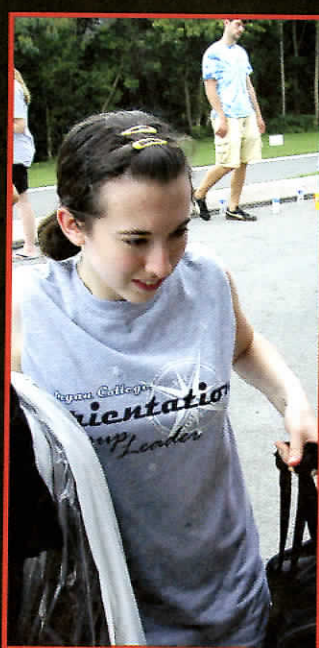

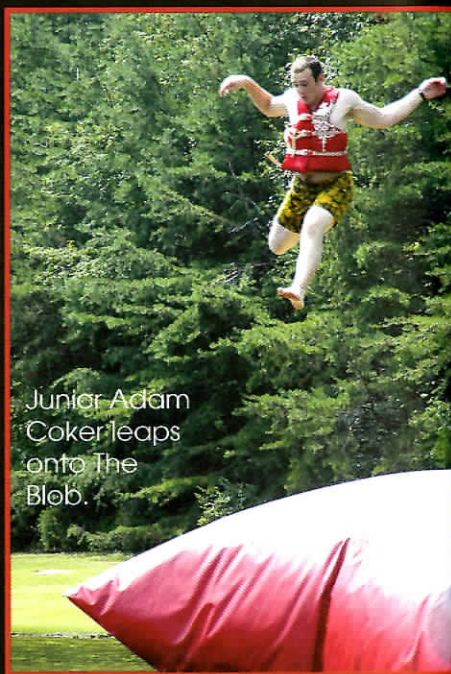

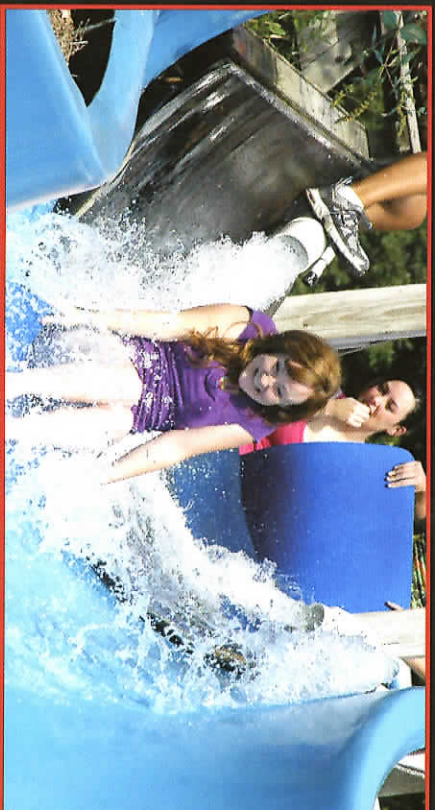

Communications class hosts exciting events

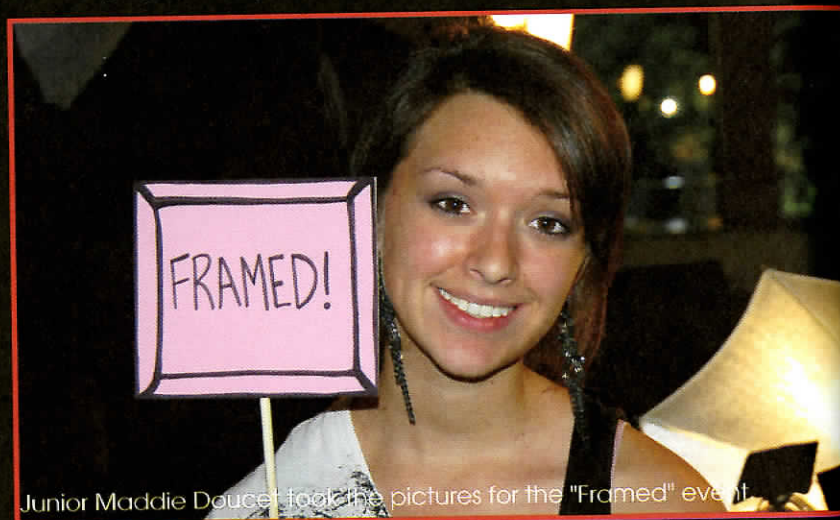

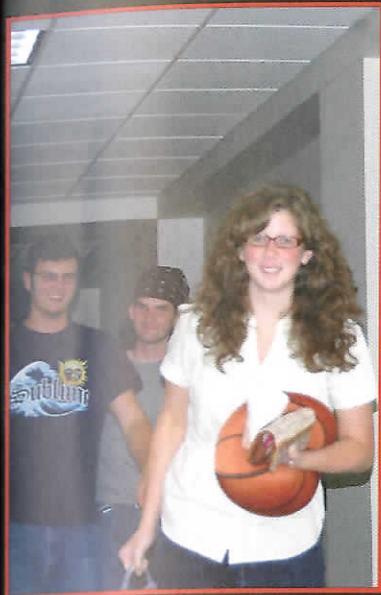

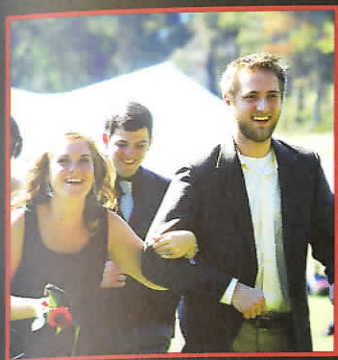

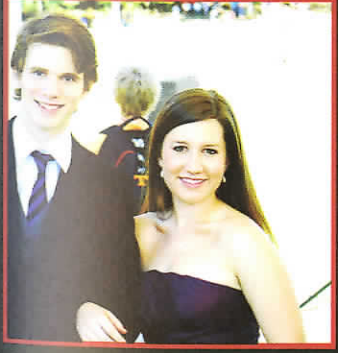

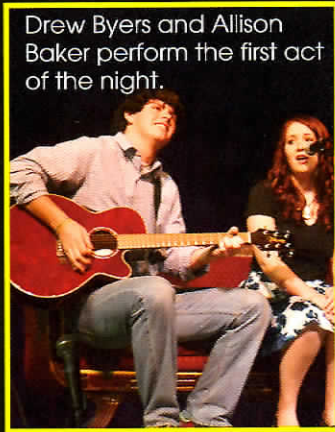
As 2011 approaches, Harvest Bash is a fun event worth looking forward to, and one can only imagine what the themes, activities and costumes will consist of next year.

