LETTER FROM A PIONEER.

Fellow Esperantists! Samideanoj!

In my young days one of the most common sentences in our writing exercises was: "Opportunities neglected seldom recur," and the experience of a long life has convinced me of this. As a result of the Oxford Congress we have a great opportunity of making a long step forward. Are we to neglect this?

We are told that in order to take this step it is urgently necessary for the membership of The British Esperanto Association to be increased considerably. Are we going to carry this through? Or are we—we, who kept the green flag of Esperanto flying throughout the great war—now going to let the opportunity slip through apathy and indifference?

Such were my thoughts as I read the appeal for help. But I said to myself: "What can I do? I'm afraid, not much." However, I passed in review all my friends and acquaintances, and to each one offering the least possibility of success I wrote a letter. Now mark the result. I have already enrolled eight new members, one I.L. subscriber, and two donors of 5/-, and I have not yet received the answers from several. Surely this is sufficient encouragement to cause every one of us to be up and doing, and trying to "go one better."
