CLASS 101.—*Mineral Combustibles.*

Coal, anthracite and bituminous, is found in great quantities all over the North of China. The extent of these coal-fields is estimated at some 87,000 square miles, but the mining appliances are very defective and the coal hitherto extracted is but surface coal. As soon as the appearance of the strata indicates the presence of coal, or more often when it is seen cropping out of the hill-side, the miners commence tunnelling. They follow up the seam, working generally in a horizontal direction, slightly inclining upwards, to admit of the free egress of water.

Hunan coal is largely used by the river steamers running between Hankow and Shanghai, and that mined at the northern end of the Island of Formosa is also utilised to a considerable extent both by foreign steamers and the gunboats built at the Government arsenal at Foochow. During the past year the authorities in Formosa have engaged the services of a foreign engineer and authorised the use, under his supervision, of European mining machinery; and it may be hoped that when they have learnt by practical experience the superiority of machinery over the rude appliances hitherto employed, the Government will sanction its introduction for the development of the enormous mineral resources lying unproductive in the various portions of the empire. In 1874 the consumption by foreign steamboats was of Hunan coal, 24,000 tons; Lohping (also Yangtze) coal, 2,200 tons; of Formosan coal, 15,000 tons; or in all some 41,000 tons: the values of the three kinds are Tls. 5, Tls. 6 and Tls. 3 respectively.

CLASS III.—Iron and Steel, &c.

Iron is reduced with coal from hematite or magnetic ore, or from iron pyrites. Used for making nails, tools, and every variety of iron implements. Iron is also extensively found in Shansi, Szechuen, Hunan, Shantung and elsewhere. A considerable quantity of iron is imported into China from Europe in different forms, because, with the present imperfect means of communication and of transportation, and the system of manufacture followed by the Chinese, foreign iron, save only in the immediate proximity of the mines, can be laid down at less cost than the native article.

Alum is found in the Provinces of Hunan, Anhwei, Kansu, Kwangtung and Fukien, and especially in the southern part of Chêkiang, near Wanchow-fu. The quality produced here is said to be equal to the best Roman alum, and the quantity is estimated at 90,000 peculs per annum. Used in bleaching and dyeing, in purifying water, in sizing paper, in cement for masonry, in silver and pewter work and as a medicine. Consumed throughout China: was formerly exported to Calcutta.

CLASS 213.—*Porcelain, &c.*

The largest quantity and the finest quality of porcelain produced in China is manufactured at the Imperial potteries at Kingtêh-chén in the District of Fouling, Province of Kiangsi; thence it is sent to all parts of the empire and has of late years been largely exported to foreign countries. A special kind of chinaware, ornamented with the five-clawed dragon, is made there for use in the Imperial household and sent annually as tribute to Peking.

Large manufactories also exist at Tung-an-hien and Changchow-fu, but the article produced there is very inferior in quality to that of Kiangsi. It is brought from the manufactory in its plain state and subsequently painted to order. The figures are traced in Indian ink and then painted in water-colours mixed with strong glue. The pieces are placed in a reverberating furnace for about half an hour and taken out and washed when sufficiently cooled. The Chinaware thus manufactured, especially the coarser quality, forms one of the principal exports of Amoy, and is sent to Saigon, Siam, Manila, &c.

A quantity of about 40,000 peculs of chinaware and pottery is annually produced at Kaopeh in the Tapu District and at Panhsei in the Kiehyang District, Kwangtung Province. The difference between coarse chinaware and pottery consists in the kind of clay used and in the finish. The mode of manufacture of both is primitive. The clay after being kneaded and worked into paste is formed by hand into the required shapes, which are then placed in ovens with some straw and chaff. The ovens are filled through small holes in the top and the fire is kept up for twenty-four hours only. Pottery is the article in its rough brown state, whilst chinaware is glazed and painted with red earth, the colours being mixed with alum-water to prevent their changing during the burning process.

A small quantity of chinaware of the coarser kind is made in the vicinity of Canton for export to India and Europe. The fine porcelain exported from Canton is made at Kingtêh-chén and only sent to Canton to be painted.

