### PREFACE.

ITTLE is known of Sheffield and its inhabitants, prior to the middle of the sixteenth century; and with a view to throwing some light on that early period of our history, I have examined and catalogued, in the following pages, such records as I have found available, relating to Sheffield prior to 1554. From that time forward, much information can be obtained from the Parish Church Register, which begins in 1560; "The History of the Cutlers' Company of Hallamshire," 1564; "The Records of the Burgery of Sheffield," 1566; and the Harrison "Survey of the Manor of Sheffield," 1637; also Hunter's "Hallamshire," Addy's "Waltheof," Leader's "Sheffield in the Eighteenth Century," and Gatty's "Sheffield Past and Present"; but not one of these local histories tells us much of the people who lived in Sheffield—other than the occupants of the Castle—from the time of Edward I to Elizabeth. In the "Report" made to the Charity Commissioners, printed by order of the House of Commons, 11th February, 1897, following an Inquiry held at Sheffield, June, 1895, into Endowments subject to the provisions of the Charitable Trusts Acts, it is stated, at page 103, that "The Church Burgesses have "also in their possession some 80 deeds of dates prior to 1554, "in addition to many others of a more recent date. They have "been arranged at some former period by some hand, probably Mr. "Hunter's, and extracts from a few of them appear in that antiquary's "work on 'Hallamshire.' The majority of those prior to 1554 "belong to the 14th and 15th centuries, the earliest being dated "in 1304. Time has not allowed of a prolonged inspection of them, "but with a few exceptions they appear to consist of grants of "land and houses, without trusts, in some cases to private individuals, "in others to a person described as 'Chaplain of Sheffield,' and "in others to the chaplain of Sheffield and three or four others, "who were probably the Churchwardens."

No doubt Mr. Hunter looked through these early charters of the Twelve Capital Burgesses; but at that time he was writing the chapter on "Ecclesiastical Affairs," for "Hallamshire"; and his object in examining these charters was rather to supplement the ecclesiastical history of Sheffield, than to extract from them general information for the use of the topographer and genealogist.

After obtaining the information he required for the particular purpose that he then had in view, he doubtless put the charters aside for other sources of information, relating more particularly to ecclesiastical matters. A schedule of these early charters was prepared in 1766 by the late Mr. James Wheat, law clerk to the Twelve Capital Burgesses; which gives a short abstract of each charter, including several not now apparently in the possession of the Burgesses. How these charters were lost or misplaced, it is impossible to say; it is, however, probable that the schedule was prepared from the originals, and not from copies; as in the latter case the fact would have been stated in the schedule; but it seems doubtful if Mr. Hunter saw these missing charters, for in "Hallamshire," 2nd edition, page 244, he says, "To prove this point as well as to bring the reader acquainted with certain altars and services which were in the parish church of Sheffield before the Reformation, a few notices of evidences in possession of the Church Burgesses and extracts from them, are here inserted." The use of the word "extracts" suggests that in some cases he did not see the original charters, and his comments in "Hallamshire" on the two missing charters to which he refers, do not give more or better particulars of their contents, than are given in the schedule, as reproduced in italic type in this catalogue. I think we may therefore assume that the charters were lost or misplaced subsequently to 1766 and prior to Mr. Hunter's examination early in the 19th century. Perhaps they may yet be found among the papers of the Burgesses or in some public or private collection of MSS. and full information as to their contents obtained.

Through the kindness of the Twelve Capital Burgesses, I have been given every facility for examining and cataloguing all the early Sheffield charters now in their possession; and in order to throw more light on the people to whom they relate, I have catalogued with them, all wills of Sheffield testators, proved at York prior to 1554, and a few other documents relating to the same period.

In cataloguing each document (other than subsidy rolls) after giving the date, I have stated the purport of the document, using modern English, unless otherwise indicated by quotation marks; and the translations follow the originals, as closely as legibility permits; but under the headings "Names of Persons," "Witnesses," "Place-names," and "Field-names," the original spelling is used, with, when necessary, the English equivalent, or modern name. The bracketed numbers in the margin refer to the

numbers attached to the charters of the Burgesses, as now arranged in their muniment room at the Parish Church.



between two gardens of the said John Stub. To have and to hold the said half toft to the said Robert his heirs and assigns for ever, of the chief lord of the fee, Know all men that I John Stub of Sheffield have given, granted and by this my charter have confirmed, to Robert Chaloner of the same (place) half a toft by services thenceforth due and of right accustomed. Yielding and paying thenceforth annually to Lord Furnival three pence, at the usual dates as in Sheffield, which lies in length between a lane called Waterlane on the west, and a garden of Reginald Braban on the east; and in breadth

the custom is in the said town, which is held by burgage tenure. And I the said John and my heirs will fully warrant against all men and for ever assure the said toft unto the said Robert and his heirs and assigns. In witness whereof I have to this charter affixed my seal. John Barker senior of Sheffield, John de Ledes of the same, John Barker junior, John de Peke, John Doget and others. in the Feast of Saint Michael the Archangel in the 4th year of the reign of King Henry V.



### CHARTERS AND WILLS.

1297 the (quarto) Ides of August (10th). Charter (Lat.) of Thomas Furnivalle, the third, son and heir of Sir Thomas de Furnivalle, dated at Sheffield; reciting that he had demised, granted and delivered in fee farm, to all his free tenants in the town of Sheffield and their heirs, all the tofts, lands and holdings which they then held of him in Sheffield, they paying to him and his heirs a yearly rent of f. 3. 8.  $9\frac{1}{2}$  in discharge of all services and demands, but reserving fealty, escheats and suit of court of the tenants; and granting the holding of a court in Sheffield by his bailiffs as theretofore; and freedom from tolls throughout Hallamshire. Names of Persons: Thomas de Furnivalle, Sir Thomas de Furnivalle. Witnesses: Sir Robert de Ecclissale, Sir Edmund Foliot, knights, Thomas de Schefeld, Thomas de Munteney, Robert de Wadislay, Ralph de Wadislay, Thomas de Furneus, William de Darnale, Robert le Bretone, then Steward of Hallumschire. Place - Name: Schefeld, Hallumschire. **Vellum**: one skin  $10\frac{1}{2} \times 4\frac{1}{2}$ , the seal of brown wax is in good Notes: This charter is now in the possession of the Town Trustees of Sheffield. A photographic reproduction, with transcript and translation, is given in Leader's "Records of the Burgery of Sheffield." The purport and effect of this charter was to improve the conditions under which the free tenants of the Manor held their lands; by commuting base and uncertain services into fee farm rents. When a town was put to fee farm the tenure of it was burgage. See Madox's "Firma Burgi," p. 21.

