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Here ends what has been audaciously denominated Shakspere's library. The first folio edition of Shakspeare, which is curious in consequence of an extra proof sheet, was purchased by Dr. Raine, of the Charter-house, for 141. 145.

The forgeries exhibited in Norfolk Street were bought in for the family at 130*l*. Mr. Blake, of the Commons, was the powerful competitor.

Mr. Malone's able inquiry into the authenticity of the papers attributed to Shakspere, in consequence of the late Mr. Ireland's marginal remarks, sold for 5*l*. Mr. Waldron was the purchaser.

Mr. H. Ireland's authentic account of the Shaksperian manuscript, merely because it was a presentation copy from the author to his affectionate father, sold for 11. 163.

At this curious sale were assembled all the eminent literary characters and antiquarians in the coun ry. We have merely enumerated its leading features, and the above list of books is principally confined to the suppositious library of Shakspere.

DIVISION OF WOMEN'S CHARACTERS.

ALL female characters in tragedy require, without exception, actresses of a noble and dignified deportment. They consist of queens, princesses, or ladies of the highest rank. I shall divide them into four classes.

A HINT TO ACTORS.

BY THE GREAT MR. BETTERTON.

THOUGH I am of opinion (says Mr Betterton) that the decay of the stage is in great measure owing to the long continuance of the war, yet, I confess, I am afraid, that too much is derived from the defects of the stage itself. When I was a young player, under Sir William Davenant, we were under a much better discipline; we were obliged to make our study our business, which our young men do not think it their duty now to do; for they now scarce ever mind a word of their parts, but only at rehearsals, and come thither too often scarce recovered from their last night's debauch, when the mind is not very capable of considering so calmly and judiciously what they have to study, as to enter thoroughly into the nature of the part, or to consider the variation of the voice, looks, and gestures, which should give them their true beauty; many of them thinking the making a noise renders them agreeable to the audience, because a few of the upper-gallery clap the loud efforts of their lungs, in which their understanding had no share. They think it a superfluous trouble to study real excellence, which might rob them of what they fancy more, midnight, or indeed whole night's debauches, and a lazy remissness in their business.

Another obstacle to the improvement of our young players, is, that when they have not been admitted above a month or two into a company, though their education and former business were never so foreign to acting, they vainly imagine themselves masters of that art, which, perfectly to attain, requires a studious application of a man's whole life. They take it, therefore, amiss, to have the author