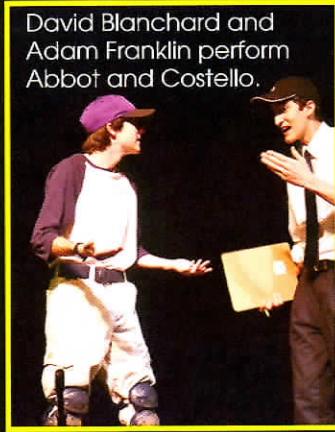

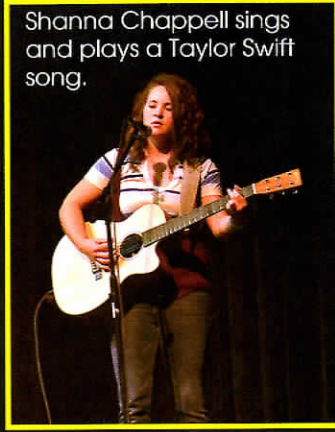

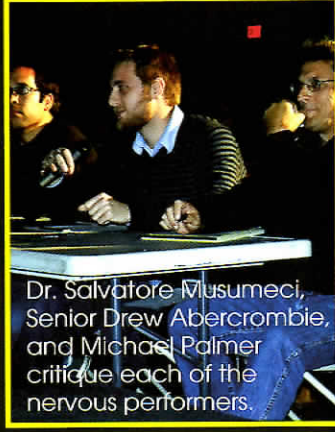

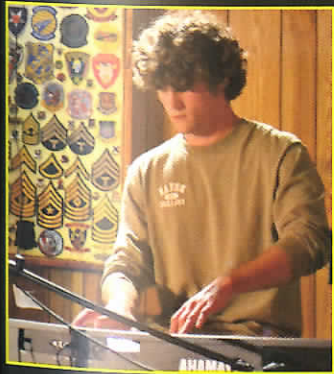

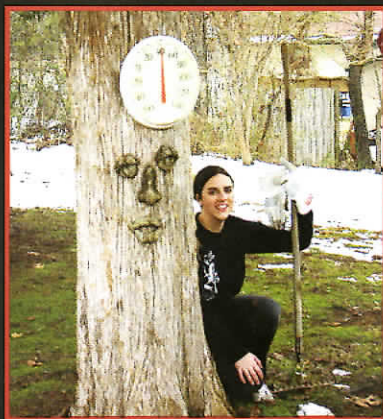
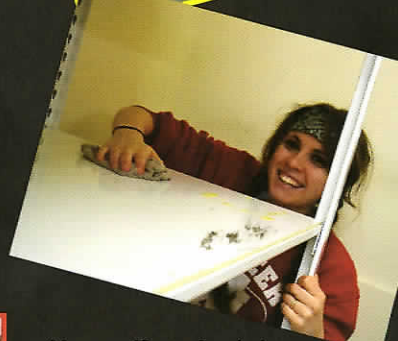
Students show Christ's love to their community

