

PREFACE

No pains have been spared to make this edition complete to date, and above all, to secure that absolute accuracy in the most minute details, which is essential in a publication, regarded and quoted, as the standard book of reference on Canadian parliamentary matters.

The issue of the Guide, for 1936, contains full and accurate details of the political events for the calendar year 1935. The advent of new parties in our Canadian politics has added special interest to the pages of this volume.

The contents of the 1936 edition of the Guide may be grouped generally under the following headings:

- 1. The numerous appointments to the Senate of Canada.
- 2. The general election for the Dominion held in October, 1935, involving a change of Government.
- 3. Results of general elections in the provinces of Alberta, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Quebec, with changes of Government in the first three named provinces.
- 4. Details of membership of the Parliament of Canada and of the legislative bodies of the provinces and territories.

It has been impossible to obtain from a few new parliamentarians, doubtless through oversight, the data from which to compile their biographical sketches, and sooner than depend upon uncertain sources of information, a few sketches appearing in these pages have been confined to information obtained from official records. I take this opportunity to appeal to the gentlemen, who have so far omitted to respond to the numerous requests for data, to supply the necessary information, before the issue of the next edition.

His Most Excellent Majesty, George the Fifth, by the Grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

Second, and only surviving son of His late Majesty King Edward VII (who resigned in Oct., 1863, on behalf of himself, and provisionally on behalf of his descendants, all right and title to his grandfather's Dukedom of Saxe-Cobourg and Gotha) and of the Princess Alexandra Caroline Mary Charlotte Louise Julia of Denmark, eldest daughter of the late Christian IX, King of Denmark.

B. at Marlborough House, June 3, 1865; baptized July 7, 1865. Named George Frederick Ernest Albert. Cadet R.N., Junc 5, 1877; Midshipman, 1880; Sub-Lieutenant, 1884; Lieut., 1885; Commander, 1891; Capt., 1893; Rear-Admiral and Commander-in-Chief Royal Marines, Jan. 1, 1901; Vice-Admiral, 1903; Admiral, 1907; and Admiral of the Fleet, 1910. Gazetted a Gen. in the Army in 1902, and Field-Marshal, 1910. By death of his elder bro., H.R.H. Albert Victor, Duke of Clarence, Jan. 14, 1892, became heir presumptive to the Throne. May 24, same year, Dukedom of York, created in the reign of Ed. III, was restored in his favour; the titles, in full, conferred upon His Majesty upon this occasion being: Duke of York, Earl of Inverness, and Baron Killarney (peerage of United Kingdom). July 6, 1893, m. to his second cousin, Her Serene Highness Princess Victoria Mary ("May") Augusta Louise Olga Pauline Claudine Agnes, daughter of Her Royal Highness Mary Adelaide, the late Duchess of Teck and His Highness the Duke of Teck. The Duchess of Teck was the daughter of H.R.H. Adolphus, Duke of Cambridge, seventh son of George III.

Upon the death of Queen Victoria, Jan. 22, 1901, succeeded his father as Duke of Cornwall. Nov. 9, 1901, created Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester. Succeeded to the Crown upon the death of his father, King Edward VII (who was b. Nov. 9, 1841; m. March 10, 1863, and ascended to the throne in succession to his mother, Queen Victoria, Jan. 22, 1901) May 6, 1910. Proclaimed King, May 9, 1910; crowned with his consort at Westminster Abbey, June 22, 1911. Proclaimed Emperor, and assumed the Crown of India at Delhi, Dec. 12, 1911.

Admitted a Bencher Lincoln's Inn, 1892, and Treasurer, 1903. When Prince of Wales, was Master of the Corporation of Trinity House, Pres. of Roy. Acad. of Music, Hon. Pres. of Roy. Coll. of Music, and of Roy. Soc. of Arts, Hon. Pres. of Roy. Statistical Soc., a Commr. of the Patriotic Fund. Patron of many Institutions, etc. High Steward of Reading and Plymouth, Sovereign of the British Order of Knighthood, the Order of Merit. the Distinguished Ser. Order, the Imperial Service Order, and the Orders of Victoria and Albert, and the Crown of India. Sovereign and Patron of the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in England, its Ambulance Depart., the Order of Mercy, etc. An Elder Brother of Trinity House, Chief of the Highland Society of London. Chancellor of Cape Univ., 1901, and of Welsh Univ., 1902. Was a Personal Naval A.D.C. to Queen Victoria, also to King Edward VII, 1901-1910, and Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports and Constable of Dover Castle, 1905-07. Elected an Hon. Member of Ancient and Hon. Artillery Co. of Boston (U.S.A.), 1910, and of the National Agricultural Society of France, 1911. Hon. LL.D. Camb., 1884, Welsh Univ., 1902, London Univ., 1903, and Glasgow, 1907; Hon. D.C.L., Oxford, 1897, and Melbourne, Sydney, Adelaide, McGill, Laval and Toronto Univs., and Queen's Coll., Kingston, Ontario, 1901, and Hon. D. Lit., Sheffield, 1909; Hon. Fellow of Royal Coll. of Surgs., etc., etc.

Has Orders of Legion of Honour of France, St. Andrew of Russia, Annunciation of Italy, Elephant of Denmark, Golden Fleece of Spain, Seraphim of Sweden. Christ of Portugal, Maha Charkri of Siam, Collar of Carol I of Roumania, and many other Foreign Orders. On succession to the throne the Civil List was fixed by Act of Parliament at £470,000 per annum.

Her Majesty the Queen Consort was born, May 26. 1867. Is a Lady of the Orders of the Garter, Victoria and Albert, and the Crown of India. Granted by an Act of Parliament, 1901, a separate annual income while Princess of Wales of £10,000 during continuance of her marriage, and an annuity of £30,000 should she survive her husband, which annuity was subsequently increased to £70,000 by Act of Parliament 1910, after the accession of King George V. Hon. Mus. D. Univ. of Wales, 1902, and London Univ., 1903; Hon. LL.D., Glasgow, 1907. Under the Regency Bill of 1910, appointed to act as Regent in the event of a minority.

Her Majesty, as Consort of the Sovereign, has a separate Court and Household and is represented in Courts of Law (where she can sue or be sued in her own name, with the affix of "Queen of England") by her own Attorney-General and Solicitor-General. To compass or imagine her death (during the lifetime of her husband) is high treason. The Queen's Arms are those of King George V, impaling 1st and 4th the arms of the late Princess Mary of Cambridge (Duchess of Teck); 2nd and 3rd the arms of the late Francis, Prince and Duke of Teck; Supporters-Dexter, that of the King of England; sinister a stag proper, being one of the supporters of the late Francis, Prince and Duke of Teek.

Palaces, etc.—Windsor Castle, Berkshire; Buckingham Palace, London, S.W.; Sandringham, Norfolk; Frogmore House, Windsor; Abergeldie Castle, Balmoral, Scot-'and; Barton Manor, Osborne, Isle of Wight.

SONS OF THE KING

H.R.H. Edward Albert Christian George Andrew Patrick David, K.G., K.T., G.C.S.I., G.M.M.G., G.C.I.E., G.C.V.O., G.M.B.E., I.S.O., M.C., Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester (Peerage of U.K.). Duke of Saxony. Prince of Cobourg and Gotha (right resigned by King Edward VII), Duke of Cornwall (in peerage of England by patent, 1337), Duke of Rothesay (Cr., 1398), Earl of Carrick, Baron of Renfrew, Lord of the Isles, and Great Steward of Scotland (by Aet of Scottish Parliament, 1469), cldest son of H. M. King George V. B. at White Lodge, Richmond Park, June 23, 1894. Is heir apparent to the Crown. Served on the staff in the field during the Great War. Colonel of the Grenadier Guards and the Welsh Guards, Colonel in Chief of the Duke of Corn-wall's Light Infantry, Honorary Colonel of the Royal Scots Fusiliers, a Captain R.N. Patron of many livings. Cr. by letters patent under the Great Seal Prince of Wales and Earl of Chester (peerage of United Kingdom) June 23, 1910. Was invested with the Order of the Garter. June 10, 1911. His investiture as Prinee of Wales took place at Carnarvon Castle, July 13, 1911. The revenues of the Duchy of Cornwall are set apart for his benefit. In the event of marriage an allowance of £10,000 per annum is assigned to the Princess of Wales, increased to £30,000, should she survive her husband. In 1919, made an extended tour through Canada, and visited the United States. Again visited Canada ineognito, as Baron Renfrew, in 1923, spending some time at his ranch near High River. Alberta. In 1924, repeated the visit to Canada and also spent several weeks in the United States. Came to Ottawa again in 1927, accompanied by his brother, H.R.H.

H.R.H. Prince George (George Edward Alexander Edmund), Duke of Kent, K.G., G.C.V.O., LL.D., Hon. Causa Edinburgh, 1929, and Sheffield, 1930. Lieutenant R.N., Personal Naval A.D.C. to the King. Married, Nov. 29, 1934, to H.R.H. Princess Marina of Greece. B. Dec. 20, 1902. One son, Prince Edward George Nicholas Paul Patrick, b. Oct. 9, 1935.

H.R.H. Prince John, b. July 12, 1905, d. Jan. 18, 1919.

⁽¹⁾ The familiar badge of the coronet with the plume of three ostrich feathers and the motto "leh Dien" generally spoken of as "The Prince of Wales' feathers" is in reality the badge of the Heir-Apparent, in whom it is vested, whether created Prince of Wales or not. In Dec. 1910, a second badge was granted to the then Prince of Wales with a view to making some special allusion to the Principality of Wales, in the armorial achievements of the Heir-Apparent, if Prince of Wales, and consists of the red dragon of Wales differenced with a label of three points. The feathers in the older plume badge have since 1876 been officially depicted and borne perfectly erect, and not as formerly borne, and sometimes, at the present day, but wrongly, represented.

