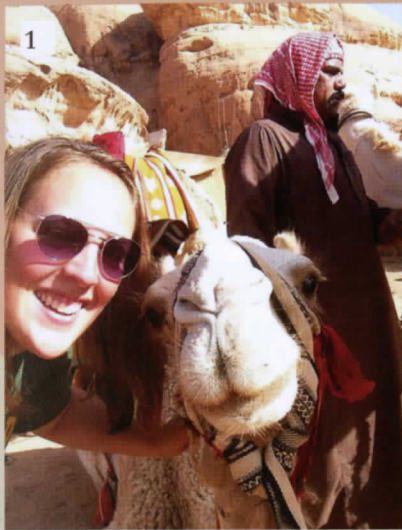

Interacting with a deep rooted caste system mindset and living in India is not for everyone, but for those who enjoy long-term missions, it is an opportunity to grow closer to God and experience a new culture. Senior Daniel Katz is one of those people.

During the summer before his senior year, Katz traveled to India with Bryan's Acts Project. According to Bryan's website, the Acts Project is a "vocational internship in a missions context preceded by an intensive semester of preparation." Katz always wanted to go overseas and was interested in having a more long-term mission experience.

Before the Acts Project, students enroll in a class during the spring semester to prepare them for the summer. The class involves academics and presentations but also includes practical applications of global missions such as groups discussion, cultural questions and case studies.

Katz was first approached by Director of Outreach

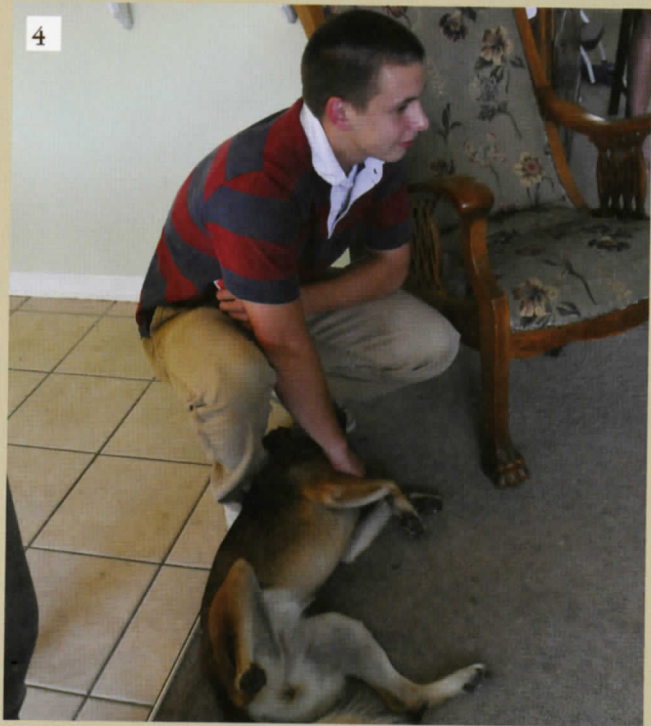
Ministries Eric McEachron. His first two choices were places in the Middle East, and his third choice was India based on the suggestions of Dr. Matt Benson who was vice president of spiritual formation at the time. "You put preferences, but they ultimately place you where they think you should go," Katz said. "I had no inclination to go to India. I ended up in India because that's where [Benson] wanted me to go."

Even though cross-cultural ministry is not for the faint of heart, the best thing about the Acts Project is that it helps to shape you for the future. "It gives you a bigger perspective of the world and how to interact with different cultures. It shows people how to have a look at their own culture and then how God is working all over the globe," Katz said. "You are forced to engage. It's healthy to get bigger and different perspectives, and that's true about all of life," he said.

