IMPORTANT CONFERENCE in PRAGUE.

La Bureau International d'Education is arranging a Congress at Prague next Easter. The subject will be "Peace Propaganda through the Agency of the School." The Bureau will be supported by the World League of Esperantist Teachers, the League of Intellectual Workers, and the League of Czechoslovakian Esperantists. The chief items on the agenda are: (1) The psychology of peace education, (2) History textbooks for schools, (3) Instruction on the League of Nations, (4) Correspondence between schools, holiday colonies, journeys, exchange of pupils and teachers.

It is greatly hoped that British Esperantists competent to take part in the discussions will attend. All information from Internacia Centra Komitato, 12 Bd. du Theatre, Geneva.

ANNUAL REPORT.

DEPORT of the Council to be presented to the Members at the Twenty-third Annual Meeting to be held in the Town Hall, Cheltenham, on Saturday, 16th April, 1927, at 6.45 p.m.

In issuing its report for 1926, the Council confidently anticipates that the Members will find as much satisfaction in perusing it as the

Council has found in its preparation.

Again, however, there has been a heavy series of losses by death, and in grateful memory of long friendship and good service the passing has to be recorded of Rev. G. Aldridge, John Bredall, G. W. Campbell, Ralph Elliott, T. P. Gandell, Mrs. A. C. Harrison, Miss M. W. Hunter, Dr. G. J. Johnston, Dr. R. J. Legge, Arthur Mee, Mrs. A. Mudie, Miss I. E. McIntosh, A. D. Peck, Young Rennie, Capt. G. C. Robinson, Mrs. Shelton, and L. D. Stockton.

To Mr. John Bredall, for so many years an ardent propagandist and supporter, the Association owes further gratitude for a bequest of £50.

Officers.—The Members in Annual Meeting showed confidence in the present Officers by making no change. The appointment of Mr. C. C. Goldsmith as Business Manager will be seen to be justified by many of the items in this report and of the figures in the accounts.

Premises.—The removal to our new offices has been perhaps the event of the year. As those who have had the pleasure of visiting them can testify, we have now, in a main thoroughfare, a commodious suite of offices, affording accommodation for stock, and every convenience for the staff and their work. Through efficient organisation by the Business Manager, the change was successfully made without serious strain either upon the staff or finances.

Finances.—In reference to the preceding paragraph, the sums prudently set aside for the purpose have sufficed to cover all expenses of removal, and have provided for necessary convenience in the new offices.

It will be noted with gratification that the loss on the year's working is only £545:11:2, as compared with £915:3:5 in 1925, and it is confidently anticipated that figures will be still better in 1927. The Balance Sheet shows a welcome reduction in the amount due to Trade Creditors. It should be noted that the rent was much higher than previously, as it was nearly doubled by the landlord when the lease was extended for a year.

The charge on the funds due to International Language has been reduced to a point which—more especially in view of the improved experience of the second half of the year—suggests that for the future it will be a contributor to the Association's exchequer.

Subscriptions.—Taking its courage in both hands, the Association decided to return to the 5/- membership subscription as from the 1st October. In doing so, it relied on the hope that each present member would co-operate to prevent any loss of income by either introducing a new member with the 5/- saved or by donating it to the Association rather than put it in his own pocket. It is most satisfactory to record that many members who have since renewed their subscription have cordially adopted this policy. More than this, however, is essential. There are many hundreds of British Esperantists who would wish to join the Association, but who have not yet become aware of the new opportunity. It is the duty of every Member to see that none of

these remain in ignorance of the fact, or unurged to take their full share in supporting the body which exists to promote their interests by forwarding the Cause as only such a body can do.

Membership.—Our membership on Dec. 31st was 160 Fellows, 1028 Members, 27 Associates. We are aiming at an increase of 1,200 members in 1927 as a result of the reduced subscription.

Book Sales.—These show the astonishing increase for last year of £669:7:0; nearly 58%. The figures of some of the "best sellers" were Esperanto Teacher 3479, First Steps 2114, Esperanto for All 6700, (with other English text books making a total of 19,135, being 962 more than last year); Keys 7750, Dictionaries 1669. Of new books were sold Kantaro Esperanta 1740, La Sankta Biblio (published August 6th) 499.

