## IMPORTANT AMENDMENTS.

### Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 13.

Permits the state, county and municipal bonds to be made payable at any place within the United States. It will greatly extend the market for bonds of this character if the interest and principal are made payable at some financial center. State, county and large municipal issues might to great advantage be made payable in New York, San Francisco and Los Angeles, as well as at their respective municipal treasuries and county seats. The wider the market, the greater the premium the bonds will command and the lower proportionately the rate of interest to be paid. No good reason can be advanced for opposing this amendment.

### Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 20

This amendment permits corporations whose charters are about to terminate under the constitutional limit of fifty years, to extend their existence for another term of not exceeding fifty years. At present the charter of comparatively few corporations are about to expire, but they include several of the largest San Francisco banking institutions, notably the Hibernia Savings & Loan Society. The bank of California, the Savings and Loan Society and the San Francisco Savings Union, and the turn of each corporation at present existing will come in time.

Corporations which have withstood the vicissitudes of business in California for a period of fifty years, should properly be objects of pride to the commonwealth and it is exceedingly unreasonable to require them to go into liquidation and suffer the losses resulting from a cessation of operations and a forced realization of assets. Partnerships have indefinite life, and corporations are nothing more than partnerships of a number of individuals aggregating their means, who singly could use their capital to little advantage.

### Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 38

This will permit the deposit of the funds of the state, or of any county or municipality of the state in any bank of the state, on security being given in form of bonds of the United States, or of this state, or of any county, municipality or school district within the state, to an amount in value at least ten per cent in excess of the amount deposited. Interest must be paid on such deposits at the rate of not less than two per cent per annum on daily balances, and no bank shall have on deposit public funds to any amount in excess of fifty per cent of its paid up capital stock.

The withdrawal from circulation, and locking up in the public treasuries, of the money collected for taxes, at a time of the year when money is most needed for the moving of the crops, is an economic evil which no longer should be endured. The United States Government does not look up its revenues pending their use, nor do the greater number of the states. Why should California adhere to this antiquated, unwise and unprofitable practice?

### Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 8.

This amendment proposes to remove the constitutional restriction on the borrower and lender contracting as to the payment of the mortgage tax by the borrower. It was proposed at the emergency session of the legislature called to provide for the extraordinary conditions arising from the San Francisco disaster because it was believed that money to be loaned on real estate security in California would be more readily attracted from sources outside of the state, if the rate of interest to be realized could be definitely fixed when the money is loaned. It is unnecessary to discuss with any banker the operation of the mortgage tax.

It is to the advantage of the lender to fix the rate of interest and pay the mortgage tax, for he can fix a rate sufficiently high to cover any

possible tax and a little more for contingencies. It is to the advantage of the borrower to agree on a net rate of interest and pay the mortgage tax himself. The adoption of this amendment will permit the lender to dispense with subterfuges by which they at present endeavor to evade the penalties imposed by the Constitution for such contracting. The advantage to the lender would be the facilitating of his bookkeeping. The advantage to the borrower would be a lower rate of interest. This amendment should be adopted as a matter of public policy.

### WALTER C. LINDSAY

Everywhere he went he was enthusiastically received and given a warm assurance of support regardless of political affiliations.

### A Good Amendment.

The following letter, explaining Constitutional Amendment No. 20 is so true and plain we publish it in full as a guidance to voters who are called on by the Banks and Bankers of the State:

To the Public:  
"As citizens whose financial interests are promoted by anything that contributes to insure the stability and orderly conduct of business, and particularly of financial institutions, such as savings banks, commercial banks and other like corporations, we respectfully ask you to vote for and support Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 20, which will be submitted to a vote of the people at the next election in this state, November, 6 1906. The object of this amendment is to permit corporations, whose charters are about to expire by the fifty-year limitation prescribed by law, to extend their corporate existence for another fifty years by filing a certificate for that purpose. This amendment is of present importance to the banks in this State, whose charters will expire in from five to eight years. You know that hundreds of California corporations, business corporations, savings and other banks, and corporations of many descriptions, were organized between 1856 and 1865 under the first statutes on corporations for a period of fifty years. They are now nearing the end of their legal existence. Unless this amendment be adopted, they will have to wind up their business and dissolve through expensive, laborous and vexatious court proceedings and provide for re-organization under a new name. The result would not be only damaging loss to the corporations and shareholders involved, but a serious set-back to their creditors and customers, and a grave interruption to the general business of the community. The amendment will also benefit all corporations, religious, educational and benevolent, as well as those organized for profit. It needs no argument to show that the general welfare, and consequently your financial interests is promoted by the steady progress of business and of financial institutions, without hitches, jars or interruptions to the orderly and continuous march of commercial and industrial affairs.