(1) 1304 Wednesday next after the Feast of Saint Andrew the Apostle (30th November). Release and Quit Claim (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, by Richard son of Adam de Weston of Sheffield to Jordan Tailor (Cissor) of Sheffield, of all his right and claim in a toft, land and tenement in the territory of Sheffield, which his father Adam formerly held. Names of Persons: Richard de Weston, Adam de Weston, Jordan Cissor (Tailor). Witnesses: Thomas de Bosco (Wood), Adam Coco (Cook), Adam de Bosco, Lambert Tinctore, Adam Robuc. Place-Names: Schefeld. Vellum: one skin 8 × 3, seal

missing. Notes: There was a Robert de Bosco, vicar of Ecclesfield in 1311. See Hunter's "Hallamshire," 2nd edition, page 347.

Names of Persons: Adam Drake. Place-Names: Attercliff, the Church of Schef-Field-Names: Leyland. Notes: This grant is not now in the possession of the Twelve Capital Burgesses. The above information is obtained from "A Schedule and abstract of all the deeds belonging to the Church estate from 1304 to the granting of the Charter of Incorporation in the 1st Year of Queen Mary, Anno 1553;" set forth in a folio volume, bound in vellum known as the "Church Burgess Election Book," page 86; also from Hunter's "Hallamshire," 2nd edition, page This schedule appears to have been prepared by the late Mr. James Wheat in 1766. The following is the resolution passed by the Burgesses, at a meeting held 10th March 1766: "A majority of the Burgesses do hereby appoint Mr James Wheat to be clerk to the same Corporation, during so long a time as he behaves himself well; and we do order that all the Charters, Deeds, Books and papers, relative to the trust, be scheduled and deposited in the chest belonging to the Church and there kept"; see Preface.

(2) 1322 Friday next after the Feast of Saint Martin the Bishop (11th November). Charter (Lat.), dated at Attercliffe, confirming a grant by William son of Thomas de Aterclif to Adam his son, of one acre of land, with the curtilage, called Pereshouslande in the town of Attercliffe. Names of Persons: William de Aterclif, Thomas de Aterclif, Adam de Aterclif. Witnesses: Adam de Coppeley, Ralph Chaumpeneys, Richard de Kirkeby, Roger . . . ., Adam de Cresseuill. Place-Names: Aterclif. Field-Names: Pereshouslande. Vellum:

one skin  $7\frac{3}{4} \times 4$ , seal missing. Notes: It can be gathered from this charter, that the family of de Aterclif possessed considerable wealth.

Release and Quit Claim (Lat.). dated at Sheffield, by Emma daughter of Alleway Pote of Hallam to Robert Smith (Faber) of Sheffield, of all her right and claim to a plot of land lying in the town of Sheffield, between tenements, which Simon le Walker formerly held in the same, and tenements of .... of Sheffield on the other part, and abutting on one part upon land of Adam son of Elye towards the east, and on the other part upon an ancient road leading through the middle of the town of Sheffield towards Names of Persons: Emma Pote, Alleway Pote, Robert Faber (Smith), Simon le Walker, . . . . de Scheffeld, Adam son of Elve. Witnesses: Adam Coco (Cook) of Scheffeld, Lambert Tynctor, Adam son of Elye, Roger del Hill, Adam de Capella. Place-Names: Hallum, Scheffeld. Vellum: one skin, slightly torn  $7\frac{1}{2} \times 4$ , seal missing. Notes: For a reference to Lambert Tynctor and Adam Coco, see Hunter's "Hallamshire," 2nd edition, page 347.

(4) (1329?) in the 3rd year of Edward (III?) in the Feast of Saint Lawrence (10th August). Release (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, by Margot Jordan of Sheffield to John Cutler of Attercliffe, John Trepet of Brikferth and William Reson of Sheffield, of all her right and claim in a messuage in the town of Sheffield, lying between a messuage of Hugh

Shotley (?) on the east, and a messuage of John del Smithe on the west; and abutting upon the King's road leading to the Castle on the north. Names of Persons: Margot Jordan doghter, John Cutler, John Trepet, William Reson, Hugh Shotley (?), John del Smithe. Witnesses: John de Mappls, John de Walkmylne, John de Peek, Henry Hauk, Robert Rankell chaplain. Place-Names: Sheffeld, Attrecliff, Brikferth, the King's road, the Castle. Vellum: one skin 9 × 31, seal missing Notes: The ink is much faded and parts are illegible. The skin is torn where the regnal year is written, and though it is clearly the third year of the reign of King Edward, it is very difficult to say if it is Edward III or Edward II. Endorsed in a hand of the 18th or 19th century is "3 Edwd 3 1330", but as the year anno domini should be 1329 and not 1330, the accuracy of the rest of the memorandum may be questioned. If it is Edward II the date is 1309, but the handwriting is more probably of the later date. The form Jordandoghter occurs in the 14th century, but in the Lay Subsidies Roll 2 Richard II 1378-9, (see Appendix, page 121), there is a Margote Jurdan, widow, of Sheffield. Endorsed in small court hand is "Carta Moogt Jordandoghter juxta Castelgren." The names of John Trypet and Johanna his wife, William Reyson, wright and Emma his wife, John Mapples, esquire and Agnes his wife, John de Walkmylne, smith, and Johanna his wife, appear in the Lay Subsidies Roll of 1378-9 (see Appendix, page 115). The family of Trippet is one of the oldest Sheffield families; Trippet Lane now Pinfold Street was named after some member of this family; see Leader's "Sheffield in the Eighteenth Century," page 206. Brikferth is now Brightside; see Addy's "Sheffield Glossary."

(5) 1332 (?) in the Feast of Saint John the Baptist (24th June). Grant (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, by Henry de Tapton, William Baunkel, Allan Turnur and Adam Sumpter to John de Elcliff chaplain, of a life estate, subject to a rent of a penny a year if demanded, in a croft and an acre of arable land in the town and territory of Sheffield, the said croft lying in the Balne, between a toft Emmote (Emme) Redfer formerly held of Emma Pote towards the east; and a toft of Adam le Barker towards the west; and the said acre of arable land lying at Gosdricker, and abutting upon land formerly of Adam Coke on one part, and upon Hallumlane on the other part. Names of Persons:

Henry de Tapton, William Baunkel, Allan Turnur, Adam Sumpter, John de Elcliff, Emme (Emmote) Redfer, Emma Pote, Adam le Barker, Adam Coke. Witnesses: Lambert Lyster, Roger del Hill, William Stubbe, Richard Moton, William Moton. Place-Names: Sheffeld, Balne, Gosdricker, Hallumlane. Vellum: one skin  $9\frac{1}{4} \times 4\frac{3}{4}$ , two seals of light vellow wax, each bearing a fleur-de-lis or similar device. Notes: It is impossible to fix the year of the decade. Balne is that part of Sheffield now known as Balm Green, lying between Barker's Pool and Bow Street. See Addy's "Sheffield Glossary," but the old spelling is always Balne. Balne (obs.) meant a bath, see N. E. D. It seems highly probable that Adam le Barker, the adjoining landowner on the west, was an ancestor of the Barker who in 1434 made a small reservoir at Balm Green to supply water for Sheffield, known for several centuries as Barker's Pool, the site of which still bears its name. See Leader's "Sheffield in the Eighteenth Century" pages 152-8. Hallam Lane was a very ancient road leading out of Sheffield to the west, it extended from the top of Broad Lane up Brook Hill and Western Bank, past the windmill, which stood on the site of Weston Park Museum, to Crookes and Hallam. It was part of the Roman Road, known as "Long Causeway," from Templeborough Camp to Brough. Leader's "Sheffield in the Eighteenth Century," page 206. Gosdricker or Goosedrain (Gos a Goose, and drecca or drana, a drain or watercourse) was evidently the name of a district near Broad Lane, probably it was the brook from which Brookhill takes its name. It will be seen that the croft and the arable land were about a mile apart.