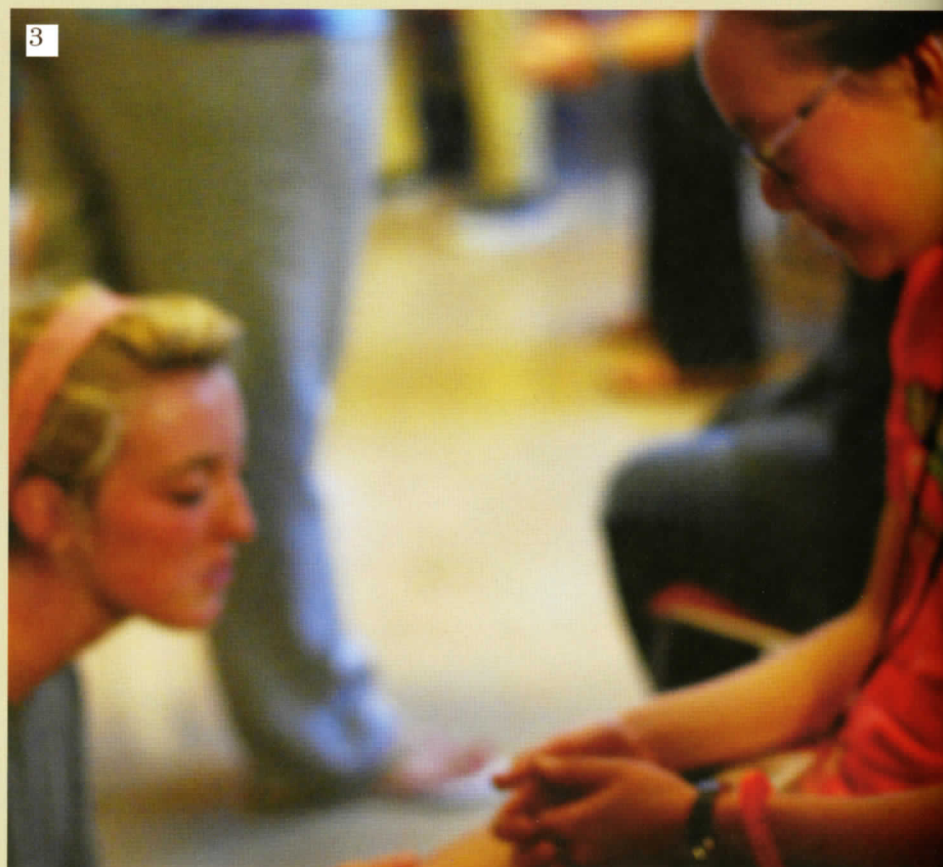
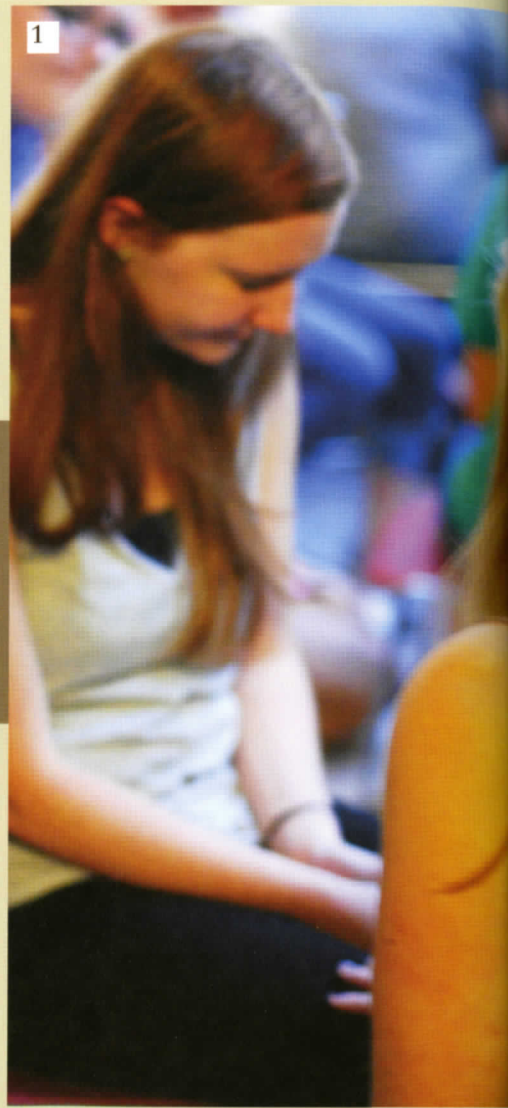

