GREEK COINS. SILVER.

[The sizes given are according to the American scale.]

- 1. An early Didrachm of Macedonia; obv. female head, surrounded by dolphins; rev. winged figure, seated on the Diota; well preserved and rare.
- 2. Didrachin of Crotona in Achaia; the symbol is a tripod; an incused coin, in good preservation.
- 3. Didrachm of Tarentum; the founder of the city on a dolphin, Victory erowning him; rev. a horseman; extremely fine.
- 4. Same as last, Taras on the dolphin, carrying a vase; rev. similar to last; very fine.
- 5. A similar coin, the sun on the field behind the son of Neptune, ex. fine.
- 6. A variety of the same coin, fine.
- 7. Achaia, B.C. 280; head of Jupiter; rev. wreath enclosing a monogram.
- 8. Athens; head of Pallas, facing right; rev. large owl, at full face; size 18.
- 9. Athens; head of Pallas to right; rev. owl, full-face, olive branch and inscription; very fine indeed, size 16.
- 10. Athens; same type as the last two, size 6, very fine.
- 11. Neapolis; head facing right; rev. a mask; size 10.
- 12. Syracuse; female head facing right, surrounded by dolphins; rev. Biga, and horses; an exceedingly rare type, size 17.
- 13. Thurium; head to right, with helmet; rev. a bull, a fish below; very fine indeed, size 14.

- 14. Archelaus; obv. a lion's head; rev. a horse and rider; a fair specimen of a very rare coin, size 10.
- 15. Philip II., head; rev. a horseman; size 9.
- 16. Philip II.; similar to last, size 9.
- 17. Alexander the Great; head of Hereules with the Lion's skin; rev. Jupiter seated, with inscription; a splendid coin, size 19.
- 18. Ptolemy II.; portrait to right; rev. an eagle facing left; fine, size 16.
- 19. Antiochus IV.; fine portruit to right; rev. Jupiter seated, exceedingly fine and of large size, being 22 by the seale.
- 20. Demetrius Soter; fine portrait in very high relief, with diadem and surrounded by a wreath; rev. female scated on a throne, with horn of plenty, with inscription BASILEOS DEMETRIOU SOTEROS; a coin remarkably fine and well spread, size 22.
- 21. Demetrius I.; different type from the last, but equally fine, size 20.
- 22. Large Copper of Ptolemy Soter; rev. an eagle standing; in fair condition.
- 23. Extra large and fine Copper of Ptolemy II.; rev. two eagles standing on a thunderbolt; rare.

ROMAN COINS. SILVER.

- 24. Denarius of the Julian Family; obv. a female head; rev. Æneas earrying his father Anchises from Troy, with the Palladium; fair, very rare.
- 25. Two Denarii, one with the head of Saturn, the other of Rome: family coins, fine, two pieces.
- 26. Two Denarii of Angustus; rev. a bull: another, female standing, holding a lyre: both very desirable coins, well preserved.
- 27. Galba, portrait; rev. a Biga; rare type, false.
- 28. Denarius of Vespasian, fine: and one of Trajan, extremely fine; two pieces.

124. Henry VIII. Henric VIII., Testoon, bust at full-face with erown; rev. a crowned rose, with the letters H. R., a small piece broken from the side. The Testoon of Henry VIII. is very rare.

125. Edward VI. Edward VI. D. G. Agl. Fra., &c., Sixpence, bust full-face, erowned, in Parliament robes; rev. royal arms, m. m. a tun; in good order, very scarce.

126. Mary. Maria D. G. Ang. Fra., &c., Groat, bust crowned, flowing hair, neeklace with cross; rev. Veritas temporis filia, royal arms with cross; very beautiful and rare.

127. Mary. Maria, &c., Groat, same type as the last, nearly or quite as fine.

128. Mary. Maria, &c., Groat, good condition, rare.

129. Philip and Mary. Base Shilling, busts of the king and queen crowned, date below the bust, 1555; rev. harp between the letters P. and M., harp and letters crowned; good and very rare.

130. Philip and Mary Shilling, same as last, not quite as good.

131. Philip and Mary, another Shilling, about like the last.

132. ELIZABETH. Shilling, crowned bust with ruff; rev. royal arms, m. m. a bell; very good, scarce.

Liber Par. xx., date 1642, below. The original of this piece is of the most extreme rarity, and copies are seldom met with.

- 152. St. Patrick's Half-Penny in silver. Obv. King David playing on a harp; rev. St. Patrick expelling vermin from Ireland; fine, and in silver of great rarity.

- 153. Charles II. Hammered Money, Half-Crown, Carolys II. D. G., &c., profile bust in armor, erowned, with numerals XXX. behind the head, m. m. Crown; rev. Christo Avspice, &c., the royal arms quartered on a shield; very fine and extremely rare.
- 154. Charles II. Crown, laureated bust to the left; rev. four erowned escuteheons, with a thistle in each angle; good and very searce.
- 155. Charles II. *Pattern* for a Shilling; obv. bust, an elephant beneath, the neck bare, with a flowing lock brought forward on the left shoulder.

[The obv. of this coin differs from all other silver coins of this reign; on all the rest the bust of the king is draped. Coined from silver brought in by the African company, as indicated by the elephant beneath the bust. Only two or three specimens of this coinage are known to exist. This is in very fair condition, though not fine.]

- 156. Charles II. Pattern Farthing, in silver, laureated bust facing left, with date 1665 below; rev. Britannia represented by a portrait of Frances Stuart; very fine and very rare.
- 157. Charles II. Pattern Farthing "Quatuor," &c., in silver, good and very rare.
- 158. James II. Gun Money, Pattern Piece for a Shilling, struck in silver, head to left laureated; rev. a crown between the letters J. R., inscribed MAG. BR. FRA. ET. HIB. REX., 1690, XII.; almost proof and very rare.

- 160. William and Mary. Groat, a Pattern Piece, busts facing left; rev. a crown with M. and W. interlinked, below 1694; very fine and rare.

FOREIGN SILVER COINS.

- 227. Crown or Medal, struck to celebrate the centenary anniversary of the Augsburg Confession. It bears the bust of "Johannes, 1530, 25 June;" and on the reverse side that of "John George, 1630, 25 June." Both of these princes are shown to the waist, in the costume of the day and armed; in extremely fine condition, and very rare.
- 228. A Coin, crown size, of John George, Duke of Saxony, struck in 1622. It is of the value of 60 Krs., very curious; in very good condition.