Grasscloth.—Several plants furnish the fibre from which grasscloth is made, of which the *Bohmeria nivea*, the *Cannabis sinensis* and the *Dolichos bulbosus* are the chief. They are classed in Chinese under the generic term *Ma*. In the Kwangtung, Kwangai and Kiangsi provinces are found the principal seats of the grass-cloth manufacture, with Canton, Swatow and Kiukiang as ports of shipment. There are many varieties and qualities of *Hia Pu*, costing from 8 cents to \$1.20 per yard. The coarser kinds are exported in small quantities to Manila and Singapore, where, as in China proper, they are extensively used as materials for summer clothing. The finest quality embroidered with silk is much prized by Europeans. Particulars regarding price, length, &c., will be found enumerated below.

Matting.—A texture made from reeds, said to be the *Arundo mitis*, but probably composed from several species of which one, for instance, grows in salt water flats, and another only in sweet water. The natural colour of the reeds is greenish white; they are not bleached but become white in use. To produce the different patterns the reeds have to be dyed before being woven. The usual colours are red, yellow, green, and a very dark blue. Sapanwood, the sulphate of copper and the sulphate of iron mixed with alum are the dyeing materials. The loom for weaving matting is a very simple one. It consists of two uprights about five feet apart connected by cross bars three feet apart. The warps (strings made of Chinese hemp) are fastened by one end to a small piece of bamboo, passed through the weaving bar, round the two cross-bars, and fastened at the other end to the small bamboo. The reeds are woven while damp and pliable in two yard lengths. The woven fabric is then dried, first in the sun and afterwards over a slow fire, and as the drying process causes the reeds to shrink, the matting is stretched on a frame, the irregular parts of the texture being pressed flat by the hand. The projecting ends of the warps are then trimmed to a uniform length of about 3 inches, and passed between the reeds of another piece of the same pattern, thus joining the pieces of matting, 20 of which make one roll of 40 yards. The Kwangtung province is the chief seat of the matting industry. It is shipped from Canton to the United States and Great Britain. The average value is \$4 per roll. Specimens of the patterns most in favour are exhibited from Canton, No. 2,406.

Cotton cloth, called by foreigners "Nankeens," from Nanking where the manufacture is said to have been begun, and where the finer kinds are still produced. The manufacture of cotton cloths is carried on everywhere in China, but chiefly in the Kwangtung, Fukien, Chêkiang and Kansu provinces. The Commissioner of Customs, Amoy, gives information as to dimensions, cost and durability:—

"Each piece is 28 Chinese feet long and from 1 foot 4 inches to 1 foot 8 inches wide, weighing "from 1 catty 4 taels to 1 catty 6 taels; and the value varies according to weight from 60 cents to "85 cents per piece. One piece is sufficient to make a short jacket and a pair of trousers, which are "said to be twice as durable as those made of ordinary shirtings, and of about equal strength with "garments made of good T-cloth. This cloth is made all over the Fukien province, in hand-looms "worked principally by women. An industrious worker can produce one piece of cloth in 12 hours."

The cloths are dyed all colours, blue being in most favour.

SILK AND SILK FABRICS, AND MIXTURES IN WHICH SILK IS THE PREDOMINATING MATERIAL.

Silk.—The manufacture of Silk in China dates from a very remote antiquity. Popular tradition assigns its invention to the wife of the Emperor HWANG-TI, B.C. 2602, while credible notices of the culture of the mulberry tree and the rearing of silk-worms are found in Chinese books as far back as B.C. 780. Frequent allusion is made to it in the old records, and it has always as a national industry enjoyed the peculiar care of the Government. In the neighbourhood of Chinkiang, where the mulberry trees were nearly all destroyed during the occupancy of the Taiping Rebels, mulberry plants were during five successive years imported by the local government from Hoochow, a country celebrated for the excellence of its silk, and distributed gratuitously among the owners of land. Silk cultivators were also brought to teach the peasantry the art which had been forgotten. Such is the success of this liberal scheme that the Commissioner of Customs is able to report that “the worms fed on these trees are producing a description of silk which is said to equal that of Hoochow, and there is great hope that in course of time raw silk will show a large figure among the exports” of Chinkiang.

The consumption of Silk in China is enormous as it is largely used as a staple for clothing by all but the poorest classes of the population.