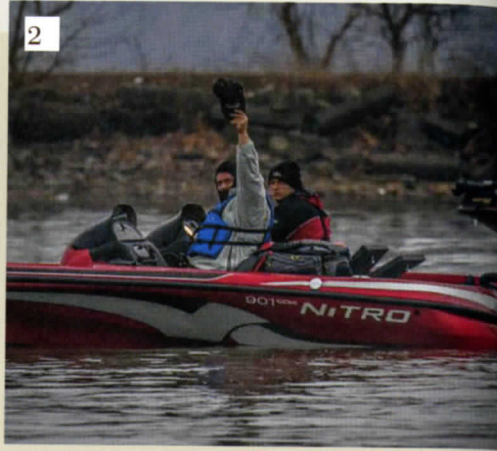

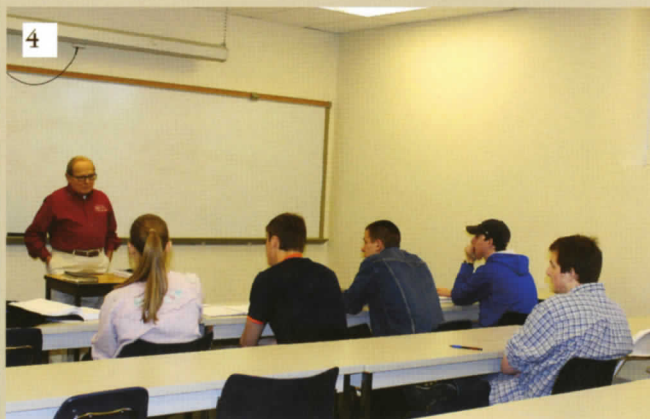

In Spring 2014, Bryan College announced that Long Hall would be transformed into a co-ed residence hall for the coming 2014-15 school year. Instead of triple-bunking female students, the Residence Life staff found that there were enough rooms to accommodate all students on campus in the already existing residence halls. While the change was made in order to remedy the housing needs caused by the closing of Huston Hall, Residence Director Matt Williams and his wife Kati say that the change has positively affected the Bryan College residence life, even though the closing of Huston was a very sad event for many students. Attitude is very

important, though - Matt and Kati both said that they viewed this as a "unique opportunity to try out a new community atmosphere". While they have faced new challenges having girls in the building, Matt credits Kati and Resident Assistant Jessalyn Pierce for keeping everything running smoothly. The Long Hall girls have loved their experience so far. They have even adopted the nickname "Long Flowers". Resident Karis Wnuk said, "Long Flowers are blooming and cultivating a wonderful garden patch here on the hill". When asked if Long Hall would remain co-ed in the future, Matt said yes, "we are absolutely doing it again next year".

This was the first time in Bryan history for a dorm to be co-ed. Long Hall housed both male and female

students in the 2005-2006 school year, but there way no shared living areas. Male students were only allowed to use the back door and the female students could only use the front and side doors. During the 2014-15 school year there were no door restrictions and the students shared common area - the lounge and computer lab. As long as they were in the building by curfew, they could share these areas no matter the time of night.

Heather Newberry, a junior "Long Flower", said "[this] really taught students how to live in a better community with their student at Bryan".