R.E., 1868, transferred to R.A., Oct. 1868, and to Rifle Brig. Aug. 1869; became Capt. 1871, trans-ferred to 7th Hussars 1874, promoted to Major 1875, transferred as Lieut.-Col. to command 1st Battn. Rifle Brig. 1876, promoted Brevet-Col. and Maj. Gen. 1880, Lieut.-Gen. 1889, Gen. 1893, and Field-Marshal 1902; apptd. Col.-in-Ch. Rifle-Brig. (Prince Consort's Own) 1880, and Col. Scots Guards 1883. Was Brig.-Gen. in command 3rd Inf. Brigade at Aldershot 1880-82; served during Fenian raid in Canada, 1870 (medal with clasp), and with Egyp-tian Expeditionary Force in 1882, in command of 1st (Guards) Brig. of 1st Div., present at action of Mahuta and battle of Tel-el-Kebir (despatches thrice, medal with clasp, Khedive's star, 2nd Class Medjidie, C.B., thanked by Parliament). Inspector-Gen. of the Forces and Pres. of Selection Board, 1904-07, and Com.-in-Ch. of Mediterranean Forces and High Commr. in Mediterranean, 1907-09. Opened, on behalf of the King,

the first Parliament of Union of South Africa, 1910; apptd. to be Gov. Gen. and Com. in Ch. of Canada. March 21, 1911, assumed office Oct. 13, 1911, retired from office upon completion of his extended term, Oet. 13, 1916; elected Pres. of Roy. Soc. of Arts, 1911; introduced at Privy Council, 1871. Created Duke of Connaught and Strath-earn, and Earl of Sussex (in the peerage of the United Kingdom), 1874. Was sometime Hon. Col. Hampshire and Isle of Wight (Reserve) R.F.A., and Sligo, R.F.A. (Reserve); is a personal A.D.C. to H.M., Ranger of Epping Forest, Great Prior of Ireland, Great Master of the Order of the Bath, Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of Freemasons, Grand Prior of the Order of St. John of Jerusalem in England, Master of the Corporation of Trinity House, a Bencher of Gray's Inn, Pres. of Wellington Coll. and of St. Thomas's Hospital, a Member and Pres. of the Gen. Council of the Roy. Patriotic Fund Corporation, Pres. of Kennel Club, a Knight of Justice of Order of St. John of Jerusalem in England, of the Order of the Golden Fleece of Spain. Is a Gen. in the Swedish Army, Col.-in-Ch. of the Roy. Dublin Fusiliers, 6th (Inniskilling) Dragoons, Rifle Brig. (Prince Consort's Own), and Highland L.I., Col. Grenadier Guards, and Army Ser. Corps, 6th Batn. Hampshire. Regt., 3rd (Reserve) Batn. Queen's Own (Royal W. Kent Regt.), Royal E. Kent Yeo., S. Irish Horse (Reserve) 18th Batn. (V.D.) Col. of London Regt., 3rd and 4th (Reserve) Batns. PARLIAMENT OF THE UNITED KINGDOM

The king, as sovereign, exercises all powers of executive government through a cabinet composed of certain sworn privy councillors, who act as advisers of the Crown, and conduct the public administration in accordance with iaw and constitutional usage. The Crown is hereditary, hut subject to such limitations as may he imposed by Parliament-i.e., hy the Crown, the Lords and the Commons.

Parliament—i.e., by the Crown, the Lords and the Commons. The Cahinet, or Committee of Ministers, in whom the executive government of Great Britain and Ireland is practically, though not nominally, vested, is selected with the approval of the Crown, by a Premier or First Minister, who is the choice of the Crown, the existence of the Cahinet, the members of which belong to His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, heing dependent upon the possession of the confidence of a majority in the House of Commons, the popular branch of Parliament.

The Parliament of the United Kingdom is composed of the Crown, the Lords, and the Commons, this division into three branches dating from the middle of the fourteenth century. The House of Lords, the Magnum Concilium of ancient days, consists of archhishops, hishops and peers, the latter divided into dukes, marquesses, earls, viscounts and barons. Three princes of the Royal hiood have also seats in the house. No peer can take his seat if he he under age, of unsound mind, or hankrupt. The Speaker is the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, who is a member of the Cabinet and retires with a change of government. The House of Lords has co-ordinate powers of legislation with the House of Commons, except as respects taxation or money bills. It cannot initiate or amend such hills, but it may reject them, as a whole. The maximum duration of the British Parliament is five years.

The House of Commons is the hody where the chief political power rests. Since the general election heid Nov. 15, 1922, it has consisted of 615 members. Up to dissolution, preceding the election in question, there had been 707 members, the absence of members from the South of Ireiand on account of the creation of the Irish Free State being responsible for the decrease. The general election of 1918 presented several new features. For one thing, the voting was done in one day. Then it was the first time that women voted in Britain, and the first time that there were women candidates. August 14, 1911 the House of Commons of the United Kingdom by a vote of 241 to 125 passed a resolution appropriating £252,000 for the payment of members' salaries for the then ensuing year. This action was taken pursuant to a resolution passed Aug. 10, providing for an annual salary of £400 for each member of the House of Commons. This was a radical departure from the principle of gratuitous public service which hitherto prevailed in the Commons of the United Kingdom.

Lady Astor, the first woman elected a member of the House of Commons of the United Kingdom, took her seat Dec. 1, 1919.

THE UNITED KINGDOM GOVERNMENT

(Revised December 12, 1935.)

The thirty-sixth Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland was dissolved on October 25, 1935, after a life extending from October 1, 1931. Nominations for the new House of Commons took place on November 4, and polling on November 14, 1935.

THE DOMINION OF CANADA

The territories which now constitute the Dominion of Canada eame under the British fiag at various times, some by settlement and others by conquest or cession Nova Scotia (Acadia) was discovered by the Cabots, in the service of King Henry VII, in 1497. The part of Canada now forming the Province of Quebec was discovered by Jacques Cartier, in the service of King Francis I of France, in 1534. The colony of Halifax was founded in 1749. By the treaty of Utrecht (1713) Acadia, and the Hudson Bay Territory (Hudson Bay was discovered by Henry Hudson in 1610) were acknowledged to be British Territory. The Hudson Bay company's charter, confering right of government over the territory now known as the Provinces of Manitoha, Saskatchewan, Alberta and the North-West Territories, was granted in 1670. The old French Colony of Canada was surrendered by the capitulation of Montreal, signed September 8, 1760 and along with the Prince Edward Isiand, and part of the present Province of New Brunswick, formally ceded to Great Britain by France under the Treaty of Paris, signed Feb. 10, 1763.

Vancouver Island was acknowledged to be British by the Oregon Boundary Treaty of 1846, and British Columbia was occupied in 1858.

As originally constituted, the Dominion of Canada was composed of the provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotla, and New Brunswick. They were united under the provisions of an Act of the Imperial Parliament (30 Victoria, Chapter III) passed in 1867, and commonly cited as "The British North America Act, 1867," aithough its full official designation originally was:-"An Act for the Union of Canada, N. Scotia and New Brunswick, and the government thereof, and for purposes con-nected therewith." This Act received the Royal assent March 29th, 1867, and came into effect by virtue of Royal Proclamation July 1st, 1867. This Act expressly provides that the Constitution of the Dominion shail be "similar in princip'e to that of the United Kingdom" (1st clause), so that the executive authority shall be vested in the Sovereign of Great Britain and Ireland, and carried on in her name by a Governor-General and Council "to aid and advise in the government of Canada, to be styled the Queen's Privy Council for Canada." (Clauses 9, 10 and 11). Provision was made in the Act for the Admission of British Columbia. Prince Edward Island, The North-West Territories, and Newfoundland into the Dominion (Clause 146). Newfoundland alone has not availed itself of such provision. In 1869 the extensive region known under the various designations of "Rupert's Land," "the Hudson Bay Territory," and "the North-West Territory," was added to the Dominion by purchase from the Hudson Bay Company. The Province of Manitoba was set apart out of a portion of it (32-33 Victoria, Chap. 3), and admitted into the Confederation July 15, 1870.

July 20, 1871, the Province of British Columbia, and July 1, 1873, the province of Prince Edward Island, respectively entered the confederation.

June 25, 1886, the Royal assent was given to "An Act respecting the representation in the Parliament of Canada of Territories which for the time being form part of the Dominion of Canada, but are not included in any Province," commonly eited as "The British North America Act, 1886" (49-50 Victoria, Chapter XXXV).

This Act provides that the Parliament of Canada may, from time to time, make provisions for the representation in the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, or in either of them, of any Territories which, for the time being, form part of the Dominion of Canada, but are not included in any Province thereof.

The Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan were formed from the provisional districts of Alberta, Athabaska, Assiniboia and Saskatchewan (4-5 Edward VII. Chap. 3 and 42), and were admitted to the Union as Provinces on September 1st, 1905.

During the first session of the 12th Parliament a bill was passed extending the areas of Manitoba, Ontario, and Quebec north-ward by adding to those provinces portions of the North-West Territory.

THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA.

The present Canadian system of government which was established under the British North America Act of 1867, is a Federal Union, the first of the kind in the British Empire. It comprises a general or central government controlling matters essential to the development, the permanency and the unity of the Dominion as a whole, and also a number of provincial governments having the control and management of certain clearly defined local matters naturally and conveniently talling within their jurisdiction. These several governments are administered in strict accordance with the principles of British parliamentary government.

The executive Power of the Government of the Dominion of Canada, as also the chief command of the military and naval forces, is vested in the King, represented by the Governor-General, appointed by His Majesty the King and advised by a Cabinet chosen from members of the King's Privy Council for Canada, and consisting of ministers holding departmental offices, besides, often, one or more ministers without portfolios. The government holds office as long as it has the confidence of the popular branch of Parliament.

