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PREFACE

In the course of a lifetime of teaching, at the University of the South and at Columbia University, William Peterfield Trent (1862-1939) assembled a collection of the writings of Daniel Defoe which remains second only to that at the British Museum. Taking up the challenge of identifying as Defoe's the multitudinous and usually anonymous products of his pen, Trent acquired, from booksellers both in this country and abroad, vast quantities of books and pamphlets potentially relevant to his search.

The results are impressive. For a matter of shillings he frequently obtained items unavailable today for pounds. On occasion he extended himself substantially in purchases such as the seventy-seven volumes of Defoe's writings brought together by Henry Labouchere, first Baron Taunton (1798-1860), the British politician whose own liberal views echoed Defoe's and roused Queen Victoria's ire. Similarly he obtained a nearly complete set of Defoe's periodical *The Review*, and, from the collections formed by the British bibliophile, Henry Huth, many a scarce individual title. All in all, his library comprised some 30,000 items.

Though Trent never found time to complete the monumental work on Defoe he once envisioned, his interests found partial fruition in the section on Defoe he prepared for the *Cambridge Bibliography of English Literature*. His attributions, based frequently on subjective and stylistic grounds, have not, to be sure, remained unquestioned. But though more recently Professor John Robert Moore has given us his *Checklist of the Writings of Daniel Defoe* (Bloomington, Ind., 1960), making more use of objective and external evidence, it is still safe to say that the last word will never be uttered regarding the definitive Defoe canon, and the materials garnered by Trent will in themselves continue to be useful in probing the problems involved.

Purchased by the Boston Public Library in 1929 from funds provided by numerous benefactors, Trent's library has already contributed to the work of Defoe scholars in recent years. Along with Defoe materials already in this Library and subsequent purchases, it has also made possible this catalog. The comprehensiveness of Trent's collecting, the apparent hope that unexpected items might turn up in a lot of grubby pamphlets or a battered volume of odd tracts, has resulted not only in multiple editions but also, on occasion, in multiple copies of the same edition of a work. Their careful comparison has revealed for the first time many hitherto unrecognized facets of their publishing history, frequently of significance to the textual student.

Thus it has become apparent, for instance, that in a remarkable number of cases — e.g., *King William's Affection to the Church of England Examin'd* — what appear superficially to be identical copies of the same edition represent, bibliographically speaking, variant editions hitherto undifferentiated. Occasionally, what have been designated as later editions prove to be but variant issues with as equal textual value as their presumptive predecessors.

The fact remains that what is here offered is a catalog of the materials by and about Defoe in the rare book collections of the Boston Public Library. It is not a bibliography in the terms of David Foxon's recent brilliant "Defoe: A Specimen of a Catalogue of English Verse, 1701-1750" in *The Library* for December, 1965, based on a wider and more intensive study of geographically scattered holdings. Yet we are confident that in this catalog a substantial amount of new information is to be found, and new channels for investigation suggested. Admittedly, no attempt has been made at settling vexatious problems of attribution: recognition has been given to the conclusions of Trent and of Moore, but it has seemed futile to do more.

For the preparation of this catalog, major credit must be given to Miss Ellen M. Oldham, of the staff of the Rare Book Department. No praise of her patience and accuracy could be exaggerated. But her task has been shared over the years by others, and if inconsistencies in treatment are noted, they are the results of differing approaches and altered circumstances. In general, however, it may be said that for works by Defoe published during his lifetime full transcriptions of titles and imprints have been given, as well as detailed paginary collations, with collations by signatures when their inclusion seemed desirable. For works not generally ascribed to Defoe and for those published after 1731, the transcriptions and collations have usually, but not invariably, been simplified. Behind the descriptions has lain, by and large, the principle that cataloging is not a Procrustean bed to which a work is to be trimmed or stretched, but a medium for conveying its character and identity.

Within these limitations it is possible that in this catalog the scholar will find answers to some of his questions, the bibliographer encouragement in facing others, and the bookseller new guidance in matters of priority. Yet we will be the first to admit that what is here offered is only a tentative beginning towards the ultimate hope, a definitive bibliography of Defoe solving problems we have but raised.