While the worms are growing, great care must be taken to keep them undisturbed, in feeding them, and in noting the right period for spinning cocoons. Three days are required for spinning, and in six it is time to reel off the silk. Two methods are employed for killing the cocoons, viz., by interlaying them with salt and by exposing them to the steam of boiling water. Exhibits Nos. 2473-2488 and 2490-2507 (which, as well as No. 2489, were collected by Messrs. RUSSELL & Co.) are specimens of the raw material exported to foreign countries from Shanghai; No. 2489, comprising 31 specimens, of that exported from Canton.

Silk Piece Goods.—The manufacture of Silk Piece Goods, under which head are classed, Satins, Chinese Crapes, Gauzes, &c., may be said to be confined to the provinces of Kiangsu, Anhwei, Chêkiang and Kwangtung. The fabrics produced in the first three provinces form a distinct class and are much superior to those of Kwangtung, selling for nearly double the price. In Shantung is manufactured a coarser kind known as "Shantung Pongee" which from its cheapness and durability is much prized as an article of summer clothing by both natives and foreigners. Paper.—Paper is made chiefly from bamboo, but also from rice-straw, wheat-straw, cotton, hemp, the bark of the *Ailanthus Broussonetia*, the stalks of reeds and the refuse of silk cocoons. The method of preparation from bamboo is as follows:—the bamboo is stript of its leaves and split into lengths of 3 or 4 feet which are packed in bundles and placed in large water-tanks. Each layer of bamboo is covered with a layer of lime, water is poured on till the topmost layer is covered. After remaining in this condition 3 or 4 months the bamboo becomes quite rotten, when it is pounded into pulp in a mortar, cleansed and mixed with clean water. This liquid is poured in quantities sufficient for the size and thickness of the sheets required upon square sieve-like moulds. These sheets (of which a skilful workman can make 6 in a minute) are allowed to dry, then taken from the mould and placed against a moderately heated wall and finally exposed in the sun to dry. The best quality of Paper is made from the shoots of the bamboo with alum added to the infusion: the second from the bamboo itself, though a higher grade of this quality is attained by the previous removal of the green portion; and the third from grass or bark and leaves of the trees above enumerated. The chief centres of the Paper industry are situated in the Southern and Yangtze provinces.

Pith-paper.—The so-called rice-paper is made of the pith of the *Aralia papyrifera*. The pith is soaked before cutting; the workman then applies the blade to the cylinders of pith, and, turning them round dexterously, pares them from the circumference to the centre, making a rolled layer of equal thickness throughout. The best pieces are used for painting; the smaller for artificial flowers, for which purpose, owing to manner in which it takes colour, and the appearance of "bloom" it gives to the flowers, it is superior to the materials usually employed in Europe. Specimens of the Flowers will be found under class No. 254; and of the pictures delicately painted on this substance at Canton under class No. 441.

Corean Paper.—In addition to the specimens of Paper manufactured in China, some specimens are sent from Newchwang, of that imported from Corea. It is made of the bark of the mulberry tree, and is used by the wealthier classes in Manchuria and North-China instead of Glass, for covering windows, for making umbrellas, etc. It resembles Japan paper. Its great strength and imperviousness to damp, and the size of the sheets are worthy of special notice. Indeed, it is well known that the making of paper is one of the chief industries of the still isolated kingdom of Corea; it finds its way into China through the three annual fairs which are held near the boundary between the two countries. The strength of Corean paper is owing to the fact that the material is not weakened by being subjected to the action of lime, for the purpose of whitening it. The paper which the Coreans use for despatch writing resembles, in strength and colour, the specimen sent, but it is often thicker, and it is polished on both sides.

Pewter-ware.—Pewter-ware is made in all parts of China, but that manufactured in the Ch'aochow prefecture (Swatow) has gained the highest reputation. Its composition consists of 80 % tin and 20 % lead; the tin being first melted and the lead added subsequently. When in a state of fusion the metal is poured on and pressed into sheets between bricks, smoothed and covered with common Chinese paper, whence it receives its yellowish tint. These sheets are worked up as required. Formerly native metal from Kwangsi was used in the manufacture, but of late years it has been supplanted by foreign metal, owing to the cheapness and superior quality of the latter.

