## DUES SLASHEDII

In January, the Executive Committee agreed to present to the membership a proposal by Acting President C.H. (Hank) Dickson that current dues be lowered.

At the General Meeting, the membership discussed the proposal thoroughly.

The final decision was to reduce annual dues for the next twelve months from $\$ 18$ to $\$ 15$. Newsletter subscriptions would continue to be $\$ 12$ annually.

The main purpose of the reduction was to stop penalizing current members for a dues structure which historically has been too high.

Treasurer Barry Washington cautioned that based on his experience the past six months, income has not been keeping up with expenditures.

The participants in the diccussion agreed that, to keep a high level of solvency, occasional new members plus an improved level of renewals will be needed. The new dues structure will hopefully encourage both.

Those who may have already renewed in December (an usually heavy month) or before January 13, 1990 at the $\$ 18$ rate will have their anniversary date extended two months (1/6 of a year) as a matter of equity.

JOHN CONGER, former CATS president, is moving on to greater things. He therefore brought his large collection of Sinclair items to the New Carrollton Branch Library to donate to the club.

MARK FISHER, also a former president, asked the Executive Committee if he could auction the items off, with the proceeds going to a $\$ 50$ software item he needs for the BBS on the Kaypro 10.

The answer was an enthusiastic "yes".

A large part of the business meeting was absorbed by the auction. Items that went under the auctioneer's gavel included books, documents, TS $1000^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, TS $1500^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, TS 2068's, printers, modems, memory packs, power supplies---the whole array. fraud? Maybe so, probably not. As a rule these publications are sidelines, rather than the primary sources of income, therefore their existence is tenuous at best. A host of problems can prevent the editor from getting an issue out. These operations usually are thinly capitalized and are started because thefounder has an interest in the computer and not necessarily because he has good business sense. With a subscriber base that is either dwindling or does not get enough initial subscribers, the founder valiantly tries to go ahead anyway. A businessman would close up shop and return the subscription money, but these folks aren't in it for the money. They want to get the info to you. So they get in over their heads and just quietly go under. Is this fraud? I think not. In the light of some of the real frauds the Sinclair community has experienced, Quantum Computing and Foundation Systems (which got me for $\$ 300$ ), even if it were fraud it would be small potatoes. Do I think somebody ought to be able to start a publication, take subscription money, then fold it without returningthe money. Certainly not. I just think everything ought to be put in perspective. End of Bus Ad 101 lecture.

To David Harman I wish good health and prosperity. Why? Because, if the venal attitude he displayed toward Tim Wood(s) is indicative of his treatment of others, when he has problems everyone is going to sit on the shore and laugh while he drowns.

## QUELLING CRAZY QUILL

by Sheldon S. Gilbert

Nobody says Quill is the world's greatest word processing program, but it does come with the QL and it is almost a WYSIWYG program. It can drive you crazy if you try to do anything much more than produce a simple letter and even there it requires a special technique (changing the indent margin to match the left margin for block format or stopping and resetting the indent margin after the salutation for indented paragraph format.)
Pagination In Headers and Footers

If you are writing a long manuscript, such as a book, a peculiar thing happens when you reach page 208. Neither the header nor footer will print if you designate a page for the printer to start in the printer command. That is, the header and footer will print in their proper places if you press "F3, P, enter, enter, enter" but if you press "F3, P, enter, 208, enter, enter, enter" the text will print but neither the header nor the footer will print out. This will happen even if the manuscript is only one page. If you must start printing at a designated page number either break the manusript up so that the desired starting page is the first page of the document, enter that page number as the "Start page" of the Design menu and press "F3,P. enter, enter, enter ${ }^{\text {" }}$, or assign a lower number page in the design menu and include the desired hundreds digit as part of the text of the header or footer. Example: To have the header and footer print "page 210". Set Start Page on the design menu to 10. Set the header and the footer to read "page $2 n n n$." Now either"F3, P, enter, enter, enter" or "F3, P, enter, 10 (or 11 or whatever), enter, enter, enter" will work. When you reach page 255 you will have no choice. Neither the header nor the footer will paginate above page 254. If you want page 255 or above to be printed in a header or footer you must use the technique given in the example no matter what instructions you give to the print command.

Special Format Using Double and Single Spacing

Many publications expect the first page of an article, story or book to have information such as the author's name, address, telephone number and social security number single spaced in the upper left hand corner of the first page. Other information such as the number of words and legal rights offered for sale goes in the upper right hand corner. The title of the piece starts about half-way down the page and everything after that is double spaced. A header with the name of the author and the page number appears on the second page and on all following pages. It takes a couple of steps to set up Quill to do this. First, put the first page on the screen as you would want it to appear on paper. Second, hit "F3" then "O" (not zero) and then "P". This brings up the forced page break menu. Set the cursor on the last line of the title and hit "P" again. Then "Enter" to escape from the Page menu. Make a note of the line number. Third, turn off the footer (or if your printer configuration is like mine and prints an extra letter when set on "none" and you haven't got aroundtoreconfiguring, set Footer at"Centre", push "Enter" and then erase everything so the line is blank.Then set the footer margin to " 0 ".) Fourth, Press "F3" and then " $D$ " to access the Design Menu. Set "Gap" to "0" (zero) and "Start page" at " 0 ". Count the number of lines in the Upper Margin (I use 2 or less), add them to the cursor line number you just noted and set the "Page length" to the result. Fifth, Press "F3" and "P" for Print. When "whole" appears in the print instruction line press " 0 " and when "to end" appears press " 0 " again and enter. The printer should print the information at the top of the page, move down to the middle of the page, then stop after printing the title. Sixth, if the document is to be only one page go back to the Design menu ("F3" then "D"), set "Gap" to "1", "Start Page" to "1", "Upper Margin" to " 0 " and make "Page length" long enough to finish the page (I set mine at 60). Print with "whole" in the printer command changed to " 1 ". If there is more than one page the procedure is only a little more complicated. The first five steps are
exactly the same. The only settings that need be changed in the sixth step are the "Gap" to "1", the "Upper Margin" to " 0 ", and the "Page Length." For the second page and following pages, reset the header to the left and provide a desired header message and header margin. Retum to the design menu and insert the "Upper Margin" that you desire. Go back to the text and force a page break at the end of the last line that has been printed on page 1. Change "whole" in the print command to " 2 ". An alternative to the procedure given for a multi-page document is to print the title and text first and then go back, put the paper back into the printer or rewind the platten and insert the special single spaced info at the top of the first page.

It may be useful to keep a record of the various settings that you use in the design menu. I find it useful to hide these in either the unused footer line or in the header line, taking them out before the header (which for me is always the same "Gilbert-nnn") is activated. Thus, if the document need be retyped in the future all the information is ready and waiting. F4 and the TYPEFACE FUNCTION

The use of the "F4" typeface function can be daunting. Using "Shift F4" to toggle between "Overwrite" and "Insert" modes is easy enough and simple underlining by using "F4" followed by "U" normally doesn't present too much of a problem. Difficulties sometimes arise when using the "Paint", "Bold", "High" and "Low" typeface modes. You suddenly find yourself in a mode and don't know how to get out. No problem. To get out of one of the typeface modes simply repeat what you did to get into it. So if you are in high type made simply press " F 4 " and " H " and you will be back to normal. This applies to any of the "F4" procedures. (The HELP information is pretty clear on this, but who remembers to look at HELP?) With this in mind, a sentance such as,"Water or wasser, H 2 O , is essential to human life $.26^{\prime \prime}$ becomes a piece of cake. The tricky thing is that Quill will put youin the