(6) 1333 Thursday next before the Feast of Saint Michael the Archangel (29th September). Charter (Lat.), confirming a grant by John del Wodd del Brome to John Elcliff chaplain, of a croft and an acre of arable land in the town and territory of Sheffield, videlicet the said croft lies in Balne, between a toft of Emmote (Emme) Redfir, which she held of Emma Pote towards the east, and a toft of Adam le Barker towards the west; and the said acre of land lies at Gosdricker, and abuts upon land formerly of Adam Coke at one end, and upon Hallumlane at the other end. Names of Persons: John del Wodd, John de Elcliff, Emme (Emmote) Redfir, Emma Pote, Adam le Barker, Adam Coke. Witnesses: John Parker of Sheffeld, Adam Coteler, William Lambert, Adam Elys, William Stubbe.

Place-Names: Brome, Sheffeld, Gosdricker, Hallumlane, Balne. Vellum: one skin  $10 \times 2\frac{3}{4}$ , seal missing. Notes: It is not easy to see the exact effect of this charter, and the grant (5) of a life estate in the same land, the date of the latter is uncertain, but the result seems to have been that John de Elcliff got a life interest first and then the fee, the grantors being different in each case. The chaplain was not the vicar. See list of Sheffield Vicars in Hunter's "Hallamshire," 2nd edition, page 268.

(7) 1334 Wednesday next before the Feast of Pentecost (15th May). Release and Quit Claim (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, by John son of Thomas del Wod of Sheffield to Richard Moton of Sheffield, of an annual payment of four pence a year, with wardship, reliefs and escheats, paid out of a tenement in Sheffield lying between tenements formerly of Adam Coke (le Keu) towards the east, and that toft which was called Lambekyntoft towards the west. Names of Persons: John del Wod, Thomas del Wod, Richard Moton, Adam le Keu. Place-Names: Sheffeld. Field-Names: Lambekyntoft. Vellum: one skin 9 × 2<sup>8</sup>/<sub>4</sub>.


(8) 1334 Saturday in the Vigil of Trinity Day (22nd May). Release and Quit Claim (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, by Richard Moton of Sheffield to John son of Thomas Wood (de Bosco) of Sheffield, of part of a toft in Sheffield which was called Lambekyntoft, and lies at the south end of the said toft, between a toft formerly of Adam Coke (le Keu) on the one part, and a toft of Robert de Morton on the other part. Names of Persons: Richard Moton, John de Bosco (Wood), Thomas de Bosco, Adam le Keu, Robert de Morton. Place-Names: Sheffeld. Field-Names: Lambekyntoft. Vellum: one skin 8 by 3½, seal of light yellow wax obscure.


(9) 1335 Thursday next before the Feast of Saint Michael the Archangel (29th September). Release and Quit Claim (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, by Agnes daughter of Adam Gyter (?) of Sheffield to Margerie daughter of Jordan de Preston of Sheffield, of all right and claim in half a toft, with a building thereon, in the town of Sheffield; lying between tenements formerly of Adam de Weston on the east, and tenements formerly of William Gehynterdore (?) on the west. Names of Persons: Agnes Gyter (?), Adam Gyter (?), Margerie de Preston, Jordan de Preston, Adam de Weston, William Gehyntedore (?). Witnesses: Adam Elys of Sheffeld, Roger del Hill, Thomas de la Chapel, Adam Coteler, Robert de Mapples. Place-Names: Sheffeld. Vellum: one skin 9 × 3½, seal missing.

(10) 1337 Saturday in the Feast of the Invention of the Holy Cross (3rd May). Charter (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, confirming a grant by Alice Sikman of Sheffield to Thomas de Ferneus of Walkley, of all her tenements in Sheffield, which were formerly of her father Robert, lying between tenements formerly of William Rextous (?), and tenements of Robert de Nora (? Mora); abutting on the Watergate to the east, and on another road leading through the middle of the town of Sheffield to the west. Names of Persons: Alice Sikman, Robert Sikman, Thomas de Ferneus, William Rextous (?), Robert de Nora (? Mora, Moor), see page 114. Witnesses: Roger de Hallom, Adam son of Elve, Thomas de Capell, Roger del Hill, Robert Resun (?), Symon Capun, William clerk son of Lambert. Place-Names: Sheffeld, Walkelay, le Watergate. Vellum: one skin 9 × 31, seal missing. Notes: Endorsed in small court hand are the words "Watergate Toft Sheffeld."

(11) 1337 Wednesday next after the Feast of the Invention of the Holy Cross (3rd May) in the 11th year of Edward III. Charter (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, confirming a grant by Richard Moton of Sheffield to William Moton his son, of a messuage with the appurtenances, lying between the toft of John Wood (de Bosco) on the east, and tenements of the said William on the west. Names of Persons: Richard Moton, William Moton, John de Bosco. Witnesses: Adam Elis, Roger de Hallum, William Stubbe, Roger de Monter, Adam Cotel(er), Thomas de Capell, Thomas Crane, William Lambert, John Coke. Place-Names: Sheffeld. Vellum: one skin 8 × 3, seal missing. Notes: William Lambert is probably the William son of Lambert a witness to the Charter (10).

- (12) 1338 Tuesday next after the Feast of Saint James the Apostle (25th July). Charter (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, confirming a grant from William Moton son of Richard Moton of Sheffield to John de Elcliffe chaplain of Sheffield his heirs and assigns, of all lands and tenements which William Moton held in the town and interior of Sheffield. Names of Persons: William Moton, Richard Moton, John de Elcliffe. Witnesses: Roger de Hallam, Robert de Mapples, William son of Lambert, Robert de Morton, Adam Elys, Thomas Tune, Thomas de Capell clerk of Sheffeld. Place-Names: Sheffeld. Vellum: one skin 8½ × 3, seal in good condition. See Plate II. Notes: Compare this with (11), (13), (17), and (19). Adam Elys may be Adam son of Elye (3) and (10).
- (13) 1338 Wednesday next after the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Mary the Virgin (15th August). Release and Quit Claim (Lat.), dated at Sheffield, by William Moton of Sheffield to John de Elcliffe of Sheffield chaplain, of all his right and


claim in all his land, with a building thereon, lying in the interior of Sheffield. Names of Persons: William Moton, John de Elcliffe. Witnesses: Roger de Hallum, John Payrcarre, William son of Lambert Tinctore, Robert de Mapples, Robert de Morton, Thomas Tuyne, Thomas de Capell of Sheffeld. Place-Name: Sheffeld. The property has lately been leased at a ground rent of £620 a year. The following memorandum, written in small court hand, is endorsed: "Felicia Hyne, de cruce argentea et aliis ornamentis ecclesie emendis."

