And in all of the virtues excell.

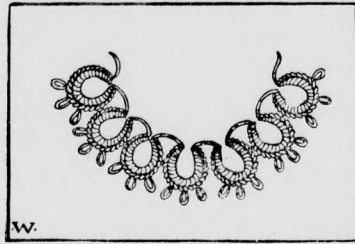
May no trouble, or sickness, or care

Tatting Design.

This design is worked in perilusta white tatting thread, size 20. A shuttle and a pair of the only implements re-



quired. For the first row make a loop on the fingers with the shuttle thread, do 4 d stitches, 1 picot, 2 d, 1 picot, 1 d, 1 picot, 1 d, 1 picot, 2 d, 1 picot, 4 d, draw up close. For the second oval make a loop, leave three-eighths of an inch of perilusta, work 4 d, draw the thread through the last picot of previous oval, 2 d, 1 picot, 1 d, 1 picot, 1 d, 1 picot, 2 d, 1 picot, 4 d, draw up close. Repeat for the length required.

How to Make College Flags.

College flags are quite simple, but require care and much precision in putting the letters on as well as in cutting them.

A good plan is to cut your letters from stiff cardboard and trace around them on the felt, afterward curving with a sharp knife.

In mounting these on the felt background paste them on with a very thin coating of photograph paste and couch around all edges with many strands of silk, caught down at regular intervals with a single strand of the same color.

Couching means to hold the heavy cord or many strands of silk along the edge of the thing to be outlined and stitching across it and through material with the single thread in the needle.

Shrinking Cloth.

The question of how to shrink heavy cloths is often a difficult one to solve. Hang the material over the clothesline, with the fold on the line, and wet it with the garden hose. Allow it to hang until dry. It will be quite unnecessary to iron it, as the garment must be pressed when finished. This can only be done with heavy clothes, as a light loose weave would stretch and lose its shape.

West Indian Negroes.

When he wants a wholesale supply of fish, he explodes a piece of dynamite, which was probably intended for the making of new government roads, over a hole in a mountain stream, and the fish are killed by the concussion. But his favorite resource is the bark of the dogwood tree. This he drops into a river hole, and the mullet, intoxicated, comes to the surface of the water. This singular property of the dogwood has caused it to be employed as a narcotic.—Pearson's.

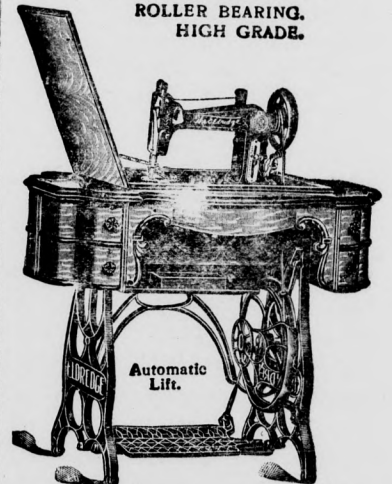

CAMPBELL ATHLETIC GROUNDS.

High School and Grammar School to Have Splendid Field.

Campbell high and grammar schools can now boast of possessing about the best equipped play grounds in the county, or will have, rather, when the present plans are matured which are now under way.

The high school trustees have secured an additional half acre adjoining the present grounds, on the south, and the fruit trees have been removed. This gives the school two full acres of land within the fence or buildings and grounds, Mr. and Mrs. E. Pagel having generously thrown in the land used for sidewalk and street.

The grammar school trustees have purchased the remainder of land lying between the new high school half acre and the grammar school, being about three-quarters of an acre, which gives the grammar school about two acres in all.

It is understood that a joint athletic field will be maintained between the two schools, where there will be provided a base ball diamond, a six-lap track, a tennis court, a basket ball court, and a 200-yard cinder path.

It can be seen that when these improvements are completed the physical side of the students will be well cared for, and for this Prof. J. F. Smith must be given a great deal of credit, for from the organization of the new high school he has been untiring in his efforts to secure a splendid athletic field. It is safe to say that this added feature to the school life will still further assist in placing Campbell in the front rank of Santa Clara County as to schools.