It is not necessary that all the members of the Cabinet be members of the Senate or the House of Commons as long as the Cabinet, as a whole, has the confidence of the popular branch of Parliament.

According to the B. N. A. Act, 1867, Sec. 55, where a Bill passed by the Houses of Parliament is presented to the Governor-General for the Queen's assent, he shall declare, according to his discretion, but subject to the provisions of the mentioned Act and to Her Majesty's instruction, either that he assents thereto in the Queen's name, or that ne withholds the Queen's assent, or that he reserves the Bill for the signification of the Queen's pleasure.

ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT

Up to May 7, 1901, it was provided by Royai Letters Patent that the "powers granted His Excellency may in the case of his death, incapacity or absence, be given to the Lieutenant-Governor for the time being of Canada, or in his absence to such person as Her Majesty might, by warrant, appoint to be Administrator, or in the absence of such Lieutenant-Governor or Administrator to the Senior Military Officer for the time being in command of Her Majesty's regular Forces in the Dominion".

Upon the date mentioned a dormant Commn. passed under the Royai Sign Manual and Signet appointing the Chief Justice for the time being of the Supreme Court of Canada, or in the ease of the death, incapacity, removal or absence from Canada of the Chief Justice, the Senior Judge of the Supreme Court of Canada, to be Administrator of the Government of the Dominion in the event of the death, incapacity, removal or absence of the Governor-General.

The Royai Letters Patent of June 15, 1905, which provided for the change in the designation of His Excellency's office from that of "Governor-Generai in and over the Dominion of Canada" to that of "Governor-Generai and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Dominion of Canada", contained the same provision as to the Administrator as the dormant Commission, and that instrument, being thus rendered superfluous, was withdrawn and cancelied.

The Administrator is vested with all the powers and authorities granted to the Governor-General by letters patent or otherwise. (See Supreme Court of Canada.)

AHEARN, HON. THOMAS. Born June 24th, 1855, at Ottawa, Ont. S. of John and Honora (Power) Ahearn. Ed. at Ottawa. With his former partner, W. Y. Soper, organized the Chaudiere Electrie Light and Power Company, 1887, which was merged into the Ottawa Power Company, 1895. Ottawa Investment Company; Director Bank of Montreal, Royal Trust Company, Bell Telephone Company of Canada, Canadian Westinghouse Company, Northern Electric Company, Guarantee Company of North America, and many other corporations; Chairman of the Ottawa Federal District Commission until 1932. Organized the very successful national broadcasting in connection with the Diamond Jubilee Celebration 1927, a work which the Governor General stated has done more to ereate a national spirit in Canada than any other movement. D.C.L., King's College, Windsor. Married Jan. 14, 1924, to Miss Grace Winnifred Coster. Children: John B. M. Jr., Eleanor Cowden, Frederic Coster Noel and Mary Faith. Lt.-Col. commanding 3rd Regt. C.A. 1907-12. Member of Union Club, St. John; Cliff Club, N.B.; University Club of Montrcal; Rideau Club, Ottawa. Pol., candid. Dec. 1911, elec. by acclamation to N.B. Legis. for St. John Co. Re-elec. at g.e., 1912, and in Dec. 1914, apptd. Attorney-General. Again re-elec. at g.e. 1917 and 1920. Chosen leader of Provincial Opposition, Sept. 1920. Sworn as Minister of Customs, Sept. 21, 1921, retiring with Meighen Admin., Dec. 29, 1921. First elec. to H. of C. g.e. for City and C. St. John and Albert. Resigned his seat in the H. of C. when selected Leader of the Provincial Conservative Party for New Brunswick. Elec. to Legis. Assem. in Aug. 1925; re-elec. at g.e. 1930. Was called upon to form a Government on Sept. 10, 1925. Became Premier on Sept 14. Resigned as Mem. of N.B. Legislature when apptd. to the Supreme Court of N.B., May 18, 1931. St. John, N.B.

BORDEN, RIGHT HONOURABLE SIR ROBERT LAIRD, P.C., G.C.M.G., K.C., D.C.L., LL.D. Eld. s. of Andrew Borden and Eunice Laird, his wife. B. at Grand Pré on June 26, 1854. Sir Robert Borden's great great-grandfather went to King's County, N.S., with the old settlers from New England in 1760. Subsequently returning to Massachusetts, he gave his land in Nova Scotia to his son, the great-grandfather of the Prime Minister. Ed. at Acadia Villa Acad., Horton. Was Prof. in Glenwood Inst., N.J. Returning to N.S., he studied law and was called to the Bar, 1878. Before removing to Ottawa, was head of the law firm of Borden, Ritchie and Chisholm, Halifax, and for ten years pres. of the N.S. Barristers' Soc.; Q.C., 1900. Hon. D.C.L., Queen's Univ., 1903; D.C.L., King's College, (Windsor, N.S.,) 1912; LL.D., St. Francis Xavier Univ., 1905; McGill Univ., 1913; Edinburgh Univ., 1917: Cambridge Univ., 1917; Dalhousie Univ., (Halifax, N.S.), 1919; D.C.L., Oxford Univ., 1927. At a meeting of the Board of Governors of MeGill University, 1918, Sir Robert Borden was unanimously elected President of the Royal Institution for the Advancement of Science, and Chancellor of McGill Univ. Chancellor of Queen's Univ. 1924-1929. First Prcs. Can. Inst. of Int. Affairs, 1927-1929; Fellow of Royal Soc. of Canada, 1928. Delivered first scries of Rhodes Memorial Lectures at Oxford University, during the summer term of 1927 and took as subject. "Canada in the Commonwealth; from Conflict to Cooperation". Elec. to H. of Com. for Halifax, g.e., 1896; re-el. g.e., 1900. An unsuccessful candidate for Halifax, at g.e. 1904. Edward Kidd, m. for Carleton (O.), resigned and Mr. Borden was elce. for the constituency by acel, at by-elec., Feb. 4, 1905. At g.e., of 1908, re-clec. in Carleton by a large majority and also elected in Halifax, N.S. heading the poll. He elected to sit for Halifax and resigned the other seat. Re-elec. for Halifax, at g.e., of 1911. Is Honorary Colonel of the 63rd Regiment of Halifax. Elected leader of the Conservative party in the H. of Commons, Feb. 6, 1901. Upon the resignation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Cabinet on Oct. 6, 1911, following the defeat of the Liberal party at the polls at the general elections September 21st, 1911, Sir Robert Border. was sent for by His Excellency Earl Grey, and entrusted with the task of forming a Cabinet, assuming office as President of the Council, October 10, 1911. Attended meeting of the Imperial Cabinet by invitation of the Prime Minister of the United Kingdom, July 14, 1915, being the first Overseas Minister of the Empire to whom such an invitation was ever extended. Visited Canadian and British Expeditionary Forces and French armies at the front in France and Flanders. July, 1915. This was the first legislation in any Parliament authorizing any of the interested Governments to embark in the scheme. It was shortly afterwards followed by legislative action in the Parliaments of the other portions of the Empire which were interested in the scheme, and resulted in the construction of the Pacific cable, a line extending from Canada to New Zealand and Australia. THE PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

The British North America Act, 1867, provides:-

"There shall be one Parliament for Canada, consisting of the Queen, an Upper House styled the Senate, and the House of Commons". (Clause 17.)

"There shall be a Session of the Parliament of Canada once at least in every year, so that twelve months shall not intervene between the last Sitting of the Parliament in one Session and its first Sitting in the next Session". (Clause 20.)

"The Governor-General shall, from time to time, in the Queen's name, by instrument under the Great Seal of Canada, summon and eall together the House of Commons." (Clause 38.)

The Parliament and Government of Canada (See. 132 B.N.A. Aet), possesses all powers necessary or proper for performing the Obligations of Canada or of any Province thereof, as Part of the British Empire, towards Foreign Countries, arising under Treaties between the Empire and such Foreign Countries.

Either the English or the French language may be used by any person in the Debates of the Houses of the Parliament of Canada and of the Houses of the Legislature of Quebee, and both these languages are used in the respective records and Journals of those Houses; and either of those languages may be used by any person or in any Pleading or Process or in issuing from any Court of Canada established under the B.N.A. Act and in or from all or any of the Courts of Quebec.

As the Dom. of Canada possesses a system of federal government, her legislative powers are limited to certain subjects of Dominion or National import, set forth in Section 9 of the British North America Act of 1867, as follows:---

"91. It shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate and House of Commons, to make laws for the Peace. Order and Good Government of Canada, in relation to all matters not coming within the Classes of Subjects by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the Provinces, and for greater certainty but not as to restrict the Generality of the foregoing Terms of the Section, it is hereby declared that (notwithstanding anything in this Act) the exclusive Legislative Authority of the Parliament of Canada extends to all Matters coming within the Classes of Subjects next hereinafter enumerated, that is to say:-

" 1. The Public Debt and Property.

" 2. The Regulation of Trade and Commerce.

The Raising of Money by any Mode or System of Taxation. " 3.

The Borrowing of Money on the Public Credit. • 4.

" 5. Postal Service.

" 6. The Census and Statistics.

"7. Militia, Military and Naval Service and Defence.

" 8. The fixing of and providing for the Salaries and Allowances of Civil and other Officers of the Government of Canada.

"9. Beacons, Buoys, Lighthouses and Sable Island.

"10. Navigation and Shipping.

"11. Quarantine and the Establishment and Maintenance of Marine Hospitals.

"12. Sea Coast and Inland Fisheries.

"13. Ferries hetween a Province and any British or Foreign Countries, or between two Provinces.

"14. Currency and Coinage.

"15. Banking, Incorporation of Banks and the Issue of Paper Money.

"16. Savings Banks.