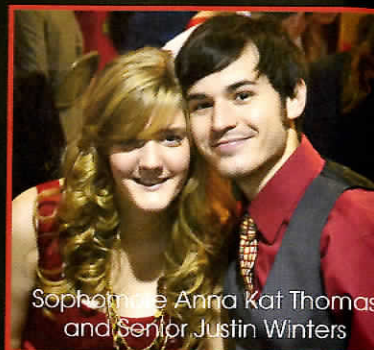

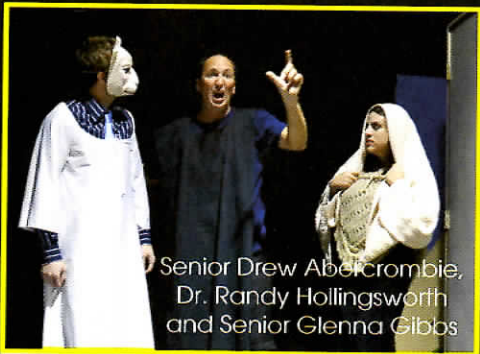

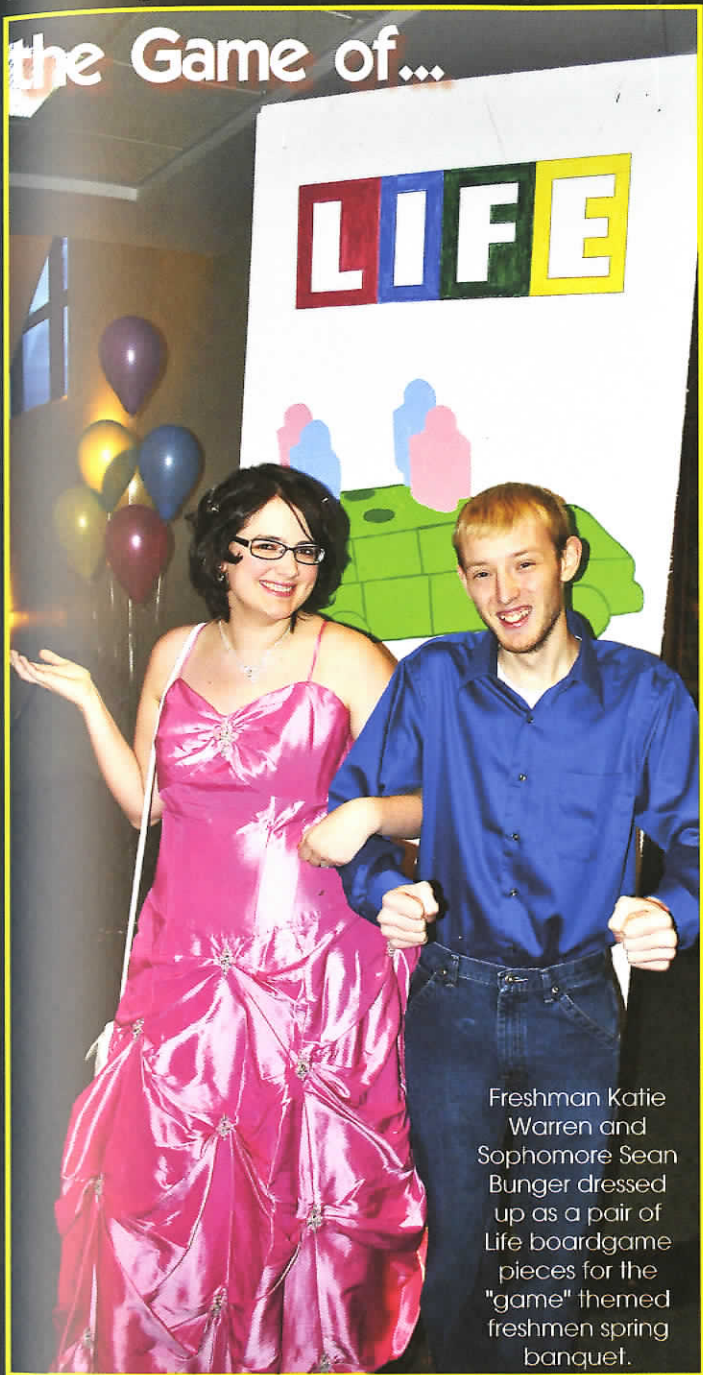

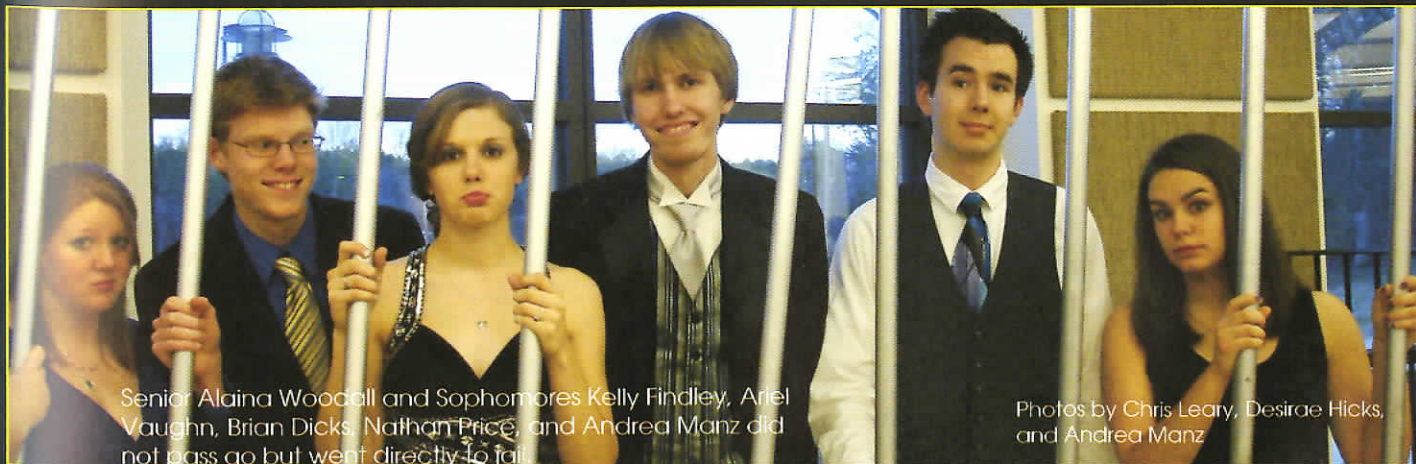

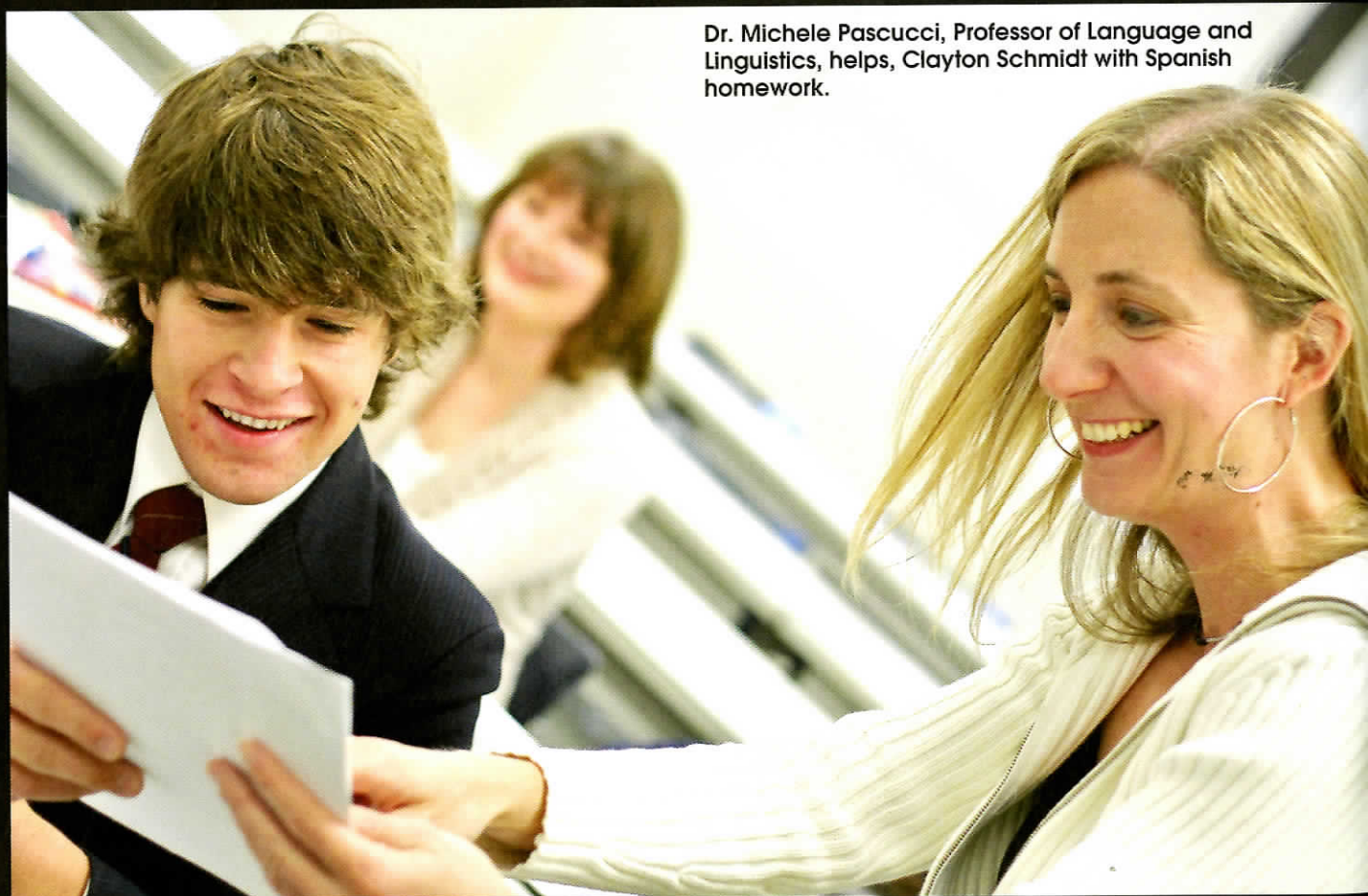

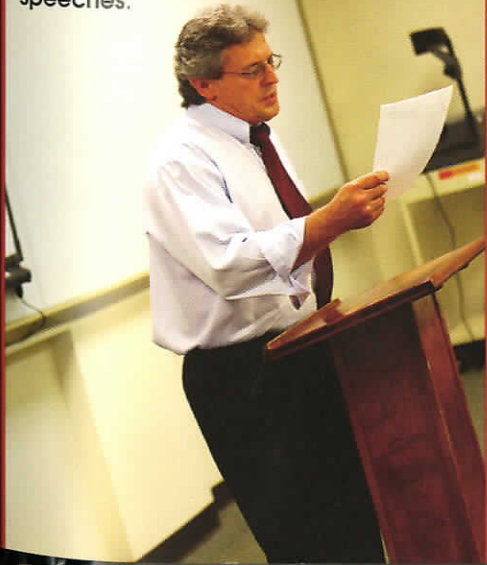

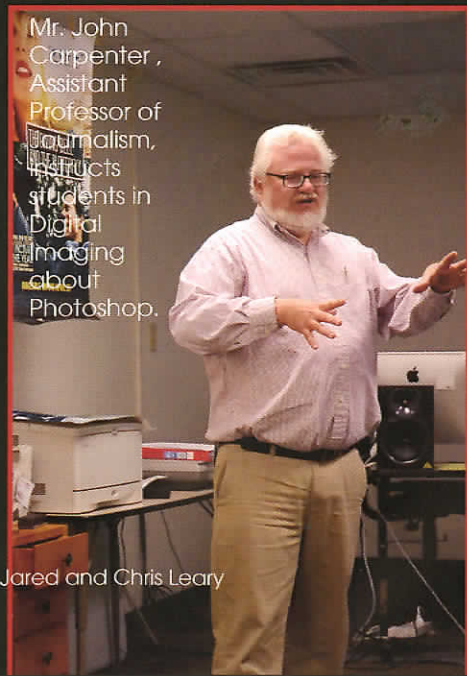

Pinching and Wedging

Bryan gets artsy

In Hand Building, we have done such projects as making plaster stamps, beads, mosaics, whistles, rattles, pinch pots, coil pots, and other projects dealing either with air-dry clay or firing clay. We have also learned multiple techniques, such as pinching and wedging. Pinching is when you get a piece of clay, form it into a circle, put your thumb in the middle, and go round the edges, pulling and pinching out and up to make different shapes. Wedging is when the clay is thrown down against a clean flat surface so that it gets all of the bubbles out. That way, when the clay is fired it does not explode in the kiln.

