

PREFACE.

The Anthropological Collection is composed of two parts—one situated in the Anatomy Department and the other in the

Museum adjoining the Mitchell Hall.

The part situated in the Anatomy Department consists of an extensive series of specimens illustrating the structure and comparative anatomy of Man, including many skulls of existing races of mankind, and numerous bony and other remains and casts of skulls of Pre-historic Man. Each specimen has a descriptive label appended and is not individually mentioned in this Catalogue. Any one interested in this branch of Anthropology has free access to this part of the collection on

application to the Professor of Anatomy.

The part contained in the Museum adjoining the Mitchell Hall, and usually known as the "Anthropological Museum," consists of specimens which have been collected and arranged in order to illustrate, in so far as they can, the habits, customs and culture of the different races of Man. Previous to 1906 many of the specimens were dispersed in various parts of the University buildings. In 1907 they were brought together by Professor R. W. Reid, the Curator, to form an Ethnographical Collection in one place, so that by such a consolidation they might, with subsequent additions, be more useful from a scientific and educational point of view. The specimens have been arranged from a geographical and not from an evolutionary standpoint, and objects from those parts of the world which are inhabited by peoples presenting more or less similar physical characters have been placed together.

The table of contents shows the geographical arrangement, and in the grouping of specimens the following order has, as far as possible, been adopted:—

1. Pre-historic objects.

2. Historic objects pertaining to (1) religion, (2) dress and ornament, (3) home, (4) arts and crafts, (5) music and games, (6) agriculture, (7) fishing and hunting, (8) warfare.

The Anthropological Museum contains:

1. Collection of local relics, obtained especially from the northeast of Scotland. These have either been presented by friends of the University, or purchased with funds provided by the University and Wilson Trustees. The Curator hopes that this section of the Museum will continue to expand, as the bringing together and the proper preservation of objects of local interest occupy naturally a first place in the Museum.

2. Wilson Collection of classical and eastern antiquities made by Robert Wilson, M.D. (University and King's College, 1815), H.E.I.C.S., sometime private secretary to the Marquess of Hastings, Governor of Malta (1824-26), and latterly residing at Glenairnie Cottage, Morayshire, and bequeathed by him to

Marischal College, University of Aberdeen, 1871.

3. Collection of Egyptian antiquities, presented in 1897 to the University by James Andrew Sandilands Grant (Grant Bey), M.D. (Aberdeen, 1864), LL.D. (1882), and Mrs. Grant his widow.

The last two collections formed the nucleus of this part of the Museum—a nucleus which has been largely augmented by gifts from friends of the University and by objects acquired by funds provided by the University and Wilson Trustees.

4. Henderson Collection of early classical vases bequeathed to the University in 1863 by William Henderson, of Caskieben, M.A. (Marischal College and University of Aberdeen, 1809), M.D. (Edinburgh, 1813), Lecturer on Materia Medica, Marischal College and University of Aberdeen, 1818-60.

5. Collection of specimens from other parts of the world. The names of the donors are too numerous to mention here.

They are duly recorded in the pages of the Catalogue.

6. A large collection of Greek, Roman, Oriental, Modern Continental and British coins for which the University is greatly indebted to numerous donors. The collection is kept in the Wilson Room off the Museum. It is under the care of Rev. Professor James Gilroy, D.D., by whom a selection, duly classified and dated, is being arranged for exhibition in the gallery of the Museum. Particular mention must be made of a specially valuable set of Greek coins (numbering about 500), known as the Davies Collection. It was purchased by the Wilson Trustees in 1880 and access to it may be obtained on application to Professor Gilroy.

Professor Reid has the privilege of numbering very many of the donors of specimens among his former students and he takes this opportunity of cordially thanking them and other friends for their kindness and generosity in presenting him with so many valuable objects for the benefit of the Anthropological Collection. Among others who kindly helped the Curator in the arrangement and cataloguing of the specimens in the Museum special mention must be made of James Smith, Attendant in the Museum, Alfred Wm. Gibb, M.A., D.Sc., Lecturer on Geology in the University, and Alexander Low, M.A., M.D., formerly First Assistant in the Anatomy Department, and now University Lecturer on Embryology in the University. Dr. Low's assistance was invaluable to the Curator throughout.

