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PREFATORY NOTE.

The Emmet collection of manuscripts, prints and other material illustrative of American history is the result of the efforts of Dr. Thomas Addis Emmet during more than fifty years. To the formation of his collection Dr. Emmet devoted great perseverance and ample means ; and as he was among the first in the field, he was able to obtain large results in bringing together material valuable not only from the collector's point of view, but from that of the historian.

The manuscripts number about 10,800. They include one or more autographs of almost every man at all distinguished in American affairs during the revolution, as well as a large number of earlier colonial documents, and letters of more recent date. The greater part of them are fully described in this calendar by a synopsis of each under the name of the author ; those only being omitted which appear to have little interest or value except as autographs. Of such, an alphabetical list will be found at the end of the index.

Maps and printed matter of all kinds are fully catalogued. Of the portraits and engravings a part only are catalogued here, as the Library will issue later a complete list of all the prints in its possession.

The chief part of the collection is bound in pigskin, in ninety-four volumes, of folio size. There are also about 2,500 unbound letters and documents ; and there are twenty-seven volumes of portraits, and seven of paper money, besides several missals and other rare or curious manuscripts.

The entire collection was purchased by Mr. John S. Kennedy, and was presented by him in June, 1896, to the New York Public Library.

The inserted material consists of: documents 23, drawings 8, engravings 3, letters 33, maps 3, plan 1, portraits 36, views 15. Nos. 1-87 are illustrative of the text; nos. 88-122 of the individual members.

The abbreviations are A. L. S. for autograph letter signed; A. L. for autograph letter; L. S. for letter signed; A. D. S. for autograph document signed; A. D. for autograph document; D. S. for document signed.

The report of the Board of Trade on the union of New York with the other colonies, Feb. 25, 1696/97, is printed in the *New York Colonial Documents*, vol. 4, p. 259, and in Carson, vol. 2, p. 451. Davenant in his *Discourses on the Public Revenues and on the Trade of England*, published in 1698, made a suggestion for the general management of the commerce of the country; see his *Works*, vol. 2 (Lond., 1773) p. 29; his plan is printed in Carson's *Anniversary of the Constitution*, vol. 2, p. 454. In 1701 was published in London *An Essay upon the Government of the English Plantations on the Continent of America*, which criticized the suggestions of Penn and Davenant, and also suggested another scheme of union for the colonies; a selection from this is given in Carson, vol. 2, p. 456. On May 13 of the same year Robert Livingston put forth his plan for union; this is to be found in the *New York Colonial Documents*, vol. 4, p. 874, and in Carson, vol. 2, p. 459. Earl Stair's *Proposals for a scheme towards the better governing of the West Indies*, dated 1721, was printed first in Carson, vol. 2, p. 460, from a manuscript in the British Museum. In the same year the Lords of Trade and Plantation, in a representation to the King on the *State of the British Plantations in America in 1721*, printed in the *New York Colonial Documents*, vol. 5, p. 591, recommended that a Captain-General be placed over the colonies, *ib.* 627, and Carson, vol. 2, p. 464. The following year, 1722, was published Daniel Coxe's *Carolana*, in which another scheme for union was brought forward; portions of this are reprinted in Carson, vol. 2, p. 465. Archibald Kennedy's scheme of 1751 is mentioned in Carson, vol. 2, p. 467. In general for these early plans of union, see Frederick D. Stone's article in Carson, vol. 2, pp. 439 ff., and the *American History Leaflets*, no. 14.

The letter of the Lords of Trade to De Lancey, July 5, 1754,

THE STAMP-ACT CONGRESS OF 1765.

The text is taken from H. The inserted material consists of: broadsides 2, caricature 1, clipping 1, documents 28, drawings 11, engravings 2, letters 32, map 1, newspapers 3, portraits 28, views 12. Nos. 121-173 illustrate the text; nos. 174-224 the individual members; and 225-243 relate to the Stamp Act and its repeal.

The abbreviations are A. L. S. for autograph letter signed; A. L. for autograph letter; L. S. for letter signed; A. D. S. for autograph document signed; A. D. for autograph document; D. S. for document signed.

The colophon reads: "Printed by Andrew Marvel, at the Sign of the Bribe refused, on Constitution Hill, North-America."