"17. Weights and Measures

"18. Bills of Exchange and Promisory Notes.

"19. Interest.

"20. Legal Tender

"21. Bankruptcy and Insolvency.

"22. Patents of Invention and Discovery.

"23. Copyrights.

"24. Indians and Land reserved for the Indians.

"25. Naturalization and Aliens.

"26. Marriage and Divorce.

"27. The Criminal Law, except the Constitution of the Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction, but including the Procedure in Criminal Matters.

"28. The Establishment, Maintenance and Management of Penitentiaries.

"29. Such Classes of Subjects are as expressly excepted in the Enumeration of the Classes of Subject by this Act assigned exclusively to the Legislatures of the Provinces".

THE SENATE OF CANADA.

According to the British North America Act, 1867, the Senate as originally constituted was to consist of 72 members; 24 for the Province of Ontario, 24 for Quebee and 24 for the Maritime Provinces (Nova Scotia and New Brunswick). Qualifications were laid down as fol-lows:--Must be a British subject; must be thirty years of age; must be possessed of real property, free of all incumbrances, to the value of \$4,000; must be a resident of the province for which he is appointed. Senators are appointed by the Governor-General in Council and, subjeet to ecrtain conditions, hold their appointments for life. A Senator may by writing resign his seat. His place becomes vacant (1) if for two consecutive sessions of Parliament he fails to attend; (3) if he becomes a subject or citizen of a foreign power; (3) if he becomes a bankrupt or defaulter; (4) if he is attained of felony or convicted of felony or crime; (5) if he eeases to be qualified in respect of property. The Governor-General in Council appoints the Speaker of the Senate, the Clerk and the Gentieman Usher of the Black Rod. The debates and proceedings of the Senate are governed by Rules and Orders modelled to a considerable extent after those of the House of Lords and differing very considerably from those of the House of Commons. Thus honour-able gentlemen, rising to speak, address themselves to the "Honourable Gentlemen," composing the House, and not to "Mr. Speaker," as in the House of Commons.

Each of the Senators from Quebee is appointed to represent one of 24 divisions corresponding with former electoral divisions of the old Province of Lower Canada. Senators for other provinces are not appointed for any designated divisions, but the practice of assuming distinctive territorial designations prevalis. A popular practice of Senators who have formerly sat in the House of Commons is to adopt as their designations the titles of their former constituencies. Several are content to be designated as "from" the eity or town in which they reside. Senators must continue to reside in the province from which they are appointed.

The first increase in the membership of the Senate took place in 1871, when Manitoba and British Columbia, upon entering the Confederation, were awarded two and three seats respectively. In 1873 Prince Edward Island, upon entering Confederation, was given four members, the representation of Nova Seotia and New Brunswick being reduced by two senators each. In 1882 Manitoba was given an additional member and in 1892 another. In 1888 the North-West Territories were given two senators. In 1904, in virtue of the Act 3 Edward VII, Chapter 42, the representation of the North-West Territories was increased to four. Upon creation of the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan in 1905, each was allotted 4 seats in the Senate, or eight seats between them.

The Senate as then constituted consisted of 87 members as follows:-Ontario, 24. Quebec, 24; Nova Scotia, 10; New Brunswick, 10; Prince Edward Island, 4; Britisb Columbia, 3; Manitoba, 4; Saskatchewan, 4; Alberta, 4.

During the session of 1914 (3rd session XII Parliament) the government introduced a measure providing for the increase of representation in the Senate to 96. This measure provided that the detail of representation should be as follows:—Ontario by 24 senators; Quebec, by 24 senators; the Maritime Provinces and Prince Edward Island, by 24 senators, 10 thereof representing Nova Scotia, 10 thereof representing New Brunswick and 4 thereof representing Prince-Edward Island; the western provinces by 24 senators, 6 thereof representing Manitoba, 6 thereof representing British Columbia; 6 thereof representing Saskatehewan and 6 Alberta.

This measure as amended by the Senate came into effect upon the dissolution of the 12th parliament.

The eligibility of women for appt. to the Senate of Canada was declared by the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council in 1929, and in Feb. 1930, for the first time in the History of Canada a woman was appointed a Member of the Senate.

In accordance with 5th Edward VII, Chapter 43, an allowance was made to each member of the Senate and House of Commons, of \$20 beyond for each day's attendance if the session did not extend beyond thirty days, and if the session extended beyond that time an allowance of \$2,500 was made. For every day on which a member did not attend a sitting of his House a deduction at the rate of \$15 per day was made.

During the fourth session of the 13th Parliament of Canada (1920) there was passed an Act to amend the Salaries Act and the Senate and House of Commons Act, which provided for an increase in the sessional indemnities of Senators and Members of the House of Commons from \$2,500 to \$4,000. In view of the increased indemnity, certain restrictive provisions were imposed in the Bill, the chief of which read as follows: "A member shall not be entitled to the sessional allowance if he does not attend a sitting of the House of which he is a member on at least three-rourths of the days upon which such House sits: but the allowance for any less number of days shall be twenty-five dollars for each day's attendance."

It was provided in this legislation that the Prime Minister need not be burdened with a portfollo and that he receive a salary of \$15,000, the other ministers to receive salaries of \$10,000 each

Provision was also made for the raising of the salaries of the Speakers of the Senate and House of Commons from \$4,000 to \$6,000 and the salary of the Deputy Speaker of the House of Commons from \$2,000 to \$4,000

NOTICE FOR PRIVATE BILLS

EXTRACTS FROM RULES OF THE SENATE

All applications to Parliament for Private Bills, of any nature whatsoever, shall be advertised by a Notice published in the *Canada Gazette*. Such notice shall clearly and distinctly state the nature and objects of the application, and shall be signed by or on behalf of the applicants, with the address of the party signing the same; and, when the application is for an Act of Incorporation, the name of the proposed company shall be stated in the Notice.

A company for the construction of any works which in their construction or operation might specially affect a particular locality, or for obtaining any exclusive rights or privileges, or for doing any matter or thing which in its operation would affect the rights or property of others,—In a leading newspaper in the particular locality or localities which may be affected by the proposed Act.

And, if the works of any Company (incorporated or to be incorporated) are to be declared to be for the general advantage of Canada, such intention shall be specifically mentioned in the notice; and the applicants shall cause a copy of such notice to be sent by registered letter to the clerk of each county council and of each municipal corporation which may be specially affected by the construction or operation of such works, and also to the Secretary of the Province in which such works are, or may be located, so as to reach those officers not less than five weeks before the consideration of the petition by the Committee of Standing Orders; and a statutory declaration establishing the fact of such mailing shall be sent to the Clerk of the Senate.

All such notices, whether inserted in the Canada Gazette or in a newspaper, shall be published at least once a week for a period of five consecutive weeks; and, when published in the Province of Quebec and Manitoba, shall be in both the English and French languages; and marked copies of each issue of all newspapers containing any such notice shall be sent to the Clerk of the Senate, endorsed "Private Bill Notice," or a statutory declaration as to due publication may be sent in lieu thereof.

HOUSE OF COMMONS

CONDENSED STANDING ORDERS RESPECTING NOTICES FOR PRIVATE BILLS.

All applications to Parliament for Private Bills shall be advertised by a notice in the *Canada Gasette* (see Standing Order 95 (1)) clearly and distinctly stating the nature and objects of the application and signed by or on behalf of the applicants with the address of the party signing the same. For an Act of incorporation, the name of the proposed company shall be stated. If the works of any company are to be declared to be for the general advantage of Canada the same shall be specifically mentioned in the notice and a copy of such notice shall be sent by registered letter to the clerk of each county or municipality which may be specially affected by such works and also to the sccretary of the province in which such works are or may be located; and proof of such service of notice shall be established by statutory declaration.

1. FOR ACTS OF INCORPORATION—(a) Of a railway or canal company or of a company for the construction of any special works, or for obtaining any special rights and privileges (95, A1); in the principal place in each county or district affected;

(b) Of a telegraph or telephone company (95, A2); in the principal place in each province in which the company intends to operate;

(c) Of banks, insurance, trust, loan or of industrial companies with out any special powers (95, A4); Advertise in the *Canada Gazette* only.

2. For AMENDMENTS TO ACTS OF INCORPORATION—(a) For the extension of a line of railway or canal or branches thereto (95, B1); where the head office of the company is located, and in the principal place in each county or district affected.

(b) For the extension of time for construction of works of any kind (95, 2 B2); where the head office of the company is located, and in the principal place in each county or district affected.

(c) For the continuation of a charter or for the enlargement of any of the powers of a company (not involving exclusive rights) (95, B3); where the head office of the company is located or is authorized to be.

(d) For the granting of exclusive rights which in operation would affect the rights of others (95, C); in the locality or localities where rights of others may be specially affected by proposed Act.

All such notices whether inserted in the *Canada Gazette* or in a newspaper, shall be published at least once a week for a period of four consecutive weeks; and when originating in the Province of Quebec or in the Province of Manitoba shall be published in English in an English newspaper and in French in a French newspaper, and in both languages in the *Canada Gazette*; and if there is no newspaper in a locality where a notice is required to be given, such notice shall be given in the next nearest locality, wherein a newspaper is published; and proof of the due publication of notice shall be established in each case by statutory declaration; and all such declarations shall be sent to the Clerk of the House, endorsed "Private Bill Notice" 95, C.(3).

For further particulars as to notices, fees, form and deposit of bills, etc., address the Clerk of the House of Commons, Ottawa, or see the Standing Orders of the Commons relating to notices of applications for Private Bills as published in the *Canada Gazette*.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS OF CANADA.

The House of Commons of Canada is elected by the people for five years, unless sooner dissolved by the Governor-General. Members require no property qualifications, but they must be of the age of 21, and British subjects, not disqualified by law. The Speaker is chosen by the House at the opening sitting of the first session of each parliament.