Federations and Groups.—There are 86 Groups affiliated to the Association. By a change during the year, the Midland Federation is now represented by four Federations, named East Midland, South Midland, West Midland, Salop and Staffs., making a total of 10 Federations.

"The British Esperantist."—This has continued to flourish as a multum in parvo of information and interest, with an excellent "Special Congress Number" in August, on the prompt appearance of which its Editor, Mr. Montagu C. Butler, is to be heartily congratulated. In the "Books Received" column—an informing addition—161 new volumes are recorded as having been added to Esperanto literature in 1926.

"International Language."—As the new Editor, Mr. L. N. Newell has certainly "won his spurs." In all respects but one (the advertisement income, and that was on the upward grade during the latter half of the year), this, our great venture, has shown excellent improvement, particularly in administration. The expenditure has been reduced over 15%, and there is every prospect of realising a substantial profit in 1927. Its present issue is fairly satisfactory at 5,900 copies per month, and unceasing effort by all to extend this number will make assurance doubly sure. Mr. W. Severn has now taken up the learners' pages, previously so capably edited by Mr. F. M. Newell, Mrs. Osmond, and Mrs. Edmonds.

Funds.—In a year of which six months were occupied by an industrial dispute of far-reaching effect, it is a matter for great satisfaction that our Association can still show some increase in its capital, and that no reduction has occurred in the accustomed financial support of its adherents.

Publications Committee.—In addition to the publication of 5,000 copies of Kantaro Esperanta, and 2,000 Object Lesson, further editions

of the Esperanto Teacher (17,500) and Esperanto for Beginners (5,000) have been issued, and 200 copies bound of Manon Lescaut. A number of manuscripts have been received for consideration, but lack of funds has prevented publication.

Instruction Committee.—That the B.E.A. "Standard" Correspondence Courses continue to do most useful work is shown by the increase of Students taking the Preliminary and Advanced Courses. Members of the B.E.A. do not, however, support the Translation Course, which was added to give Diplomitoj a chance of increasing their knowledge of Esperanto, and of developing style. The Council desires to tender to the Tutors its warmest thanks for the self-denying way in which they give their time to this work. The Honorary Secretary finds their co-operation and kindness invaluable.

Examination Committee.—Although the number of candidates for the Preliminary Certificate during 1926 was somewhat higher than in any of the three preceding years, there was a considerable decrease in the number of candidates for the Advanced Certificate.

The results of the examinations in 1926 were as follows:—Preliminary:—Certificates awarded 75; ditto with distinction 68; failed 45; Total 188. Last year 174. Advanced:—Certificates awarded 24; ditto with distinction 6; failed 11; Total 41. Last year 67.

It is hoped that as one result of the 18th Congress a large increase will be observable in the statistics for 1927.

Literary Committee.—The proposals for Literary Competitions during 1927, for prizes to be awarded out of the various funds placed at the Committee's disposal, appear on page 180 of The British Esperantist for December, 1926.

Radio Committee—Much quiet but steady work has been done. One disappointment was the proposed petition to the B.B.C. If Members had done their duty we could have presented an influential petition, calling attention to the undoubtedly wide desire for Esperanto transmissions; but most members apparently left the work to others. The number of signatures obtained was insufficient to give a true impression of the reality of the demand. The inertia thus manifested, when even so small a piece of work is asked for, is deplorable. It is hoped that Members will in future take more active interest in promoting the use of Esperanto in the Radio world, in which Esperanto is badly needed, and will be of inestimable value.

During the Edinburgh Congress, Esperanto broadcasts were given from Edinburgh and Glasgow. These were followed on September 5th by fifteen minutes from Daventry.

In an article in The Wireless World, our

Member Mr. Carr, of Southampton, formulated a scheme of International Call-Signs based on Esperanto, which attracted much interest in Radio Circles. There is reason to hope that when alternative programmes are the order of the day an Esperanto Instruction Course will be arranged.

The Committee urges the necessity for much greater and more serious work in this field.

Edinburgh Congress.—A notable event of Esperanto life in Britain in the year was the holding of the Universal Congress in Edinburgh in August. The Congress Committee is to be congratulated on the complete success of all their arrangements—official, educational, social, and financial.

Encyclopaedia Britannica.—Another sign of the times is the inclusion, in the just issued supplementary volumes of this great standard work, of a long article under the heading "Universal Language," which gives information on the progress of the International Language movement in general, and forms a powerful plea for Esperanto—in welcome contrast to the article by Prof. Sweet on the same subject in the previous edition.