"The proposed amendment is substantially the law of nearly all the States in the Union. There is no more reason why a business or financial corporation, a savings bank or a commercial bank, should die in fifty years than a partnership. Such aids to business and investment are indispensable. No one can be damaged by the adoption of his amendment. The whole community will be benefited. It will not extend any of the franchises granted to corporations by cities or towns, nor increase the corporate powers or rights of any corporation. It will simply prolong the lifetime of corporations that wish to continue to exist. The right of the State to abolish corporations and to alter charters will not be interfered with or affected. You are respectfully urged to vote for it and work for it among your friends. Thirteen other proposed constitutional amendments are to be voted for likewise, and we trust you will see to it that this Senate Amendment No. 20 is not overlooked in the confusion of such a large number. Remember the number, Senate Amendment No. 20."

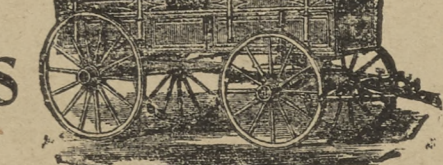

**A NEEDED CHANGE**

Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 20 is an up-to-date and sensible change in our existing laws and should be passed. It allows legal and proper existing corporations doing business in this state to renew their charters like is done in nearly every other state in the Union. There is no more reason why a legitimate corporation should be compelled to cease business and apply for a new charter under a new name, than there would be for a hardware store, farmer, contractor or any other line of honorable business. Suppose you are interested as a stockholder in a good old reliable and prosperous manufacturing plant, would you like to be compelled to cease operations, sell out and start again under a new name simply because your charter time had run out? Nonsense! Might as well ask a butcher, a baker or carpenter to quit business, change his name and start in fresh. Don't forget to vote for Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 20 and help California's business interests and bring the state laws up-to-date in business affairs.

Don't let suspicious minded people tell you a lot of imaginary stuff about Senate Constitutional Amendment No. 20. Vote for it.

**Vote For the Bond Issue**

There is not one good reason why any citizen should vote against the bonds to enable Sonoma county to have a court house to take the place of the one destroyed by the recent earthquake. Should any voter be unwise enough to do so he is not only voting against his best interests but against the county as well.

A court house we must have and will have, and the wisest possible plan to build it and pay for it, is the one recently adopted by our supervisors. The new structure to cost \$280,000 is the least possible sum for which a suitable court house, commensurate with the needs of a large and growing county, such as Sonoma, could be built. The law compels the erection of suitable buildings in which to carry on the county's business and therefore the Board of Supervisors could levy a special tax for the purpose if they so chose. But instead they adopted the easiest and best plan for the tax-payers. Think of the heavy rate that would be necessary to raise \$280,000 by special direct tax.

It is a ridiculous and ancient idea, that of taxing the people in one year to pay for a building to be used and enjoyed by future generations. Vote for the bonds and vote to save your tax money. Vote for the easiest and best plan and prevent the heavy direct tax being forced upon us. Don't neglect your duty but vote for the good of the county and your own good; vote for the county bonds. Read the explanation by the Chamber of Commerce in this paper.

**M. D. HOPKINS**

M. D. Hopkins, Republican nominee for County Assessor is a pioneer resident of Petaluma, where he is holding the office of city assessor having been elected to that position for five successive terms. Many of the older residents will remember Mr. Hopkins who many years ago bought cattle from the ranchers in this valley.

This is the first time Mr. Hopkins ever ran for a county office and he feels that his years of experience is a guarantee of his qualifications. He informs us that he was instrumental in getting a bill passed by a former legislature of this state, exempting \$100 worth of household personal property from taxation, thus lessening the taxes of the poor man.

**THE COMING ELECTION**

Next Tuesday every voter is called upon to decide on very important matters effecting the future welfare of the county, state and nation. Honest efficient officials make good government which is what we all desire and must have.

This being the last publication before election day a review of the candidates for official honors might not be amiss at this time. The Expositor believes that the only right way is to vote for the best and most honest and efficient candidates on both tickets and there is plenty of good material from which the voter can make his choice for every office.

Hon. C. O. Dunbar, who has had legislative experience that proves his worth and ability would make a good senator.

G. W. Hoyle, a clear thinker, capable and honest seems to be the right man to represent us in the assembly.

Walter C. Lindsay and Chas. A. Pool, both capable and upright, are running a close race for Auditor.

The people are fortunate that a man like John K. Smith is to be their next Sheriff. He has no opposition.

On the theory that one good term deserves another Fred L. Wright should be our next County Clerk though his opponent, Geo. Baer, is also a good capable man.

The Assessor's fight, between Frank E. Dowd, one of the most popular men in Sonoma county and M. D. Hopkins, the pioneer Assessor of Petaluma is being warmly contested.

In the case of Lea vs. Pond the former seems to have collected the preponderance of evidence in his favor. Decisions will be rendered on Nov. 6 by the people.