Kayak and accompanying implements were brought to Aberdeen about 1700. Kayak was occupied by "an Indian man," who died in Aberdeen soon after his arrival. The man and his kayak were captured at sea, not far from Aberdeen, according to local tradition. See Douglas's "East Coast of Scotland," Paisley,

1782.

About 1690 a similar canoe was preserved in the Church of Burra, Orkney, and another in the Royal College of Physicians, Edinburgh, both of these canoes having been found in Orkney waters. Orkney and Shetland accounts ascribe these canoes to a race of "Finn-Men" or "Finns," who came from Norway, and who were probably Lapps. The Lapps and Samoyeds formerly used skin-canoes. The Eskimo "kayak" is of the same character as the canoe of the Finn-Men.







II. EGYPT.

Egyptian civilisation of the pre-historic period is entirely different from that of the historic time. The potter's wheel had not been invented, the pottery being entirely hand made. It is a porous pottery covered with a wash of ground haematite, which was polished with smooth pebbles. When put in the kiln, the haematite retained its colour in all parts to which the air was freely admitted; but where the air was excluded, as when the pot was placed mouth downwards in the ashes, the part covered became a deep lustrous black. The stone vases were made by chipping into shape and by grinding with tools fed with emery powder. The characteristic form of the later prehistoric vases is barrel shaped with tubular handles. A great deal of ivory was in use throughout the prehistoric period, in the form of bracelets, rings, ornaments of various kinds, combs, hair pins, etc. The origin of the ivory is not yet satisfactorily settled, but it argues a large amount of trade with Central Africa. The slate palettes are a distinctive feature of this period. They were used for grinding malachite and galena, which, when mixed with water, formed a paint for the eyelids. Lumps of malachite and galena with the smooth pebbles required for the grinding are found with the palettes.

Egyptian history is founded on the chronicle of Maneto written about 270 B.C. and compiled from records, many of which have now perished. The MS. of the history was deposited in the Library-jof Alexandria and was destroyed, but other ancient authors (Josephus, Africanus, etc.) had made copious extracts from it, which still remain. Maneto groups the kings into dynasties, which he numbers, beginning with number one as the earliest. He gives the length of the reign of each king in years, months, and days, and also the total length of each dynasty. His facts are checked and amplified by contemporary records in every period; and his chronology is checked not only by the records, but also by astronomy.

The chronology of Egypt is a subject of difficulty and much controversy, but the following dates, indicating the commencements of various dynasties and periods, are based upon Professor Flinders Petrie's

system :-

The chief dynasties to remember are the IVth, the XIIIth, the XVIIIth, and the XXVIIIth. Each has its own peculiar style of art and covered a period when Egypt was powerful and prosperous.

The first three are approximate only, dated by indications in the narrative

and in history.

To the religion of Egypt is due, in a great measure, our knowledge of the civilisation of that country. The Egyptian believed that man was composed of seven parts, Body, Soul, Name, Heart, Intelligence, Shadow, and Ka. These parts were disintegrated at death and had to be re-united in order that the person might live again. Therefore the body was mummified and hidden away; the soul joined the Boat of the Sun, journeying with him through the underworld at night and returning to its old haunts by day; the name, intelligence and shadow went to the other world, but there is nothing to show what trials and perils, if any, they passed through. The heart was weighed in the balance against the ostrich-feather, the emblem of truth, in the presence of Osiris, god of the dead. If evil, i.e. heavy, it was thrown to the Eater of Hearts, and the deceased then became one of the demons attacking the Boat of the Sun in the underworld; if light, it was returned to the owner, who then entered the kingdom of Osiris. During the weighing, the owner of the heart recited the "Negative Confession" to the forty-two judges who sat with Osiris. The Negative Confession shows the high ethical standard of the Egyptians. The Ka, or double, remained in the tomb near the mummy; though immaterial itself, it required material offerings to keep it alive, otherwise it perished of inanition. In order to ensure a perpetual supply of offerings (food, household objects, weapons, etc.), representations were sculptured on the walls of the tombs; and that the supply might be perpetually fresh, the representations included scenes of harvest and from farm-yards, artisans at work, and so on. Every representation also had a Ka, and it became customary to reproduce, in sculpture or painting on the walls of the tomb-chapels, scenes of daily life or great events which the deceased wished to live over again in a future life. As tomb robbers have been known in Egypt ever since there have been tombs to rob, and as no mummy was sacred from their profane hands, statues of the deceased were made, reproducing all their beauties, all their defects, so that should the real body be destroyed the Ka would have another body exactly like the original in which to dwell. Hence arose a school of portrait sculpture which was never surpassed in the ancient world. It will thus be seen that it is to this theory of the Ka that we owe the