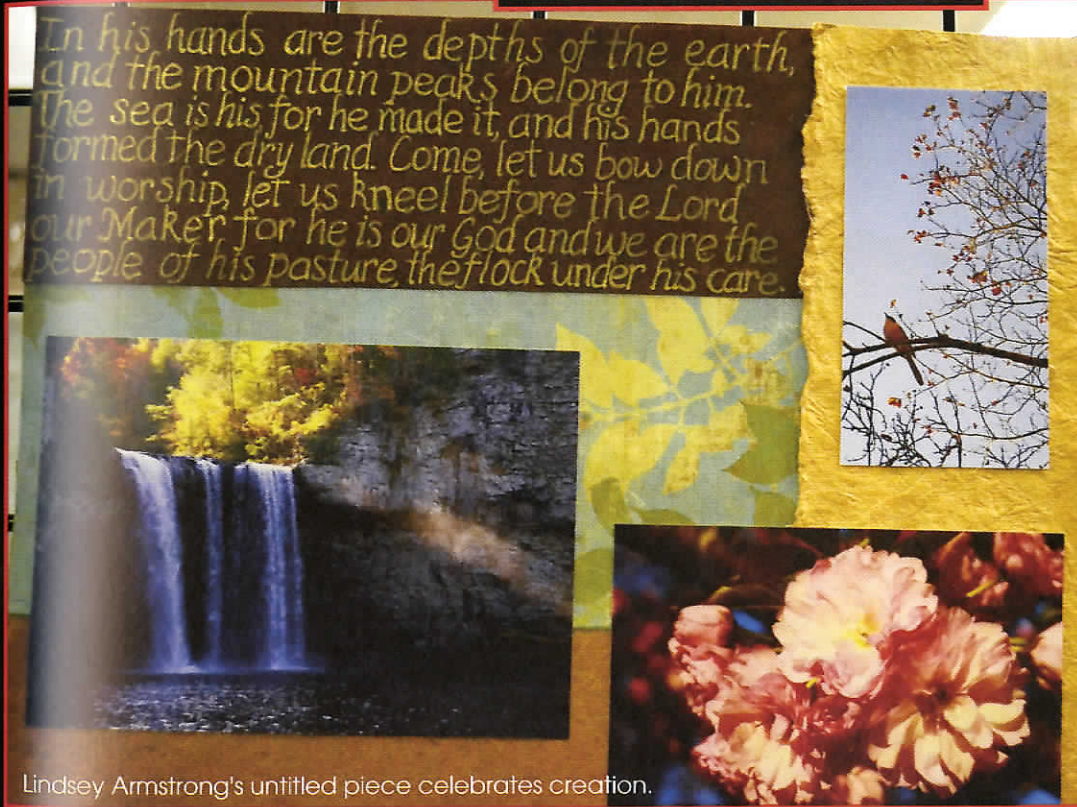

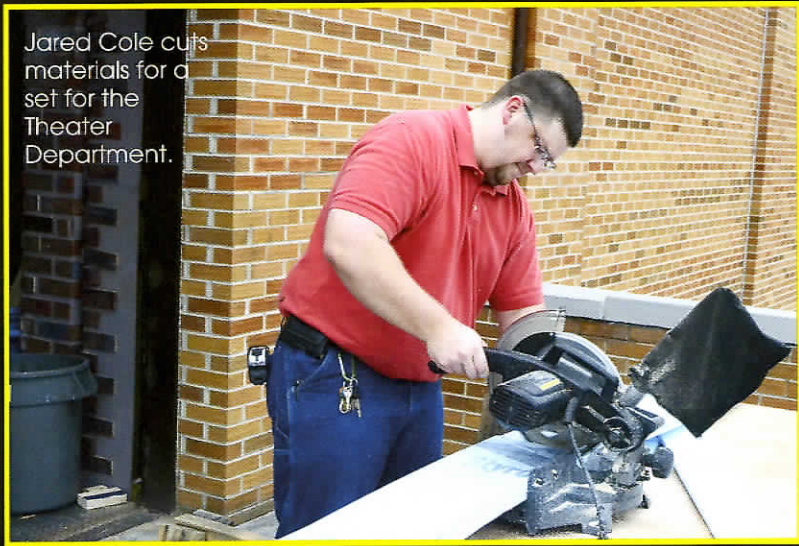

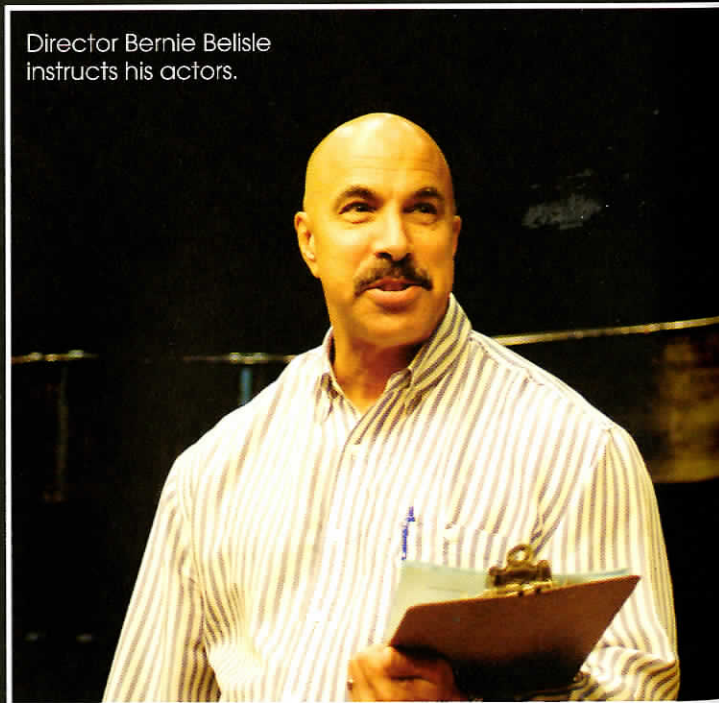

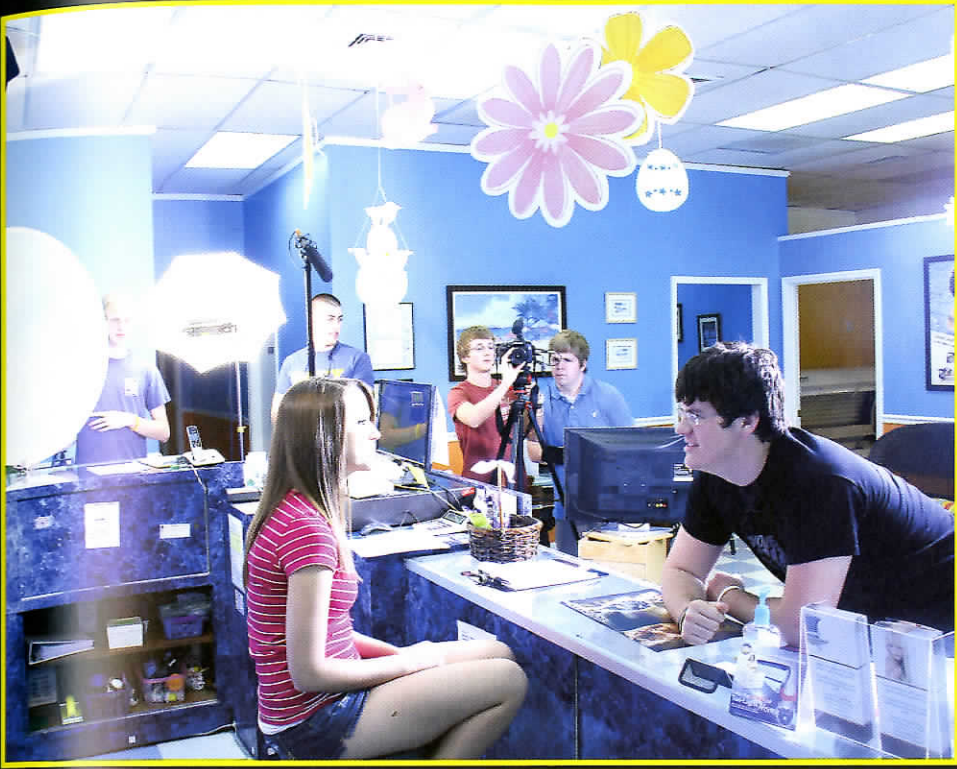

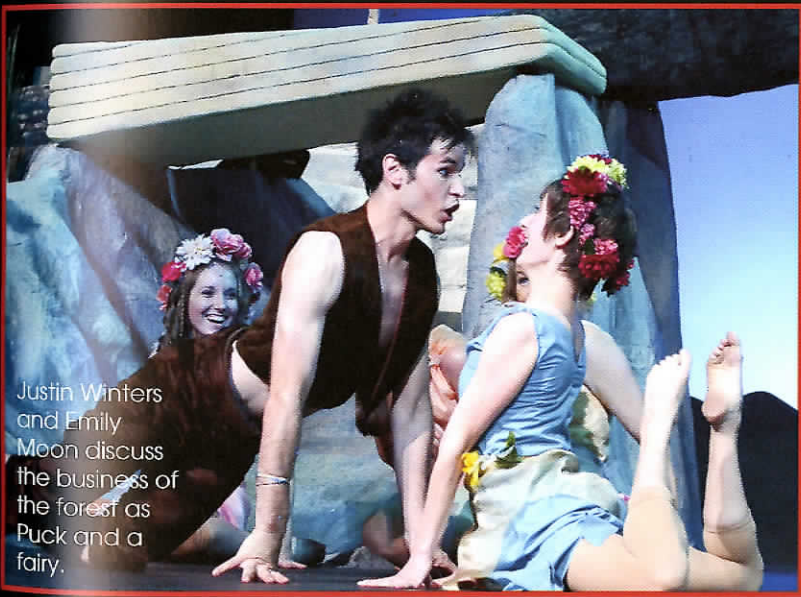