CLASS 289.—*Wooden and Basket-ware, Papier Mâché.*

Lacquer-ware.—In the manufacture of lacquer-ware the lightest kinds of wood are used. After planing, the surface is covered with a coating of grasscloth fibre and Broussonetia paper, and a mixture of pigs' or buffaloes' gall and pulverized old red sandstone serves as a priming. The article is then placed in a dark room, and a coating of the prepared lacquer laid on with a brush and allowed to dry; and according to the fineness of the ware these coatings are repeated from 3 to 15 times. When the last coat is dry the articles are painted and gilded. The lacquer, sap of the *Vernix vernicia*, used in Canton, is imported from Szechuen or Kiangsi. The gold colouring (a solution of gold leaf in glue water) is laid on with lye of potash; red is native cinnabar, pink a varnish prepared from *Carthamus* and green is formed by a mixture of hartall and indigo. Nearly all the lacquer-ware is manufactured in Canton, but magnificent specimens, far exceeding the Canton ware in beauty, colour and fineness are turned out at Foochow. They are made by a single family, said to be of Japanese origin, who brought the secret over with them and have retained it ever since.

Rattan-ware.—Rattan-ware is made from the stem of a certain spinous climbing plant of the genus *Calamus*. The epidermis is first removed by drawing the stem through a notch in a tree, the cane is then either split in half lengthways or used in its natural state in the manufacture of rattan-ware.

Bamboo and Bamboo-ware.—The bamboo, which shoots up the height of fifty feet and upward, is cultivated about all villages and houses for its beauty and usefulness. This plant may well be called useful for it is applied by the Chinese to such a vast variety of purposes, some of them indeed better accomplished elsewhere by different materials, that it may fitly be termed their national plant. The tender shoots are cultivated for food, and are, when four or five inches high, boiled, pickled and comfitted. The roots are carved into fantastic images and the culms are manufactured into bamboo-ware. The uses of the bamboo are so various that a complete enumeration of them would be a difficult task. Somewhat to illustrate its uses a separate collection has been made, which represents very indifferently the unlimited field of industry comprised under the name of "bamboo-ware."

Tobacco.—*Nicotiana chinensis* and *fructiosa*. The introduction of Tobacco into China is of very early date, and it is now cultivated in nearly every part; the yellow and water being those most common. Its use, for smoking, is almost as general throughout the country, as is that of tea as a beverage. None is chewed, though a considerable quantity is consumed in the form of snuff. It is, on the whole, weaker than American or Manila.

There is a small trade, confined to Canton, in cigars manufactured to imitate the Manila cheroot; besides which, some small quantity is made up into cigarettes; the mass of the people, however, men and women, employ the pipe; either the simple metal cup, containing enough to supply some 10 or 12 whiffs, or the brass water-pipe, with sufficient for one long-drawn inhalation.

The cutting and general preparation are similar to the processes adopted by Western nations. At Swatow, ground-nut oil is used to give flavour and colour. The provinces of Chêkiang, Hupeh and Kwangtung furnish the most esteemed qualities. It is an article of interchange between most of the ports; that from the South being sent North and vice versa; there is, besides, a considerable export to Japan.

Opium.—There are two specimens; one from Newchwang, the other from Hankow. The poppy is cultivated in several provinces of China: Shansi, Shensi and Shêngking in the North; Szechuen, Yünnan and Kweichow in the West and South. The quantity produced has been steadily increasing from year to year, in spite of the Imperial edicts forbidding the cultivation. The prices range from 300 to 400 taels per pecul (133 lbs. English), as compared with a market for Indian, fluctuating between 500 and 600 taels. From a glance at the returns for the last few years, showing the total import of the latter into China, as passed through the various offices of the Imperial Maritime Customs, the increased growth of the poppy in the country would not appear to have affected the trade in the Indian drug; still, from such information as can be obtained, it is believed that the general consumption has increased, whilst of that increase Indian has no share.

Tea.—Tea is produced in all the provinces of China south of the Yellow River, and is exported from Hankow, Kiukiang, Shanghai, Ningpo, Foochow, Swatow, Canton and the Island of Formosa; from all of which places specimens will be found.

Tea may be divided primarily into two classes, black and green, under each of which headings are ranged a variety of different sorts; but both black and green can be made from the leaves of the same shrub, the latter hue being the result of special preparation. The chief descriptions of black are Congou, Oolong, Pekoe, Caper, Pouchong and Souchong; those of green, Hyson, Young Hyson, Twankay, Gunpowder and Imperial. Most of those names, such as Congou, Souchong, Pekoe, Hyson, Twankay, Oolong, are more or less remote reproductions of the names they bear in Chinese; some having reference to the locality in which they are produced, others to special peculiarities, such as Souchong, a corruption of *Siao-chung*, meaning "small sort," Pouchong, from *Pao-chung*, "twisted sort" Pekoe, from *Peh-hao*, "white hair," being the earliest leaf-buds, with a downy appearance still on them, Hyson from *Hieh'un* "flourishing in spring."

