

Students show Christ's love to their community



neighbor as yourself."





Upperclassmen Find Neverland


Juniors and Seniors follow the first star to the left and go straight on till morning


After leaving, he continued to encourage Bryan by sending a video about how the college helped and encouraged him as well.



The Business Department gives students practical opportunities. Numerous activities allow students to get involved in hands-on experience that they are able to take into future jobs.

Though the Business Department is small with only two professors, Dr. Bill Lay and Dr. Jeff Boyce, it contains many possibilities, including international business. The department took a trip to Romania over Spring Break. There they worked with local businesses.

Each business major is required to complete an internship. Bonnie Fowler traveled to East Asia to complete hers. Through the Acts Project, she interned at a manufacturing company. She analyzed production processes and determined where improvements could be made.

Fowler said, "I also helped other departments with audits, research and English translation."

Other students completed internships locally. Senior Hannah Glupker worked for the Lowcountry Pregnancy Center in Charleston, SC, and Senior Joseph Delrosario worked for Dawson McAllister, "The HopeLine".

Delrosario said, "Here individuals are able to speak to a 'hopecoach' for a longer period of time and through the conversation they get other professional resources to help out further."

Not only do students interact with the community where they intern, they also engage with the Bryan community. Students in the management and marketing classes create a product and sell it on campus. They are required to make a business plan and record profit. In the past, they have sold T-shirts and fleece blankets. The money from sales goes to scholarship funds and organizations like the Women's Care Center.







Get Physical

In Hand Building, we have done such projects as making plaster stamps, beads, mosaics, whistles, rattles, pinch pots, coil pots, and other projects dealing either with air-dry clay or firing clay. We have also learned multiple techniques, such as pinching and wedging. Pinching is when you get a piece of clay, form it into a circle, put your thumb in the middle, and go round the edges, pulling and pinching out and up to make different shapes. Wedging is when the clay is thrown down against a clean flat surface so that it gets all of the bubbles out. That way, when the clay is fired it does not explode in the kiln.
















Jocasta (Ashley Boyd) is Oedipus's unwitting queen and mother.



As Christmas approached, dozens of traditional Bryan graduates said "goodbye" to college life and "hello" to their careers.



The Lions played an extraordinary season this year both defensively and offensively, scoring 68 goals and allowing only 11 to be scored against them in 22 games.

Hosting and dominating the semifinal and final games of the AAC Tournament Championship, the Lions brought home the conference title for the second year in a row. They were nationally ranked ninth at the end of their regular season — the highest ranking the Bryan soccer program has ever received.

ever received.

The Lions continued to make history at Bryan by being the first team to host the national tournament's opening round.

"There are only 15 other colleges in the United States who have had this privilege," said head coach Sandy Zensen, "and this is the first time Bryan has ever, in any sport, to my knowledge, hosted a national tournament game. This is huge."

Winning the first round of the national tournament on their home field in double overtime, 2-1, the Lions advanced to the second round of the NAIA National Tournament in Orange Beach, Ala. – another first in Bryan history. This year the Lions made an announcement on the national stage in Alabama, taking the Bryan College name one step farther than ever before and making the Bryan Community proud every step of the way.


Diamond dwellers set standard!




