Un Zippy Thoughts H.L. Schaaf March 14, 1994

CATS has a collection of ZIPped files, so folks might want to know how to go about the unzipping process. I had 8 disks full of files ending in "_zip" along with one executable file named "UnZip22" and a 10 page manual in the file "zip22_readme_txt". I ended up with 20 disks of unzipped files! How did I do it? Read on.

I found that a semicolon is important, as well as a pair of quotation marks (either single or double quotes will do).

from SuperBasic:

tk2_ext (to invoke Toolkit II)

- prog_use ram1_
- data_use flp1_ (I used flp1_ for the disks with the _zip files. (source), flp2_ was for the disks to hold the unzipped files. (destination)

copy the 'UnZip22' file into ram1_

- put a disk with _zip files in flp1_
- dir [ENTER] this shows the filenames, choose one that ends in _zip
- ex unzip22;"-1 filename" [ENTER] (that's a lowercase letter L after the minus sign. you don't need to include the _zip extension as part of the filename.)

This gives you a list of the files that were zipped up, which is what you'll have if you decide to unzip them. You may want to try a 'v' instead of the the '-l' for more gory details. Try it! O.K. so now you have an idea of what's there.

To unzip it I used:

ex unzip22;"-Dflp2_flp1_filename" [ENTER]

The '-D' means you have to tell it explicitly where to put the unzipped files (in this case to flp2_) and where to look for the zipped files (in this case flp1_).

This is the bare bones version to get you

started. You can imagine how altkeys and clipboard/requester menu combinations would be useful.

Sometime when you are fresh and mentally alert you can plow through the 10 page manual and discover the marvelous array of options and features available. When you do, please tell us about them!

For \$8.95, you get a bare (uncased) 2400 baud Hayes compatible modem. For \$1.50 you get the 12 volt power supply necessary to run it. 

Patterson does not emphasize this curse of civilization as much as he should have.