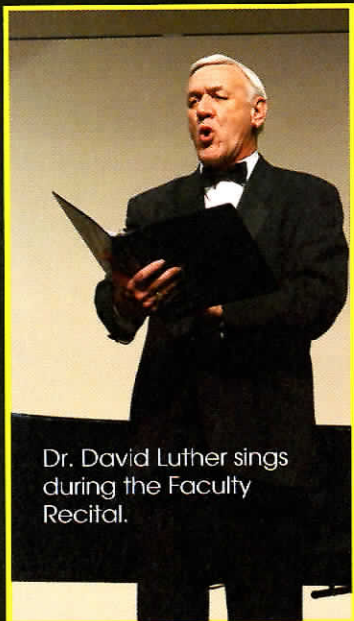

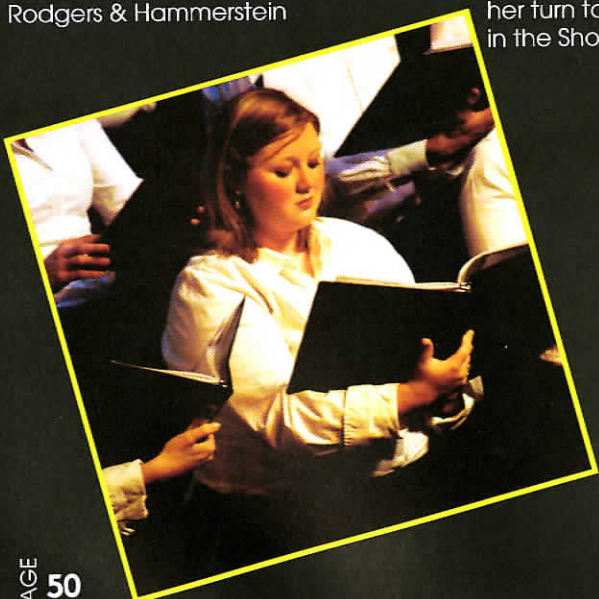

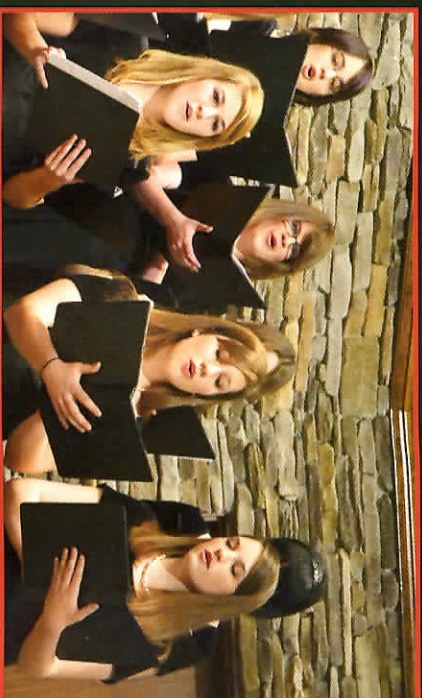

As Christmas approached, dozens of traditional Bryan graduates said "goodbye" to college life and "hello" to their careers.