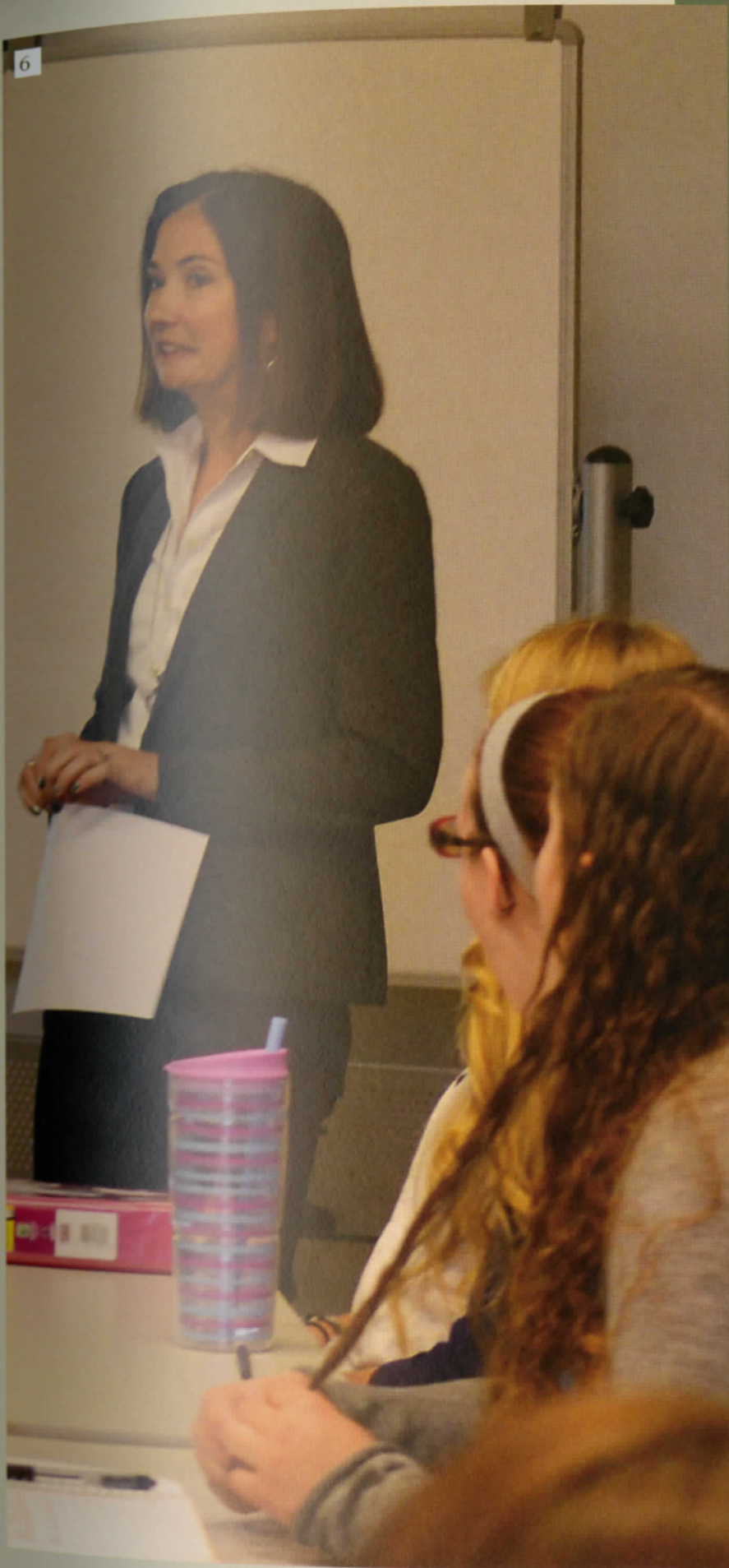

According to senior Gustavo Angel Tamayo, you don't need to be a basketball pro in order to make bank - playing varsity soccer will do just fine.

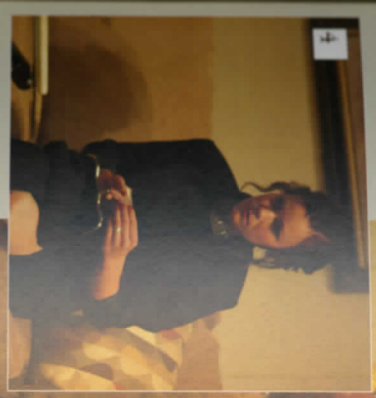
Aside from that one basketball class during his freshman year, Tamayo had no previous collegiate basketball experience.

