sheet shows a very heavy loss on this item proves, on the one hand, how good a "value for money" was given; while it unfortunately shows, on the other hand, to what a limited extent this great opportunity is appreciated. No English-speaking Esperantist should be without his monthly copy for perusal and subsequent propaganda use.

Funds.—The Council most thankfully records the receipt of gifts of £100 by Mrs. Mudie to

the Capital Fund, in memory of Capt. H. B. Mudie, and of £50 by Miss M. B. Clark, to the Guarantee Supplementary Fund, 1924.

Our "50,000 Shillings Fund" is now well on its way, and there seems no reason why it shall not reach the half-way mark before the end of 1926.

Examination Committee.—There was a considerable increase in the number of candidates compared with the total in each of the two preceding years.

The results of the examinations in 1925 were as follows:—Preliminary:—Certificates awarded 62; ditto with distinction 57; failed 55; Total 174. Last year 128. Advanced:—Certificates awarded 33; ditto with distinction 12; failed 22; Total 67. Last year 60.

The great majority of the Groups, however, have again failed to put forward any candidates for these examinations. It is very desirable that examinations for the B.E.A. certificates should be held at the end of each session at all places where class instruction is given, as such examinations provide a valuable stimulus for serious study of the language.

Instruction Committee.—The number of students taking advantage of the B.E.A. Correspondence Courses shows an appreciable advance over that of last year, and it is clear that these Courses are much wanted and enable very useful work to be done.

It is pleasing to note that many of the Students have passed the B.E.A. Preliminary and Advanced Examinations, and the Examinations of the London Chamber of Commerce.

It is felt that many Esperantists would profit by taking the Translation Course.

The Council wish to express their gratitude to Mrs. Clayton, and to those who have acted as Tutors and done so much without remuneration to make these Courses a success, thereby incidentally considerably helping the funds of the Association.

Apart from this work, nearly fifty readers of *International Language* sent in answers to the exercises set monthly up to August. These were helpfully corrected, and a number of proficient adherents added to our Cause and Association.

All the material is classified by subject, each item receiving a distinctive number by the Dewey system, and being easily available for reference. There is also a large collection of leaflets, cuttings, and MSS, arranged on the same plan. 95 current Esperanto magazines are displayed in the Reading-Room. Some 100 volumes of magazines await binding before they can be indexed and rendered available for use. No funds are available for the upkeep of the Library, or for binding, and help for this purpose would be greatly appreciated.

The Library is a Reference Library only, and books may not be removed from the room.

Office Staff.—The Council desires to record its hearty thanks to Mr. Butler, Mr. Epton, and the Staff, who carried out their duties with an amount of devotion without which much of the work done could not possibly have been accomplished. Correspondence received at the office during the year was 15,146; correspondence dispatched, 27,680; circulars manifolded (including press service), 22,604.

London Chamber of Commerce Examinations.—These were again very well attended, as evidenced by the excellent record of Passes published in November *British Esperantist*.

B.E.A. Publications.—During the year the Association published the *International Radio Manual*, *The Object Lesson*, and *Kantaro Esperanta*. It also collaborated in the preparation of the text of the Linguaphone Esperanto Course, *Esperanto in Thirty Lessons*. A number of leaflets were revised and reprinted—others were dropped *pro tem.* owing to lack of funds.

U.E.A.—By mutual consent between the B.E.A. and the U.E.A. the "Combined Subscription" has been discontinued. It is believed that this simplification of working will be to the advantage of both parties, while under the new arrangement the cost to the individual member is the same.

Premises.—The present lease has been extended to the end of 1926, when new premises must be found.

Ce Tour.—The Association was able to arrange a three months' Propaganda Tour by Mr. Andreo Ĉe, who did much good work, and

incidentally left behind him feelings of warm friendship on the part of all with whom he came in contact.

There can be no fear of the *future*. The Forward Movement throughout the whole world is unmistakeable. It is the *present*, and our own affairs, which at the moment give us concern. There are thousands of Esperantists in the British Empire who give no atom of support to their National Association. It is the duty of those who are interested in it to wake up to a sense of their duty those who are now content to let others do all the spadework at their own expense. When the day of full fruition of our efforts arrives, let there be no British Esperantists of whom it may be said, to their shame: "They reap where they have not sown."

Every minute of work done and every penny spent by the Association, is done and spent in the name and on behalf of the Esperantists of the British Empire. Let each recognise his responsibility, and future reports will be able to picture even greater activities without the background of financial anxiety for those who carry on the work.

Report of Auditors to Members of the British Esperanto Association (Incorporated)