The process of preparing Tea for the foreign market is somewhat as follows: The leaves when gathered are exposed to the air spread on trays for about 12 hours, and in heaps, for two; they are

shaken out, leaf by leaf, and fired over a brisk wood fire for about 5 or 10 minutes; the next process, that of smoking with charcoal fumes, is repeated several times; alternating with winnowing, sifting, picking and rolling; after which the leaves are separated by a hand-machine in three or four qualities, such as dust, loose and tight twisted leaves, the last named being the finest description.

The drying process is as follows: The pans containing the charcoal are firmly built in with clay, on the floors; the charcoal is heated to a red heat and then covered with ashes; a tubular basket, open at each end, shaped like an hour glass, except that the contraction in the centre is very slight, is now placed over each pan of charcoal; on the contracted centre a woven bamboo tray, with tea leaves to the depth of about 2 inches, is placed; the interstices of the tray allowing the charcoal fumes to ascend freely: five to ten minutes is sufficient for each drying. The tea having been sufficiently picked, the last drying is gone through: the leaves are placed on the trays to a depth of 4 to 6 inches, and dried over the charcoal pans, until sufficiently cured; the workman, however, occasionally takes the baskets off the fire to stir the tea, and having shaken any dust from the leaves, replaces them; the tea is then packed while still warm; a certain number of pounds being weighed for each chest.

Tea is grown in patches belonging to different owners in the country districts; much of it on hill sides up to a moderate elevation. As a rule, the grower, after the first process of exposure to the air, disposes of it to others in whose establishments the firing process is gone through; who, again, hand it over to a local broker to sell on the nearest market, or port of shipment; on its arrival there, the aid of a resident broker is called in, whose business it is to find a purchaser.

Green Tea.—The colouring matter for Green Teas consists of gypsum and Prussian blue, with a little turmeric, and is thrown into the pan during the later firings; the process of which, in all its stages, is the same as that adopted for Black Teas.

Scented Tea.—(Orange Pekoe and Scented Caper) are prepared by having damp flowers of the *Chloranthus inconspicuus* (Chulan) mixed with the leaf at the first charcoal drying. The tea is left over the pans until all the extraneous moisture has been steamed out, when the Chulan flowers are carefully picked out. The leaf then passes through the usual process of drying, picking, sifting and winnowing, but before the last drying, it is mixed with Moli (*Jasminum Sambac*) flowers, which are sifted out just before the tea is packed. As substitutes for the Moli flowers the Suhing (*Jasminum officinale*) and the Yehsan (*Aglaia*) are used in seasons when the former are scarce.

PREFACE.

THE following list represents the publications of Protestant Missionaries to the Chinese, that have been collected for exhibition, in accordance with the proposal of S. W. WILLIAMS, Esq., LL.D. It is almost needless to say, that it has been found impossible to obtain copies of all that has been published; but we are probably safe in stating that the present collection comprises the greater part. Especially has it been difficult to get copies of many important publications of the early workers, who have long since left the field and entered a higher sphere. Some of these works are now exceedingly scarce; and in a very few instances we have included incomplete specimens, where no others were procurable.

It is hoped the collection may have an interest for the numerous Christian people, who will doubtless visit the Chinese department of the Exhibition; and it will show that one mighty agent of modern civilization—the Press—has not been neglected in the recent opening up of this great Empire to the intercourse of Western nations.

The Catalogue is in two prime divisions. The first, and by far the most important,—being Chinese works,—includes 1,040 articles. The other consists almost entirely of books in the English language, to the number of 109. The Chinese works are classed according to dialects; 733, or more than two thirds of the whole, being in the literary or general book language of China. The remainder comprise eleven local dialects. There are also a few works in the languages of four adjacent nations. Each language and dialect is subdivided into a number of classes, as will be seen by the accompanying table of contents. The works in each class are arranged in chronological order, according to the date of publication; and by reference to any work in the catalogue will be seen at a glance, the several particulars as to author, number of volumes, size, number of leaves, manner of printing, with the place of publication and date.






