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# Introduction.

ALEXANDER CAMPBELL AND SONS, in presenting their TWENTY-THIRD AUTUMN CATALOGUE of ROSES, DUTCH FLOWER ROOTS, FRUIT TREES, CARNATIONS, PICOTEES, PINKS, PANSIES, CINERARIAS, HOLLYHOCKS, &c., most respectfully beg to express their grateful acknowledgements to their kind patrons for the very liberal support they have received for the past twenty-two years, and they beg to assure them that no care or expense will be spared in future, to merit a continuance of their esteemed commands.

With respect to Roses, A. C. and Sons beg to observe, that the past season has been the most trying during the present century on this class of plants; not so much owing to the severity of the winter and spring, as to the nature of the previous season, in which, owing to the continuance of wet during the summer and autumn months, and the mildness of the month of November, the plants were forced into a full and vigorous growth ; but having been subsequently checked by the intense frost which occurred about the end of December, the previous generous flow of sap was stopped, and their whole system disorganized; the consequence has been that vast numbers of those plants were destroyed in all parts of the United Kingdom, and especially in England, where nearly two-thirds of the stock were lost. A.C. and Sons suffered in common with other growers in this respect, but being favoured by the mildness of the climate, and the position of their Nursery, which is peculiarly adapted for the growing of the Rose plant, they are in the possession of perhaps the most extensive and varied collection of Roses in any single growers hands at the present time, in the United Kingdom. A. C. and Sons have therefore to request an early perusal of this portion of their Catalogue, and that such orders as may be contemplated, shall be forwarded with the least possible delay, particularly for Standards, as this class of the Rose Plant has suffered most, and will in all probability, fall short of the demand.

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In the case of Standards or Dwarf Standards, A. C. and Sons most respectfully suggest the propriety of parties requiring any given number, forwarding a list of the plants they already possess, and leaving the selection of those required to ourselves, by which means the purchaser will ensure not only a select and varied collection, but also first-rate plants of the sorts furnished.

They again urge upon the attention of all lovers of fine Roses (and who are not?) the great advantage of early planting, and to say that where the work can be got done, November is the month in the year, to which we would give the preference. In their present Catalogue will be found every fine variety that has been as yet introduced, and they feel convinced that their present stock cannot fail to give every satisfaction, if planted in time and in a proper manner; and they hope the following plain directions will be acceptable to most of their customers, being, as they are, the result of much experience.

The ground in which they are intended to be planted should be trenched at least two spadings deep, and a layer of manure dug into the lower spading, so as to be under the roots when planted; a quantity of well prepared compost should also be at hand, at the time of planting, to put immediately under and over the roots, and special care should be taken before planting, that the roots are carefully pruned, a point of the utmost importance to their after success.

In planting, consider well the nature of the soil. If wet, keep the roots pretty near the surface; but if porous or dry, they should get a good hold of the ground; and immediately after planting, should the ground about the plant be mulched with common or rough manure, all the better for the first year, observing, that if standards, each plant, as they are put down, be secured to a strong stake, in order to prevent their being shaken in their position until they have taken fairly with the ground; and as soon as they have broken into leaf in the spring, a supply of liquid manure may be given once or twice a week, with great advantage. In pruning, the best time for which is towards the end of February or first of March, attention is absolutely required to the habit of each variety. In the case of a robust strong-growing kind, the young wood should be left from 8 to 12 inches, and in very strong growers, such as Chenedole, 14 to 18 inches of young wood is not too much, in order that they may flower freely. But in the case of weak growers, or abundant bloomers, the young wood should be cut to within three or four eyes of the old wood, and the very weak wood or dead branches carefully cut out, so as never to allow the bush to get to much crowded, and to encourage a more robust growth and finer bloom, which will be found to be the result.

Should the green fly attack them during the early summer months, as it too often does, mix one quart of tobacco water with six quarts of rain or

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soft water, and go over the plants occassionally with a syringe in the evening, which will soon clear them of these pests; or a new composition —Gishurst's compound—is said to be most effectual in the destruction of this troublesome insect, and the disagreeable smell of the tobacco got rid of; the direction for use is given with each package; and A. C. and Sons have imported a large quantity of it, which may be had at the lowest selling price.

Great care should be taken in the early spring months to watch for and destroy the rose grub, which generally makes its appearance when the plants are pretty well in leaf. Its presence is indicated by the young leaves becoming curled or rolled up at the points of the young shoots : the only remedy is to unfold the leaves destroy the insect, which if not done in time it will extend its depredations, going from one young shoot to another, until not unfrequently the entire blooms upon a plant have been destroyed. A little early and extra care of this sort will ensure an **ab**undant bloom, and prevent the too often unreasonable complaints as to bad roses, &c.

And with respect to the autumn bloomers.—pick off the decayed blooms from day to day until the first bloom is over, when the old flower stems should be cut back, the ground stirred about the plants, and a few doses of liquid manure given, which will encourage a new growth with a new head of bloom, often equal, and sometimes superior, to the first.