preservation of so much of one of the greatest civilisations the world has

The bodies of the dead were preserved with spices, resin, salt, and in Roman times with bitumen. According to Herodotus there were three methods of embalming, the most expensive taking seventy days (compare the mourning for Jacob which lasted seventy days). The viscera were embalmed separately and placed in four jars, each jar having a lid in the form of the head of one of the children of Horus, the genii of the dead. who were also the gods of the four cardinal points. The names of these deities were Mestha (human-headed), Hapi (ape headed), Duamutef (jackal-headed), and Qebhsennuf (hawk-headed). These jars are now called Canopic jars; they were made in stone, pottery, or wood; some were merely dummies, made in this way either for economy or by a dishonest undertaker. The body was enclosed in a wooden coffin shaped like a mummy, which was laid in a large outer coffin, both coffins being painted and inscribed with prayers for the dead, and often with figures of deities and scenes of the judgment.

The bodies of sacred animals were often embalmed and buried with

great ceremony.

Ushabti figures are statuettes of farm-labourers which were placed in the tombs to work for the dead in the other world. They were usually inscribed with the name of the owner, so that when Osiris called upon him to work they might answer in his stead. Hence the name Ushabti, Answerer, from the verb usheb, to answer. They were often inscribed with the VIth chapter of the Book of the Dead. In the earlier dynasties. the hands held nothing, but from the XIXth dynasty onwards they held a hoe or a mattock, with a basket slung over the left shoulder. From the XXVIth dynasties to the XXXth, the figures were bearded, stood upon square pedestals with supports along their backs, and incised inscriptions. Ptolemaic ushabti-figures are rare.

The Egyptian gods were represented either in human form, or with human bodies and animal heads. Small figures of the deities were worn on the person as amulets, large figures were dedicated in temples or tombs

or were worshipped in private houses.

Figures of animals sacred to the gods are found in temples, tombs, and houses of Egypt. Small ones were worn as amulets on the person, the large ones were set up in temples as votive offerings, or placed in houses as protections against evil.

Besides figures of the gods and sacred animals, other amulets were worn. Many of these were emblems of deities and were used in the place of the actual figures of the gods. The greater number of these amulets were for the use and protection of the dead.

Scarabs are models of a beetle (Scarabaeus sacer), belonging to the numerous group of dung-feeding Lamellicorns. It was sacred to the god Khepera, and was the emblem of the resurrection. Scarabs were used sometimes as seals, sometimes as amulets, sometimes as mere ornaments. They were made in many materials, but chiefly in glazed steatite and glazed ware. They are divided into three classes: (1) Funereal scarabs, (2) scarabs worn for ornament, (3) historical scarabs.

Funereal scarabs were placed over the heart among the linen bandages with which the mummy was swathed, the smaller ones being often set in rings and placed on the fingers. They have also been found lying loose in coffins or on floors of tombs. Upon the flat bases of the funereal scarabs were engraved names of gods, kings, priests, and private persons, etc. The bases of the larger ones were usually inscribed with the XXXth chapter of the Book of the Dead.

Scarabs for ornament were worn during life by men and women to indicate homage to the creator of the world and for magical protection.

Historical scarabs commemorated four principal events in the reign of Amenhotep III., circ. 1500 B.C.

Scarabs were in common use from circ. 4400 B.C. to circ. 600 B.C., and

were unknown in Ptolemaic and Roman times.

In the XXVIth dynasty there was a large scarab-factory at Naukratis for the export trade to the Ægean.