Testator further willed, that the vicar of Sheffield should receive of testator's executor 6s 8d yearly, of the holding that then was belonging to the Church of Sheffield, during the term of "ve said holding," wherewith he shall make a "solemyn dirige" yearly for testator and his wife, for his "fader and moder and all other good doers," the residue of 6s 8d to be disposed of for poore Names of Persons: Thomas Abson otherwise named Thomson, An Antiphonar, Alice Abson, Alice Swift, Gerry Swift, Nicholas Abson. Witnesses: John Wickersley of Bromehall gent, Thomas Cundall vicar of Shefelde, Sir Richard Lede priest with others (not named). An Antiphon was an anthem and the Antiphonar would be the priest who sang or intoned it

"A Legend" seems to have been the anniversary service for the dead, held on the vigil of the anniversary, at which passages from the Scriptures and The Lives of the Saints were read. See Du Cange's Glossarium. By 3 & 4 Edward VI, c 10, s, l all books called Processionalles, Manuelles, Legends, etc., were abolished.



The Will (Engl.) of Herry Swift of Sheffield, proved 2nd October 1521 at York, directed that he should be buried in the churchyard of Saints Peter and Paul and for "mortuarie as ryghte requirethe." He gave to the High Altar in Sheffelde Church 3s 4d; to every priest of the said Church being at his dirige 12d; to his two "childer" Frances and Thomas 20 marks; to the repair of the highway between Sheffelde and Heyley 40s; to Alexander his "broder, a pakehors wth all things belonging"; to "Richard Wright childer xxs in whyke goodes to goo forward to their behove"; to every of his "godchilder" 4d; to "John Swift childer" all his "sheppe at Hugh Oxsprynge"; to Johanne Jakethe 2s. All such debts as his "broder" John Swift and Richard Wright owed testator, he gave to their children. 



Testator willed "other purchased lands in the Countye of York to the Church of Sheffeld to find an honest priest to synge in the said Church and pray" for his soul. To Sir John Crawsha his chaplain £5 to pray for testator in the said church "a hole yeare"; also out of part of the profits of the above lands "to cause the loft in the Roode Chapel to be new buylded and to provide a sute of vestments to be used at the roode altar in the chapel." Residue to his niece Elinor Wentworth "doughter" of his "broder" Nicholas Wikersley deceased, and to the heirs of her body "and for defalte" to Elizabeth and Margarete testator's sisters, "and for defalte" as declared by the Will of his father. Testator gave to William Blithe "3 shepe"; to Richard Blith (sic) the son of John Blith "3 shepe"; to Agnes Fox 8d; to Margarete testator's wife all the land that he purchased of Sir Nicholas Stirley, and the land in Attercliffe, for her life, and after her decease to Georgie and Robert Dent testator's "yonger sones", they paying yearly to John Dent, testator's eldest son, 6s 8d; but if they happen to die the same to descend to John. Testator's goods to be divided into three parts, one to himself "to bring me forthe," one other to Margaret his wife, and the third to seven of his children, Elizabeth, Elinore, Jennett, Thomas, Hughe, John and Marie. Testator further directed, that William his son should give to each of his children 5s "per year, for sixe yeres for two closes lyinge in the parish of Ekerton," and testator gave to John Bright his son in law 40s and "a cow mylke, and the house that is in the folde, rent free for 2 yeres"; to Margaret his wife a close that he had taken from Thomas Pereson for five years called Tasker Felde; to Margarete his wife "all fermes" that he had "of the Graunte of the Erle of Shrewesburie in Hopathorpe reserving the last iii yeres of the said lease" to his son William, but if his wife died then Marie his "doughter to have the residue thereof." 

The Will (Engl.) of Richarde King of Sheffield, proved 4th October 1548 at York, directed that he should be buried in the churchyard of Saints Peter and Paul, and for his mortuary according to the King's Acts. Testator gave to Alice his daughter his "greteste panne, the counter, the best stithie, bellowes, hammeres and tonges, with all thinges belonging to the same harthe"; to Anne Robert his daughter's daughter, his best brass pott; to Henrie Dolphyne, his "worstede cote laitely made"; to George Robert his "plonket iaket (jacket), and a stag skin coite," with all debts owing to testator; to Geffrae his son "an axiltre of yron" at Thomas Hobson's of Waddeslae Bridge; to Otwell Cutler testator's servant "the litle stithie, the bellowes, a pair of tonges, a stovente, a harthe staffe"; to Thomas Claiton 12d. The residue to his wife, with his "wheile;" to Alice his daughter, a third of his goods not bequeathed, and the residue of the said wheile, if his "wife dye before the yeres thereof



Testator gave to his daughters, Marjorie, Anne, Katherine, Jennet and Alice, who were then all married, 8 marks; to his daughters not married, Elizabeth, Margaret and Elinoure 8 marks, to be paid out of his "goodes, but if they will not extend to the same," then they should have the "qwell of the sandes," after the decease of his wife; to Elizabeth his wife, the said "qwell on (sic) the sandes," and Thomas Sikes and Hughe Person to oversee the said qwell, and keep it in repair; and to have "for their paynes one troughe," which Richarde Eyre and John White then occupied. On the decease of testator's wife, the profits of the said qwell were to be

divided among his children at the discretion of Robert Baweman, John Helaghe and Thomas Melloure. Testator gave to Robert Lee his "qwell which stands in Porter Felde Side"; to John Carre one close called Prioure Greve; to his wife one close called Priour Rowe "lienge in Mountenay Felde," and after her decease to testator's children; to his wife "a litle close in Sheffelde nere unto Barker Lands," and after her decease to his youngest daughter (not named but presumably Elinoure); to Anne Pearson his daughter one close in Narrowe Layne; to his wife a third of his goods. Residue to Elizabeth his wife, and his eight daughters (above named), whom he made his executors; and he appointed Lawrence Smythe and John Hylaghe (sic) super-Names of Persons: John Daille, Marjorie, Anne (Pearson), Katherine, Jennet, Alice (his married daughters, surnames not given with the exception of Pearson), Elizabeth Daille, Margaret Daille, Elinoure Daille, Elizabeth Daille (testator's wife), Thomas Sikes, Hughe Person, Richarde Eyre, John White, Robert Baweman, John Helaghe, Thomas Melloure, Robert Lee, John Carre, Lawrence Smythe, John Hylaghe (? A qwell was a spring of water, and "the sandes," probably Millsands. It may be inferred that these springs of water were intercepted by troughs near the Mill on the bank of the Don, and the troughs were let at a rent for trade purposes. Perhaps grinding wheels were run from these troughs; they evidently had to be kept in repair, and were run for profit. The Testator appears to have owned a similar property on the bank of the Porter. High Street was known as Prior Gate, and is so shown on Gosling's Map of Sheffield, 1736, and the two closes, Prioure Greve and Priour Row, also Mountenay Felde, adjoined High Street near to where the Drapery Establishment of John Walsh Ltd., now stands. A passage from High Street into Mulberry Street, passing the Clarence Hotel (which formerly stood on the same site), was, until the Hotel was pulled down for street improvements in 1900, known as "Prior Court." Barker Lands was probably near Barker's Pool; see page 9. There is a Broad