The members are elected by constituencies and voting is by ballot. The number of members of the House of Commons is regulated

by the following clauses of the British North America Act, 1867:-

"51. On the completion of the Census in the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-One, and of each subsequent decennial Census, the representation of the four Provinces shall be readjusted by such authority, in such manner, and from such time as the Parliament of Canada from time to time provides, subject and according to the follofing Rules:--

"(1). Quebec shall have the fixed number of Sixty five members.

"(2). There shall be assigned to each of the other Provinces such a number of members as will bear the same proportion to the number of its population (ascertained at such Census) as the number Sixty-five bears to the number of the population of Quebec (so ascertained).

"(3). In the computation of the number of members for a Province a fractional part not exceeding one-half of the whole number requisite for entitling the Province to a member shall be disregarded; but a fractional part exceeding one-half of that number shall be equivalent to the whole number.

"(4). On any such readjustment the number of members for a Province shall not be reduced unless the proportion which the number of the population of the Province bore to the number of the aggregate population of Canada at the then last preceding readjustment of the numbers of members for the Province is ascertained at the then latest Census to be diminished by one twentith part or upwards.

"(5). Such readjustments shall not take effect until the termination of the then existing Parliament.

"52. The number of the members of the House of Commons may from time to time be increased by the Parliament of Canada, providing the proportionate representation of the Province prescribed by this Act is not thereby disturbed."

At Confederation (1867) the House of Commons consisted of 181 members of which Ontario returned 82 Quebec 65 Nova Scotia, 19; and New Brunswick, 15. During the fourth session of the 1st Parliament the representation was increased to 191, Manitoba (4 members) and British Columbia (6 members) having entered Confederation.

The representation in the 2nd Parliament (July 8, 1972, to Jan. 2, 1874), under the Redistribution Act of 1872, was 200 up to the last sessions, when there was an increase of 6 members owing to the admission of Prince Edward Island to Confederation, Ontario had 88 members; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 16; Manitoba, 4; British Columbia, 6.

In the 3rd Parliament (Jan. 2, 1874, to August 17, 1878), and in the 4th Parliament (Aug. 17, 1878, to May 18, 1882) the representation remained as at the dissolution of the 2nd Parliament, viz:—Ontario, 88; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 21; New Brunswick, 16; Manitoba, 4; British Columbia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 6. Total 206

The representation in the 5th Parliament (May 16, 1882, to Jan. 15, 1887) under the Representation Act of 1887, was increased to 211, the Ontario representation being increased from 88 to 92 and that of Manitoba from 4 to 5.

In the 6th Parliament (Jan. 15, 1887, to Feb. 3, 1891), the representation remained unchanged, except that in 1887 the North-West Territories were granted representation with 4 members, thus making a total representation of 215.

During the 7th Parliament (Feb. 3, 1891, to April 24, 1896) there was no change in the representation.

In the 8th Parliament (April 24, 1896, to Oct. 9, 1900), under the Representation Act of 1892-3, the representation was as follows:—Ontario, 92; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 20; New Brunswick, 14; Mauitoba, 7; British Columbia, 6; Prince Edward Island, 5; North-West Territories, 4. Total, 213.

During the 9th Parliament (Oct. 9, 1900, to Sept. 29, 1904), there was but one change in the representation, a seat being added for the Yukon Territory (Chap. 37, 1902). This made 214 members, distributed as follows:—Ontario, S6; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 18; New Brunswick, 13; Manitoba, 10; North-West Territories, 10; British Columbia, 7; Prince Edward Island, 4; The Yukon Territory, 1.

The House remained so constituted until the dissolution of the 10th Parliament, September 17th, 1908.

During the first session of the Tenth Parliament of Canada (1905) provision was made for the creation of the new provinces of Saskatchewan and Alberta out of part of the North-West Territories, and provision was made for the taking of a census of population in the two new provinces, as also in Manitoba, in the middle year of each decade commencing with 1906. The results of the first quinquennial consus made necessary, according to the Saskatchewan and Alberta Acts, a readjustment of the representation of Saskatchewan and Alberta in the House of Commons, and at the session of 1906-07 an amendment was passed to the Representation Act (Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes 1906) providing that the House of Commons shall consist of two hundred and twenty-one (221) members, as follows: Ontario, 86; Quebec, 65; Saskatchewan, 10; (a gain of 4); British Columbia, 7; Alberta, 7 (a gain of 3); Prince Edward Island, 4; Yukon Territory, 1.

By a special clause embodied in this Act, it only took effect upon the dissolution of the 10th Parliament.

During the session of 1914 (3rd session 12th Parlt.) a Redistribution Bill was passed, providing for an increase in the number of members of the House of Commons to 235, divided among the provinces as follows:—Ontario, 82; Quebec, 65; Nova Scotia, 16; New Brunswick, 11; Manitoba, 15; British Columbia, 13; Prince Edward Island, 4 Saskatchewan, 16; Alberta, 12; Yukon, 1. Total, 235. The new Act came into effect with the dissolution of the Twelfth Parliament. During the session of 1923 (2nd of the 14th Parlt.) the Government introduced a Redistribution Bill based upon the census of 1921. It was not passed before prorogation and was accordingly re-introduced at the 1924 session and with certain amendments adopted. Under its provisions the Maritime Provinces lose two members; both in Nova Scotia; the Prairie Provinces gain eleven—four going to Alberta, five to Saskatcnewan and two to Manitoba. British Columbia gains one. The other provinces remain as at present, as does the representation of Yukon Territory. The net increase in representation for the whole Dominion is, therefore, ten.

The Representation Act, 1933, based on the census of 1931 was passed at the session of 1933 (4th of the 17th Parlt.) It reduced the membership of Nova Scotia to 12 and New Brunswick to 10; increasing Alberta to 17, and British Columbia to 16. Other Provinces remaining the same.

The distribution of the seats among the provinces provided for in the Act is as follows:

The functions, powers and prerogatives of the Canadian House of Commons approximate as closely as may be to those possessed by the Lower House of the Parliament of the United Kingdom. Bill for appropriating any part of the Public Revenue, or for imposing any Tax or Impost, must originate in the House of Commons. It is not lawful for the House of Commons to adopt or pass any Vote, Resolution, Address, or Bill for the Appropriation of any Part of the Public Revenue, or of any Tax or Impost, to any Purpose, that has not been first recommended to the House by Message of the Governor-General in the Session in which such Vote, Resolution, Address or Bill is proposed.

Under an order of the House (April 25), the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, attended and on motion of the Hon. Mr. Cameron, of Peel, a resolution was passed, instructing the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery to amend the return so as to declare both candidates elected. This was done, and Dr. Lynch, who was present in Ottawa, forthwith subscribed to the oath and took his seat. Then Hon. Mr. Cameron drew attention to the rule which provided that a member must withdraw while the matter of his election was before the House, whereupon Dr. Lynch withdrew. May 13, Mr. McKay, having arrived in Ottawa, presented himself and took the oath and his seat. Under similar conditions as Dr. Lynch he withdrew. A delay of six weeks was allowed the Elec. Com to enquire into the matter. Before the House finally disposed of the matter Parliament was dissoived. (See Journals of the House.)

PROVINCE OF ALBERTA

(Revised, December 15, 1935.)

With the Province of Saskatchewan formed from part of the Northwest Territories by Act of Dominion Parliament, 1905, (first session, 10th Parliament). The two provinces are divided by the meridian of 110, west from Greenwich. They lie between British Columbia on the west, and Manitoba and the Northwest Territories on the east, and between the International boundary at the 49th parallel on the south, and the 60th parallel on the north. From north to south each province extends 760 miles, or as long as from the mouth of the Detroit River to the mouth of the Saguenay in a straight line. The area of the two provinces is 504,190 square miles, which is as large as the united areas of Great Britain, France and Germany, as large as the States of Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota and the two Dakotas combined, and more than twice as large as the six New Englnd States together with New-York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana. The provisions of the B.N.A. Act 1867, with its several amendments, apply to the new provinces. The public lands are retained by the Government of Canada. and In place of these, as a source of revenue, the provinces receive an annual sum based upon the population as from time to time ascertained by the quinquennial census.

Act creating Province of Alberta came into force Sept. 1, 1905.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

(Revised December 18, 1935.)

The constituency of Columbia which was joined to Revelstoke in 1932 was recreated as a separate constituency at the session of the Legislature of 1934.

Dissolution of the 17th Legislature took place August 1, 1933; nominations, October 19, 1933, and voting, November 2, 1933. Due to the death of one of the candidates the elections in Vancouver (2 seats) and Victoria (4 seats) were deferred; nominations, November 13, 1933. and voting, November 27, 1933.

NINETEENTH LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Consists of 55 members elected by popular vote. An additional constituency (The Pas) was created after the extension of the province, the first election therein taking place Oct. 22, 1912. By a redistribution bill passed in the 1914 session, nine new constituencics were created and two old ones wiped out. Winnipeg city was divided into three divisions returning two members cach. Morden and Rhineland were consolidated, as were Brandon and South Brandon. Three seats were created in New Manitoba. Sessional indemnity \$1,500. The eighteenth Legis. was dissolved May 7, 1932. The election for the 19th Legis. took place as follows:—

Nominations June 6, 1932, voting June 16, 1932. Deferred elections in Rupert's Land and The Pas; nominations July 4, 1932; voting July 14, 1932. The voting in the City of Winnipeg was conducted on the Proportional Representation system.

NEW BRUNSWICK LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

At, and for many years after Confederation, New Brunswick had a Legis. Council as well as a Legis. Assembly. April 16, 1891, an Act (54 Vic., Chap IX) was passed abolishing the Legis. Council and vesting all its powers in the Lieut.-Governor and Assembly, thereafter designated the Legislative Assembly. This Act came into force upon the dissolution of 1892. The "Legislatures" are now officially counted from that date only, the present being known as the "Tenth", although including the sessions prior to 1892, it is really the 17th since Confederation.