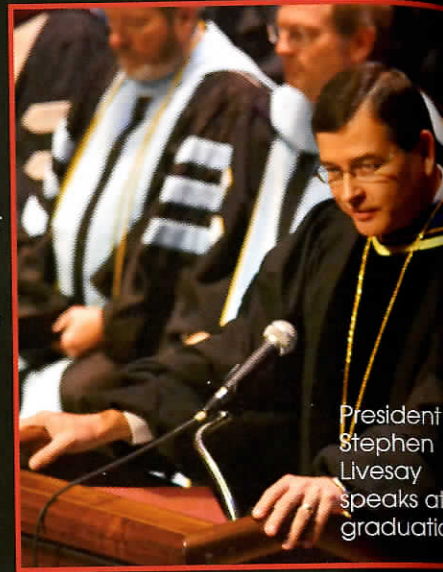

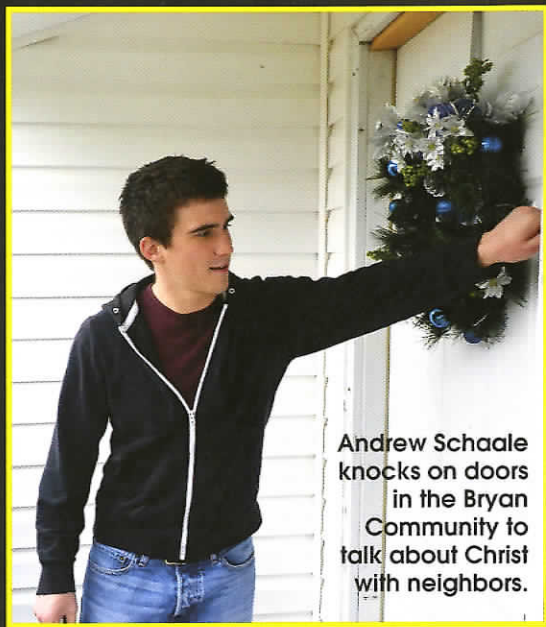

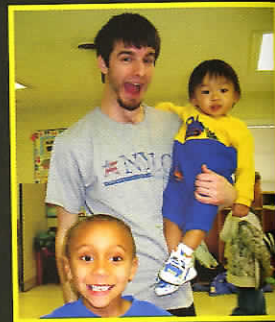

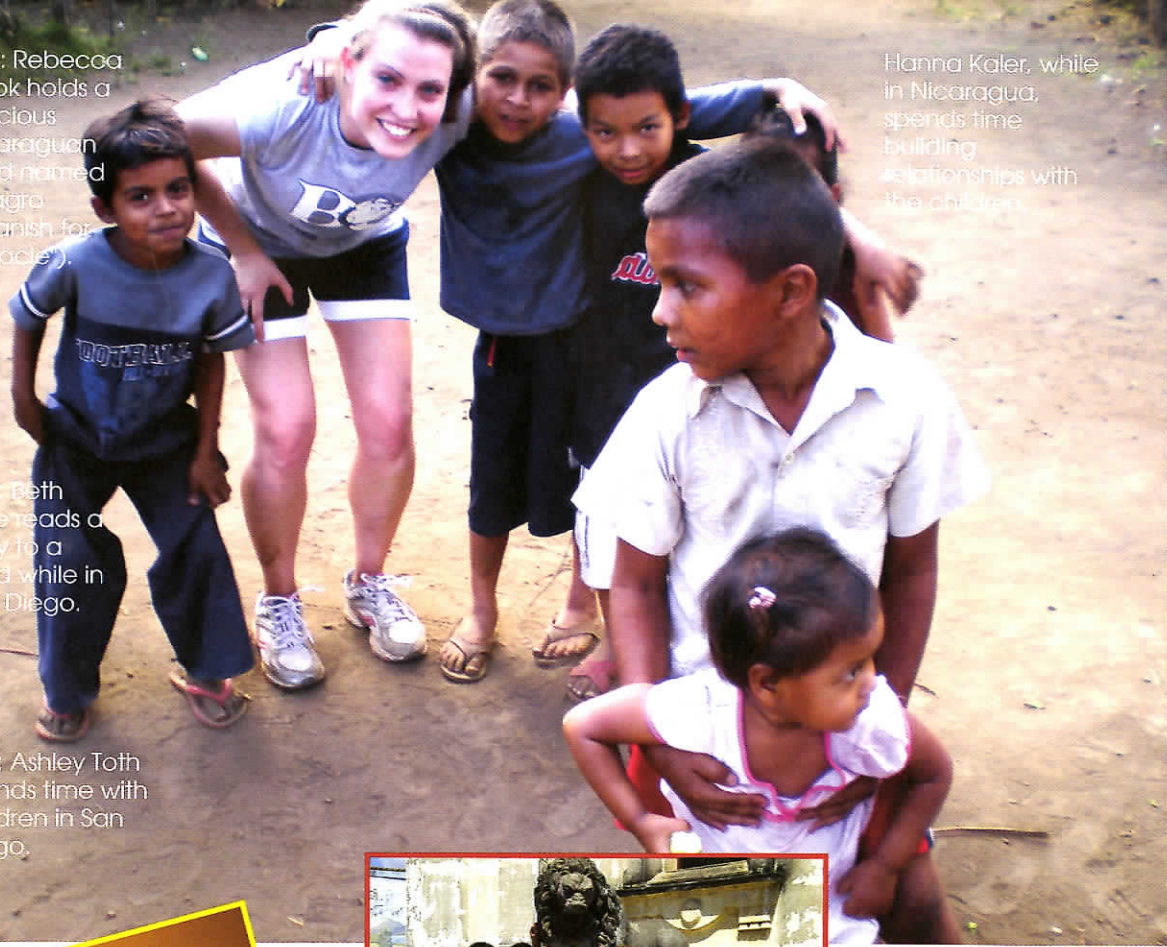

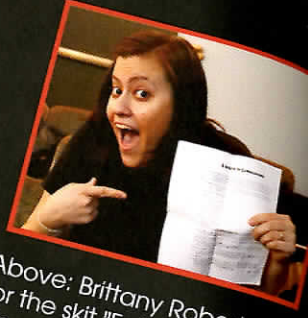

Students in Free Enterprise had their hard work noted with a regional championship and a national award.

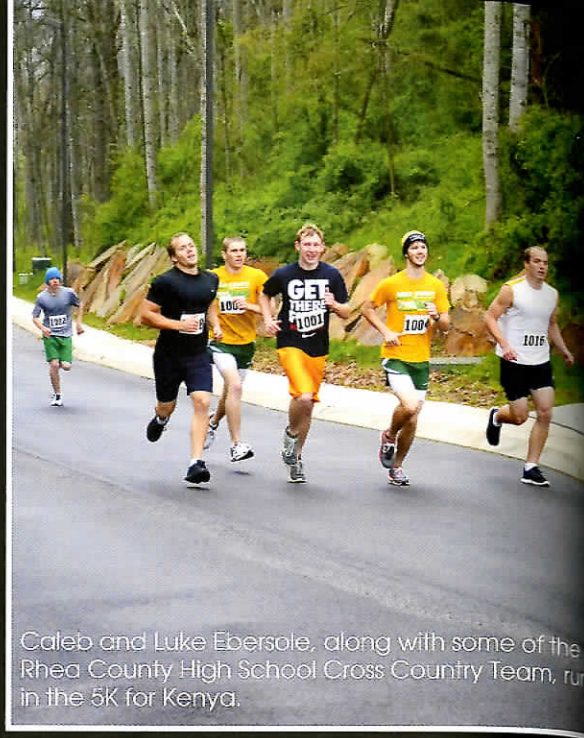
Bryan's SIFE presentation team highlighted two projects, "Reality Check" and "The Kenya Project," in front of a 15-judge panel in Atlanta.

