CATS Sees PASCAL and QL Network

A lesson on PASCAL programing—using networked QL computers—was the special treat provided attendees at the June CATS meeting.

DUANE PARKER brought together a tremendous presentation on the intricacies of networking software, coupled with a view of the inherent beauty of the PASCAL language.

Participants in this unique affair included:

1. Duane Parker, whose QL and floppy-disk drive were the file-server for the network.

2. Herb Schaaf

3. Hank Dickson, with Tom Bent's TRUMP card.

4. Dick Parker

5. Mark Fisher

6. Bill Barnhardt

7. Richard Roseen

With Duane Parker's tutorial on using QL PASCAL, CATS members were able to view the little-recognized but still potent networking capabilities of the QL. No additional network hardware is needed for the QL—it performs the basic network functions using the "network-in" and "network-out" miniature jacks in the back of the machine. Enabling software, however, is needed from a package such as Tony Tebby's TOOLKIT.

For a network using PASCAL, all participants were encouraged to have

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Tebby's TOOLKIT package available on a TRUMP card, or other interface card. This arrangement was necessary because the PASCAL compiler requires a plug-in EPROM. Other network applications would not need this special arrangement.

VSLETTER

About an hour of intense activity was needed to set up a seven-member network. Duane's QL and quad-density floppy-disk drive acted as file-server for the operation. The network was defined through boot programs in both the file-server and each QL, which assigned numbers to each of the stations (two through seven).

When Richard Roseen was added to the network after it was already operating, there was no great disruption. It did, however, take some fast footwork on the part of the network manager, Duane Parker, to blend him in.

Duane proceeded to show the networkers how to handle directories, broadcast files, and run programs from another QL. Slides for the workshop were shown by "broadcasting" a SuperBASIC program for each slide over the network.

Two problems surfaced during the exercises:

1. The command NF_USE, from the TOOLKIT package, did not work when used with a TRUMP card. Used with TOOLKIT in a ROM, it worked.

2. During the PASCAL session, QL PASCAL's limit on length of file names caused a problem. Shortening the file names a little relieved the congestion.

The PASCAL training took up the bulk

FROM THE EDITOR

For good reason because the machine was just plain unreliable. Almost all of us have had a QL go sour, sort of like a "computer rites of passage." There's nothing as chilling as seeing your display go wavy, then green, and then white and knowing that you should have saved that two hours worth of work when you thought of it several minutes ago but were just too busy! OL folks get into the habit very early of backing up their data often. So we had a great machine that only ran a short time. Enter hardware gurus like Tom Bent and, after 3 years, and many fixes later our machines could run forever, the only problem was that the screw holes were stripped out from being removed so many times!

We are now at the point envisioned by Mark Fisher a year or so back, ready to explore programming and various programming languages on the QL. When you come to think of it, this is where we HAVE to be. Commercial software support for the OL has never been great, but in the past, what was there was adequate. As the number of software houses with QL products shrinks, we will have to provide our own support and who better than ourselves can determine what we need? So throw your QL in your backpack and come to the hardware session at the August meeting to partake of Part Two of Duane Parker's PASCAL class.

Upload QL! (or BBS)

Last month Vernon published an off-hand listing adapted from an autodial program I had written for the 1000. The intent was to provide for a way to transmit ASCII listings from the 1000 to our other machines. I've done some further

> fooling around on that score hut nothing publishable. There are

several problems. The 1000 won't merge programs,

so any BASIC devoted to the uploading must either be laboriously typed in each time, or stored above ramtop via some kluge or other. In addition, a BASIC program needs two levels of translation to be readable by other machines-the tokens must be expanded, and all characters must be translated into ASCII.

I've been able to do the expanding part, thanks to Dave Wood's book and a ROM call, but there seems to be some interference between the list-line-to screen routine and my out-115 and out-119

routines. As l develop more info, I'll put it on the **BBS.** Any other thoughts would be welcomed. I guess that the goal would be a short program, probably m/c, that would dump



an ASCII listing out the modem, rather than the printer.

I've been told that the Public Domain 1000 modem programs (such as mini-Xmod) will successfully do this, but I haven't seen them. Any info?

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Eudaemonic Pie (A book)

by Thomas Bass 1985, Houghton Mifflin

One of the attractions of microcomputers is that anything seems possible. From the blue-sky, frivilous ideas such as my plan to coounterattack the coomputer-sales calls by taping a battery powered TS1000 and MODEM to a telephone pole, programmed to call THEM continuously, to the blue boxes that used public information to open the doors of the international phone system, to the common hacker that wrote CPM so he could get reliable information flow in his machine, the

computer has acted as a magic wand to make dreams real. What more likely target for computer hacking that a City that is devoted to dreams?

In this case the dreams were of wealth and

independence from the normal grind. The city was Las Vegas - and the computer's role as a magic wand was to allow a player to PREDICT roulette. The players in this drama were much like people you've met at CATS. Coming to electronics from physics, and motivated by a mix between the early seventies reaction to the war machine and a late seventies awareness of the power of the computer, they realized that they could make use of their knowledge to earn enough money to break free of DOD contracts.

At this point, I should tell you that this is a true story. The author was a sometime member of the group that spent four years developing the theory and practice of computer-powered roulette prediction. Other members of the group were major players in Chaos theory, as mentioneed in last month's review. In fact, the work on the roulette computer project served in part as a finishing school that prepared them to tackle chaos theory. The title of the book came from the incorporated name for their group, Eudaemonic Enterprises. The Eudaemon is the good demon that rewards contemplation for the ancient Greeks.

In contrast to Chaos theory, roulette prediction is a "straight foreward" application of classical mechanics. Given the initial speed of the wheel and the ball, and the frictional losses of each, it is possble to name within eight pockets which point the ball will end up in. The complications lie in carrying it out, and in a very hostile environment. The Mafia doesn't like to give too much of its money back. The computer that could predict roulette would have to be concealable, flexible, and fast. The final model was based on a CMOS 8085 CPU,

independent bettor. The computer itsen was encapsulated in wax, and hidden in the soles of three shoes. The book chronkcles the growth of the

group that nurtured this idea, and the trials and byways of its development. As literature, it suffers from the nontechnically literate author's gee-whiz reaction to many of the technical details. At the same time, he is good at producing vivid portraits of the individuals that put so much of their soul into the project.

What happened? Well, remember it took several years of their young adulthood. Basically, by the time the hardware was finally ready, they had grown up enough to realize that there were better ways to spend their lives than in 24 hour palaces to venality, surrounded by whores and gangsters. The players went on to find new ways to open physics to the real world.

A Menu Driven Selection Program

Some utilities are used time and again in one's computer operations. Each of us has our favorite utilities. This program presents a menu program which will allow easy selection from a group of these utility programs residing at the bottom of memory. It is a defined procedure which calls a number of other procedures. These other procedures are your choice utilities. For illustrive purposes, a few such procedures are included in the program listing.

A call to this program can be put in your boot routine to provide an automatic initialization with the menu. Arrow keys or number keys will move you about the menu in the normal fashion. Keying ENTER on the desired highlighted strip will obtain the desired utility. Some utilities can return you to the menu. Study the code to see how it can be modified to your needs.

The screen dimensions shown in the program are for use on a RGB monitor. A TV would use a screen 455x200 instead of 511x255 with appropiate offsets to center it. The menu selection code is contained in the first 87 lines of the program. Blanks are critical only in the two lines containing START and STOP and may need to be changed to fit your screen. The first six procs are original to me. The others are modifications of code from various sources.


