mole and see the kingdom of Man.

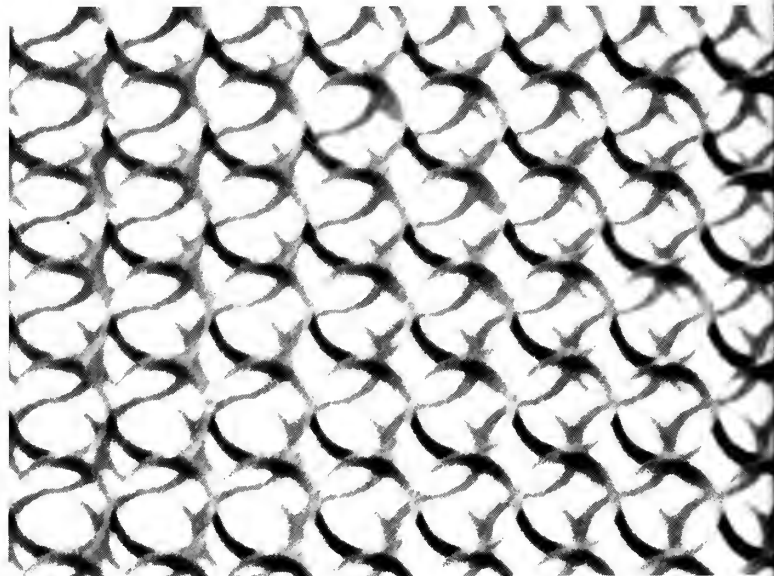

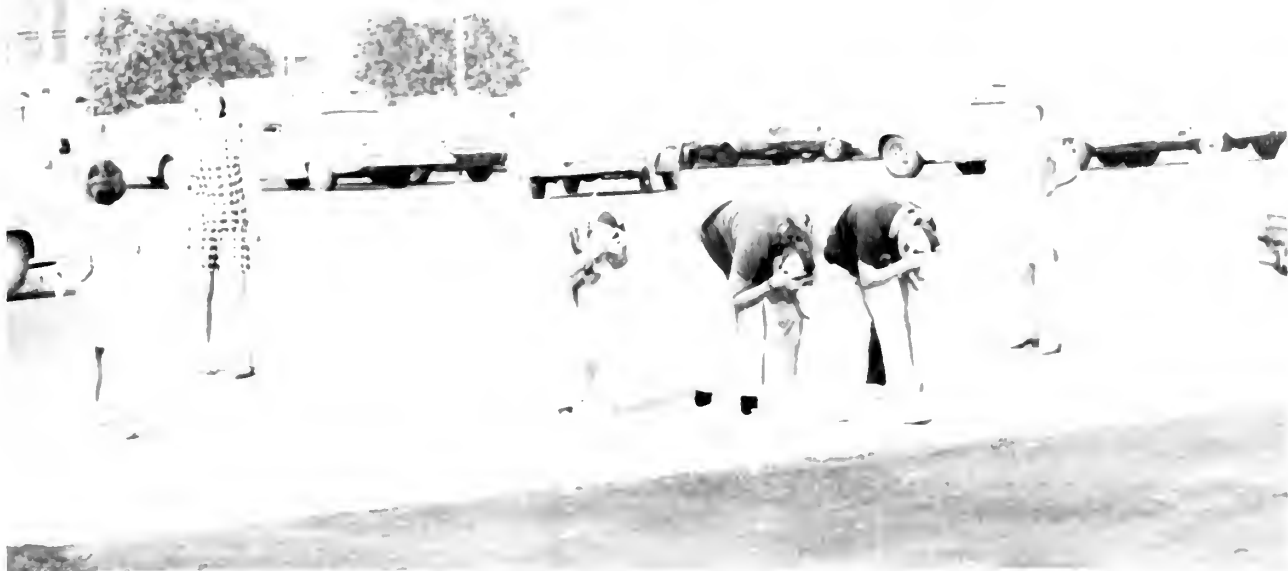

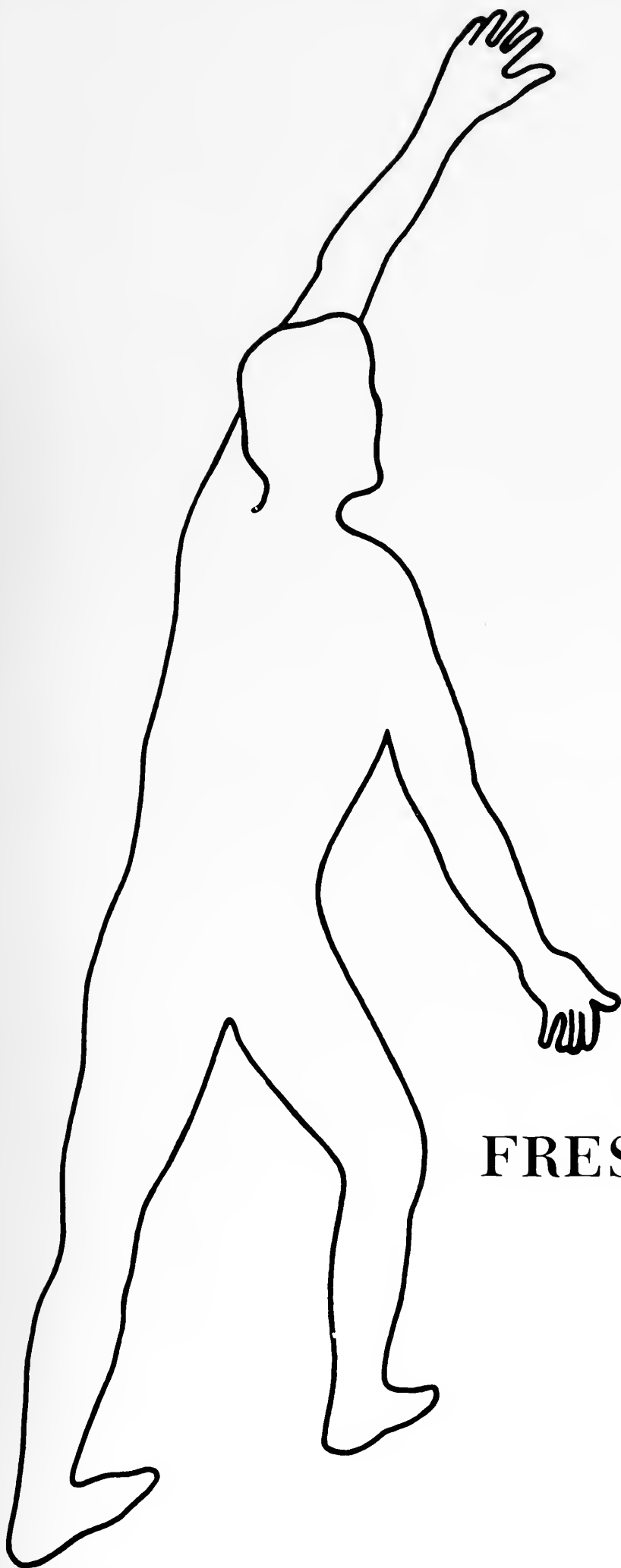