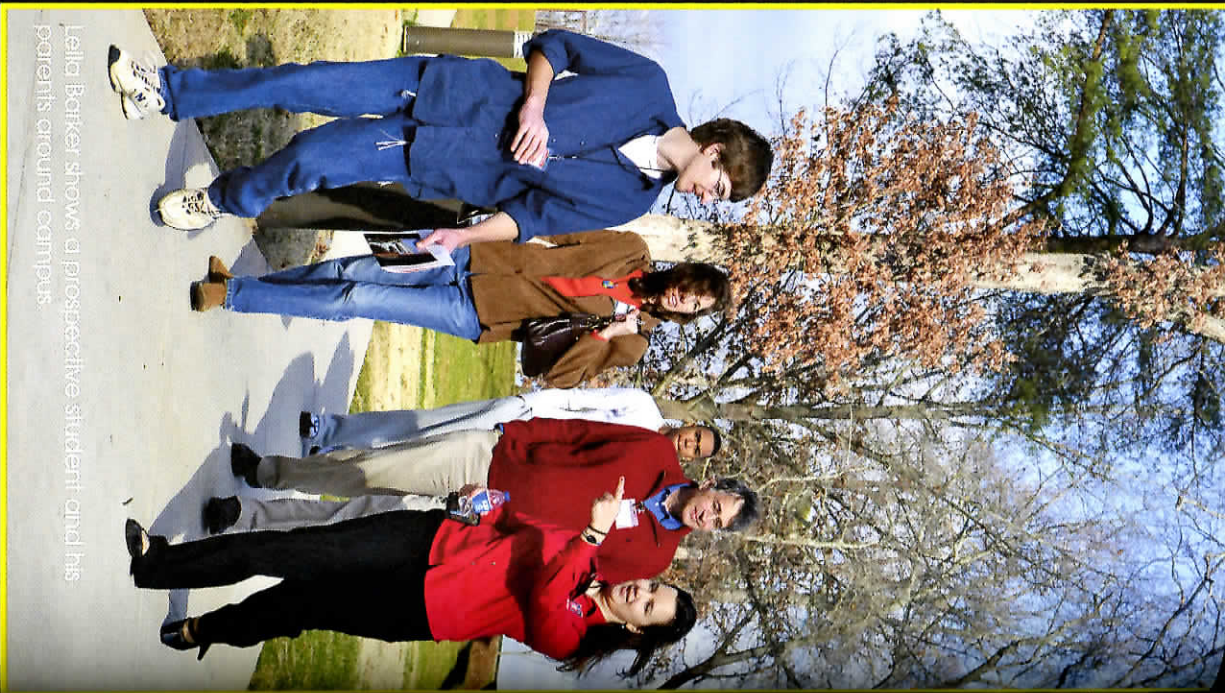

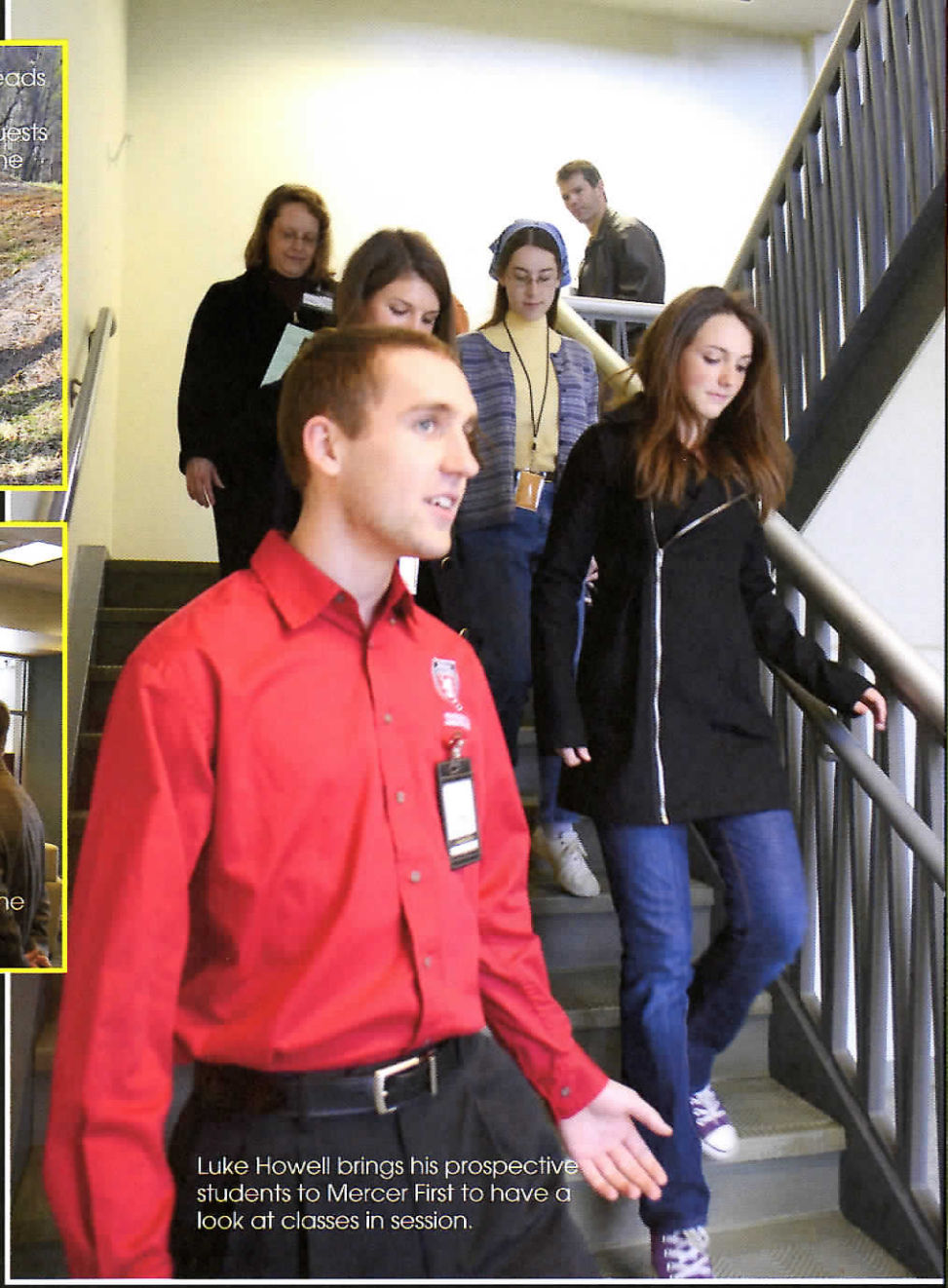

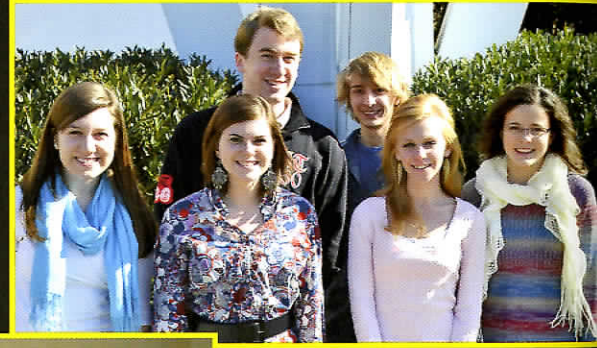

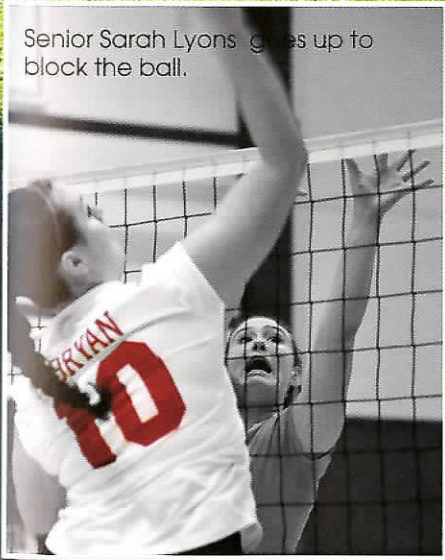

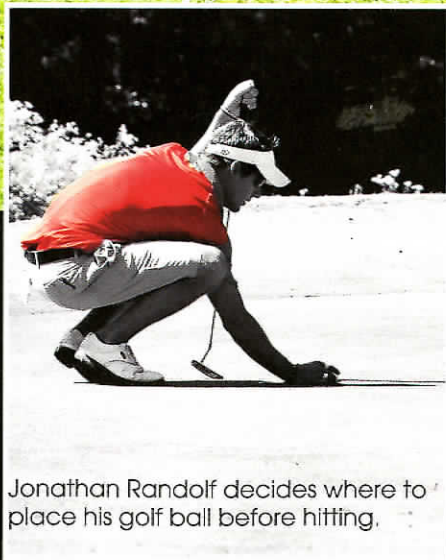

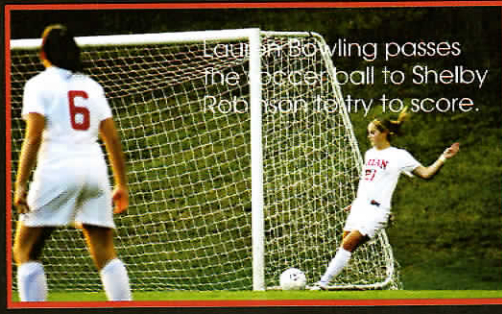

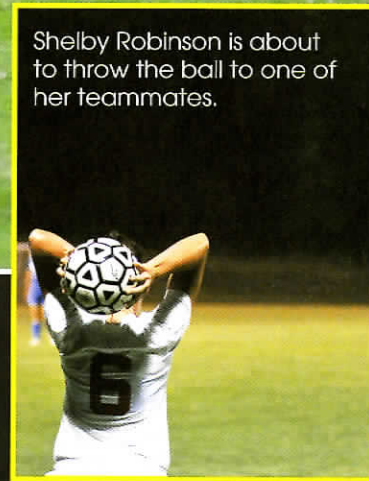

Lions Go for the Goals

"I said it's great to be a Bryan Lion!"

"I'm always proud to be a Lion, win or lose. But today...today is special." These words were spoken by Bryan Senior Garrett Lemons just hours before the Men's Varsity Soccer team would face the Broncos of Hastings (Neb.) College in the 2010 NAIA National Tournament Championship (Orange Beach, Ala.) second round.

The Bryan community gathered on and off campus, watching and cheering on their Lions, ranked fourteenth in the country, as they fell to the undefeated Broncos, ranked third, with a final score of 3-0.

"This season has been an unforgettable experience," said freshman midfielder Jorge Gonzalez. "It's one I will cherish because it was with this team that we made history at Bryan College and the stepping stone for better things to come."

The Lions played an extraordinary season this year both defensively and offensively, scoring 68 goals and allowing only 11 to be scored against them in 22 games.

Hosting and dominating the semifinal and final games of the AAC Tournament Championship, the Lions brought home the conference title for the second year in a row. They were nationally ranked ninth at the end of their regular season — the highest ranking the Bryan soccer program has ever received.

The Lions continued to make history at Bryan by being the first team to host the national tournament's opening round.

"There are only 15 other colleges in the United States who have had this privilege," said head coach Sandy Zensen, "and this is the first time Bryan has ever, in any sport, to my knowledge, hosted a national tournament game. This is huge."

Winning the first round of the national tournament on their home field in double overtime, 2-1, the Lions advanced to the second round of the NAIA National Tournament in Orange Beach, Ala. — another first in Bryan history. This year the Lions made an announcement on the national stage in Alabama, taking the Bryan College name one step farther than ever before and making the Bryan Community proud every step of the way.

