The President, Dr. Sidney Smith, has issued the following statement:

"It was with deep regret that the University accepted the resignation of Mr. Arnold Gaine from the Comptrollership of the University. In the brief span of two years, Mr. Gaine has made an outstanding contribution to the institution. It is with pleasure and confidence that we announce that on January 1st, 1948, Mr. R. E. Spence, B.A., A.C.A., who has been Chief Accountant, will assume the duties of the Comptroller of the University, and that Mr. G. L. Court, D.F.C., B.Com., C.A., who has been Assistant to the Comptroller, will assume the duties of Chief Accountant. We bespeak the co-operation of all members of the University with these two important officials."

PROMOTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

The President announced the following appointments:

Dr. Edward G. Bullard of Cambridge, England, who helped Britain beat the magnetic mine, will become head of the Physics Department next July. Dr. Bullard's wartime achievements on degaussing and mine-sweeping problems for the Royal Navy have been matched by his peacetime research on geophysical problems of structure and heat flow. Dr. Bullard succeeds Professor E. F. Burton, who desires to devote more time to research, and who will hold the title of Research Professor in Physics.

Professor Edgar McInnis was chairman of the Canadian delegation to the Institute of Pacific Relations Conference which was held in September in Stratford, England.

Dr. J. Kreutzer gave a Clinic at the Chateau Laurier in Ottawa on December 8th before the Ottawa Dental Society.

Dr. W. G. McIntosh spoke on December 10th at Seldon House, Owen Sound, before the Gray-Bruce-Dufferin Dental Society.

Professor Griffith Taylor has been invited by the Austrailian Government to make a three month visit, and to make recommendations concerning future settlement in the Commonwealth. Dr. Taylor will lecture at all Australian Universities, and is being consulted concerning the new Research University at Canberra.

The Board of Governors announce the re-appointment of Professor H. H. Madill, Head of the School of Architecture, as representative of the University on the Registration Board of the Ontario Association of Architects for a three year term from January 1st, 1948 to December 31, 1950. Professor Madill has been a member of the Registration Board continuously since 1936 and has been Chairman of the Board since 1944.

Hart House Theatre has chosen as its third production of this season Samson Raphaelson's prize-winning comedy "Jason." Despite its title, "Jason" is not a classic drama, but a witty, modern Broadway comedy about a stuffy New York drama critic named Jason Otis. It will be directed by Robert Gill with an all-University cast.

F. E. La Brie represented the Faculty of Law early in December at a two weeks Conference at Ottawa of the Canadian Tax Association. He also represented the Faculty of Law at the Annual Meeting of the American Association of Law Schools held at Chicago during the week after Christmas.

Frederick Charles Dyer, formerly Professor of Ore Dressing, who retired in 1938 by reason of ill health after thirty years of service to the University, died in Toronto on December 16th.

A portrait of Professor Emeritus J. Watson Bain, painted by Kenneth Forbes, R.C.A., and presented to the University by the graduates in chemical engineering, was unveiled on December 16th. It will ultimately hang in the Wallberg Memorial Building.

The Engineering Journal, organ of the Engineering Institute of Canada, recently published a paper by Professor T. R. Loudon, head of the Department of Aeronautical Engineering, entitled "Elementary Shear Flow Analysis."

The Naval Ordnance Laboratory of the United States will shortly publish a paper by Dr. Gordon N. Patterson, Professor of Aerodynamics, on "Properties of General Equations for Hypersonic Flow of a Continuous Fluid."

The recently inaugurated radio network serving the Ontario Provincial Police was planned and designed by Professor J. E. Reid, of the Department of Electrical Engineering.

The Department of French of University College has added to its teaching facilities a practical Phonetics Laboratory, under the direction of Professor Eugène Joliat, assisted by Mr. J. S. Tassie. The new Laboratory will be the working adjunct of all classes in the Honour French Courses of the College, and the student will be able to hear his own recordings played back, and correct his French under supervision. He can also hear and imitate the best French diction as recorded by teachers and actors of the Comédie Française.