For tax collector W. F. Wines and F. M. Collins are making an active and clean campaign. Both are well known to the voters of Sonoma county and both have shown fitness for the office.

Glen E. Murdock seems to be in the lead over Henry Fox for County Treasurer. The former is asking for re-election, having served one term faithfully and well. His administration of the Treasurer's office could not have been improved upon.

Unless all signs fail, Fred G. Nagle will get a good majority over Ben F. Ballard for Recorder. Both men are qualified for the position.

Geo. Winkler is stepping lively in his race with Jos. Cox for Surveyor. Both men possess the training and experience required to properly fill the office.

DeWitt Montgomery A. B. M. A. of Sonoma is making a winning fight for Supt. of Schools and from present indications will be elected by a good majority over the incumbent Miss Minnie Coulter. Sonoma Valley people think they are entitled to at least one officer at the county seat and are going to give their favorite candidate a tremendous vote.

Lafferty and Blackburn are fighting hard to win the office of Coroner and Public Administrator.

Jos. F. Ryan will be the next Constable. There's none better anywhere. No one is running against him. The result would be the same if there were.

The many warm friends of H. W. Gottenberg would be pleased to see him Justice of the Peace.

Sonoma Valley is entitled to at least one representative at the county seat, and we are going to have it. We are going to vote for DeWitt Montgomery for Superintendent of Schools.

**Johnson Estate Sold**

The public auction in front of the postoffice here last Saturday morning was well attended by local and outside people. All of the sixteen pieces into which the Buena Vista property had been divided and put up for sale by G. H. Umbred & Co. of San Francisco, were sold to the highest bidder on each parcel. Prices ranged from \$3.75 per acre for the hill land to \$70 per acre for valley land.

G. S. Harris of Sonoma and Mr. Bock of El Verano bought a few pieces but the most of the remainder was bid in by a San Francisco party. The total sales amounted to \$31,598.50.

**Figures on the Bond Issue by the Chamber of Commerce.**

To the Voters of Sonoma County:

The old court house cost something like \$100,000, and the hall of records \$25,000. We are informed that they could not be duplicated today for twice than amount on account of the increase of wages and price of material, and they were neither earthquake nor fire-proof records, as the report of every grand jury of the last few years will show.

Now it is proposed, in the event of the bonds carrying, to construct a court house with recorder's office in same building, as nearly fire-proof and earthquake proof as the skill of man can make them, also large enough to accommodate the business of the county for at least fifty years to come.

The supervisors were advised through correspondence with leading bankers of the coast as well as in the east that 4 per cent bonds would not sell, but that 4 1/2 per cent bonds would bring a premium. The interest on \$280,000 at 4 1/2 per cent is \$12,600 per annum. We have an assessment roll of \$32,000,000 and a levy of 4 cents on the \$100 will pay the interest. For the first five years none of the principal will be paid and for the next ten years \$6000 per annum is to be paid, making a total of \$18,600 to be paid on the sixth year.

During the past seven years the assessment roll has increased from \$27,000,000 to \$32,000,000, and it is reasonable to suppose that in the next five years the roll will be at least \$35,000,000. A levy of 5 1/2 cents on the \$100 will a little more than pay the interest and principal to be paid that year, and this is probable the highest rate that will be required during the entire thirty-five years, as the interest will be a little less each year, and the roll will be a little greater.

On the sixteenth year and for ten years thereafter it is proposed to pay off \$10,000 per annum. The indebtedness will have then been reduced to \$220,000, and the interest on that amount will be \$9,900, added to the \$10,000 to be paid, making 19,900. It is probable that at that time the assessment roll will be at least \$40,000,000, possibly \$50,000,000. A levy of 5 cents on the \$100 will pay the principal and interest to be paid the sixteenth year. The last ten years of the proposed issue will probably be the easiest of the entire term, as, beginning with the twenty-sixth year indebtedness, will be reduced to \$120,000, and the interest \$5,400 added to the \$12,000 to be paid each of the last ten years, making \$17,400 to be paid off the twenty-sixth year.

During the entire term of the proposed issue it is probable that the average rate, to pay the indebtedness, will be less than 5 cents on the \$100 which means that a man assessed for \$1,000 will not have to pay more than 50 cents per annum.

It is the duty of the supervisors, under the law, to provide suitable offices for the county officials. This may be done in two ways; either by issuing bonds as proposed, or by direct taxation, which would require the entire payment within two years, increasing the rate from 5 cents on the \$100 to 45 cents.

The defeat of the bonds at this time would result in delay to reconstruction and further endanger the valuable records of all property owners in Sonoma county regardless of where each resides. The county records are altogether too valuable and important to be kept in the present fire traps any longer than is absolutely necessary.