The present volume is one of five devoted to the members of the Continental Congress. The following introduction by Dr. Emmet, printed at the beginning of this volume, sufficiently explains the scope and plan of the series:

"Much uncertainty has existed in the past regarding the identity of those who were appointed by the different states to serve as members of the Continental Congress. This difficulty has arisen from different causes. The chief one was due to the fact that no law then existed limiting the size of the delegation, while occasionally alternates in addition were appointed, who might serve for a short period and who thus became members. Moreover, the journals of Congress were so indifferently kept that it is impossible, in many instances, to designate the presence of a special individual by the simple mention of his surname. The names are given of all who were appointed and who accepted the office, but wherever the fact was ascertained that the appointment was declined before rendering service, the name of the individual was omitted from the list of members. To complete the list, the names in addition are given of those who were appointed and who accepted the position, the year before, to serve in the Congress which would have been held, if the Constitution had not been adopted.

"But the autographs, portraits and other illustrations are only given of those who did serve and who were believed to have been present at one meeting, at least, where a quorum existed.

"The plan which has been thus followed seems to be the only one offering the possibility of obtaining, with any accuracy, a knowledge of those who were members of the Continental Congress from 1774 to the formation of the Federal Government in the spring of 1788."

The names of delegates from each state are also given by Dr. Emmet, with dates of their service. There is no other text, the volume being made up entirely of portraits, letters and illustrative matter. The material herewith indexed consists of: broadsides 2, documents 22, drawings 2, engravings 4, letters 83, portraits 81, views 8. Nos. 430-449 refer to the Congress as a whole, its meeting places and officers; nos. 450-488 include the New Hampshire members; 489-554 those from Massachusetts; 555-586 from Rhode Island; and 587-645 from Connecticut.

THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE.

(Emmet Collection. Presented to the New York Public Library by John S. Kennedy.)

Emmet (Thomas Addis). History of the inception and drafting of the Declaration of Independence. With a collection of autographs of the signers, and other documents. New York, 1876. F°.

The letterpress consists of twenty-four leaves. It opens with a brief sketch of the condition of the colonies before the Revolution, and of the elements that entered into the growth of the spirit of separation from England; the Mecklenburg declaration of independence is treated at greater length, Colonel William Polk's account of the convention that adopted those resolutions being printed in full. The actual outbreak of hostilities is next considered, and the instructions from the various colonial legislatures to their delegates in Congress that referred either favorably or adversely to independence; the action of Congress resulting therefrom is shown by selections from the *Journals*, which are embodied in the text. The last division relates to the first printing of the Declaration.

The volume is bound in brown pigskin. Each outside cover is formed of an enameled copper plate which measures ten by fifteen inches, and is riveted into the leather. On the front cover a row of stars upon a blue field furnishes a narrow border for the buff background of the centerpiece; at the two upper corners of the latter are two circles inscribed "Albany Congress 1754" and "First Cont. Congress 1774"; at the two lower corners appear two shields, one engraved with the New England pine tree, the other with the stars and stripes. An inner border, upon which are twined the names of fourteen of the signers, incloses two circles, lettered "Confederation 1778" and "Constitution 1789." Below the circles is a square piece of drapery on which the names of the thirteen colonies are interlaced in a circle round a rising sun and the date 1776; and immediately below this is the fac-simile signature of John Hancock. Within the lower edge of the second border is the motto "E pluribus unum," and at its top appear an arm grasping a liberty pole and cap, and the words "This is my right and I will defend it." The plate forming the back cover is engraved with the coat of arms and the triple monogram of Thomas Addis Emmet; like the first, it is also bordered by the stars on a narrow blue field.

The material indexed in the volume consists of: broadsides 8, caricature 1, documents 18, drawings 2, engravings 1, letters 62, newspapers 4, portraits 88, views 4.

This volume contains the best set of the Signers to the Declaration, in the Emmet Collection. Another set, extended to twenty folio volumes, will be described in the following numbers of the Bulletin. See Lyman C. Draper's *Essay on the Autographic Collections of the Signers of the Declaration of Independence and of the Constitution*, New York, 1880, pp. 60-63.

The Declaration, as engrossed, is given in fac-simile in Force's *American Archives*, 5th series, vol. 1, p. 1505. The library also possesses an artotype fac-simile made by Bierstadt and published by A. G. Gedney, 54 Reade St., New York, in 1883; the "negative taken 25 July 1883, from the original parchment," and the restoration of the signatures being taken from a copper-plate engraving made by order of President Monroe in 1823.

The first edition was a broadside issued without name of printer, for a description of which see Ford's *Bibliography of the Continental Congress*, no. 101. The earliest edition in the library, issued probably early in July, is described below as B.M. 1528.

The earliest official text of the Declaration in any collection of documents was that in *The constitutions of the several independent states of America; the Declaration of Independence; etc.*, Philadelphia, 1781; of which edition the library possesses Secretary's Thomson's own copy.