Under the head of scarabs are included scaraboids, plaques, and

cylinders.

Offerings of food that were made for the Ka were placed on pottery or stone trays—tables of offerings—often with representations of the offerings moulded or carved upon them in order to ensure a permanent supply for the deceased. Some have a small hollow or tank to receive libations. The hieroglyph which means offering was originally a picture of a vase piled with grain or flour standing on a rush-mat—the most primitive form of tomb offering.

On the west side of the tomb-chapel, there was always placed a false door—Ka-door—through which the Ka of the deceased was supposed to come to partake of the offerings presented to him by his descendants. The architrave, lintel, and jambs were inscribed with prayers for the dead and with the titles and name of the deceased. The principal title and the name were always on the drum above the door. The offerings were placed

on a tray or flat stone in front of the door-way.

Foundation deposits were laid under the corner stones of Egyptian temples. They consisted of offering vases, models of all the sacrifices, models of the grinding stones for corn, fragments of the materials of which the temples were built, models of the tools used in building, and rings or plaques bearing the royal cartouche of the founder. The foundation plan of a temple that is almost completely destroyed can often be traced, and the actual date of its foundation can be accurately fixed, by these deposits.

All the domestic vessels, for cooking, storing, etc., were of pottery. Quantities of these vessels are found in consequence. As pottery is imperishable it becomes the best method of dating, owing to the changes

in form and style of the vases.

The characteristic green and blue glazes of the Egyptians were obtained by one of the most complicated processes known to potters. Glazing was known as early as the 1st dynasty and continued throughout the historic period. The blue and green colours were obtained from copper; it was not until the end of the XVIIIth dynasty that glazes of other colours were used. The brilliant dark blue glaze found at Deir el Bahri from the XVIIIth to the XXIInd dynasty can no longer be obtained; it appears to have been a sccret of the potters of that place.

Glass was used for beads and small vessels from the XVIIIth dynasty onwards. It was wound in threads which were fused together by heat.

Blown glass occurred first in Roman times.

Beads were the most general ornaments for the person. They were made in all materials, and owing to the changes in style are extremely useful for

dating.

A large number of objects connected with the toilet are found at all periods. Among these are the vessels for holding kohl, the black paint for the eves. These vessels were made in various materials, the blue marble

being characteristic of the XIIth dynasty.

The Egyptians were the greatest writers of ancient days, every event was recorded and accounts were carefully kept, and therefore every government office, every large estate, and every temple had a full complement of scribes. The hieroglyphic sign for a scribe and for writing was a picture of the scribe's writing implements, pen-case, water-pot, and palette. The material on which legal documents and religious works were written was papyrus, but as this was too rare for ordinary use, potsherds or pieces of limestone

were employed for letters and accounts. These inscribed fragments of pottery and stone are called ostraka.

Games and toys were known from prehistoric times, one of the commonest games being a kind of chess, played by three persons on a board of ten squares. Dice were not known till the Roman period. Children's toys include dolls, marbles and knuckle-bones.

Woven cloth was known in Egypt from prehistoric times, and implements for spinning and weaving are found of all periods and in all parts of the country. In classical times the linen of Egypt was celebrated

for its fineness and beauty throughout the known world.

Flint implements were in common use from the palæolithic period till the XVIIIth dynasty; copper implements in prehistoric times and until the XIIth dynasty; bronze from the XIIth to the XXVIth dynasty; and iron from the XXVIth dynasty onwards.



The munmy crocodiles were made up of small remains except the largest ones. The smaller nummies contained an egg or a bone, the larger a group of bones. The only point was the wrapping as a religious feature, the crocodile being of no essential consequence. The nummies of other animals, e.g. cats, birds, etc., were formed in the same way. It appeared to have been a solenn duty to bury all fragments of sacred animals. Human beings were buried intact except where the bones were unfleshed and the undertaker mixed two or three skeletons together.