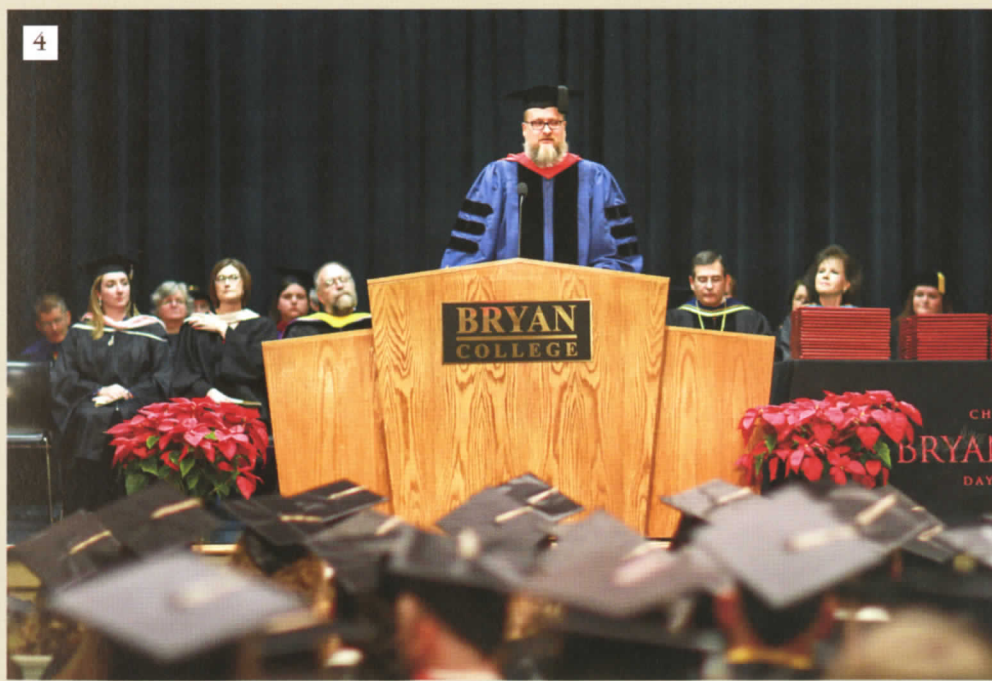
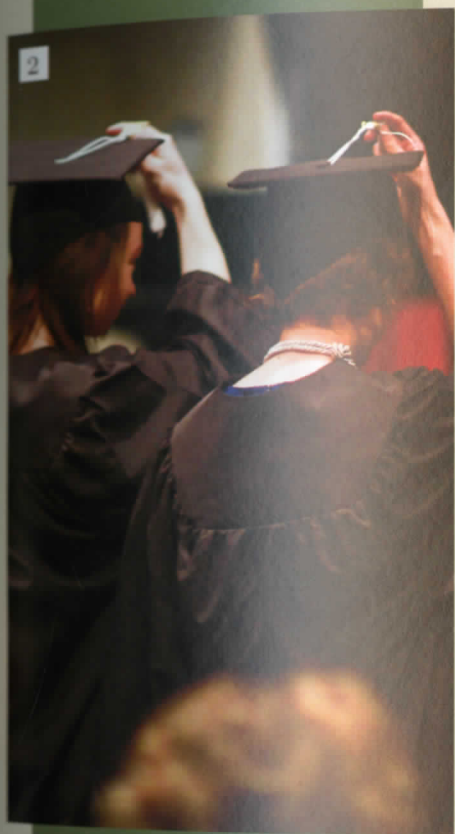


