Our Select List of Rosemont Roses

THE ROSE IS QUEEN OF FLOWERS. All peoples have worshipped at her shrine from time immemorial. To care for her is "tonic-toil," to live with her is to feed the soul.

Plant Rosemont Roses and avoid disappointment—Roses from us are fresh from the field and not to be compared to the "shelf-worn" stock which has been repeatedly handled. In selecting Roses for you we have considered each variety carefully and have endeavored to offer only the very best varieties with honest descriptions.

Hints on Care and Culture of Roses

SOIL—Any good garden soil is alright for Roses—don't enrich too much. Select a sunny location away from trees and shrubbery, spade or plow well.

TIME TO PLANT—Fall planting is preferred, especially in sections where the Winters are not extremely severe. Any time during the dormant period however is alright—November 1st, to March 15th usually with us.

FERTILIZER—Apply fertilizer on top the Rose bed and dig in slightly—the rain will carry the plant food to the roots. Barnyard manure is excellent Rose food.

WATERING—During dry weather water after the fashion of a good rain, allow to dry out and cultivate. Do not sprinkle the Rose bed every day, soak up well when you do water and if dry weather continues, repeat in about eight or ten days. Always keep well cultivated, cultivation is more important than watering.

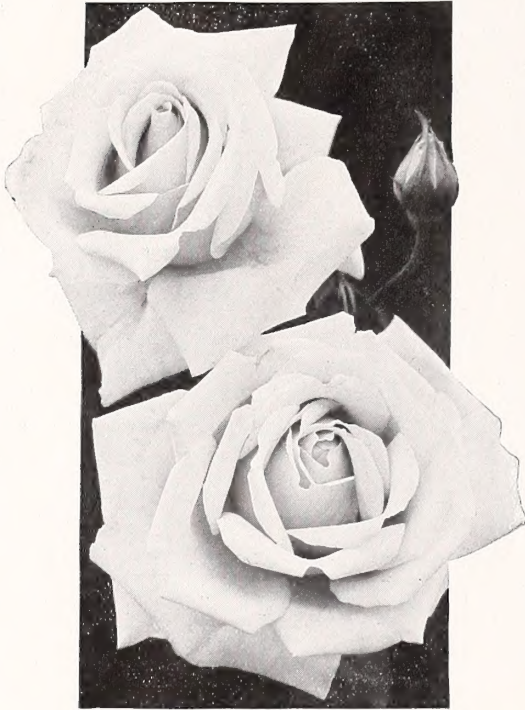
MILDEW AND BLACK SPOT may be prevented with a mixture composed of 9 parts dusting sulphur to 1 part arsenate of lead. Apply once a week with dusting gun or muslin bag. This remedy is not as effective with Black Spot as Mildew. Black spot is best checked by picking off affected leaves.

PRUNING—Rosemont Roses are pruned for setting before being shipped. They will not need further pruning the first season. Bush roses of Hybrid Perpetual type should be cut back to within 5 or 6 eyes of the ground and bush Roses of the Tea and Pernetian type should be cut down to about four eyes. Old weak stems should be entirely removed. The stems left should be cut just above an eye which points out. This gives the plant an open and well balanced shape. The proper time for pruning is just before the buds begin to swell in the Spring.

Every Rosemont Rose Has Bloomed One Season In The Field. Rose Plants From Us Set During The Dormant Period Will Begin Blooming by The Last of May or First of June in All Southern Sections. Our Friends in Florida begin planting them in September and cut blossoms for Christmas.

BETTY. (H. T.) (A. Dickson & Sons 1905). Large Blossoms, full and well shaped, coppery pink, overspread with golden yellow. Deliciously fragrant.

BETTY UPRICHARD. (H. T.) (A. Dickson 1922). Good size long pointed bud; flower large, open, semi-double to double, very lasting, extremely fragrant, delicate salmon-pink, reverse of petals carmine with coppery sheen, borne singly and several together on long stem. BRIARCLIFF. (H. T.) (Briarcliff Greenhouses, 1926). Sport of Columbia. Type, Columbia. Bud one-third longer than Columbia; very large, long-pointed; flower $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches across when well de-