Lane in Sheffield, and Narrow Lane was a little to the south of it, and formed the west outlet of Trippet Lane. See Leader's "Sheffield in the Eighteenth Century," page 206.


(1547) In the 1st year of Edward VI. "The Act for Chantries Collegiate," 1 Edward VI c. xiv, stated by way of preamble, that a great part of the superstition and errors, in Christian religion, had been brought into the minds and estimations of men, by reason of the ignorance of their very true and perfect salvation, through the death of JESUS CHRIST; and by devising and phantasying vain opinions of purgatry and masses satisfactory, to be done for them which be departed; the which doctrine and vain opinion, by nothing more was maintained and upholden than by the abuse of trentals, chantries and other provisions made for the continuance of the said blindness and ignorance; and that the alteration, change and amendment of the same, and converting to good and godly uses, as in erecting of Grammar Schools to the education of youth in vertue and godliness, the augmenting of the Universities, and better provision for the poor and needy, could not in that parliament be provided and conveniently done, except by the King; who, with the advice of his most prudent Council, could and would most wisely and beneficially, both for the honour of GOD and the weal of his Majesty's realm, order, alter, convert and dispose of the same; and enacted, that all manner of colleges, free chapels and chantries, having being or in esse within five years next before the first day of the then present Parliament, and all manors, lands, tenements, rents and other hereditaments, by any manner of assurance, conveyance, will, devise or otherwise, made, declared, given, limited or appointed to the finding of any priest to have continuance for ever; and wherewith or whereby any

priest was sustained, maintained or found, within five years next before the first day of the then present Parliament; and also all annual rents, profits and emoluments at any time within five years, employed, paid or bestowed, toward or for the maintenance, supportation or finding of any stipendiary priest, intended by any act or writing to have continuance for ever, should by the authority of the then Parliament, immediately after the Feast of Easter then next coming, be adjudged and deemed, and also be, in the very actual and real possession and seizin of the King and his heirs and successors for ever, without any office or other inquisition thereof to be had or found; and in as large and ample manner and form as the priests, wardens, masters, ministers, governors, rulers or other incumbents of them or any of them, at any time within five years had occupied or enjoyed or then occupied or enjoyed the same; and as though all and singular the said colleges, free chapels, chantries, stipends, salaries of priests and the said manors, lands, tenements, hereditaments, &c., were in that Act specially named. It also enacted, that Commissioners should be appointed to ascertain what lands, &c., the King was entitled to under the provisions of the Act, and such Commissioners were to assign yearly pensions to every governor, priest, fellow and servant of every chantry dissolved under that Act. Notes: After the passing of this Act, Commissioners appointed under it visited Sheffield and finding that three priests were being maintained out of the rents of portions of the public lands, decided that they were chantry priests, and certified the lands for confiscation to the Crown. These lands, which were only part of the Town lands, remained in the possession of the Crown during the reign of Edward VI, but when Mary came to the throne, the inhabitants of Sheffield successfully petitioned for their restoration. See "Petition," page 104, and "Royal Letters Patent," page 106. It appears, that in order to prevent any attempt to conceal from the Commissioners any information as to the lands or income of charitable guilds, chantries, &c., and to secure to the Crown property to which it became entitled under this Act, public informers were encouraged to come before the Court of Augmentations and give evidence by a formal Information, disclosing such concealment; and if the Information proved correct, and lands, rents or other property thereby accrued to the Crown, the Informer was to be rewarded, by receiving a twenty-one years Lease of such lands, rents or property. This does not form part of the Act, but it may have been a bribe,

offered by the Court, some time after the passing of the Act, when it had reason to think that information was being withheld and lands concealed.

The Will (Engl.) of Laurence Smythe of Attercliffe within the parish of Sheffield, proved 16th April 1551 at York; directed that he should be "buried in Eccleasicall Sepulture," and for "mortuarie according to King's Grace Testator gave to the five daughters of Richarde Fenton his son-in-law, viz., Dorothie, Elizabeth, Marie, Anne, and Katerine "everie of them" £6.13.4 to be paid by Hughe testator's son; to the said Hughe all testator's "landes, tackes and fermes, the Mylnes of Sheffelde and Ollerton," which he had of the Erle of Shrewsburie, and "for lacke of issue, to Richarde Fenton the yonger, and for lacke of issue of Richarde to the six daughter of Richarde Fenton the elder," Ellinoure, Dorothie, Elizabeth, Marie, Anne and Katerine: to Annie testator's daughter all his "stocke of malte and barlie with the greate chiste in the chamber"; to Isabell Abrahame 20s; to John Swift 3s 4d; to Thurgoland 3s 4d; to Alice Savage 20s; to Anne Dae 6s 8d; to "wif of William Wordesworthe" 3s 4d; to John Beighton son of Rauf Beighton 3s 4d; to Marjarie Hartely 3s 4d; to Richard Fenton "the yonger," testator's "parte of the ferme of Sheffelde Church during" his "termes"; to Rauf Carre 20s; to "the the maynetenance of the Service of God in the Chapell of Atterclif, during 20 yeres" 13s 4d, to be paid by Hughe his son. He also gave to William Rawson 40s, upon a condition "that he do his apprentishipe"; to Thomas Twyg his servant 40s; to Elene Rawson 24s 8d; to Alice Wilkynson 20s; to Thomas Birddocke 26s 8d upon condition "that he go forthe upon his apprenticeship"; to Elizabeth Rawson daughter of Hew Rawson, 6s 8d; to James Frogson a jackett, "a pare of whit hose and a fustiane dublett"; to Jennet Stanyforthe (sic) 6s 8d; to Jennet Moore 6s 8d; to Ellene Rawson 6s 8d; to "the Poore Man's Box" 3s 4d. 



