Telecommunicating in Far Off Places

As I write this, I am in Saudi Arabia. My work takes me here, but my free time lets me explore my other interests. One of which, as most readers of this will know, is computers.

I had hoped to use E-mail as a primary mode of communication between Saudia and the US, but that hasn't panned out. I subscribed to CompuServe, after getting a download from them that showed access numbers for Saudi Arabia. It turned out that the numbers given were a cross between two alternate third party network services. One required a \$1500 deposit for applicants (they were burned by many reporters during the Gulf war), and the other was a government agency that has been hard to hook up with.

I have been using the computer to reach the states, however. By using a FAX/MODEM, I can send hard copy to almost anywhere - from the office of my employer here to the desk of the captain of the ship where I volunteer. It has proven to be fast and reliable, allowing far more communication in five minutes of connect time than 20 minutes of voice contact. In addition, it frees me from "world time" concerns - I FAX when I please, and my recipients pick it up at their leisure.

In the process of tracking the satellite network connection down, however, I came across Mr. Fahad. He is the owner of Waseet Computers (as opposed to Alwaseet, the government network provider), and, as a hobby, runs a BBS with~1500 subscribers. He re-affirmed my difficulties in connecting out of the country. He is

providing simulated outside contact for his members by hooking up CD's holding core dumps from Compuserve conferences. This provides a database of mail for his subscribers to browse in.

Like many new endeavors in this country, his BBS setup is BIG. The database he has hooked up is reputedly numerous GigaBytes (I haven't read through it, I'm afraid). Here is a list of the catagories of programs "in stock:"