veloped, high-centered, lasting, moderately fragrant, deep rose-pink at center, passing to lighter on outer petals. Borne singly on long, strong stem. New and scarce. 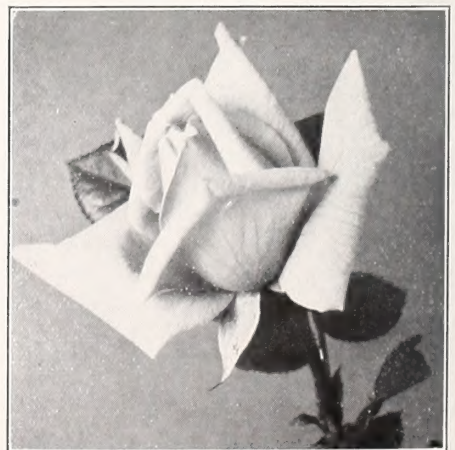
COLUMBIA. (H. T.) (E. G. Hill 1917) (Ophelia X Mrs. Geo. Sawyer). Bud large, long-pointed, deep pink; flower extra large, full, double, very lasting, intensely fragrant, fresh, glistening rose-pink, borne singly on long strong stem. Foliage medium size, dark green, disease-resistant. Growth very vigorous, upright; profuse, continuous bloomer.

COMMONWEALTH. (H. T.) (A. Montgomery Co. 1922). A comparatively new rose having long pointed buds and very large double open flowers borne singly on medium strong stems. The color is an even shade of pink, very clear. Has few thorns, good foliage, very fragrant. Good bloomer.

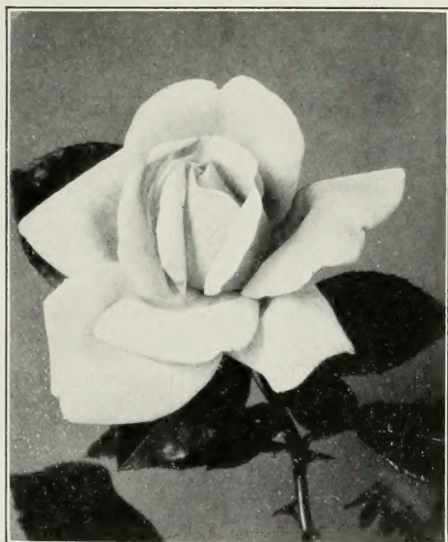
DAME EDITH HELEN. (H. T.) (A. Dickson, 1926). Bloom very large, full, double, high center with recurving petals; lasting, intensely fragrant, pure glowing pink, borne singly on long strong stem. Foliage medium size, rich green leathery, disease resistant. Growth vigorous, upright, bushy; profuse continuous bloomer all season. New and scarce. FRANK W. DUNLOP (H. T.) (Dunlop, introduced by C. H. Totty Co., 1920) (Mrs. Chas. E. Russell X Mrs. George Shawyer). Bud very large, long-pointed; flower very large, full, high-centered, very lasting and double. Extremely fragrant, deep, bright rose-pink, borne singly on long, strong stem. Foliage sufficient leathery, glossy dark green, disease-resistant. Profuse bloomer.

HELEN GOULD (H. T.) (P. Lambert 1896) (Charles Darwin X Marie Van Houtte). An old favorite. Bud long-pointed, opens well; flower large, double, full, very fragrant, delicate pink in center, darker at edges, borne singly and several together on long, strong stem. Growth vigorous; free continuous bloomer.

HILL'S AMERICA (H. T.) (E. G. Hill Co. 1921) (Premier X Hoosier Beauty). A fine rose comparatively new, resembling Columbia. It blooms continuously from early May until frost. The buds are long and pointed, color is the most glorious glowing rose-pink imaginable. Opens up most artistically as the outer petals fold back, leaving the high pointed center fully exposed. You will be pleased with this fine rose.

J. J. L. MOCK (H. T.) (M. Leenders & Co.) (Mme. Caroline Testout X Mme. Abele Chattaney). Clear pink, under side of petals rosy; almost silver white. Blooms of magnificent size on long, erect canes. Free blooming, very double. One of the best.

KILLARNEY BRILLIANT (H. T.) (A. Dickson, 1914) (Sport of Killarney). Bud medium size, long-pointed; flower medium size, open, double, lasting, strongly tea-perfumed, brilliant pink, almost crimson in bright weather, in dull or cloudy weather pure deep rosy carmine, borne singly on medium-long, strong stems. Many thorns.

KILLARNEY (H. T.) (A. Dickson 1898). Bud large, long-pointed; flower large, double, open, lasting, moderately fragrant, bright sparkling pink. Borne singly on medium stem.

LADY ASHTOWN (H. T.) (A. Dickson 1904). One of the best garden roses and a fine long lasting cut flower. Flowers of a very pleasing carmine-pink shading to a golden-yellow at the base. We especially like this rose.

LOS ANGELES (H. T.) (Howard & Smith 1916) (Madame Segond Weber X Lyon Rose). Chosen by the American Rose Society as one among the twelve best roses in America. Los Angeles is a comparatively new rose originated in California and has made a big sensation. Subject to black-spot but may be protected from this trouble by formula given on page 5. The growth is vigorous and produces flowers continually on long stems, color a luminous flame-pink, toned coral, shaded gold at base of petals. Richly fragrant and having long pointed buds which open into a mammoth bloom.