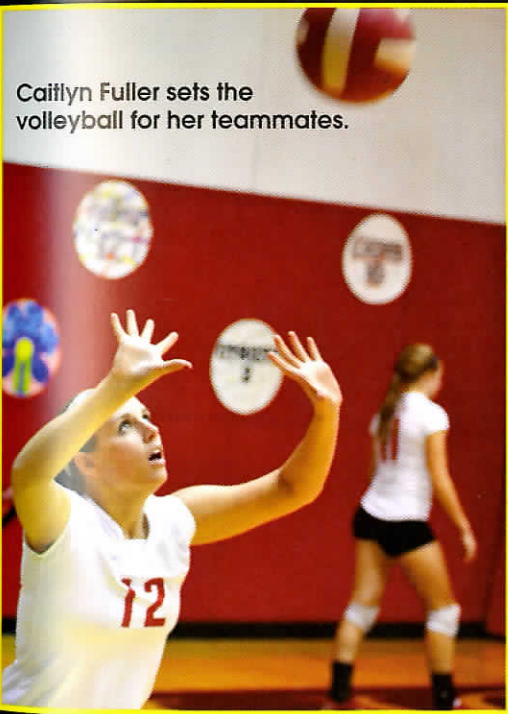

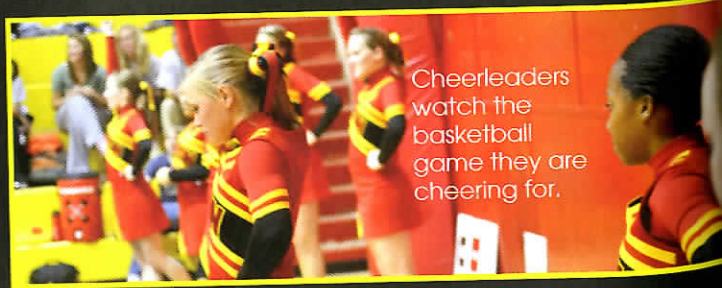

Record Breaking

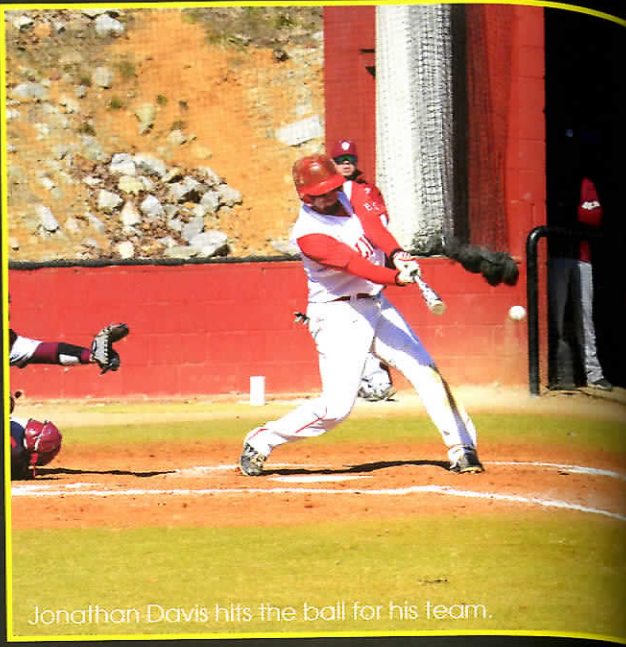
Diamond dwellers set standard!

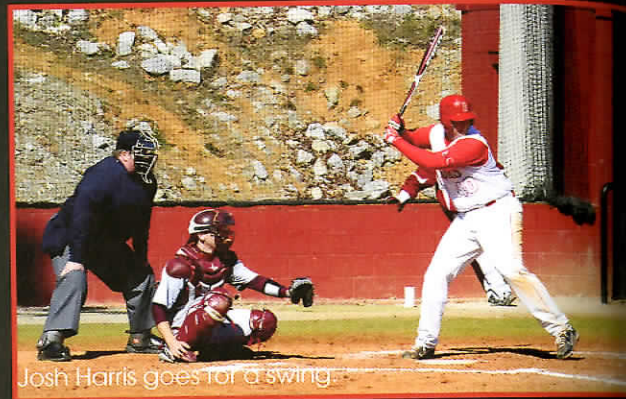

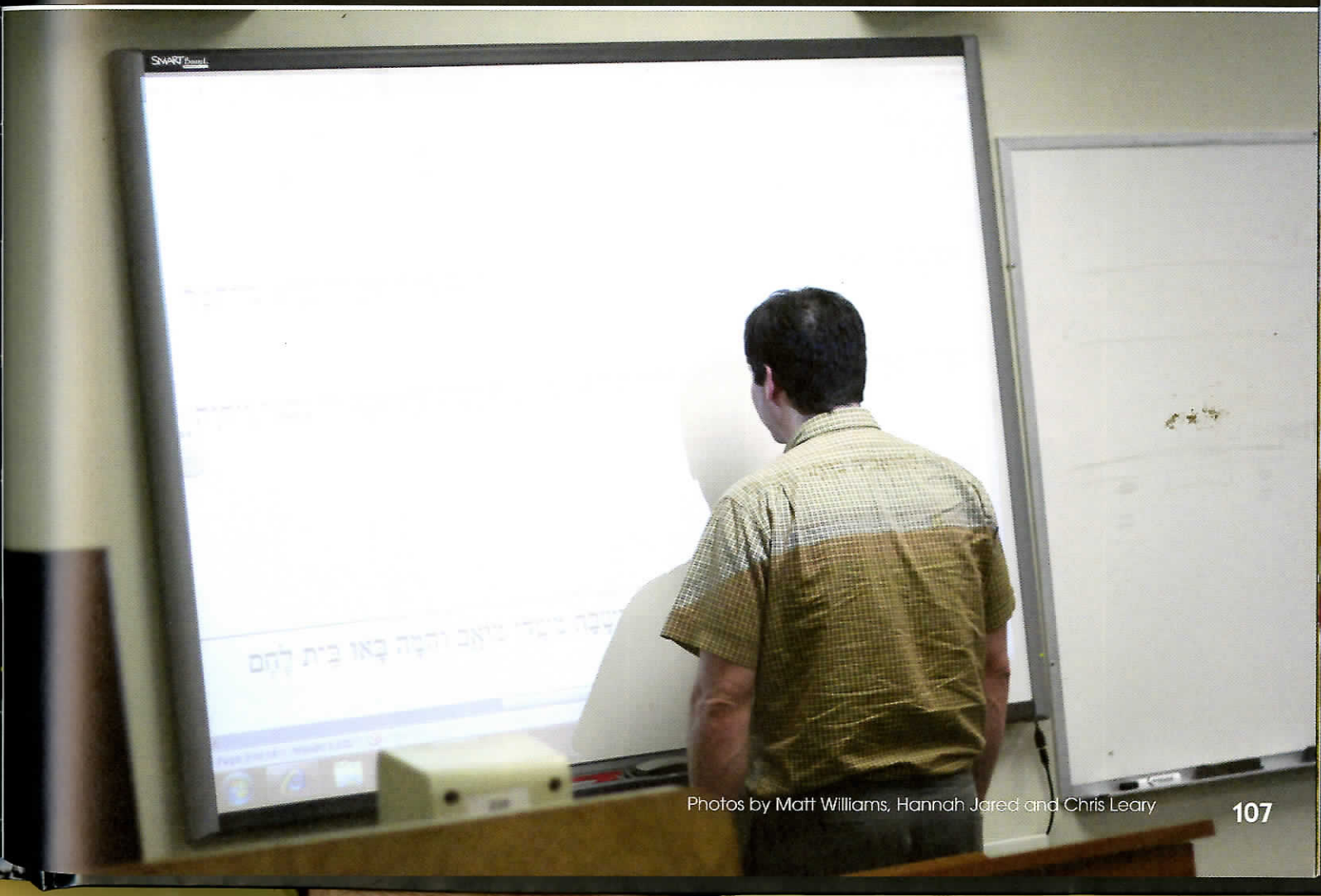