Elec. by popular vote—48 members. Last g.e., June 27, 1935. Sessional Indemnity, \$1,000 and travelling expenses; the Speaker \$400 and the Leader of the Opposition, \$1,000 additional.

THE SPEAKER

The Legislature not having met since the last general election. June 27, 1935, the Speaker is not yet chosen.

The Redistribution Act of 1929 provided for a House of 38 members, but that number has been reduced to 30 members by the Redistribution Act of 1932 (Chapter 19). Under this Act, one member is returned from the following electoral districts: Cape Breton North, Cape Breton East, Cape Breton South, Cape Breton Centre, Cape Breton West, Halifax East, Halifax West, Halifax South, Halifax Centre, Halifax North; one member is returned by each of the following Counties: Annapolis, Antigonish, Digby, Guysboro, Hants, Inverness, Kings, Queens, Richmond, Shelburne, Yarmouth and Victoria; and two members are returned by each of the following Counties: Colchester, Cumberland, Pictou and Lunenburg.

Members receive sessional indemnity of \$1,000 per session.

The Speaker receives \$800 per annum in addition.

THE QUEBEC LEGISLATURE

In accordance with the B.N.A. Act, 1867 (clause 71 and following) the Legislature for the Province of Quebec coonsists of the Lieutenant-Governor and of two Houses, styled the Legislative Council of Quebec and the Legislative Assembly of Quebec.

The Legislative Councillors are "appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor in Council or life, unless the Legislature of Quebcc otherwise provides." The qualifications of the Legislative Councillors are the same as for members of the Senate of Canada and the place of a Legislature Councillor becomes vacant in the cases, "mutatis mutandis", in which the place of Senator becomes vacant.

The Legislative Assembly is composed of members elected by the various electoral divisions into which the province is divided.

The work and authority of the two Houses are divided as in the House of the Dominion Parliament.

QUEBEC LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

(Revised December 30, 1935)

The Legislative Council consists of 24 members appointed by the Crown (the Provincial Govt. of the day) and the appointment is for life. The speaker is also appointed by the Crown, and broadly, the Council resembles the Canadian Senate in its composition, functions and procedure. "The official table of Titles to be used in Canada" (clause 10) provides that Legislative Councillors appointed after Confederation shall not be entitled to the title of "Honourable", but Councillors appointed previous to that date were allowed to retain it. Sessionnal indemnity of \$2,500, plus \$300, for travelling expenses. The Speaker receives in addition an allowance of \$5,000.

THE SPEAKER

LAFERTE, HON. HECTOR, B.A., LL.L., K.C. (Stadacona). B. Nov. 8, 1885, at St. Germain de Grantham, Drummond Co. S. of Joseph Laferté (member in the Quebec Legis. from 1901 until 1910), and Georgiana Jeanne Tessicr. Jules Allard, Jérémie L. Décarie and J. E. Caron, successively Provincial Ministers of Agriculture. Was pres. of students in law. founder and first pres. of L"Association de la Jeunesse Libérale." Was Pres. of the young Bar Assn., mem. of the Council of the Bar. Was one of the principal speakers at the unveiling of the Mercier monument at Quebee, in June, 1912. In 1914, represented the Province of Quebce at Houghton, Michigan, at the National French-Canadian eelebration. For six years was associated with the Hon. P. A. Choquette and the Hon. Antonin Galipeault. (to-day Judge of the Court of Appeal). Later was head of the firm of Laferté & Pouliot, and later still associated with Hon. Ernest Lapointe. Was lawyer for

the bootmakers at the time of the great strike in 1913 and is legal advisor for many corporations, and also of several Labour Unions. Was also Revenue Lawyer. In 1916 was the youngest member of the Legis. Ass., and moved the address in reply to the speech from the The Throne and same year as representative of the men appeared before the Commission appointed to settle the tramways' strike. Is a past President of the Reform Club, and still one of its directors. Refused nomin. for the seat for Quebec East rendered vacant by the death of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, as he had several times previously declined nom. tendered him, notably in Drummond-Arthabaska. First elec. to Legis. Assem. for Drummond at g.e., 1916, by a maj. of 643. Re-elec. by accl. at g.e., 1919. Re-elec., 1923 and 1927. Dec. 21, 1923, chosen unanimously as Deputy Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and Chairman of Committees. Was also elected Hon. Vice-Pres. of the Press Gallery. Took active part in the Lib. Conv. held in Ottawa, 1919, and accompanied the del. of farmers to the Federal Capital to interview the Government to ask exemption of their sons from Conscription. Rep. the Prov. of Quebec at Lewiston. Me., June 1922, for the celebration of the Nat. Feast of the Fr. Am. Named legal adviser, Fr. Am. Tourists Party of the N. England States Assn. in the Prov. of Quebec, 1923; June 24, 1922, was invited to be the prine. Speaker at the Nat. Feast of the Fr. Am. at Woonsocket. Was vice-patron of the East. Township's Agric. Assn. Apptd. by the Govt. to rep. the Prov. of Quebec at the rel. and patriotic celebration held at Fall River, U.S., Oct. 1924, on occasion of fiftieth ann. of foundation of the parish of N.D. de Lourdes. Was first Pres. of the Liberal Federals Club, Quebec, and as such was Chairman of a banquet held in Quebec in honor of Hon. L. A. Taschcreau at which attended 1700 guests. Attended conv. of Can. and American Barristers in London and Paris, 1924. Presided at demonstration given the Rt. Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King in Quebec, Jan. 1925. In Oct., 1926, was acting Gov.-General of "Parlement modèle." Elec. unanimously Speaker of the Legisl. of Quebec, Jan. 10, 1928, also Hon. Pres. of the Press Gallery. Was apptd. as Minister of Col., Game & Fisheries, April 24, 1929. Re-elcc. at g.e., 1931. Life member of Société Zoologique of Quebec since 1933. Apptd. to the Legislative Council of Quebec, and President of the Council, July 25, 1934. Clubs: Reform. Montreal and Quebec; Garrison, Quebec; Drummondville Golf and Country. Party Pol., Liberal. Religion, Catholic. Residence: 41 St. Louis Street, Quebec.

THE SASKATCHEWAN LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

Consists of 55 members elected by popular vote. The representation was increased from 25 to 41 by legislation passed during the third session of the first Legislature, and again from 41 to 54 under Legislature Act (Cap. 2) 1912--under the Act of March 14, 1916 (Cap. 4), the number of Constituencies was increased to 59, and under Act Providing Representation for members of Overseas Forces, dated March 10, 1917 (Cap. 4), three additional seats were provided.

At the (1920) Session of the Legislature, an Act (Chap. 13) was passed to amend the Legislative Assembly Act, which increased the representation from fifty-nine members to sixty-three by providing that the Electoral Divisions of Moose Jaw City, Regina City and Saskatoon City shall return two members each and by re-arranging the boundaries of certain of the other electoral divisions and creating a new electoral division named Gravelbourg. This amendment took effect upon the dissolution of the Fourth Legislature.

During the Session of the Legislature in 1932, a redistribution of the Electoral Divisions was provided for under an Act to amend The Legislative Assembly Act (Chapter 75 of 1932) whereby the number of Electoral Divisions was decreased from 60 to 52 and the Representation reduced from 63 to 55 members, (the Cities of Regina, Saskatoon and Moose Jaw still to return two members each.)

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT-DAWSON

The Yukon was created a separate Territory in June, 1898, by Act of Pariiament (The Yukon Act). By amending legislation provision is made for a local Government composed of a Chief Executive, styled Commissioner (since classified Comptroller), also an Elective Legislative Council of three members with a three year tenure of office. The Comptroller administers the Government of the Territory under instructions from the Governor General in Council or the Minister of the Interior. The Comptroller in Council has power to make ordinances dealing with the imposition of local taxes, sale of liquor, preservation of game, establishment of territorial offices, maintenance of prisons and municipal institutions, issue of licenses, incorporation of companies, solemnization of marriage, property and civil rights, administration of justice, and generally ali matters of a local and private nature in the Territory.

SEAT OF GOVERNMENT-OTTAWA

The Northwest Territories comprise the territories formerly known as Rupert's Land and the Northwestern Territory, except such portions thereof as form the provinces of Man.toba, Saskatchewan and Alberta and the Yukon Territory, together with all British territories and possessions in North America and all islands adjacent thereto, not included within any province, except the Dominion of Newfoundland and its dependencies. For administrative purposes the Territories were subdivided into the provisional districts of Mackenzie, Kcewatin and Franklin by Order in Council of the 16th March, 1918. The Northwest Territories are governed by the Commissioner, the Deputy Commissioner and five councillors appointed by the Governor General in Council. The Commissioner in Council has power to make ordinances for the Government of the Territories under instructions from the Governor General in Council or the Minister of the Interior, subject to any Act of the Parliament of Canada applying to the Territories, respecting such matters as direct taxation within the Territories in order to raise revenue, establishment and tenure of territorial offices and the appointment and payment of officers, maintenance of prisons, municipal institutions, licenses, solemnization of marriages, property and civil rights, administration of justice, education and generally all matters of a local nature,

SUPREME COURT OF CANADA

The Supreme Court of Canada (as also the Exchequer Court) was eonstituted in 1875 under "The Supreme and Exchequer Court Act" (38 Vic., Chap. 11).