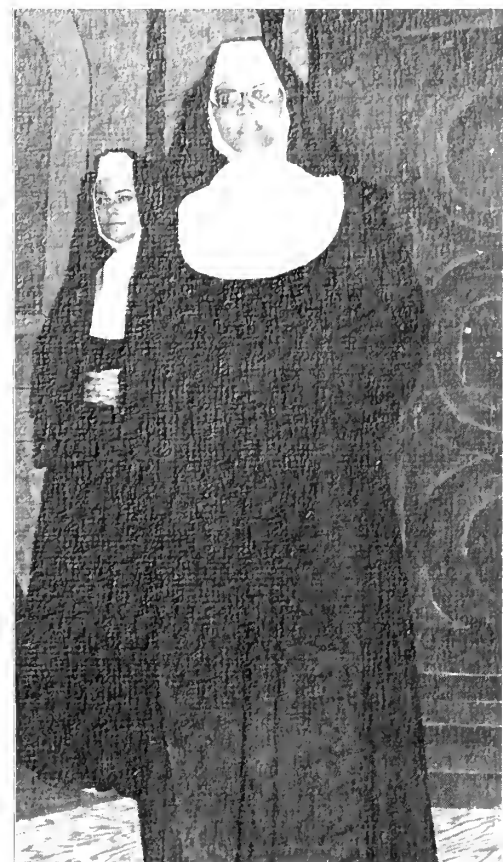

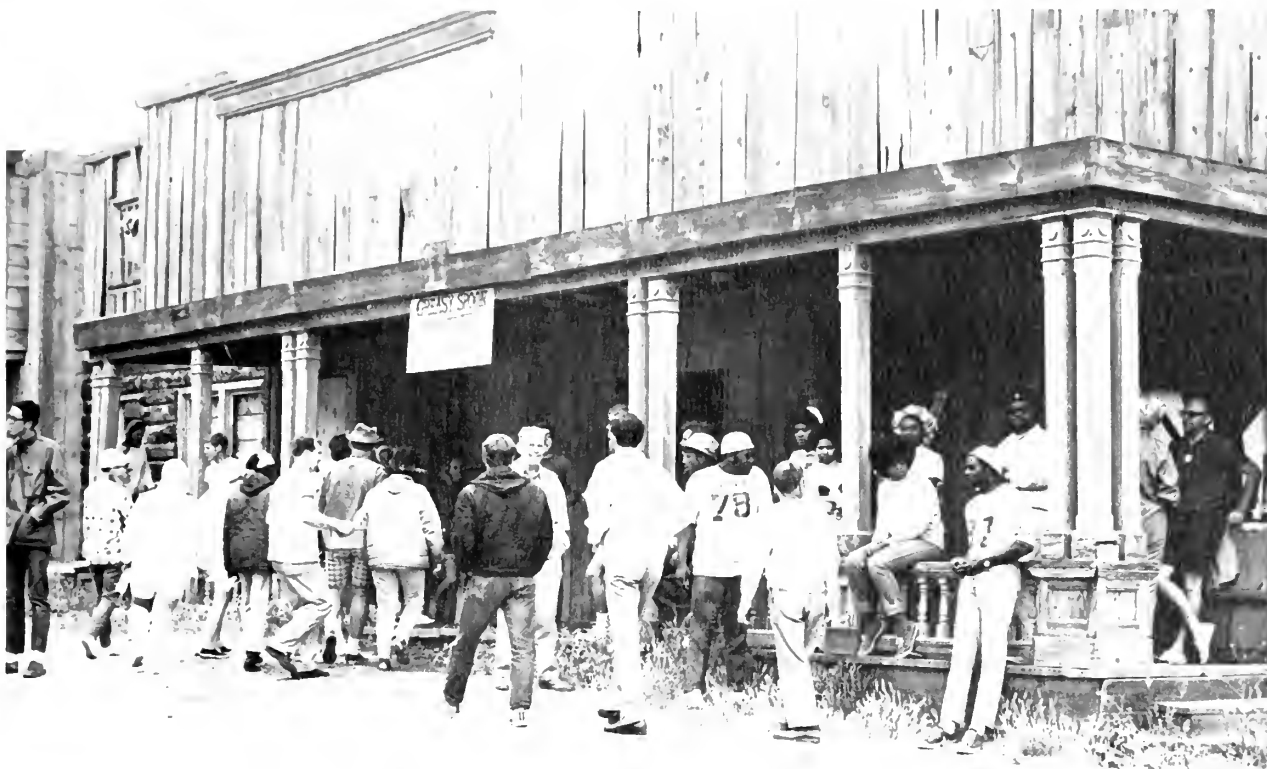

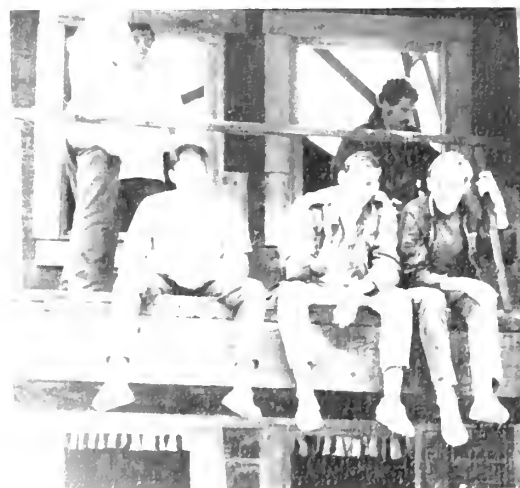

