New York.-Edward M. McLaughlin, one of the best known billiard match referees and billiard champion of Pennsylvania, is dead. His straight rail record was 1349.

Asheville, N. C .- Fire destroyed the Kenilworth Inn, one of the most fashionable hotels in the South. The hotel was owned by Senator M. Gazzam of Philadelphia and cost \$140,000.

Newburyport, Mass.-Mrs. Katherine Tingley of Point Loma, Cal., head of the Theosophist cult in America, arrived last week at the Lord Timothy Dexter mansion, where she will remain for the summer.

Carlisle, Pa.-John Pishotta, wealthy Greek merchant, was found murdered in the cellar of his home here. His wife and her brother, Angella Formatore, were arrested. The authorities say the killing probably was the result of a family quarrel.

RIGID LAWS TO GOVERN **AERONAUTS**

A. Leo Stevens, Instructor of U.S. Army Balloon Corps, Advocates Government License and Examinations.

Every day I am firmly convinced that there should be Government reg-

Every day I am firmly convinced that there should be Government regulation on ballooning. I have held this theory for some time, but the experience of a certain California aeronaut a few days ago in the Sierra Madre Mountains has brought the need home to me more strongly than ever. The Government regulations should consist of licenses for balloon pilots, and laws within which the pilots should have to confine them selves.

While I do not wish to reflect on this aeronaut, I do wish to point out that he is only a case in point. Some people can never become successful balloon men any more than all men can become successes as artists or deep sea divers. It's a part of a man's make-up. There are some men who can make twenty ascensions and still be no better equipped as pilots than if they were going up for the second time. A person who is not skilled in aeronautics, knowing that this man has made say nine ascensions, says. "Oh, I'll willingly go." If we had Government regulation, where men skilled in aircraft should make the examinations as to whether or not the applicant was fitted to be a pilot, this obvious danger would be dispensed with.

The popular idea is that all one has to do to make an ascension is to jump into the balloon car, cut loose, and when one is ready to ascend throw overboard the sand ballast. As a matter of fact, that much is not even the alphabet of air riding.

When I heard that this experimenter was to make the trip with that number of passengers and with so small an amount of ballast in my old "America," I predicted failure. He should be thankful that the escape was os successful. requirements and some theories con trolling the ascent and descent of balloons just as fixed as those that govern temperature or that of gravitation. A certain sized airship, with so many cubic feet of gas, naturally can carry only so many passengers exclusive of its ballast.

There is a nicety in determining just how many it can carry successfully. To be specific, a balloon with 80,000 cubic feet of gas should start out with 35 bags of ballast and five passengers. Equipped in that manner the pilot need fear no storm, and have no worry. He is just as safe as if he were sitting at his own fireside. When a storm comes, by throwing overboard some ballast he can go up above it. When the storm is over, by letting out a little gas through the escape valve he can descend safely to earth. When a balloon of this size, that is 80,000 cubic feet, has thrown over all its ballast for one reason or another, except five bags, it should drop to earth at once. To do otherwise is to run a dangerous risk. A law making this necessary would be a great boon to the art and practice of ballooning. A bag carrying between 35,000 and 40,000 cubic feet of learning is exactly like running a rail-There is a nicety in determining tween 35,000 and 40,000 cubic feet of gas and two persons besides the pilot should drop to earth when the pilot has expended all the ballast save three bags. If he does not do so he is risking lives that he should not be allowed to jeopardize.

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

RAW DRUGS.

Castor Oil Comes as Pretty Little Brown and Black Beans. Editor and Publisher

Brown and Black Beans.

Upon going into a pharmacy and looking over the mysterious jars and bottles and boxes that line the shelves did you ever wonder where on earth all of the drugs came from and how they appeared before they were ground up and made into bils or dried or pulverized or crystallized into queer shaped lumps? Each jar and box seems to hide some secret which you immediately become curious to solve. How many different lands do they represent? And, after they leave the jars resent? And, after they leave the jars that hold them now, what are they made into?

Who, for example, would connect a great pile of dry, thin twigs, neatly tied into small bundles, with barsaparilla? These twigs are the creening roots and rootlets of a prickly shrub that grows in Jamaica, and they are worth from 10 to 50 contra pourse.

shrub that grows in Jamaica, and they are worth from 10 to 50 cents a pound. Somewhat similar in appearance is ipecacuanha, which also comes to us in dry twigs, which are pair of the trailing root of a plant found in the damp forests of Brazil.

These roots receive no preparation save drying before they are shipped off to the United States. They are packed in large sacks, and the workmen who open the bales must heware of breath. open the bales must beware of breath

open the bales must beware of breath-ing the pungent, irritating dust given off, which is productive of unpleasant results if incautiously inhaled. Castor oil, too, is hard to recognize in the pretty little brown beans, spot-ted with black and with polished skins, that arrive in beas from Lude There that arrive in bags from India. They look far too attractive to suggest the much hated dose of our early days.

Aloes, the base of many nauseous medicines, may be seen in its crude form as a solid mass resembling brown sealing wax, packed in heavy wooden boxes, from which it is chipped out in flakes with a chisel and hammer. It is of different qualities and prices,

It is of different qualities and prices, according to whether it comes from Arabia, Socotra or the West Indies, and may bring any sum from \$4 to \$45 per hundreweight. Aloes is the juice of the big fleshy leaves of the plant of that name. This juice is pressed or evaporated from the leaves and poured into chests or kegs in a semifiuld state, hardening presently into a solid block. Not infrequently it is inclosed in the dry skins of monkeys and in this strange form brought to market.

One of the most interesting of drugs is opium, both on account of its awful or in the strange form brought value. A case of opium, about 225 pounds, is worth \$400 roughly. The case is of rough deal lined with the and contains a number of soft, dark lumps, like large handfuls of dough packed very closely together in a quantity of dry, chaffy seeds.

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
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