The Supreme Court has jurisdiction as a High Court of Appeal in both eivil and criminal cases throughout the Dominion of Canada. It is also a Court of Appeal for controverted election cases, from the Exchequer Court, from the Board of Railway Commissioners as provided in the Railway Act and under the Winding-up Act. It also has jurisdiction in controversies between the provinces and the Dominion. The Governor-in-Council may refer to the Supreme Court for an opinion upon any matter deemed advisable in the public interest. From the decision of the Supreme Court an appeal lies to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council of Great Britain by special leave of the Judicial Committee in all cases except appeals which come to the Supreme Court from the Exchequer Court sitting as a Court of Admiralty. In the latter case alone there is an appeal as of right.

The Supreme Court sits in Ottawa, where the judges reside and where three sessions annually are held, beginning on the first Tuesday in February, the fourth Tuesday in April and the first Tuesday in Oetober.

In 1896 Parliament amended the Supreme Court Act by repealing s. 4, and substituting therefor the following: "The Supreme Court shall consist of a chief justice, to be called the Chief Justice of Canada, and five puisne judges who shall be appointed by the Governor-in-Couneil by letters patent under the Great Seal." This section appears in this form in the Supreme Court Act, R.S.C., e. 139, s. 4.

In 1927 the Supreme Court Act was amended by the substitution of this section instead of section 4 of Chap. 139, R.S.C., 1906.

"IV. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice, to be called the Chief Justice of Canada, and six Puisne judges, who shall be appointed by the Governor-in-Council by letters patent under the Great Scal".

Section IX, of the said Act was amended by adding thereto the following:-

"Provided that each Judge whether heretofore appointed or hereafter to be appointed, shall cease to hold office upon attaining the age of seventy-five years, or immediately, if he has already attained that age."

Sections VII and VIII of the letters patent passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom, dated March 23, 1931, constituting the office of Governor-General and Commander in Chief of the Dominion of Canada, read as follows:—

"VII. And we do hereby deelare Our pleasure to be that, in the event of the death, ineapacity, removal, or absence of Our said Governor-General out of Our said Dominion, all and every the powers and authorities herein granted to him shall, until Our further pleasure is signified therein, be vested in such person as may he appointed by Us under Our Sign Manual and Signet to be Our Lieutenant-Governor of Our said Dominion or, if there shall be no such person or persons as may be appointed by Us under Our Sign Manual and Signet to administer the Government of the same; and in case there shall be no person or persons within Our said Dominion so appointed by Us, then in Our Chief Justice for the time being of the Supreme Court of Our said Dominion; or, in case of the death, incapacity, removal, or absence out of Our said Dominion of Our said Chief Justice for the time being, then in the Senior Judge for the time being of Our said Supreme Court then residing in Our said Dominion and not being under incapacity.

"Provided always, that the said Senior Judge shall act in the administration of the Government only if and when Our said Chief Justice shall not be present within Our said Dominion and capable of administering the Government.

"Provided further that no such powers or authorities shall vest in such Lieutenant-Governor, or such other person or persons, until he or they shall bave taken the Oaths appointed to be taken by the Governor-General of Our said Dominion and in the manner provided by the Instructions accompanying these Our Letter. Patent.

"VIII. And we do hereby require and command all Our Officers and Ministers, Civil and Military, and all other, the inhabitants of Our said Dominions, to be obedient, aiding and assisting unto Our said Governor-General; or, in the event of his death, incapacity or absence, to such person or persons as may from time to time, under the provisions of these Our Letters Patent, administer the Government of Our said Dominion."

It was notified in the "London Gazette" of May 21, 1913, that the King had been pleased to approve of the use and recognition throughout His Majesty's Dominion during tenure of office of the title of "Honourable" in the case of the Chief Justice of Canada, the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts of Canada and some others.

THE EXCHEQUER COURT OF CANADA.

(On December 26, 1935.)

The Exchequer Court of Canada possesses exclusive original jurisdiction in all cases in which demand is made or relief sought against the Crown or any of its officers. It enforces the law relating to revenue.

The Exchequer Court sits from time to time, and in such places as the business of the Court requires.

By the Dominion Act of 1891, 54 and 55 Vic., c. 29, Admiralty jurisdiction was vested in the Exchequer Court (ss. 5 and 6), and the judges were designated "Local Judges in Admiralty of the Exchequer Court" (s. 6); and other sections refer to the Exchequer Court "on its Admiralty side." By the Dominion Act of 1895, c. 39, these judges are deemed "to be Judges of a Superior Court."

The Exchequer Court is also a Prize Court in time of War

Judges of the Exchequer Court are entitled to the designation "Honourable". See "Table of Canadian Titles".

BOARD OF RAILWAY COMMISSIONERS FOR CANADA

Created Feb. 1, 1904, under authority of the Railway Act of 1903 (3 Ed. VII, ehap. 58). First session held at Ottawa, Feb. 9, 1904. Commissioners are appointed for a term of ten years, but are eligible for re-appointment.

By Chap. 62, 7-8 Edward VII, the Railway Act was amended by adding an Assistant Chief Commissioner and two Commissioners to the Board. It had previously consisted of three members only. It was provided that the Assistant Chief Commissioner shall exercise all the powers of the Chief Commissioner in his absence, and that the Deputy chief Commissioner shall, in the absence of the Chief Commissioner and the Assistant Chief Commissioner, or of their inability to act, exercise the powers of the Chief Commissioner for him in his stead.

By Chap. 61, 7-8 Edward VII, the Railway Act was further amended by bringing telegraph and telephone rates under the jurisdiction of the Board, and the companies are required to file tariffs with the Board. Such tarlffs may be cealt with by the Board in the same manner as is provided by the Railway Act with respect to the Standard Freight Tariffs.

Provisions were also made for long distance communications on applications to the Board for such purposes.

Sections 355 and 360 of the Railway Act were repealed.

3. To "carry out such instructions as he, from time to time, receives from the Governor in Council respecting the commercial, financial and general interests of Canada in Great Britain and elsewhere".

CANADIAN MINISTER IN FRANCE

After his death, Hon. Philippe Roy was appointed in May, 1911, with the title of Commissioner-General of Canada in France.

In 1923, an exchange of Ministers was agreed upon between Canada and France, and in September of that year, Hon. Philippe Roy was appointed as His Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary in France to represent the interests of the Dominion of Canada.

CANADIAN MINISTER IN JAPAN

2. To act as a substitute for, and under the instruction of, the Minister of Labor, as the representative of Canada on the Governing Body of the International Labor Office.

HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR GREAT BRITAIN

During the Imperial Conference in 1926 the question of representation of the Government of Great Britain at the Dominion eapitals was discussed, and the Interimperial Relations Committee of the Conference reported as follows:—

"A special aspect of the question of consultation which we considered was that concerning the representation of Great Britain in the Dominions. By reason of his constitutional position, as explained in section IV (b) of this Report, the Governor-General is no longer the representative of His Majesty's Government in Great Britain. There is no one therefore in the Dominion capitals in a position to represent with authority the views of His Majesty's Government in Great Britain.

"We summed up our conclusions in the following resolution which is submitted for the consideration of the Conference:—

"The Governments represented at the Imperial Conference are impressed with the desirability of developing a system of personal contact, both in London and in the Dominion capitals, to supplement the present system of intercommunication and the reciprocal supply of information on affairs requiring joint consideration. The manner in which any new system is to be worked out is a matter for consideration and settlement between His Majesty's Governments in Great Britain and the Dominions, with due regard to the circumstances of each particular part of the Empire, it being understood that any new arrangements should be supplementary to, and not in replacement of, the system of direct communication from Government to Government and the special arrangements which have been in force since 1918 for communications between Prime Ministers".

This resolution was adopted by the Conference as part of the report of the Interimperial Relations Committee.

OFFICIAL PRECEDENCE

The establishment and the maintenance of tables or scales of official precedence result from the fact that in all nations and communities there are individuals, who, because they have entrusted to them by the nation the performance of certain responsible and honorable official or communal functions, are by common accord, regarded, either for the time being, or permanently, as occupying positions of various degrees of eminence in the social fabric.

In the old patriarchal communities social pre-eminence was naturally accorded to the heads of the tribal families, and precedence throughout the tribes was generally regulated by the seniority of the sons of the patriarchs and the individuals of their families. Of course there were exceptions to this rule, due to the personal ambitions and achievements of individuals.

Since nations have been evolved from the old tribal organizations, an official class of citizens has been developed, comprising those who, besides occupying the usual position of members of the state, have entrusted to them the execution of what have been described as the life functions of the nation; that is such functions as are peculiar to the civic organization in contra-distinction to the general functions excreded and actions performed by individual citizens as independent units. Official service calls in a special degree for a sense of duty to the public trust, and in many cases for a spirit of sacrifice and, if needs be, self effacement. In recognition of these conditions, and often for very practical state reasons, special privileges are granted to certain of the more responsible officials within the spheres appointed for them. So public service has come to be the one outstanding element in determining relative rank in social etiquette—the corner stone of all official tables of social precedence.

"Precedence" has been defined as the priority of place, or superiority in rank, in the conventional system of arrangement under which the more eminent and dignified orders of a community are classified on occasion of public ceremony and in the intercourse of private life.

Public functions of some form or another occur with more or less frequency in every state, and those who serve and represent the people in official capacities are necessarily the principal, often the only, participants. An ordinary sense of decency, not to speak of dignity or that wholesome sense of national pride which exists in all races, demands that such functions be orderly, and that the monopoly of places of honour be placed beyond the accomplishment of the assuming upstart and unworthy elements to the exclusion of those entrusted by the nation with the administration of its affairs and the guardianship of its interests and honour, and thus, in a very special sense, representing it.