This is one of several fair copies made by Jefferson from the original rough draft of the Declaration, after its adoption and publication, in which he gave the wording of the text as reported by the Committee, with the portions underlined that were changed or rejected by Congress. After remaining in the possession of the Lee family of Virginia for many years, with other papers of Jefferson, the manuscript was sold by the late Mr. Cassius F. Lee, of Alexandria, to Mr. Elliot Danforth, of New York, from whom Dr. Emmet obtained it.

The words substituted by Congress are not given in this copy, which in other respects agrees closely with the drafts sent to Lee and Madison, and with the text as incorporated in the autobiography, with the exception that two paragraphs and a few words were transposed.

Five other drafts of the Declaration in Jefferson's handwriting are known:—(1) the original rough draft, with interlineations, in the Department of State at Washington (repro-

duced as EM. 1523); (2) the copy sent to R. H. Lee in July, 1776, and given by his grandson to the American Philosophical Society at Philadelphia in 1825, being similar to EM. 1524 (see EM. 1521); (3) the copy made for Madison in 1783, similar to the preceding, and now in the State Department (reproduced in fac-simile in the Madison Papers, vol. 3); (4) the draft incorporated in the autobiography of 1821, similar to (2) and (3), and also in the State Department (printed in Jefferson's *Writings*); and (5) the fragment belonging to Mrs. Washburn, of Boston. See Jefferson's *Writings* (Ford) vol. 2, p. 42, note.

It is stated by Jefferson, in a letter to Madison (Aug. 30, 1823), that he wrote a fair copy from the rough draft, reported it to the Committee, and from them unaltered, to Congress. All trace of this fair draft has been lost. It was probably used in crossing out the passages rejected by Congress, and in the making of the engrossed copy. The latter, which is the one that was signed, is in the keeping of the State Department.

Between July 4 and 10 Jefferson sent other drafts of the Declaration, with the omitted passages marked, to George Wythe, John Page, Edmund Pendleton, and Philip Mazzei, none of which has been found or identified. See Jefferson's *Writings* (Ford) vol. 2, p. 42, note.

The engraving measures 25% x 18% inches. The picture

divides itself into three groups; in the centre the Committee presenting the draft to President Hancock, on the right a group of eight, on the left a group of seventeen. The members of the Committee, from left to right, are R. R. Livingston, Roger Sherman, John Adams, Jefferson and Franklin. Hancock sits behind the table, facing to the front, with Secretary Thomson seated at his right. In the group on the right, the figure seated with his back to the spectator is Charles Carroll, and the man with his hat on, towards whom he turns, is Stephen Hopkins. Among the others in this group are George Read, Hopkinson, Wolcott, and Witherspoon. In the group on the left, the seated figure with a cane is Robert Morris, and in the background are Samuel Adams, Robert Treat Paine, Edward Rutledge, Philip Livingston, Benjamin Rush, Thomas Stone, George Ross, and James Wilson. Another copy of this engraving is also in the Emmet Collection, framed and hanging in the Exhibition Room. Both of these impressions show scratches, as if the copper-plate had been injured after leaving the engraver's hands.

The engraved copper-plate itself, with one or more copies of the engraving, were presented by Samuel T. Snow, Esq., of Boston, to the Massachusetts Historical Society, in November,

1859, as the work of an unknown artist. It was stated that they had been left, many years ago, by a party of play-actors, in payment of their board, with an inn-keeper, who after keeping them for twenty years, brought them to Boston. See Mass. Hist. Society's *Proceedings*, 1858-60, p. 391.

We are indebted to Mr. Charles Henry Hart, of Philadelphia, the recognized expert and authority on American art, for the name of the artist who made the engraving. He writes (December 6, 1897): "It was engraved by Edward Savage, and left unfinished by him at the time of his death, July 6, 1817. The original picture, from which the engraving of the same size is copied, has recently been acquired by the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, and is of such recognized significance that it is being used as a guide to the restoration of Independence Hall. It was begun by Robert Edge Pine, left unfinished by him at his death, Nov. 10, 1783, purchased from his widow by Bowen and Savage, for the New York Museum, and finished by the latter. Pine called it aptly 'The American Congress Voting Independence.' I have in preparation a monograph on the picture and its painters which will tell the story in full and will make I think an interesting contribution to the history of American art."

THE ANNAPOLIS CONVENTION.

Annapolis (The) Convention held in 1786 with the original report of proceedings represented to the states by President John Dickinson in consequence of which report and the action of congress a meeting of delegates from all the states assembled in Philadelphia for forming the federal constitution.
