FEDURACION OF TIMED MATURALISTS! CLUBS OF TACMANIA

by Marjorie Westbrook - What do you do with it? Shall we forget it?

The Federation of Field Naturalists' Clubs of Tasmania meets twice a year, and between meetings there is quité a bit of correspondence on subjects brought up and some of this is writing to various government bodies and politicians on conservation matters. At the next meeting at the end of September, at Burnie's Camp House near Mole Creek, they are to discuss the FUNCTION of the Federation.

It began, in the first place, as a conservation body and several outdoor-loving groups joined - about four Field Nats! Clubs, the Wynyard and Launceston Camera Clubs, the North West and Launceston Walking Clubs and the Hobart Photographic Society, but not the Hobart Walking Club. These groups felt the need for a State-wide body to use their combined voice in bringing conservation matters before the Government. In time, others began to see the need for conservation, and at last the Conservation Trust was formed - an entirely independent organisation with many members with expertise - such as University professors, in their ranks. It appears now to be THE publicly recognised authority and water dog on conservation matters.

So where, now, does the Federation of Field Naturalists' Clubs of

Tasmania stant? The Camera Clubs have withdrawn.

Is it, as it was in the first place, mainly a conservation watchdog and activator? Could this be adequately covered by the Conservation Trust?

Or could it be a vehicle for co-operation between clubs on various projects in the way of gathering information of use to the Conservation Trust; or the National ranks and Wildlife Service (such as Boneseed, or an Orchid map?) or information on the flora and fauna of pine forests. Is its present organisation satisfactory? Or should there be a change in the way it is run? What interest have the rank and file members of clubs in it?

If it is mainly conservation, it is backed still by the Walking Clubs. If it ceased to concern itself mainly with conservation, the walking clubs would probably withdraw, as their interest is in conserving areas for outdoor recreation overall - not in the detailed study of flora and fauna. Conservation natters could be brought up by individual clubs to the Conservation Trust of their region.

The affiliation fee remains the same as last year, \$4.00 for postage and stationery. Delegates go to the meetings at their own expense - and it is mostly the same faces you see there each time. Last time, only Burnie club sent in any agenda items before the meeting. Some more items were brought up at the meeting, which means delegates had to vote as individuals because they had no directions from their clubs.

Most clubs are interested primarily in their own area. Conservation matters could be brought up by individual clubs to the Conservation Trust of their region. Very little co-operation has been noticeable to date in natural history projects. Is it worth preserving the Federation? If so, what should be its functions and how can they be made to work?

We need your written opinions in the next few weeks so that they can be collated by the Secretary of the Federation of Field Naturalists! Clubs of Tasmania and sent out to clubs, together with a copy of the original constitution, in order that delegates to the September meeting are able to discuss this matter with the opinions of their club members in mind.