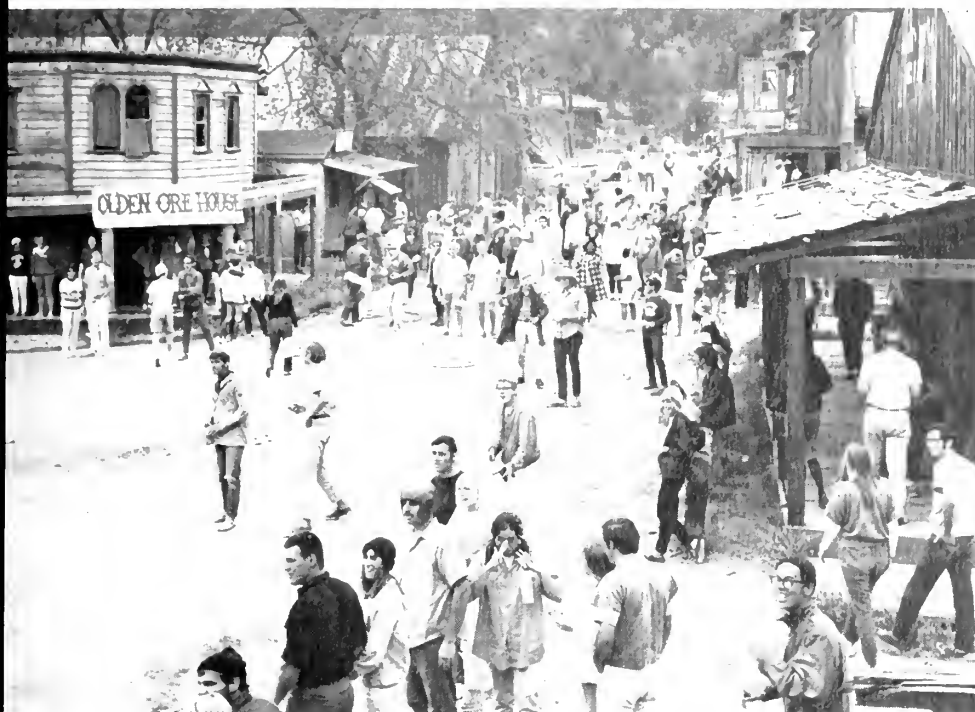

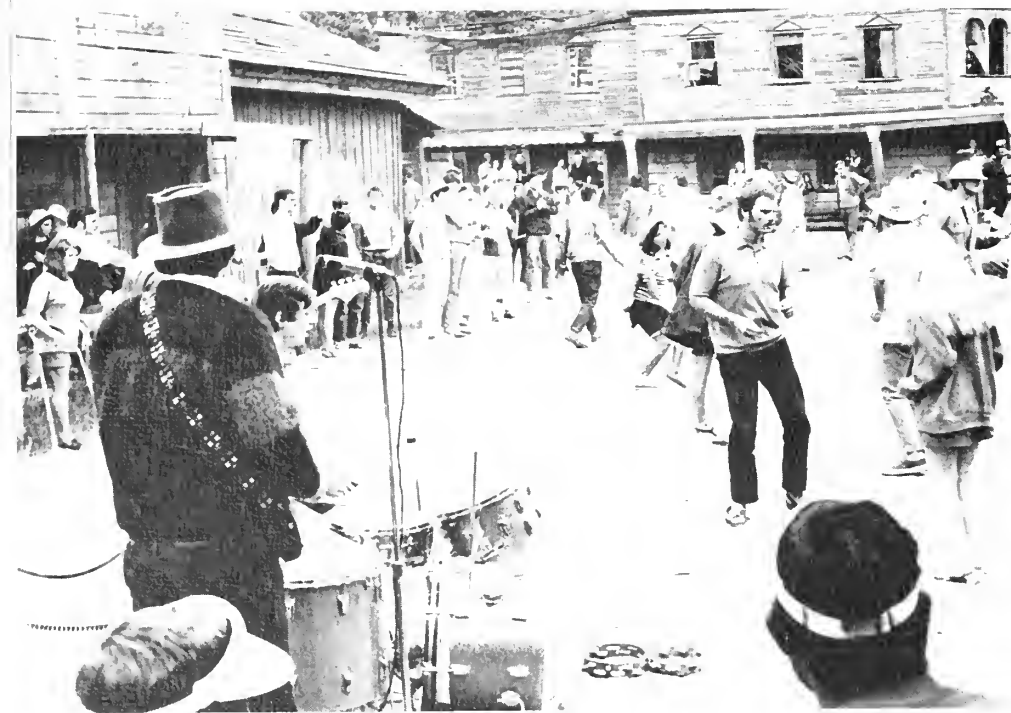

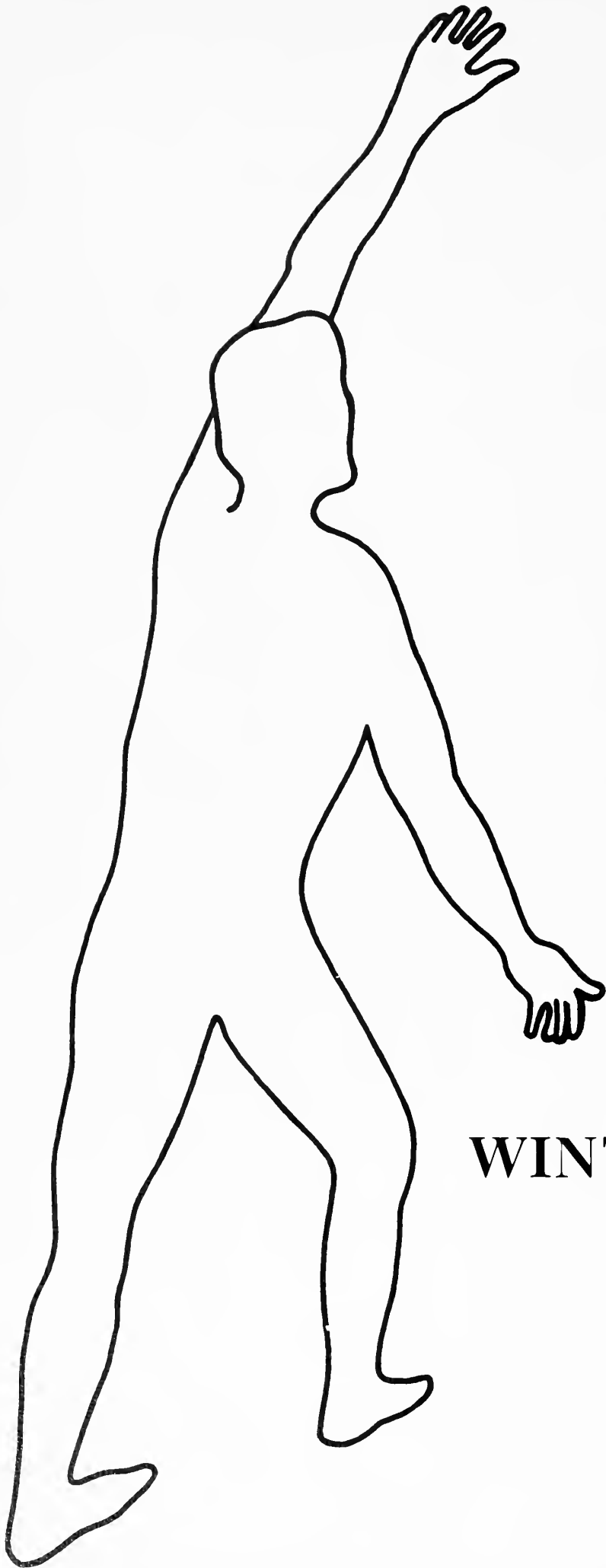

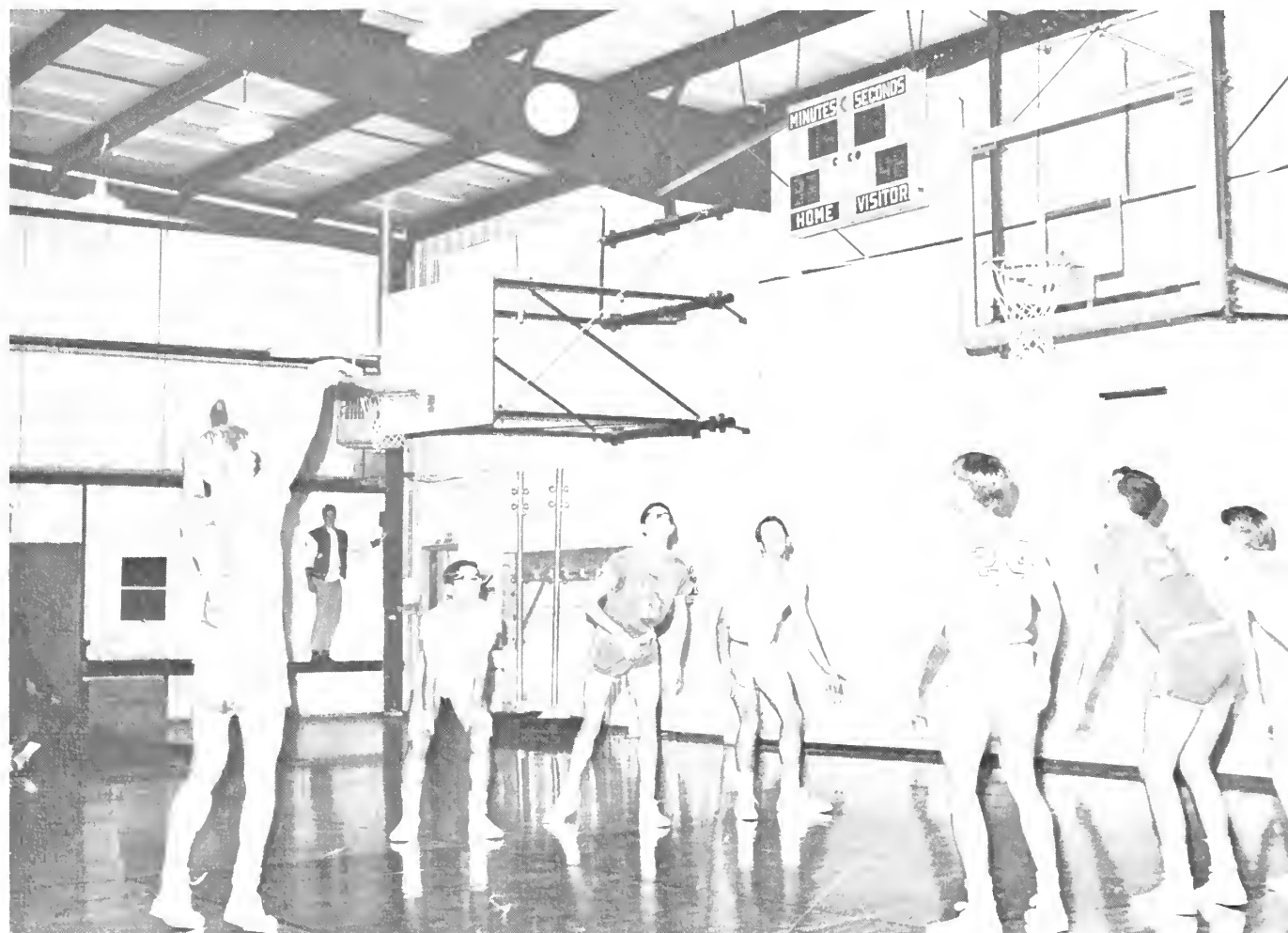