The Will (Engl.) of Richard Hobson of "the Steill Banke" in the Parish of Sheffield, proved 6th May 1552 at York, directed that he should be buried in the Parish Church of Saints Peter and Paul, and for his mortuary according to the King's Acts. Testator gave to the poore folk box 2s; to every godchild 6d; to every servant 12d; to Jenet his sister 6s 8d; to John Twige his best jacket; to Richard Hobson of Stannington his best dublet; to John Twige, Thomas Fyrthe and Thomas Twig "six shepe"; to Robert Gawthorpe vicar of Sheffield 12d; to John Wright 12d; to John Rawson 12d; to Margarete Swynden "8 shepe at Richard Hales"; to "Prentise William Hawll a pare of gret tonges, a pare of litle tonges, a borne axe and a fore hamber"; to Sir Thomas Hogsone 12d; to clerks at testator's burial 3s 4d for

a "dynner"; to Margarete Swyndone a great panne; to Richard Fyrthe a stethye. Testator willed that John Hobson his brother should give of his "owne parte" to brother Geffray Hobson 40s: and that John Hobson testator's brother should give Alice Richardson 6s 8d. 


that he had taken of Thomas Grenwood the elder of "Litle Sheffelde," for which he had paid 16s; to Agnes testator's wife and John his son "all the increase of a cowe," that he had "letten" to Thomas Grenwood; to Agnes testator's wife and John his son 20s, that testator had lent to John Hobson, and they to receive the same with the increase of 6s 8d at "Mydsomer"; to testator's three brothers Thomas Ryles, John Ryles and John Adamson part of his "working gere" and part of his "rayment." 
(1551-2) January 23rd, in the 5th year of Edward VI. Information of Henry Bayley in the Court of Augmentations, against the inhabitants of Sheffield (after reciting the Statute of Chantries, passed in the 1st year of Edward VI, see page 84, whereby all mannors, lands, rents and hereditaments given to find a priest to say masse and pray for souls, should be adjudged vested in the said King and his heirs for ever) informed the said Court, that a messuage called the George in the Old Change, London (then divided into two tenements and let for forty two shillings), was given by one Whitebread, towards the finding of a priest within the Parish Church of Sheffield, to say masse and pray for the soul of the said Whitebread; and that one tenement and two acres of ground in Sheffield in the tenure of one James Heynde, then let for ten

shillings and eight pence; one meadow in Sheffield in the tenure of William Burrows, then let for ten shillings; one other meadow in Sheffield in the tenure of Rylles widow, then let for ten shillings; a tenement and two acres of ground in Sheffield in the tenure of William Parlington, then let for ten shillings and eight pence; and six acres of land in Sheffield at a place called Red Hill in the tenure of John Goree, were likewise given by certain persons to find a priest to say masse and to keep a certain obitt within the said Parish Church. And it further informed the said Court, that the Church Wardens and parishioners of the said Church, did continually apply the rents of the said lands in the finding of one priest within the said Parish Church, to pray for the souls of the donors; and that the said Church Wardens did not present before the King's Commissioners, appointed for survey of the chantries, colleges and free chappels within the said County, to be the King's property; but did conceal the same from the Commissioners, and had from the date of the said statute improperly applied the rents thereof to their private uses, contrary to the said statute. And the Informer desired the Court to grant a commission, to the surveyors of the said County, authorizing them to enquire into the matter, and certify the same to the said Court; and asked that upon presenting his Majesty's title to the premises, the Commissioners would grant the said tenements to the Informer Henry Bayley, for twenty one years under the seal of the said Court, at the usual Names of Persons: Henry Bayley, the inhabitants of Sheffield, one Whitebread, James Heynde, William Burrows, Rylles widow, William Parlington, John Goree, the Church Wardens, the King's Commissioners. Place-Names: the Court of Augmentations, Old Change, London, Sheffield, Red Hill. Notes: The above epitome is taken from an "Abstract and Schedule of Books of Accompts, Papers, Memorandums, &c., belonging to the Church from the 5th Edward VI to 1694" (now in the possession of the Twelve Capital Burgesses), in which, what purports to be, a "Copy or Draft" of the Information is given. From the Declaration of Trust of the 1st May 1501, and the recital of the feoffment of Felice Hyne therein contained, it is clear that this Information was incorrect, in stating that "one Whitebread" had given the George in Old Change. It was Felice Hyne, daughter of John Whitebread, who gave the George in trust for sale, the proceeds to be spent in buying a silver and gilt Cross for the Church of Saint Peter at Sheffield, so that she and her husband and others might be "the better

remembered and prayed for." See (71) page 44. Of course, Henry Bayley would not have access to the title deeds, and would have to make out his case from what information he could gather from outside sources.

1551 (-2) February 2nd. The Will (Engl.) of Rycharde Stanyforth of Brynklessedge in the parish of Sheffield, proved 20th April 1553 at York; directed that he should be buried in the churchyard of Saints Peter and Paul, and for his mortuary according to the King's Acts. He gave to his son William £6.13.4, all his "smythe gevre and two dossen sythes readye to the chapman"; to Alice testator's daughter £6.13.4; to Margaret Hall daughter of Thomas Hall of Sheffield 40s; to testator's son John "all the landes that did descend unto" testator, and "all waynes and yockes being at the houses," and all money that he owed testator; to Agnes testator's wife, and William his son, all lands that he had "taken of divers men duringe the termes." Residue to Agnes his wife whom he made executrix, and he appointed Thomas Creswicke of "Litle Sheffelde," Thomas Hall of Sheffield, Robert Lee, Thomas Hobson, supervisors. Names of Persons: Rycharde Stanyforth, William Stanyforth, Alice Stanyforth, Margaret Hall, Thomas Hall, John Stanyforth, Agnes Stanyforth, Thomas Creswicke, Robert Lee, Thomas Hobson. Witnesses: Thomas Parker, Thomas Barns, Richard Sponer. Place-Names: Brynklessedge in the parish of Sheffelde, Churchyerde of St. Pet and Paul, Litle Sheffelde. From the wills at York Probate Registry, volume xiii, folio 985. Brynklessedge is doubtless an old form of Brincliffe Edge, a district in the south-west of Sheffield, about two miles from the parish church.

