THOUGHTS FOR TO-DAY.

Our first word must be one of sincere thanks to those who have already begun to work for our Membership Campaign. The enthusiastic way in which some members are recruiting is very encouraging, and warmly appreciated.

New Members! We bid you hearty welcome. Your entry into our ranks is a real help to the movement, and our Association is one to which, judged by its record of work accomplished, you may feel proud to belong.

Our present task is so to increase our membership roll as to place the B.E.A. on a firm financial footing, and thus enable it to do its work without continually begging from those who are already doing their share. Can we do this? I believe we can, if we make a decided effort.

I have been a group secretary for many years. Full well I know his troubles, especially if he is a pioneer in a new district. I know the difficulties of recruiting, of collecting membership dues, and of getting anyone else to do anything. I know how often the secretary himself pays the greater part of the rent of the meeting-place and other expenses, and I know something of the discouragement he receives from those who do nothing but criticise and leave the work to him.

I sympathise, too, with the class teacher, and his feeling that when students have just paid for a year's course and a textbook, it is not a suitable time to ask them to pay further for membership of an Association in which they have as yet no interest.

I know, too, the diffidence and difficulty each one of us feels in asking for a subscription from friends who are perhaps not too well off, or who do not yet share one's enthusiasm for Esperanto.

But having said all this, and realising the difficulties to the full, I see also another side. I do know that classes are formed, and run their course, whose members never once hear of the existence of the B.E.A., though certainly some would join gladly if tactfully approached. I do know also that if every individual member will but bring one more into our ranks, and this is surely possible, the perennial difficulties of the B.E.A. will disappear, and constant appeals for financial help will be a thing of the past. I do know that in most groups there are at least some non-members who would join if they realised the need.

Now to join the Association, and receive its monthly organ, is one very definite way to become a part of the movement. Even isolated individuals can hardly receive *The British Esperantist* twelve times a year, especially if *International Language* is added, without gaining some intelligent interest in Esperanto matters. The group secretary, the class leader, who can attach his members to the B.E.A., is thereby doing much to make them convinced Esperantists, and incidentally to strengthen their interest in the local group. Nothing else will so effectually prevent leakage as the realisation that one is a recognised part of a great world-wide movement.

One member suggests that during the few next months each group might arrange a sale of work, a concert, a whist drive, or some similar function, one half of the profits to go to local funds, the other half to the B.E.A. I hope that this suggestion will be seriously considered and widely acted upon. There are many who will throw themselves with vigour into a concrete effort of this kind, to whom an abstract campaign for membership makes no appeal. Definite work for the movement, too, impresses upon the worker the fact that the movement depends upon his help; and to get British Esperantists in general to realise the necessity for supporting their central organisation is our first need.

During the gathering the organisers would of course use the opportunity to speak about the movement: the local group, the class and the B.E.A.; and much can be said in a public meeting which is not easy to say in personal conversation. The financial result of such an effort might not be great, but even a little help would appreciably lessen the immediate strain. And prospects for the future, if present progress can be continued, are undoubtedly bright.

Think the matter over carefully. Can you help? If so, will you? Yours will be no isolated effort. We are making a long pull and a strong pull, to put the Association once and for all in a firm position. Let it be a pull all together. Do not leave it to others. Make it a point of honour personally to bring in at least one new member.

Is this indeed too much to ask? I firmly believe that our list of candidates for membership will prove that when a definite effort is required we do not look to you in vain. M.C.B.

July-September.

Meetings, 5. Average attendance, 10.

Book Prices. In order to stimulate sales, the prices of several books were reduced. *B.E.A. Diary.* It was decided to issue this for 1931. *Telegraphic Address.* A proposal to save money by dropping this was rejected. *Storage.* Arrangements were made for better storage of stocks. *Oxford Congress.* Permission was given to inset an appeal in "The British Esperantist." *Technical Dictionary.* Consideration of the publication of a Technical Dictionary was held over. *I.L. Editorship.* The resignation of Mr. L. N. Newell as Hon. Editor of I.L. was accepted with regret. *I.L. Posters.* In the interests of economy, it was decided to discontinue the issue of these. *Finance.* Various suggestions were considered for relieving the financial situation, e.g. to move nearer the city; to move to a suburban or a provincial district; to drop trading, or I.L., or both. These were all negative.

It was agreed to aim for 1000 new members by the end of March; this would solve many difficulties.

"INTERNATIONAL LANGUAGE."

Owing to pressure of work, Mr. L. N. Newell has resigned the Hon. Editorship of *International Language* after five years' devoted service. He took over the post at a moment's notice in a time of considerable difficulty, and his brilliant work has earned him the sincere gratitude of all British Esperantists. His place will be taken by Mr. K. R. C. Sturmer, who may be trusted to carry on the magazine at its present high level of excellence.