Action is tight even in the inter-squad scrimmage that marked the beginning of the frosh season



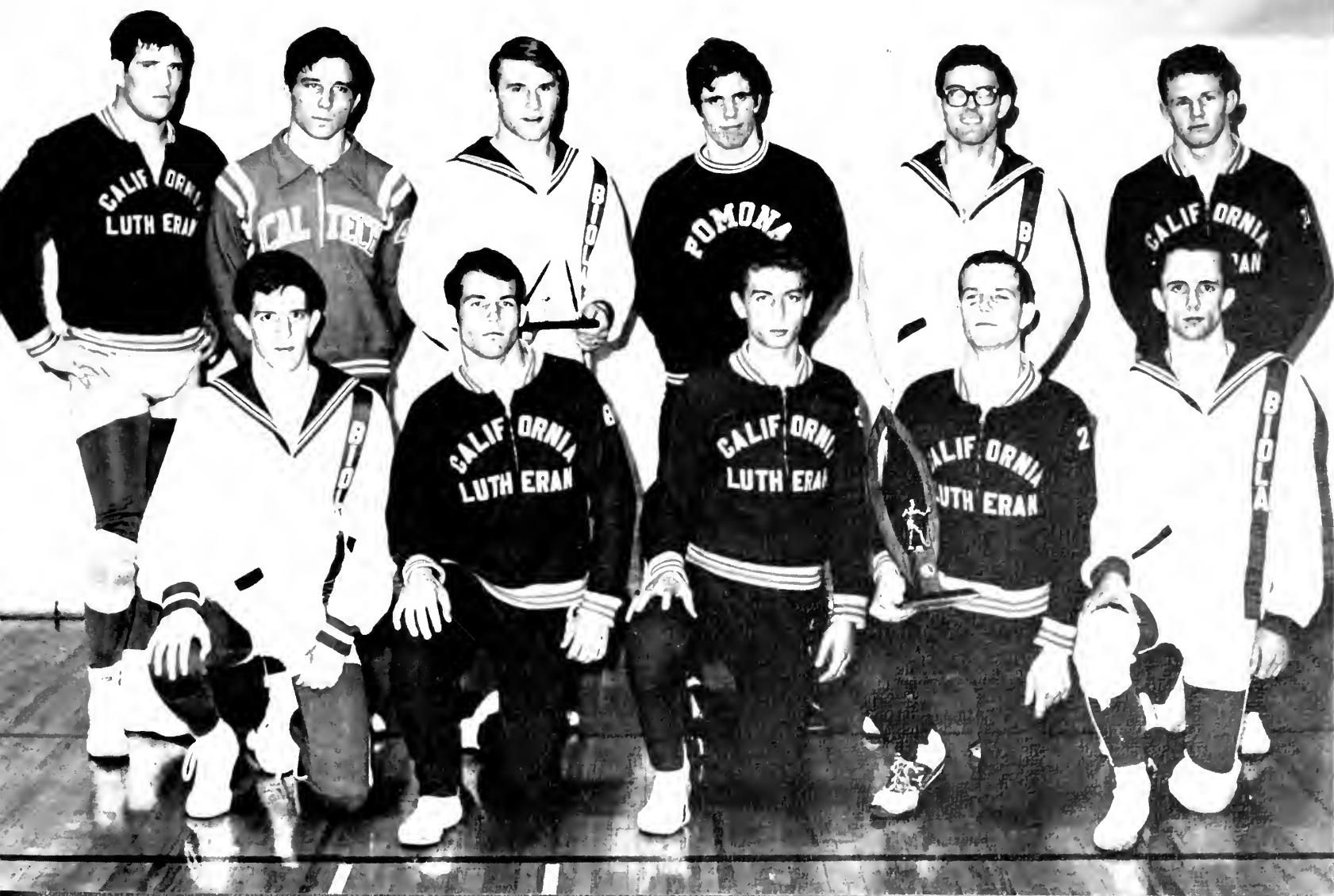
Most of the frosh team members can be seen above as they ready themselves for rebound in case the free-throw shot is off target.