(1552?) No date given, but the Answer would be filed soon after the Information was presented. Answer of Robert Swift esquire and William Tailour, in the name of themselves and

other the inhabitants of Sheffield, to the Information of Henry Bayley, in which they alleged, that the Information was untrue, uncertain and insufficient in law, that the same was grounded on malice, to put the said inhabitants to expense, and chiefly with intent to get, either by lease or otherwise, the said messuage called the George in the Old Exchange, London. The Answer recites the deed, by which Felice Hinde enfeoffed Jeffrey Buttery, Robert Parker, William Taylour and Thomas Challoner, of the Old Change London; reserving to herself a life interest, and giving the feoffees a trust for sale after her death; and that the said William Tailour (one of the two defendants above named) was the cousin and heir-at-law of the said William Taylour then deceased, the survivor of the said four feoffees. And further, that till the date of the said Information of Henry Bayley, the rents and profits of the said lands and tenements were employed by the Church Graves in repairs of the said Church, of the bridges and highways, and chiefly in relief of the indigent and needy, within the town and parish of Sheffield; without employing the said premises in finding and maintaining of any priest or keeping any obit; but it is admitted that three priests, called Roode Priest, Our Lady Priest and Saint Katherine Priest, had been of long time kept and maintained, partly out of such collections and gatherings as were collected and gathered every Sunday and holiday, amongst the said inhabitants and others that did repair unto the said Church; but chiefly out of such profits as did move and growe by reason of certain May Games and other Vain Plays and Interludes, as were used within the said parish, by reason whereof a great number of people, at divers times in the year, resorted unto the said town, to view and see the said Games, of whom much money was collected, and the same was always employed in finding and maintaining the said three priests, until about fourteen years before the said Information, when the said inhabitants and others, resorting to the said Church on Sundays and other holidays, withdrew their liberality and devotion as to any such purposes, and would give very little money, or none, for the maintenance of the said priests; and about that time also, such May Games and other like fantastical pastimes did cease, for divers good considerations, as things not to be frequented amongst civil people; by reason whereof the said priests, for want of wages and living, were like to have been discharged out of the said town; whereupon the said inhabitants remembering that the said town was large and great (having within it twelve or fourteen hamlets, and all greatly


inhabited, especially with poor folks, which occasioned plagues and distempers), and that if the said three priests should have been so discharged, the vicar of the said parish could not have been able to have ministered unto the said inhabitants in times of sickness, nor at any other times the Sacraments and Sacramentals; upon which considerations it was thought convenient by many of the said inhabitants, that part of the issues of the said premises in Sheffield should (as it might be conveniently spared after other more necessary charges done), be given to the said three priests, towards their relief and living, to the intent that they might be assistants to the said vicar, in the ministration of Divine Service and other Sacraments; but as it was not certain what the yearly charges of the repairs of the said Church, and the amendment of the highways and bridges would be, nor how much was necessary to be detained for the relief of the poor; it was not specially declared by the inhabitants what the said three priests should have; so that their yearly stipend was most commonly measured, having respect to such necessary charges as happened that year. In so much that they had some years more, some less, and as it chanced that the other charges were very small; the said inhabitants did (a few years next before the making the said statute) give to the said three priests £16.10.0., i.e., to two of them severally £5.6.8. each, and to the third (because he did more service in the Church than the other two did) 10s more than his fellows, i.e., £5.16.8. The Answer further admits the Grant by William Hynde, (67), and the Declaration of Trust for payment of seven shillings a year to the Saint Katherine priest, and for an obit nine shillings; and to the church wardens for their pains thirteen pence; which said seven shillings had been paid to the said priest as parcel of his wages. And that the King might not be deceived, neither the seven shillings given to the said priest, nor the said nine shillings employed upon an obit, nor as much as the said priests had of the benevolence of the said inhabitants, out of the said premises in Sheffield, when they had most, at any time within five years before the making of the said statute, the said inhabitants did truly present before the said Commissioners, appointed for the survey of chantries, &c., all the said rents as And accordingly the inhabitants had truly answered yearly, and paid to the use of the King, all the said rents given to the said priests as aforesaid, and employed upon an obitt; which in all amount to £27. 9. 4. Without (admitting?) that

the said messuage called the George was given by one Whitebread, towards the finding of a priest within the said Parish Church to say masse, and to pray for his soul; or that any part of the lands and hereditaments mentioned in the said Information were given, to the knowledge of the defendants, by any persons to find a priest to say masse, or to keep certain obitts (other than the said three tenements given by the said Hinde), or that the church wardens or parishioners did always, since the said gift. receive the rents of the said premises, and did find with the same, one priest to pray for the soul of the donor, as in the said Information was surmised; or did, with part of the said profits, keep any obitt in any other manner than as aforesaid; or that the church wardens or parishioners ought to have presented before the King's said Commissioners, that the said premises did belong unto the King; or that he was lawfully entitled to the said lands by force of the said Statute; or that the said church wardens and parishioners had ever since the making of the said Statute received the said rents to their own uses, as in the said Information was alleged. Names of Persons: Robert Swift, William Tailour, Henry Bayley, Felice Hinde, Jeffery Buttery, Robert Parker, William Taylour, Thomas Chaloner, Roode Priest, Our Lady Priest, St Katherine Priest, William Hynde, Church Wardens. Notes: It is obvious that this Answer was drawn up by a lawyer, probably in London, and no doubt Robert Swift and the Earl of Shrewsbury made more than one journey to London in connection with this business, see page 108. In spite of all their efforts to make a good defence, it appears from later documents that they failed to satisfy the Court, and Henry Bayley established his case and "presented His Majesty's title to the premises."

1553 May 1st. The Will (Engl.) of Roberte Parkyne of the Parish of Sheffield, proved 5th October 1553 at York, directed that he should be buried in the parish churchyard of Saints Peter and Paul and for his mortuary according to the King's Acts. Testator gave to Alice his wife, and Alice his daughter two closes, which he had purchased, by Indenture, of Richarde Hartlay during testator's "yeres to come," and his "manor" (manure) at his house; to Thomas Grese his servant "a yowe and a lamb"; to his "noder a yowe and a lamb"; to his "fader" his "russett jackett"; to Anthony Grene "a yowe hogge." Residue of his

goods to Alice his wife, and Alice his "doughter," whom he made executors, and he appointed Thomas Howslay and Edwarde Collye supervisors, and they to have for their paynes 12d. Names of Persons: Roberte Parkyne, Alice Parkyne, Alice (testator's daughter), Richarde Hartlay, Thomas Grese, Anthony Grene, Thomas Howslay, Edwarde Collye. ## Genealogy deduced.