December GRADUATION

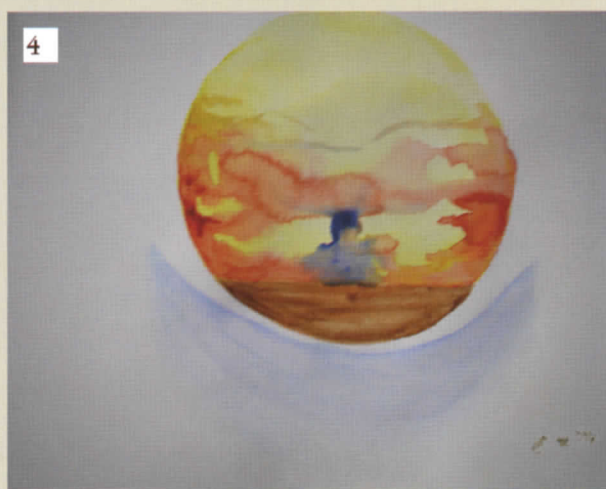
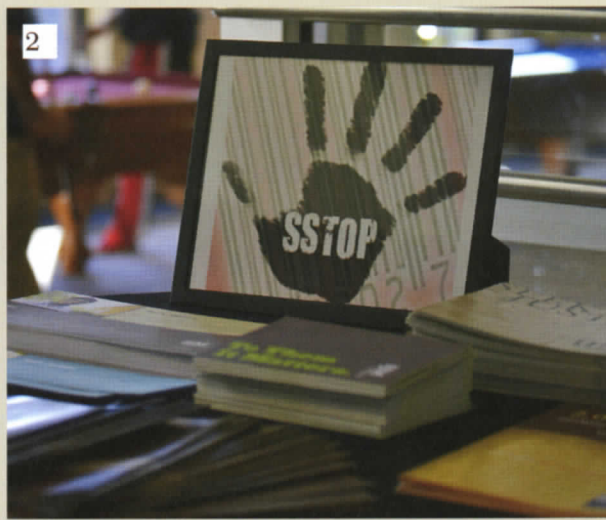

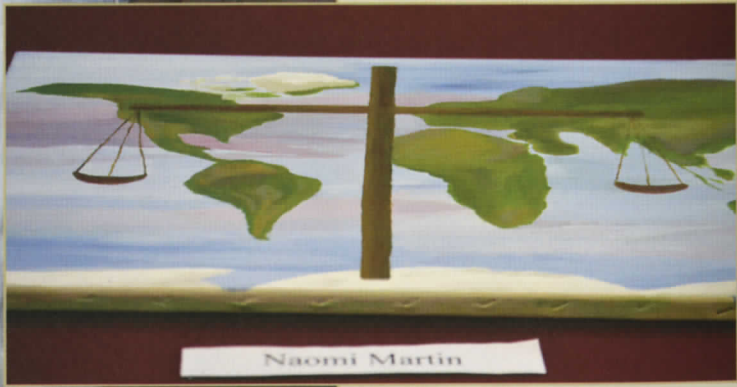

Early in the spring semester, Dr. Bradshaw was offered a full-time position as Professor and Associate Dean of Counseling and Psychology at his graduate alma mater Richmond University.

Dr. Bradshaw said that his departure from Bryan was not a result of the controversy that overtook campus in spring of 2014. "I want people to know that I don't consider myself collateral damage to what happened last year. If I had been offered this position three years ago, I would have taken it," he said. "I hope [Bryan] prospers. I hope it continues to grow, and continues to foster an atmosphere of community." 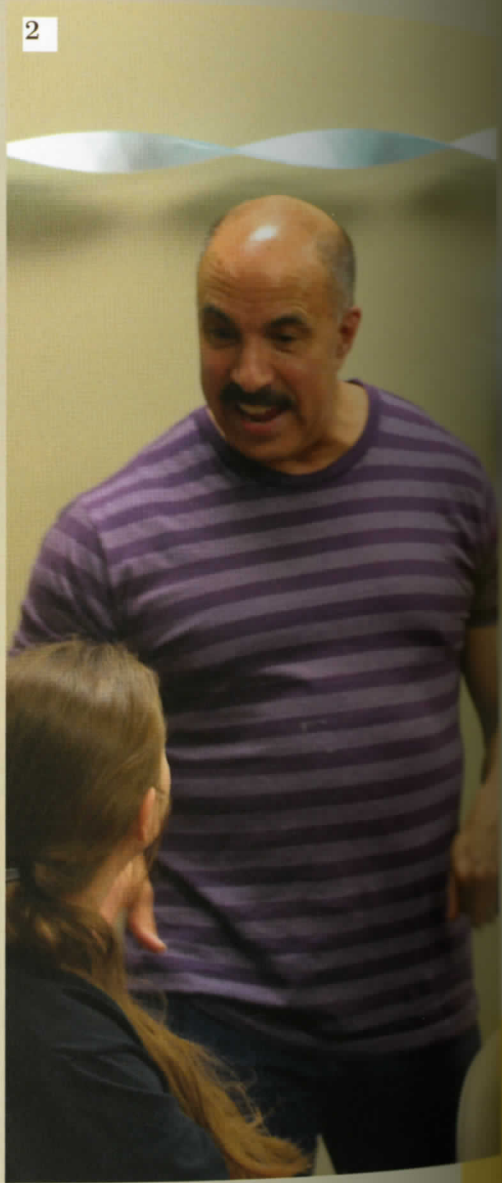