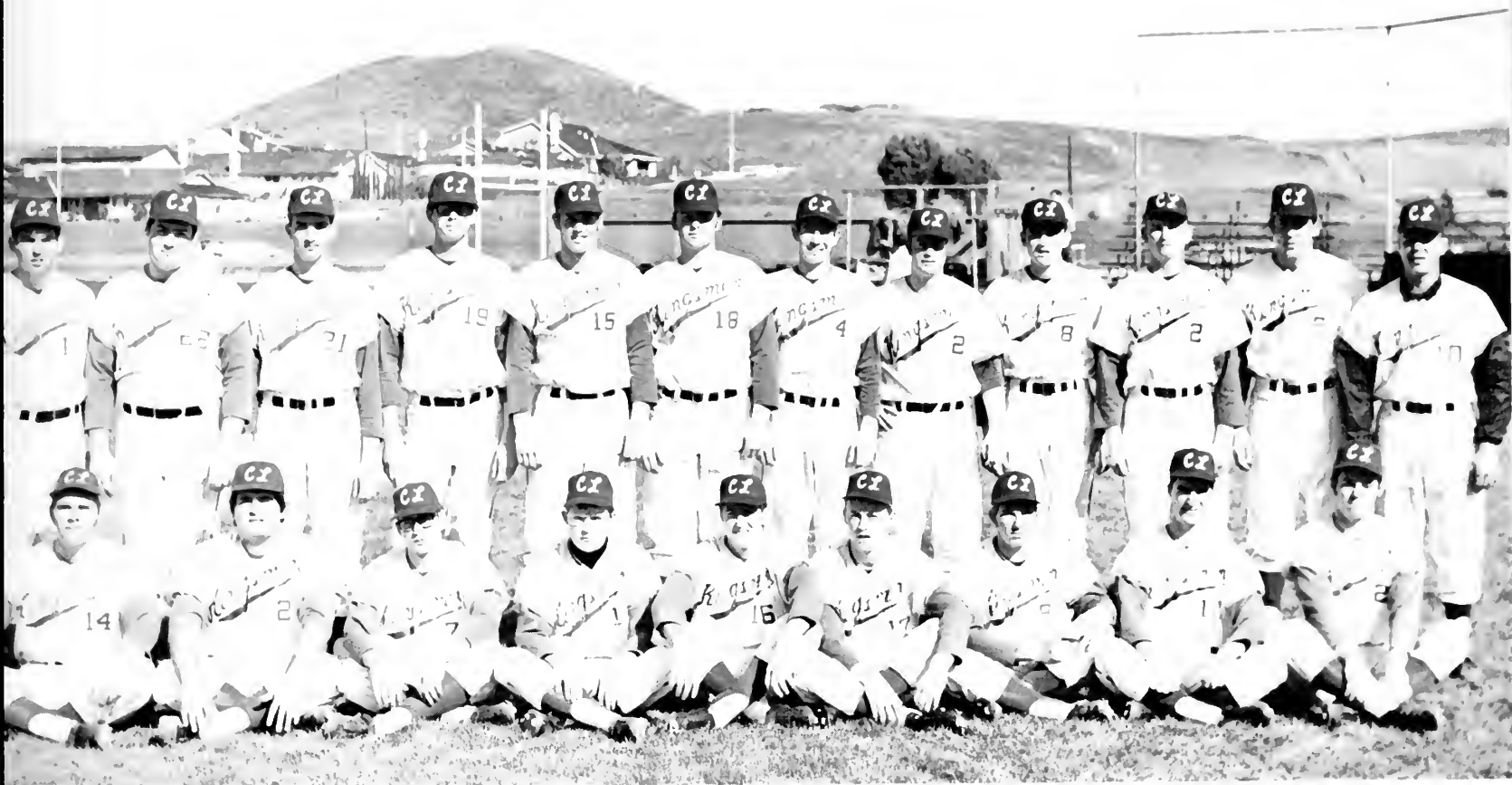

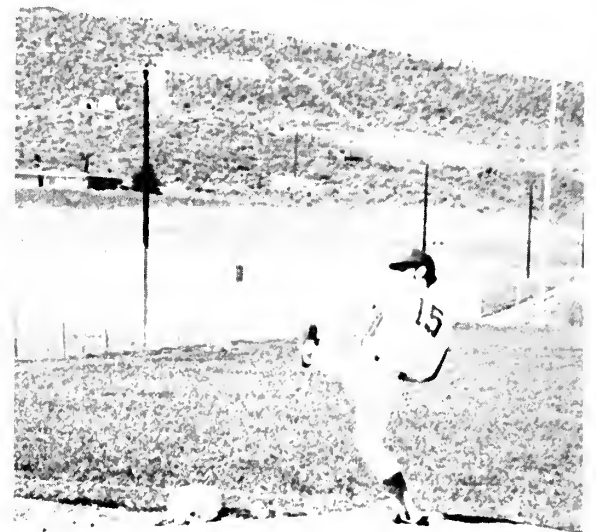