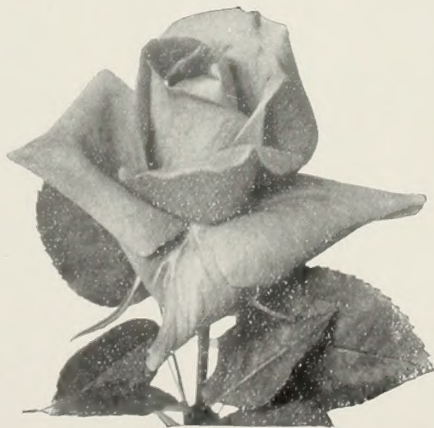
MARY COUNTESS OF ILCHESTER (H. T.) (A. Dickson 1909). Unique in its warm crimson-carmine-pink color, a color which will always catch the eye. Flowers of good size, deliciously scented. A free bloomer on long upright stems.

MISS CYNTHIA FORDE (H. T.) (A. Dickson, 1920). Flower full, large, double, extremely lasting, moderately fragrant, deep brilliant rose-pink, shading to light rosy pink on back of petals. Borne singly on long, strong stem. Foliage sufficient, disease resistant, good grower.

MISS LOLITA ARMOUR (H. T.) (Howard & Smith, 1919). Result of a cross of unnamed seedlings. Bud medium size, globular; flower very large, cupped, extremely fragrant, double, very lasting. Chrome-yellow at base, shading to burnt orange and copper, reverse chrome-yellow at base, shading to bright salmon, with brilliant copper suffusion, passing to lovely shade of shrimp-pink and copper with age. MME. EDOUARD HERRIOT. (H. T.) (Pernet-Ducher 1913) (Mme. Caroline Testout X A Pernetiana Rose). A great novelty which has won the admiration of all who see it. The buds are coral-red shaded with yellow at the base, the open flower of medium size, semi-double, of a superb coral-red, shades with yellow and bright rosy scarlet passing to a shrimp-red. MRS. A. R. BARRACLOUGH. (H. T.) (S. McGredy & Son, 1926). Bud very large, long-pointed; flower extremely large, double, high-centered, very lasting, slightly fragrant, bright soft, sparkling carmine-pink of even shade throughout, shading to yellow at base becoming brighter with age. Borne on long strong stem. A profuse, continuous bloomer. Very hardy. New and scarce. Price 2 year heavy select plants, \$1.00 each; \$10.00 per dozen, prepaid. MRS. CHARLES E. RUSSELL. (H. T.) (Montgomery Co. 1914). Bud large, long-pointed; flower large, double, full, globular, lasting, moderately fragrant, rosy carmine, borne singly on long strong stem. Disease resistant, a good rose.

MRS. DUDLEY CROSS. (T.) (W. Paul 1907). Flower medium size, full, very lasting, pale chamomile-yellow, beautifully illuminated in autumn with rose and crimson, borne on stem of average length and strength.

MRS. GEORGE SHAWYER. (H. T.) (Pernet-Ducher 1890) (Lady Mary Fitzwilliam X Mme. de Tartas). Brilliant satiny pink; immense broad petals and extremely large flowers, double and beautiful. A good bloomer even in dry weather, very fragrant.

MY MARYLAND. (H. T.) (J. Cook 1908). Full, well-shaped blooms of clear salmon-pink, with lighter edges; fragrant. Bush upright, strong, and a liberal bloomer.

OPHELIA. (H. T.) (W. Paul 1912). Bud medium size, long-pointed; flower medium size, double, very lasting, slightly fragrant, salmon-flesh, center shaded light yellow at base of petals. A favorite with many who know it.

PADRE. (H. T.) (B. R. Cant 1921). Flower shapely, of good substance, medium size, semi-double, fragrant, bright coppery scarlet, flushed with yellow, borne on long strong stem. Foliage large, rich green leathery, glossy and has not mildewed with us. Good grower and abundant bloomer. New and scarce. Price 2 year heavy select plants \$1.00 each; \$10.00 per dozen, prepaid. PILGRIM. (H. T.) (A. Montgomery 1920). A very double rose of bright silvery-pink, delightfully fragrant, has a large number of petals and never shows its center. The open flower is flat in appearance.

PINK MAMAN COCHET. (T.) (Cochet 1892). Hardy vigorous grower; one of the most beautiful pinks. Flowers are of enormous size, very full and of great depth. Color rich coral pink, shaded rosy crimson; broad, thick shell like petals. Long pointed buds, good bloomer.