Lastly, in the case of budded plants.—Remove all suckers from the base or bottom of the stems as they make their appearance, but if a shoot of the original stock be allowed to grow along with, or in advance of the budded rose, it will be found of the greatest possible service, by causing a larger *amount of sap to flow through the main stem*, by which the plants are kept in robust health at all times, especially in the case of abundant bloomers and delicate growers; but observe, this shoot should be kept as a safety-valve, so as to keep the sap in free circulation, but it should be stopped back from time to time if it be observed to take the lead of the rose.

In selecting roses, A. C. some years ago gave preference to what is called dwarf standards, as more easily cultivated, and producing better blooms. In this opinion, he is happy to say, he is borne out by all the most successful cultivators of the Queen of Flowers. Of those we have of late cultivated a large proportion, in order to meet the growing demand for them,

Purchasers leaving the selection to ourselves, and giving a list of the sorts they already possess, will never fail in getting the finest sorts and the best plants; this, A. C. and Sons are happy to say, most of their kind customers are in the habit of doing, by which they are sure to be better served, as in that case the credit and responsibility principally rests with themselves.

A. C. and Sons further beg to call the special attention of their customers to their very extensive and superb stock of Dutch Flower Roots, just

received from the first growers in Holland, an inspection of which, at their SEED and IMPLEMENT WAREHOUSE, 7, EDEN-QUAY, is most respectfully solicited. Growers of Hyacinths should order and plant their roots early, so as to ensure a first-rate bloom: this cannot be to strongly urged upon the attention of the grower, as late-planted bulbs cannot succeed so well as those early planted, the roots being much weakened before the are put down.

Their well known and complete collection of Pelargoniums, Camellias, Indian Azaleas, Hollyhocks, Pinks, Carnations, Fruit Trees, &c., are well deserving the attention of purchasers, especially the latter, which excell perhaps those of any other grower this year; their Peaches and Nectarines having escaped the severity of the past winter, while a very great number of those in England were destroyed. 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# DUTCH FLOWER ROOTS AND THEIR CULTURE.

ALEXANDER CAMPBELL AND SONS, in presenting their Catalogue of DUTCH FLOWER ROOTS for the present season, beg to say they have been selected with the greatest care from the most eminent growers in Holland, and are this year the finest in point of quality ever imported.

As Bulls, more especially Hyacinths, Narcissus, Jonquils, Crocus and Snowdrops, when exposed to the action of the air for any length of time, become weakened, they cannot when procured late, be expected to flower, either so strong or so freely as those planted early. They would, therefore, strongly recommend their customers and lovers of good blooms to lose no time in securing their roots early in the season.

A very important matter to be looked after in the culture of Bulbs is the compost used. As they delight in a free, open soil, the following will be found to answer :---Well decomposed cow-dung and turfy loam in equal quantities; add one-third of sand. When coming into bloom, frequent application of liquid-manure will be found to serve them materially; seven inch pots are the most suitable, and when potting do not press the bulbs in the soil; leave the top uncovered, setting the soil with a plentiful supply of water. Keep them under cover in a cool place until they root, and when they have fairly rooted place them in a northerly aspect, and cover them with bog earth or sand to the depth of two feet. This, by preventing a premature growth of flower stems, insures good blooms in proper season; keeping them in this state for two months, but taking out once every fortnight any that may be required for early blooming, and being cautious not to force too freely, will insure a succession of good, healthy blooms from Christmas to April. The leaves will be found to be quite blanched when taken out of where they are plunged; but by bringing them gradually into the sun and light they will recover their natural green appearance in a few days.

To grow Hyacinths, Narcissus, &c., in water : Fill the glass with water so as to touch the base of the bulb. Place them in a dark closet or cellar, until the roots reach the bottom of the glass; then remove them to the light. The water for the first two or three weeks should be changed weekly, after which every fortnight will answer, but a little peat charcoal in the glass will prevent the necessity of changing the water so often, and will also act beneficially on the roots.

# EARLY SINGLE TULIPS.

From Freeman's Journal, April 26, 1861.—" On the orchestra were ranged some of the best Hyacinths, Tulips, and other spring flowers, from the Gardens of Messrs. A. Campbell and Sons, Glasnevin, which excited general admiration."

From Saunders's News Letter, April 26, 1861.—"The Florists' Flowers, and principally those from the gardens of the Messrs. Campbell, Glasnevin, were remarkably fine in bloom and size."

The following Extract is taken from the Report of the Royal Horticultural Society's Show, held in the Rotunda Gardens on April, 25, 1861.— "Of extra entries in the section of Florist's Flowers, the Judges selected the following as worthy of notice. A fine stand of early Tulips, shown by Messrs. Campbell, a prize recommended. In this section Messrs. Campbell also contributed the following not for competition: a group of Forty-two Hyacinths, cut blooms from the open ground; and, what formed a new feature at a Spring Show, seven stands of Early Tulips in distinct colours, the v lue of which for bedding purposes in the early Spring months, have not heretofore been appreciated as they ought, in this country. These were altogether very gay, and attracted much notice."—Farmer's Gazette, May 4, page 230.