Sankta Biblio.—The publication of the whole Bible in Esperanto is an event which will have far-reaching consequences for the language and the movement. The Old Testament translation is Zamenhof's masterpiece; the New Testament translation has been carefully revised. The whole Esperanto world is greatly indebted to those who by preparation of the volume or by financial help rendered its publication possible.

The whole of this material, together with separate collections of leaflets, MSS, cuttings,

music, and pictures, is arranged on the Dewey system, and available for reference. 100 current Esperanto magazines are to be found in the Reading Room, and back issues are filed. Funds are greatly needed for binding, for further bookcases, and other necessities, and help would be greatly appreciated. The Library is for reference only, and books may not be removed from the room.

Lantern Slide Collection.—This has been largely increased by gifts. Thanks are due to the various donors; also to Miss M. L. Blake, the curator.

Correspondence.—Correspondence received during the year was 16,740; correspondence dispatched, 24,735; circulars dispatched, 8291.

Office Staff.—In recording its thanks to Mr. Butler and the staff, whose thorough devotion to their duties is practical evidence of their zeal for the Cause, the Council feels that it must especially congratulate the members on the readiness with which Mr. C. C. Goldsmith stepped into the breach at the very beginning of the year. The resulting improvements in organisation, and the introduction of new methods, have largely contributed to the turn of the tide in the Association's affairs set out in this Report and the accompanying Balance Sheet.

Summarising 1926; it may be claimed that in its admirable new premises, in the successful progress and prospects of International Language, in its largely increased book sales, in its return to a more normal financial position in spite of necessarily heavier expenditure in some directions, the Association has started on a new lease of life. With all these encouragements it has embarked with renewed vigour on a campaign for increase of membership at 5/-. MUST BE REMEMBERED THAT MEMBERSHIP IS ITS LIFE-BLOOD, which is essential to its existence. It rests with the present members whether the Association shallby their lassitude—have to struggle against anæmic tendencies, or whether it shall be a full-blooded body, active in every limb, fighting for our Cause with undivided energy, irresistible strength, and inevitable success.

THE "EDINBURGH" ESPERANTO DICTIONARY.

Since this little dictionary appeared in 1915, it has been so much appreciated that nine editions have been called for, and in all upwards of 37,000 copies have been sold.

As some persons have found the necessarily small type rather trying for the eyes, it has been decided to reprint the work with a somewhat bigger type. The size of the page will be slightly larger, but still quite suitable for a man's pocket or a lady's handbag. The opportunity is being taken to include in both parts of the larger book (Esperanto-English and English-Esperanto) all the most recently-approved roots, with the new words introduced by Dr. Zamenhof in his translation of the Old Testament, and many others that have come into general use. As thus revised, the book will be the most complete dictionary of the kind for English-speaking countries. In consequence of the present high cost of type-setting, the price will have to be slightly increased, but it will still be very moderate for a two-sided dictionary. It may be mentioned that the small royalties received by the compilers are entirely devoted to the propaganda of Esperanto, and that it is intended to continue the existing edition, which is very suitable for use in classes.

A further announcement will be made when the new booklet is ready.

TRANSLATION COMPETITION.

(First three verses of Gray's Elegy).

This proved to be no easy task. Twenty attempts were received, several good, but none beyond criticism. In the absence of a rendering indubitably the best, the prize was divided. Sums of 5/- each have therefore been awarded to Mr. J. J. Boutwood and Miss L. Iddon; and of 2/6 each to Miss E. Gregory, Miss C. O. Taylor, Mr. G. W. Williams, and a mysterious unknown (postmark Southern D.O., Edinburgh), who is hereby asked to disclose his or her identity.

No one made a really satisfactory translation of the third verse. Few succeeded in reproducing the repeated "save that" (krom ke). Nur and sed hardly give the same idea, and "escepte flugas la skarabo" will not do, for escepte means not "except" but "exceptionally." Curiously enough, no one translated "herd" by the grego of Zamenhof's later works. It is interesting to compare the version by the Rev. A. L. Curry in Eklezia Revuo (1922, p. 61).