PINK LA FRANCE. (H. T.) (Guillot fils, 1867) (Mme. Victor Verdier X Mme. Bravy). Buds large, long-pointed; flower large, double, full, lasting, very fragrant, silvery pink, reverse bright pink, borne singly on average stem.

Bud large, long-pointed flower, large, semi-double, full, lasting, moderately fragrant (spicy), medium orange except for the two outside petals which fade to a lighter shade. Borne singly on long, strong stem. Foliage leathery, disease-resistant. Growth vigorous, upright; free bloomer. In fall when the days are cool this great new rose is enhanced by splashes of red on the outer petals—every one wants Hoover. New and scarce. PRISCILLA. (H. T.) (Montgomery Co. 1922) (Unnamed seedling X Ophelia). Foliage large and leathery, glossy, disease resistant. Growth vigorous, upright; abundant bloomer. You will love Priscilla.

RAPTURE. (H. T.) (Traendly & Schenck 1926). Sport of Mme. Butterfly. Flower medium size, somewhat deeper pink than Mme. Butterfly, borne singly on long stem. 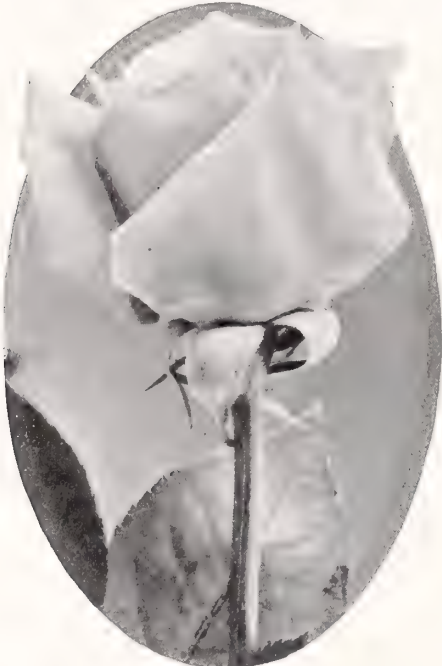

ANGELUS. (H. T.) (Lemon, 1921) Columbia X Ophelia seedling. Flower large, full, high centered, lasting. Color white with slight cream at center, fragrant, borne singly on good strong stem. Similar to Kaiserin Augusta Viktoria but is larger and richer and last longer when cut.

FRAU KARL DRUSCHKI or WHITE AMERICAN BEAUTY. (H. P.) (P. Lambert 1900). Merville de Lyon X Mme. Caroline Testout. This rose stands at the top of the H. P. roses in America. Pure snow white, long pointed buds, large full flowers. The bud sometimes has just a tinge of flesh as it begins to open, but develops into a pure white blossom.

KILLARNEY, DOUBLE WHITE (H. T.) (Budlong, 1912). Killarney type. Bud large, long-pointed; flower large, very double and lasting. Moderately fragrant. Snow white borne singly on medium strong stem.

KILLARNEY WHITE. Same as Double White Killarney except that flower is not quite so double. An old favorite well known to all rose lovers.

KAISERIN AUGUSTA VIKTORIA. (H. T.) (P. Lambert 1891). Coquet de Lyon X Lady Mary Fitzwilliam. Queen of the white family. Pure white never a tinge of pink. Splendid large buds, pointed, opening to a superb full double blossom. A continuous and profuse bloomer.

MISS AMELIA GUDE. (H. T.) (Lemon 1921). Columbia X Sunburst. Bud long-pointed; flower medium size, double, lasting. Moderately fragrant, outer petals reflexing, deep yellow at times, center shading to cream. Almost white during sunny weather. Good grower and profuse bloomer.

WHITE MAMAN COCHET. (T.) (J. Cook 1896). Sport of Maman Cochet. Creamy white, with edges flushed rose. Profuse bloomer, good grower.

WHITE OPHELIA. (H. T.) (Cleveland Cut Flower Co. 1920). Sport of Ophelia. Resembles Ophelia but is some stronger. Bud large, flower large, very lasting, intensely fragrant. White with slight pink tinge in center which disappears when bloom opens.

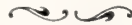

To make a hedge prepare the soil well, mixing well rotted manure if soil is poor. Open a straight trench wide enough to receive the plants without crowding the roots and about one inch deeper than plants grew in nursery. Place plants in line 12 inches apart, fill in with soil and water well. When water has settled some of the plants will have dropped out of line; straighten and pull sufficient dry soil into trench, level the bed and prevent drying out. Now cut plants back to within about 4 or 5 inches of the ground. This will make your hedge thick from the ground up. When plants have made about six inches of growth cut one half of this off on all sides and repeat until hedge is desired height. Shear hedge often to keep neat.

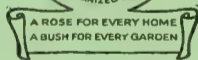
