







TRUE DWARF ESSEX RAPE.

In the United States we have millions of acres of good land that annually lie idle or run to weeds the latter part of the season, after the grain, potato and hav crops have been harvested, a large portion of which might be made to produce one of the finest feeds imaginable and in the greatest abundance, at a time when cattle and sheep are roaming through bare pastures in search of a scanty living. Its fattening properties are probably twice as good as those of clover, and for sheep the feeding value of Rape excels all other plants we know of At the Michigan Experiment Station, 128 lambs were pastured for eight weeks on 15 acres of Rape sown in July and showed a gain of 2,890 lbs., or at the rate of 3 lbs. per lamb each week.