(1553?) Probably about two years after Henry Bayley informed against the parishioners of Sheffield. Petition of Robert Swift and William Tailour of the parish of Sheffield, for and in the names of all other the inhabitants of the said parish, "To The Quene our Moste drad Soveraynge" (Queen Mary), complaining that the Petitioners (therein called the Orators), together with others of the said parish, were lawfully seised "in ther demaine as of fee," of and in certain lands, tenements and burgages, set, lying and being in the town and parish of Sheffield aforesaid, to the yearly value of f.27; and also of and in one messuage with appurtenances, called the George, set, lying and being in "The Olde Chaunge" in the City of London; which were given and assigned by divers persons of long time past, to and for the reparation and amendment of several bridges and ways, within the said parish of Sheffield; and to the reparation of the Church there, and to the relief of the most needy and indigent persons, inhabiting within the said parish; and that the issues and profits thereof had been so applied by the Church greaves, until about fourteen years before the date of that Petition, when the said

inhabitants were forced (there being many poor persons and much disease), to impart some portion of the revenues yearly, for the finding of three priests to assist the Vicar in visiting of the sick, and in administering divine service and other sacraments in the Church. In which form the same continued, until the making of the statute for the dissolution of colleges and chantries, when the Commissioners thereby appointed, perceiving that in some one year before the said statute, £17 of the said rents, besides 9s 4d for an obit, had been given and bestowed amongst the said three priests, did compel the said inhabitants to certify before the said Commissioners the said yearly rent of £17. 9. 4., and accordingly the same had ever since been paid to the receivers of the Queen's Revenues. That nevertheless Henry Bayley of London, skinner, of his most covetous and ungodly mind, seeking only his own private gain and lucre, had exhibited, in the Queen's Court of Augmentations, a surmised Information concerning the said lands, whereby he had continually vexed and disquieted the said inhabitants for two whole years then last past; and for as much as the said lands were not given for the finding of any priest or priests to have continuance for ever, but were found by the parishioners of the said parish, by reason whereof the said Petitioners did think that the same were not within the compass of the said statute, so that the Queen was not justly entitled to such rent, as was employed in the finding the same priest; and as the Vicar of the Church was not able (without assistance) to serve the cure, and to minister the Sacraments and other Divine Services within the said parish, for the reasons above alleged; and also for that the Queen had no profit or benefit by the said rent, by reason the same was paid forth again by the hands of her receiver unto the said three priests for their yearly pensions, who then went abroad at their liberty; the Church being unserved, to the great discomfort of the said inhabitants, by reason of the great decay of such Godly service, as theretofore had been used within the said Church. Therefore the Petitioners prayed the Queen in advancement of God's glory and His Divine Service, to restore unto the Petitioners the said rent, to be employed and bestowed as theretofore it had been, the Petitioners discharging the said pensions. (1554) June 8th, in the 1st year of Queen Mary. Royal Letters Patent (Lat.) by which The Twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of the town and parish of Sheffield became a Corporation with a Common Seal, and were granted the hereditaments which had been taken by Edward VI, under the Statute for dissolution of colleges and chantries, together with other hereditaments (including the London property and Red Hill, Sheffield property) which were probably all those included in the Information of Henry Bayley. Vellum: one skin 35 × 24, the seal of the Court of Exchequer, of dark wax, about 5 inches in diameter, is broken. Notes: This Royal Letters Patent forms the Charter of Incorporation of The Twelve Capital Burgesses and Commonalty of the town and parish of Sheffield, a title by which that Corporation is still known and properly described. The Charter is set out in full in Hunter's "Hallamshire," 2nd edition, pages 240, 241 and 243. From this it seems quite clear that the Court of Augmentations accepted Henry Bayley's Information as correct, and the Old Change, Red Hill and other properties, about which he informed, passed to the Crown under the Statute, but Queen Mary being anxious to please the Roman Catholics, not only restored the lands taken by Edward VI, but also included the Old Change, Red Hill and other properties, the subject of Henry Bayley's Information, giving him, as a compromise, a lease of the Old Change property for forty years, instead of a lease of all the properties to which he had established the Crown title, for twenty one years, as requested by the Information. See the Marquis of Winchester's Letter.

1556 July 26th. Copy Letter from the Marquis of Winchester, Lord High Treasurer at Saint James' (Palace), to the twelve Chief Burgesses of Sheffield, stating that the bearer thereof, Henry Bayley, was an Informer to the Court of Augmentations of two houses in the Old Change and other lands and tenements, which had come to the late King Edward VI, by the Act of dissolutions of chantries; and were concealed from the said King; in consideration of which Information and of his paynes, costs and continual trouble in prosecuting the same, there was granted to the said Henry Bayley, as well in the said late Court of Augmentations, as in the Exchequer; the preferment of the said concealed lands and tenements, to have them in lease; before the suing out of which lease, the said lands and tenements (amongst others) had been given to the said Corporation by the King and Queen, at which time the said Burgesses promised nevertheless to make Bayley a lease of the said tenements in London. Therefore, for as much as the Queen, understanding the said travel taken for her benefit to be then altogetner unrecompensed, to his undoing, she had by him (the Marquis) signifyed her pleasure, that the said poor man have his lease promised him, and requiring the Burgesses without delay to make him a lease of the said two tenements (in Old Change London), for forty years, in such form as was sent engrossed by the bearer, which when done he (the Marquis) should report to the Queen, and do the Burgesses such further pleasure as he might when occasion occurred. Names of Persons: Marquis of Winchester, the twelve Chief Burgesses, Henry Bayley, Queen (Mary). Place-Names: Saint James (Palace), Sheffield, Court of Augmentations, London, Old Change.

1556(-7) March 3rd. Copy Letter from the Marquis of Winchester, Lord High Treasurer and Sir John Baker, Chancellor of the Exchequer, at Westminster, to Robert Swift gentleman and Robert Taylour, referring to the said controversy with Henry Bayley concerning the lease, and requiring the Burgesses to accomplish the same according to promise, that the Court might be no further troubled, or they would compel them thereto. Names of Persons: Marquis of Winchester, Sir John Baker, Robert Swift, Robert Taylour, Henry Bayley, the Burgesses. Place-Name: Westminster. Notes: Sir John Baker died in 1558; he was a lawyer; joint Ambassador to Denmark in 1526; speaker of the House of Commons, Attorney-General Privy-Councillor; Chanceller of the Exchequer 1545-1558. See D.N.B. It appears from the books of the Church Burgesses, that the litigation with Henry Bayley in the Court of Augmentations lasted from St. Hillary 5 Edward VI (23rd January 1551-2) to St. John's Day 1 Queen Mary (24th June 1554), and the costs, including journeys to London "as also for moneys paid the Town Collectors Clerk," amounted to £144. 18. 6. These extracts are from copies of letters in the "Church Burgess Election Book," see page 6.

Sheffield called the Burgesses." An Obit or Devout Obit was a funeral rite. A Dirge or Dirige was a lament or funeral hymn, which began "Dirige Dominus meus." A Placebo was also a funeral hymn, "Placebo Domino in regione vivorum." The Dirge came to mean the Morning Service for the dead; the Placebo, the Evening Service; and the Requiem was the Mass. See "Piers Plowman," edited by Skeat.

Notes: From this we may gather that the houses in Sheffield, at this time, were roofed with straw thatch and built probably of stone and mortar.

An Alphabetical List of all persons owning moveable goods and personal property in Sheffield and Handsworth, when a tax of one-ninth of their value was granted to Edward I, in the 25th year of his reign, to enable him to continue the wars with France and Scotland. The original Rolls are at the Public Record Office, and are indexed "Exchequer Lay Subsidies Yorks. W.R. 206." These Yorkshire Lay Subsidies were printed in 1894 by The Yorkshire Archæological Society, in its "Record Series" vol. xvi, from which this list is compiled.

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
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
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
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