Mr. Boutwood's verses are as follows:

Aŭdiĝas vespersonorila vok'. Plugisto laca hejmen iras for. Brutar' muĝante vagas de la lok'; Mi sole restas en silenta hor'. Noktiĝas nun, kaj malaperas lum', Aer' trankvila, ne blovetas vent'; Nur de skaraboj venas daŭra zum', Kaj ŝafaj tintoj lulas en silent'; Sed al la lun' la strigo plendas pri Vagulo, kiu promenante nur Alproksimiĝas, dum malgaja kri' Resonas el hederkovrita tur'.

Somewhat less than perfection are the accentuation of "vesper," the translation of "save" by nur and sed; the transposition of the second and third lines in verse 1; the superfluous nur in verse 3 in order to make a rhyme; the lack of an object to lulas, and of a verb to go with aer' trankvila. Possibly sole and trankvila might be sola and trankvilas.

Let us now hear Miss Iddon:

Sonoras horo de la tagofin', Blekante la bovaro paŝas for, Plugisto laca hejmen trenas sin; Lasiĝas ter' al mi kaj noktokor'. Je scen' krepuska velkas nun la lum', Silento sidas sur ĉiela tron'; Nur rondeflugas la skaraba zum', Kaj el ŝafejoj tintas lula son'; Nur strigo dorma plendas al la lun', Aŭdate el hedertegita tur',

Ke trudemuloj vagas ie nun

En ŝia sola laŭbo de plezur'.

This would have got the prize, had it not trailed off so poorly at the end. Noktokor', or, more simply, nokta kor', is a bright thought. Note the nur again, the weak je, and the gratuitous dorma.

Mr. Williams' attempt is for the most part excellent.

Bovaro vagas kun muĝanta kri', Plugisto peze hejmeniras for, La mondon lasas al mallum' kaj mi.

Pejzaĝo malaperas pro mallum', Solene trankviliĝas la aer'; Krom kie sonas la skaraba zum'.

Krom ke ĉe jena hederita tur' Al luno plendas la malgaja strig'

Note the clever alliteration five times in these few lines. In spite of slight hiatuses (la aer', al luno), these verses would have gained the prize without question, had not the remainder been very unequal.

Other noteworthy lines are Miss Gregory's

Pejzaĝo mulaperas en mallum',

Miss Taylor's

Plugisto lace hejmen trenas sin;

Edinburgano's

Malgaje strigo plendas al la lun'; and Mr. French's

Kaj dormaj tintoj tremas en ŝafej'.

Phrases of interest cluster round the owl (malĝoja strigo, noktu' enua, strig' ulula, enue plendas gufo, strigina ve-ulul'); the beetle (La blapso zume radas, zumetas muŝvojaĝ', skaraba flugsonaĵ', skaraba rondvojaĝo); and the herd (bovaro serpentumas, malrapidas bovinaro, bleka bovinaro, serpentas muĝe). In one case the herd has sadly diminished in numbers, perhaps through foot and mouth disease: -Hejmen muĝas la bovin'.

A few competitors show little feeling for rhyme, and none for rhythm. It should not be necessary, though it is, to point out that sonas, iras; brutaro, mallumo; though the last letters are the same, do not rhyme.

A few thoughtful minds produced expressions more ingenious than poetical. For example: tintetec', dormettintoj, prahedermantela tur', monarhecminaca paŝsusur', solrestas mi kun iĝa noktmalklar'.

We have given some space to these notes in the hope that competitors, though they will disagree, may find them provocative of thought, and helpful for possible future occasions.

GENEROUS GIFT.

We record with deep gratitude the receipt of a legacy of £50 from our lamented friend, Mr. John Bredall. This has been placed to the credit of the Capital (50,000 Shillings) Fund of the Association.

It may not be amiss to express the hope that other Members will follow this excellent example, if they have not already done so. The following suggested wording may be helpful for the purpose:-

I give and bequeath to the British Esperanto Association (Incorporated), London, the sum of £ clear of Legacy Duty, to be raised and paid out of such part of my personal estate and effects as by law I am enabled to charge herewith: Upon Trust, to apply the same for the general purposes of the said Association. And I declare that my executors shall not be bound to

see to the investment of the said legacy or to require any declaration of trust as to the investment thereof: but the receipt of the Secretary for the time being shall be a sufficient discharge to my executors for such legacy.

I.L. EXTENSION LEAGUE.

The members of this League are doing quiet but steady work which is proving very effective, as is shown in the Revenue Statement for the current year.