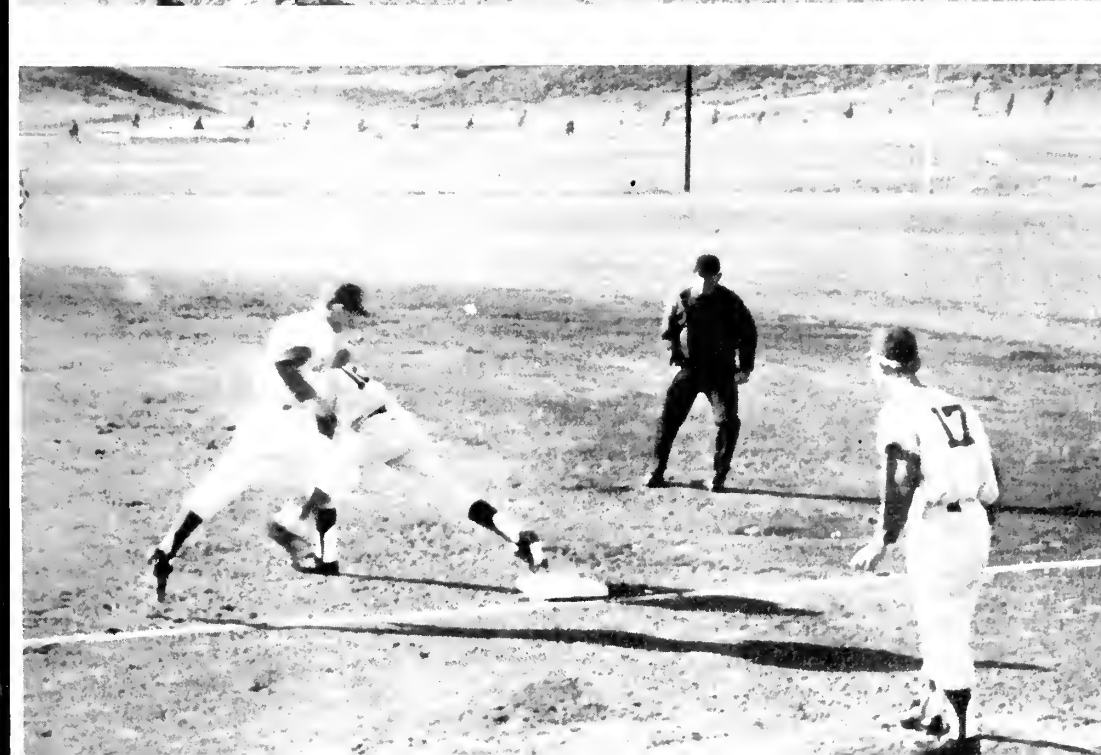

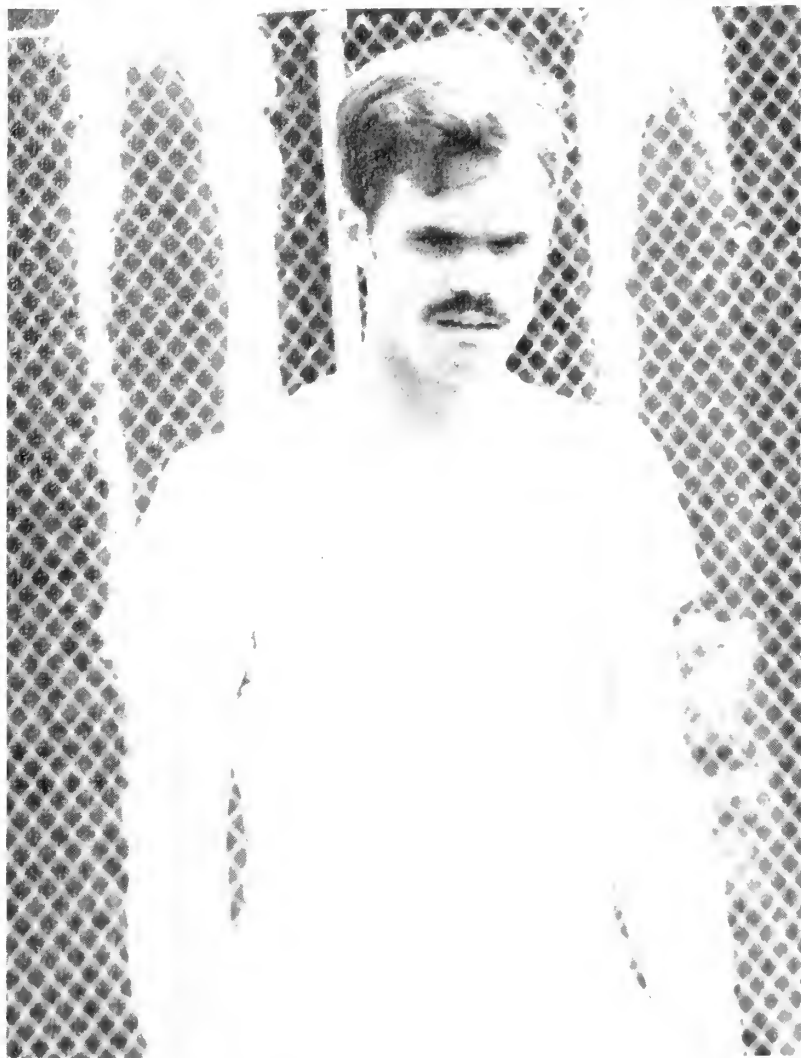

