## BOARDMAN ROBINSON

CARTOONIST OF THE

BOARDMAN ROBINSON'S crayon cartoons in the New York Tribune have gained a strong hold on the interest of the metropolis. His ideas are refreshing, the spirit of his work being attack on sham and on things, animate or not,-customs, habits, individuals, corporations, and so forth - that obstruct the path of human progress. His style is strikingly different from his fellow New York cartoonists, its development and encouragement having come while he was abroad, removed from the traditions of American cartoonists. Much of his life has been spent in Europe, painting and drawing and "loafing", as he calls it. He has exhibited occasionally with the Societé des Beaux Arts, known of old as the "Champ de Mars." Previous to his engagement with the Tribune he had for three years illustrated the Sunday section of the New York Morning Telegraph.


EAGER sympathy with the new ideals of the times, keen insight to the point of view of the masses, and a constant watch for a place to charge with his lance some current wrong are characteristics of Robert Minor, Jr., on the evidence of his cartoons in the St. Louis Post-Dispatch. He has come up from work at common labor, has advanced steadily through his own efforts and at 27 years of age is now one of the leading cartoonists of the country. His regular work was on a newspaper in his native city of San Antonio, Texas, where he was at different times cartoonist, stereotyper, assistant pressman, circulation manager, and reporter, and some of the time was all of them. From there he went to the Post - Dispatch as an assignment artist, and studied nights in the art school of Washington University. He has succeeded in establishing a striking individuality about his crayon and brush cartoons.

"Mind-Shaking Laughter" by Boccioni is the title of the upper painting and "Leaving the Theater" by Carra is the lower. These were included in the exhibition of "Futurist" art in Paris and London recently which aroused great controversy and ridicule. Their aim is to "depict states of mind," that the paintings must be the synthesis of what we see and remember. The lower one for instance, has been interpreted as illustrating the state of mind of persons who have just seen a modern problem play. Naturally this new school is giving joyous times to the European cartoonists.