Sarcophagus, painted, in wood. L. 1970, B. 505. XIth or XIIth dynasty. circ. 2500 B.C. This coffin was found at Beni Hasan, Upper Egypt, by Professor John Garstang during the winter of 1903-04. The lid may be seen lying against the right side of the coffin, while within the latter are two shaped pieces of wood formerly affixed to each end of the interior of the lid, thus serving to keep it in position. The Egyptian believed that the coffin was the "house" of the dead man, and it was accordingly decorated to carry out this idea. The door, above which two eyes were always painted, was depicted on the inside opposite to the deceased's face, while its position on the outside was indicated by a corresponding door and eyes. At the period to which this coffin belongs the deceased lay with his head to the north and his face to the east, looking towards the door through which his ka or spirit was supposed to go out, thus being enabled to circulate freely throughout the tomb and to partake of the actual offerings placed therein. The coffin and walls of the tomb were decorated with various objects necessary to the deceased's well-being in the next world. Thus there may be seen on the right side of the interior of the coffin, pictures of clothes, jewellery and toilet necessaries, and on the left side pots of ointment, weapons and tools. An inscription along the top on the left side of the interior consists of an invocation to Osiris that



the deceased may be provided with all sorts of food, while on the opposite side is a similar invocation to Anubis that he may be provided with a good burial. The panel on the north end says that the deceased, whose name was Nekht, Superintendent of the Throne, is worthy before the goddess Nephthys, while the corresponding panel at the south end states that he is worthy before the goddess Isis. The lower parts of the sides and the floor are covered with inscriptions (much defaced). These inscriptions are very early chapters of the Book of the Dead, consisting of magic precepts for the use of the dead man in the underworld.—Presented by Professor John Garstang.

Isis was the sister and wife of Osiris, both being the children of Qeb, the earth god and Nut the goddess of the sky. Osiris reigned over mankind, gave them laws and taught them to till the ground. He was the king of the underworld and judge of the dead and was the type of all munumies. His evil brother Set (the Greek Typhon) resolved to kill him. He caused a

beautiful chest to be made and by trickery induced Osiris to enter it. The lid was immediately fastened down and the chest thrown into the Nile. Isis fled to the Delta where she gave birth to Horus. Isis proceeded to search for the body of her husband, which, when she had at last found, she carried to Egypt and there lid it. Set, however, found the coffin, fore the body of his brother into pieces and scattered these over the land. Isis now set herself to search for the fragments and wherever she found one buried it. She was represented either standing wearing the hieroglyph of her own name on her head or seated suckling her son Horus and wearing crown of urasi surmounted by disk and horns or double crown. Horus the child was represented with the sidelock, an emblem of youth (this lock of hair is usually seen in figures of Egyptian boys) and with finger in mouth. He frequently wore the crowns of Upper and Lower Egypt. The figure of the goldess with Horus on her knee is interesting as being undoubtedly the precursor of the Madonna in Christian at.



He was looked upon as the patron of art and handicrafts. He was represented as a mummy holding sceptres symbolising stability, life and strength.

Belief that gods revealed themselves in forms of animals was widespread in Egypt. Animals thus deified were kept in temples, worshipped, and after death buried with great ceremony. Apis, sacred bull of Ptah, is the best known example. He was black, with white spots, and was further distinguished by white triangle on forchead and crescent on right flank. He was worshipped in special temple at Memphis (which came to be called the Scrapeum), and after death was embalmed and buried in Necropolis there. He was regarded as an incarnation of Osiris. At Heliopolis the bull was called Mnevis and held as an incarnation of the Sun-god Ra.

These cippi were for protection from all animals "biting with their mouths

or stinging with their tails ".

They became common in the Ptolemaic period and there is a noticeable resemblance between them and the representations of St. George and the Dragon in Christian art.







Sir Gaston Maspero says that burnt bricks were not often used before the Roman period, but Professor Petrie found some of Rameside age at Nebesheh and Defenneh—the only ones he has seen in Egypt before the IIIrd century, a.D. In this collection are three complete unburnt bricks, and a fragment of four others, also three complete burnt bricks. They were brought from the fortress of Hilbeh on the Nile, about 70 miles south of Cairo. They measure on an average, complete bricks, L. 358, B. 170. In the Delta at least the sizes of bricks decreased regularly under and after the XXIst dynasty. In XXIst dynasty they were L. 460, B. 235, T. 128.