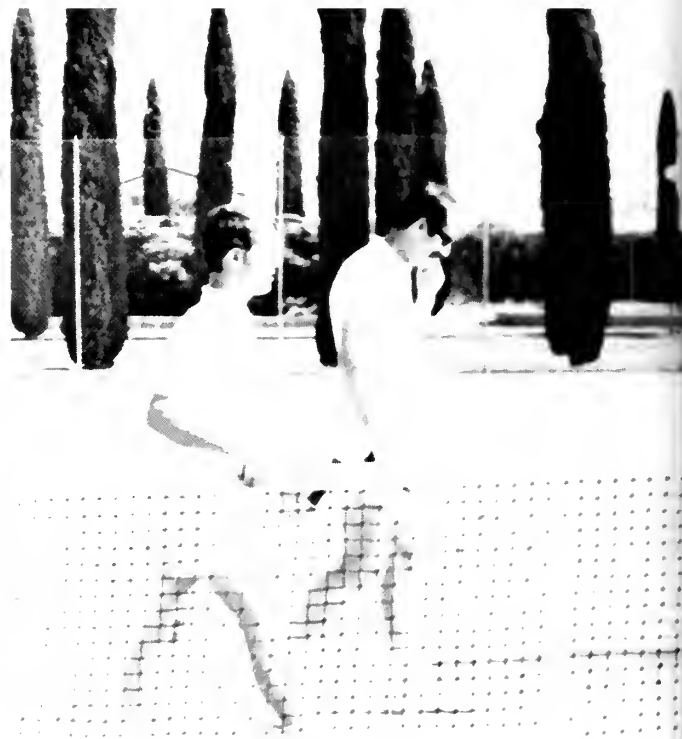

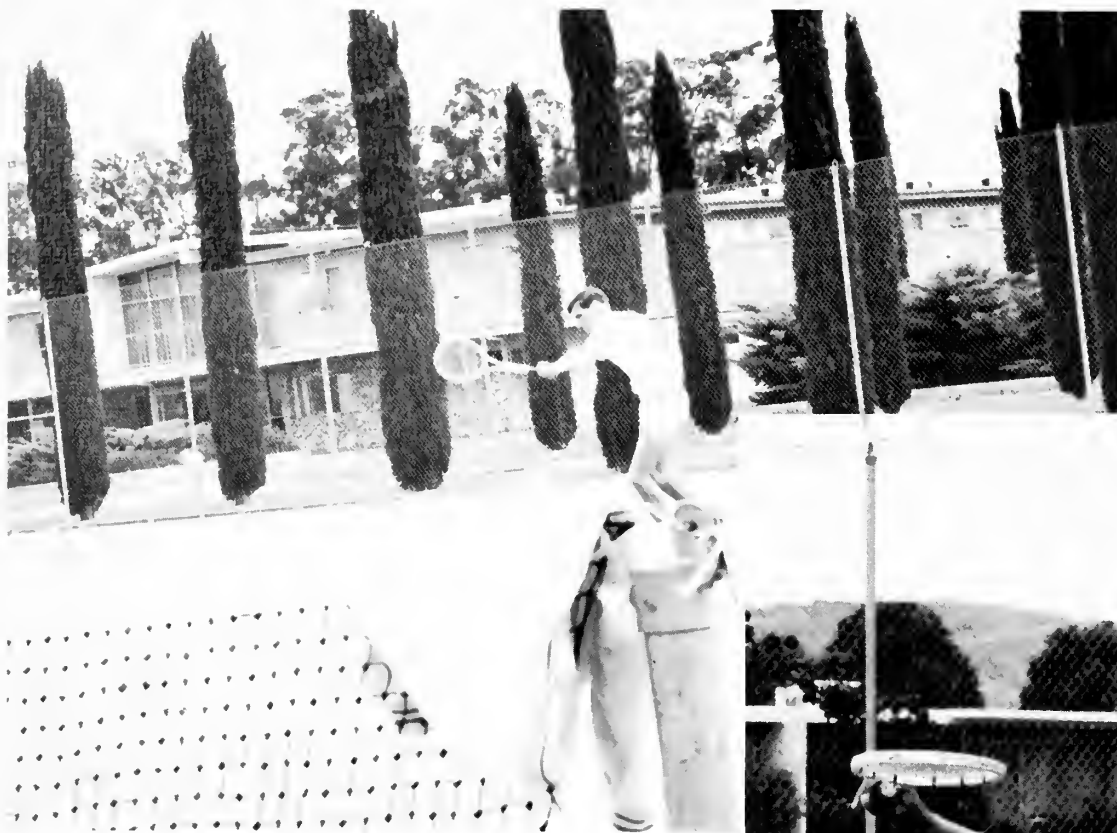
