#### FOREWORD

Richard Cyril Lockett was born in 1873 and died May 23rd, 1950. As stated in the foreword to the catalogue of his English coins (Part I) sold in June of this year, from 1906 to 1920 he confined his collecting to the coinage of the British Isles, but in 1920 the catalogue of the famous Pozzi collection of Greek coins appealed to him so strongly that he decided to secure a great many pieces from it as a foundation upon which to build the magnificent collection he eventually formed. This collection has since become famed throughout the world, largely through the publication by the British Academy of the "Sylloge Nummorum Graecorum", Volume II, The Lockett Collection, Parts I to V, where the gold, electrum and silver pieces are so ably described by Doctor E. S. G. Robinson, C.B.E. It should be stressed here that some of his finest pieces are noted in the Addenda at the end of Part V.

It was intended to publish a Sylloge of his wonderful collection of autonomous and Imperial Greek bronze, but this project had to be abandoned owing to the greatly increased costs of production after the War, but the coins are now included in the sale and to give serious students the opportunity of securing them, many fine series, which took Mr. Lockett many years to form, have been put into lots intact.

A large proportion of the gold, electrum and silver pieces, and some of the bronze, came from famous collections such as Bement; Benson; British Museum Duplicates; Bunbury; Côte; Sir Arthur Evans; Montagu; Pozzi; Weber and many others. Pedigrees have been given and in most cases refer to fairly recent times, but earlier sources can often be traced by referring back to the catalogues and literature relative to the earlist pedigree given.

Weights have not been included in this catalogue as a complete list, for the benefit of students of various weight-systems, already exists in the

Sylloge.

Coins to be sold singly will be found illustrated on the fine series of 38 plates at the end of the catalogue. Where two or more coins are sold

together, an illustration of each coin can be found in the Sylloge.

A few cases occur where the Sylloge number is not added in small type after the lot number; this happens where coins were purchased after the publication of the Sylloge, or, in a very few cases, where Mr. Lockett exchanged a coin already published for a finer specimen.

For the special benefit of collectors unable to examine the coins before the sale, the degrees of condition and references to minor details of striking,

or slight blemish, have been noted as carefully as possible.

In this first part of the Greek Series now to be sold there are so many splendid pieces, both for condition and rarity, that to enumerate them all would make a very long list, so, with the exception of such quite outstanding pieces as Lot 291 (Sylloge No. 405), Metapontum gold third-stater; Lot 725 (Sylloge No. 843), Naxos tetradrachm; Lot 889 (Sylloge No. 987), Syracuse dekadrachm, early dies by Kimon; Lot 891 (Sylloge No. 3518), Syracuse dekadrachm, later dies by Kimon; and Lot 895 (Sylloge No. 991), Syracuse dekadrachm by Evaenetus, it is thought best to let intending purchasers study the catalogue. Particular attention must be drawn, however, to the remarkably fine series of coins of Neapolis, Tarentum, Metapontum, Thurium, Velia, Croton, Rhegium, Agrigentum, Camarina, Catania, Gela, Leontini. Messana, Naxos, Selinus, Syracuse and the Siculo-Punic issues, all of which are strongly represented and in a great many cases by extremely fine and rare specimens.