It is not alone in countries where monarchical systems of government prevail that precedence is a subject of official regulation, republics finding it indispensable that provision be made for checking the tendency of ambitious and often selfish and unpatriotic individuals and elements to monopolize the highest distinctions and honours and ignore the claims of the devoted and trusted officers and servants of the nation—its recognized official representatives. The famous "protocol" of the French Republic is a case in point. Throughout the British Empire or Commonwealth of Nations, the "Tables" or "Scales" of Precedence emanate from the Crown, and are lesued under authority of the Sovereign. The Crown is "the fountain of honour," and it is its undoubted prerogative to confer on any of its subjects, in any part of its donninons, such titles and distinctions and such rank and place "as to it may seem meet and eonvenient." Its discretion is limited in those cases only wherein it has been submitted to restraint by Act of Parliament.

There is not, even in the Mother Country, any complete and comprehensive code whereby the scheme of social gradation has been defined and settled, once and for all, on a permanent foundation. The principles and rules at present controlling it have been formulated at different periods and have been derived from various sources.

In the old time, questions of precedence came in the ordinary course of things within the jurisdiction of the Courts of Chivairy in which figured such picturesque officials as lord high constables, earl marshals, kings of arms, heralds, pursuivants, etc. Points of unusual moment were referred to and decided by the sovereign in person, the privy council, or parliament.

Although there were "estates" titles and orders of various degrees in England from earliest historical times the oldest English table of precedence in existence is the "Order of All Estates of Nobles and Gentry" prepared for the coronation of Henry IV in 1399.

In the thirty-first year of King Henry VIII, Parliament, by statutory enactment, took cognizance of Precedence. It then passed the "Act for Placing the Lords," which, although it concerned directly only the Great Officers of States, and referred but incidentally to the places of the Nobility, has since been considered the chief authority for the marshailing of dignities.

This Act was originated, it is important to remember, by the desire of the King, and it is declared, as a preliminary, that "aithough it appertained altogether to the Royal Prerogative to give such honour, reputation, and placing to his councilors and others his subjects as should be seeming to the King's most excellent wisdom, the King was nevertheless pleased and contented for an order to be had and taken in his Most High Court of Parliament for the placing of the Great Officers and Lords."

The Statute of Henry VIII was in the nature of a declaratory Act, confirming the ancient and pre-existing Law of Precedence, and, in confirmation of this, it is a matter of historical fact that the advice of Garter King of Arms was taken before the bill was brought in. This Act of King Henry VIII's parilament still remains the only legislative measure in which it has been attempted to deal directly and systematically with any large and important section of the English scale or Table of Precedence. (There are separate tables for Scotland, Ireland, Wales, each Dominion, India and the Crown Colonies.)

Where no act of Parliament applies, precedence is determined by the will of the Sovereign or by what is accepted as ancient "usage and established custom."

Lists that show practice and custom in matters of precedence, such as are sccn in the published accounts of assemblies of the estates of the realm such as at solemnities—Coronations, funerals, and the like, have been invoked in the preparation of the various Tables of precedence at present in force throughout the Empire.

Strict observance of these lists is insisted upon, for the principle underlying the maintenance of these lists is the protection of established right; and the least interference, unless made by Royai or Parliamentary authority, would be destructive of the right of some one entitled to rank on the scale, and not unlikely to dishonour the State in the person of a recognized representative.

It is Men's rank that confers precedence and regulates State Ceremonials. At the King's Courts, where husbands and wives pass His Majesty together, the precedence of the husbands is that which is regarded.

The wives and children of great officers of State and of all of those who derive their places on the scale from official rank, have no consequent precedence.

Foreign Titles of Nobility borne by British subjects afford their holders no precedence whatever in the Mother Country or elsewhere in the Empire, and strictly speaking, a Royal License should be obtained for their use.

Persons entitled to precedence in the United Kingdom, in Foreign Countries, or in any particular Dominion or Colony, are not entitled, as of a right, to the same precedence elsewhere; but in the absence of any special Instruction from the King, the precedence of such persons in the Overseas Dominions and Colonies of the British Commonwealth is determined by the King's Representative (the Governor General or Governor).

TABLE OF PRECEDENCE FOR CANADA

The official Table of Precedence is established and subject to regulations by the Home Government, acting through the Right Honourable the Sceretary of State for the Colonies. The first table of Precedence for the Dominion was prepared at Confederation. The first important amendment was announced in despatches from the Secretary of State for the Colonics bearing date Nov. 3, 1879 and published in the Statutes of Canada of 1880 (43 Victoria, p. XXII). The next amendment was announced in a despatch dated Downing Street, Dec. 29, 1893, and published in the "Canada Gazette", Jan. 20, 1894. The last noted amendment assigned, on the recommendation of the Dominion Government, precedence to the Controllers of Customs and Inland Revenue, and the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, British Columbia, Prince Edward Island and the North West Territories.

During the administration of Sir Mackenzie Bowell some suggestions for a further revision of the Table of Precedence were made to the Colonial Office, but there was a change of Government before the matter reached a final issue.

December, 1923, a revised Table of Precedence approved by the King, and despatched from the Colonial Office. De ember 3, 1923, was received by His Excellency the Governor-General and published in the "Canada Gazette" on December 22nd as follows:---

- 27. The Chief of Staff National Defence, the Director of Naval Services and the Director of the Air Force provided they are of the rank of Major-General or its equivalent or higher rank.
- 28. Members of the Executive Council, Provincial within their Province.
- 29. The Speaker of the Legislative Council within his Province.
- 30. Members of the Legislative Council within their Province.
- 31. The Speaker of the Legislative Assembly within his Province.

- NOTE:—A—Ministers of foreign powers and foreign Consuls General accredited to Canada, though not provided for in the Table of Precedence, are given a courtesy precedence, the Ministers following immediately after the Prime Minister of Canada and the Consuls General immediately after the Prime Ministers of the Provinces. 'The High Commissioner in Canada for the United Kingdom has been granted precedence immediately after the Dominion Cabinet Ministers.
- B—Judges at present on the retired list and Judges at present holding Office but who shall retire after the date of the New Table shall not be affected as to Preeedenee given to them by the Old Table.

In the revised table the designation of places for the Lieutenant Governors of Saskatchewan and Alberta (9 and 10) are new; so are section 11, designating the place of the Prime Minister of Canada; section 13, according places to "The Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the General Superintendent of the Methodist Church in Canada, and the corresponding head of the Baptist Church in Canada"; section 19, providing for the Prime Ministers of the Provinces of Canada; the concluding clause of section 20, providing for the Judge appointed to perform the duties of Chief Justice at Quebec and Montreal; section 27, providing for the Chief of Staff National Defence, the Director of Naval Services and the Director of the Air Force provided they are of the rank of Major-General or its equivalent or higher rank. The Speaker and members of the House of Commons are given relatively higher place than accorded to them in the oid list. An important feature of the revised table is the omission of any reference to Imperial Privy Councillors. Since 1903 It had been the practice, with the sanction of the Governor-General, to accord certain precedence to Imperial Privy Councillors; and the omission of reference to such officers in the revised list has been taken as an Indication that the practice mentioned be discontinued, and it has been.

Official rank and position, although conferring special official precedence on the holder of the office as per the Table of Precedence, does not do so any more in Canada than in the Mother Country, upon the holder's wife and children. Thus the wives and children of Privy Councillors, Senators, Judges, members of Parliament, and officers of state, as such, have no special precedence, except such as is accorded to them (and it is always done) as a compliment. Widows of Privy Councillors, Senators, Judges, or public officials, have no claims to complimentary precedence as such, any claim they might have had in that respect lapsing with the demise of their husbands.

Knightly titles or other Imperial titles and appointments do not entitle the holders to any recognition under the Official Table of Precedence for Canada.

This is a fact which is often overlooked by those in charge of semi-fificial and popular ceremonial events, and gentlemen entitled to precedence in Canada by the official table sanctioned by the Sovereign, often find themselves ignored in favour of others having no claim whatever to precedence in Canada although they may be entitled to recognized places in the Mother Country or other parts of the Empire.

Members of the Royal Family while in Canada take precedence next after the Governor-General, this according to a rule in effect throughout His Majesty's Dominions.

*Retired Judges were given precedence next after the present Judge of their respective Courts by the Oid Table.

TABLE OF TITLES TO BE USED IN CANADA

- 1. The Governor-General of Canada to be styled "His Excellency" and his wife "Her Excellency". (1)
- 2. The Lieutenant-Governor of the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" and for life.
- 3. Privy Councillors of Canada to be styled "Honourable", and for life.

⁽¹⁾ H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught, being of the Royal Family, was while Governor-General styled "His Royal Highness the Governor-General and Commander-in-Chief."

The term "Her Excellency" was, of course, in disuse during the Duke of Connaught's regime, in favour of that of "Her Royal Highness."

- 4. The Solicitor-General to be styled "Honourable" while in office.
- 5. Senators of Canada to be styled "Honourable", but only during office and the title not to be continued afterwards.
- 6. The Speaker of the House of Commons to be styled "Honourable" during tenure of office.
- 7. The Chief Justice of Canada, the Judges of the Supreme and Exchequer Courts of Canada, and the Chief Justices and Judges of the undermentioned Courts in the several Provinces of Canada:—

Ontario-The Supreme Court of Ontario;

Alberta—The Supreme Court of Alberta; to be styled "Honourable" during tenure of office;

- 8. The Presidents and Speakers of the Legislatures of the Provinces to be styled "Honourable" during tenure of office.
- 10. Legislative Councillors in the Province of Quebec not in future to have that title, but gentlemen who were Legislative Councillors in the Provinces at the time of the Union (1st July, 1867) to retain their title of "Honourable" for life.

⁽¹⁾ Saskatchewan for some years has had a Court of Appeal and Court of King's Bench in place of the old "Supreme Court".

The following to be eligible to be personally recommended by the Governor-General for His Majesty's permission to retain the title of "Honourable".

- (a) Speakers of the Senate and of the House of Commons on retirement after three years of office, not necessarily continuous.
- (b) The above-mentioned Chief Justices and Judges on retirement.