February 6th marked fifteen years since the disastrous fire of 2000. The fire began on the third floor of Mercer Hall, presumably in a science lab and within hours had engulfed the majority of the third floor. The building was empty at the time the fire started and there were no injuries reported. The first and second floor had incredible water damage and all floors needed repair.

At the time, Mercer was the main classroom building as well as the library. Many of Bryan's books and resources were damaged in the attempt to save the building. The fire took eight long hours to extinguish. Students and the community looked on with horror and helplessness during the early hours of that Monday morning. Normalcy was quickly restored, and only one day of classes were missed. Any available space was utilized for classrooms. Classes were held in the gym, temporary trailers, and even the cafeteria.

18 months later, it was almost fully restored. Mercer still functions as the main classroom and administrative building for Bryan. Although the third floor was never fully rebuilt, the south side of the third floor is devoted to the science department with labs and the offices of professors' and the north side is still used, but largely for storage. There are aspirations of completely renovating the third floor as the need for more classrooms and offices is becoming more crucial, but funding will need to begin before any definite plans are made.

Although many years have passed, and the fire is no longer a hindering factor to the operation of Bryan, it is good to never forget the way in which it brought the community of Bryan and the community of Dayton together to restore the place we all know and love.

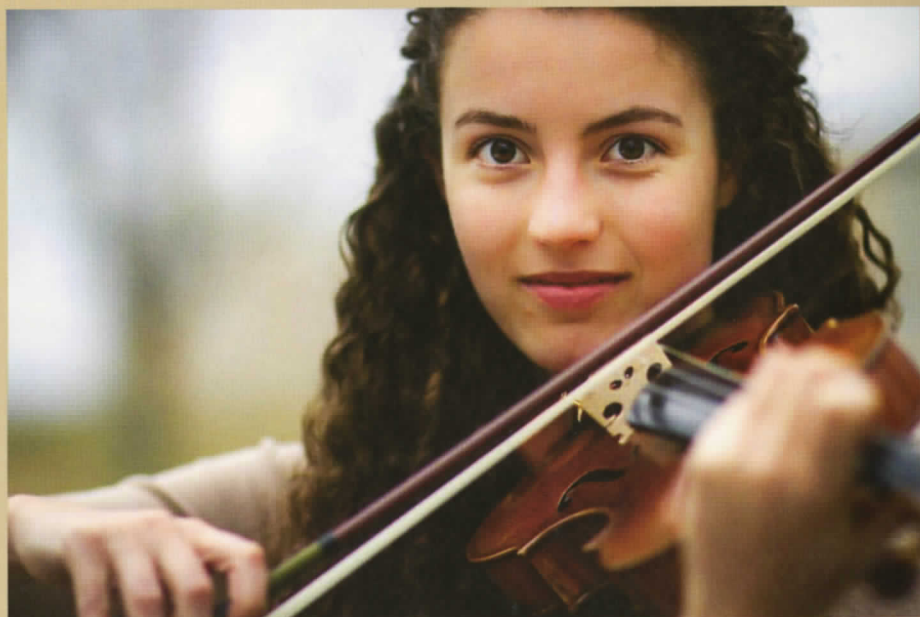
