Join Them Files

One of our members wanted to join two or more files together into one big one and couldn't find an easy QDOS command that would do that. I couldn't either. (See the CATS N/L, Jan 1989, p. 4 for an earlier discussion.) MS-DOS allows one to append one file to another (concatenate) just by putting "+"s between names:

```
COPY FLA.ASC + FLB.ASC FLC.ASC
```

This statement causes file "FLA.ASC" to be copied to "FLC.ASC" and then "FLB.ASC" to be appended to it. There are a number of "switches", and wildcard file descriptions that may be used - check with a good MS-DOS manual. Since QDOS doesn't work that way, what can we do?

For one thing we could open a new file into which we want to join the others, open the source files in turn, and repeatedly INPUT strings from source and PRINT strings to the receiving file. We repeat this process until each file "PRINT"ed to the end, and then CLOSE all the files. For example, if we had two files with lists of names, Relatives.lis and Friends.lis that we wanted to combine into All.lis, on a second microdrive, the following should work:

```
10 OPEN NEW #8,MDV2 All.lis
20 OPEN IN #5,MDV1 Relatives.lis
30 OPEN IN #6,MDV1 Friends.lis
40 REPEAT loop_a
50 INPUT #5,x$
60 PRINT #8,x$
70 IF EOF(#5) THEN EXIT loop_a
80 END REPEAT loop_a
90 REPEAT loop_b
100 INPUT #6,x$
110 PRINT #8,x$
120 IF EOF(#6) THEN EXIT loop_b
130 END REPEAT loop_b
140 CLOSE #5: CLOSE #6: CLOSE #8
```

SPL Relative.lis

This program segment will work properly if the lis files have lines, that is, if the line-feed character is present, CHR\$(10). The line length must be shorter than the QL allows, and the file must end with a line-feed. Without a line-feed at the file-end, some bytes may not be copied, and the program stops with an error message. This can be corrected if we copy byte by byte, i. e., replace 50 & 60 and 100 & 110, each with a single line.

```
50 PRINT #8,INKEY$(#5)
100 PRINT #8,INKEY$(#6)
```

Is there an easier way? Yes, there is, if you have Tebby's Toolkit II. The procedure uses the background spooler that he provides, started with the SPL command, entered as:

```
SPL name_1 TO name_2
```

The typical use would be to spool a file to a printer, e. g.:

```
SPL Friends_lis, ser1
```

Note that the comma may be used instead of TO. The spooler is then started as a separate job, and copies the file to ser1 - it is suspended if the device is in use. In other words, you may have the QL print files while you multitask another program. But, you must be careful to avoid closing or opening ser1 at the same time - odd things may occur. If name_2 is a filename, e. g. flp2>All (or just All, for the default drive), the name_1 is copied over the file "All" and the old file lost. If no "All" is on the drive the spooler creates it. Tebby provides a SPL USE command to set-up a default destination, e. g., first:

```
SPL_USE ser1
```

then

TK2, other toolkits may have the will copy file "Relative_lis" to ser1 and stop when it is finished.

Under one method, SPL may be used to join files, although Tebby doesn't make that clear in his manual. The commands are:

```
SPL #channel_x to #channel_z
```

then

```
SPL #channel_y to #channel_z
```

Channels x and y must be from files opened for input and z must

be for a file opened for output. If all these files are closed ("CLOSE"), the file opened as z will be as long as the sum of those from x and y. To illustrate this the following program was written to concatenate 5 files named, tst1, tst2, etc.

```
100 b=FOP NEW('trial')
110 FOR i= 1 TO 5
120   a=FOP_IN('tst!&i)

I hope that all of this will let you join those files, if not, I have written a SBasic program, all Babbage'd up (Herb Schaaf's term) that will do the joining for you. Just ask, I can give you a copy.

Finally, for those interested enough to get this far, I discovered some quirks and bugs in the SPL and SPL USE commands. First, these apply only to Tebby's same commands, that might work differently. In no particular order, I list some quirks or bugs that I found. To illustrate, channels 3 and 4 represent files opened for input, while 5 is one for output.

1. Joining files also works as follows:

```
SPL tst1 TO #5
```

then

```
SPL tst2 TO #5
```

But, SPL #3 TO All, will just overwrite "All".

2. The command:

```
SPL_USE #5
```

does not result in an error message until you try SPL tst1, then QDOS reports: "Bad Name".

3. If the receiving file is opened, e. g.: OPEN #5, All, then

SPL tst1 TO All

gives an error of "In use", but if you first, SPL USE All, then OPEN #5, All, and finally,

SPL tst1

no error is reported and the spooler writes over whatever is at the beginning of the file, but leaves the remainder intact!

4. If #5 is closed during the spooling (SPL #3 TO #5), an error results, but some garbage is also written to the channel (maybe 40 bytes or so).

If you find anymore quirks, or tricks to avoid the problems, let me know.

ICEHOUSE Lives

Three Decembers ago CATS witnessed a demonstration of a new board game called ICEHOUSE.

It had been developed by four University of Maryland/College Park graduates who found themselves working at NASA in Greenbelt.

The four originators who gave the demonstration were: Andy and Kristin Looney, John Cooper, and Charles Dickson III.

In the intervening time, ICEHOUSE became incorporated and a U.S. Patent (#4,936,585) was obtained.

ICEHOUSE remains a boardless board game that can be played on any flat surface almost anywhere. Small colorful pyramids make up the pieces which are played in any sequence desired.

Scoring is accomplished at the end of a game, at which time the positions and relationships of the pyramids translate into points.

ICEHOUSE has thus far been unable to find a big-time buyer for its product, but is still hopeful. An interim set of ICEHOUSE pieces has been produced using wood dyed to resemble the first colorful sets poured from acrylics. It was the acrylic sets that several members of CATS acquired after the demonstration three years ago.

Next Memorial Day weekend will see the fourth annual international ICEHOUSE tournament at the Sheraton Hotel in New Carrollton (also famous as the site of the CATS' 1989 COMPUTER-FEST). Players from all skill levels will be welcome. For information contact:

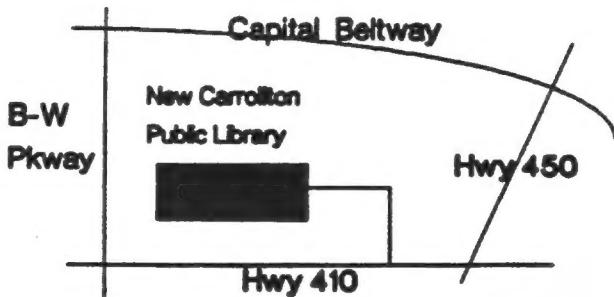
