PROGRAM REVIEW

The 2068:A System
Overview
Past, Present, and Future
by Hank Dickson

JOB W. MILLER, longtime CATS member, Corresponding Secretary. and curator of the CATS tape library, was the main speaker at the October meeting. His topic revolved around the capabilities of the ever-surprising Timex/Sinclair 2068 color computer. Joe's presentation was well-organized, informative, and conveyed a keen historical insight into the saga behind this little machine. Following is a digest of some of the points Joe made. Sadly, the newsletters announcing this event were not mailed until after the meeting, so a prime event may have slipped by many members.

JOE's OBSERVATIONS: By Joe W. Miller

Possibily the saddest item in this chronology and the one which contributed the most to the demise of the 2068 was the inopportune timing of the release of the T/S 1500. The market was already beginning to be flooded by low-end home computers. Adding another entry only served to confuse the public and dilute Timex's already chaotic marketing efforts. In the long run, the results might have been the same, but the 2068 should been given a fighting chance at the start.

On a happier note, there's a lot of truth to the statement that adding a floppy disk drive to a 2068 turns it into a real computer. Of the 3rd party interfaces (I/F's) around today for the

Regulars like Hank Dickson and Mark Fisher continue to submit articles almost every month on a variety of topics. I am deeply greatful to them.

Watch Uncle Clive closely. He is always out ahead of the pack in the practical applications of the new technologies. Guess what the new Atari pocket computer, the Portfolio, uses for data storage? You got it, EPROMS. Want a laugh? Listen to their ads and you will think that they were the first to do so.

To meet the challenges of the next few years (increasingly older machines and a shrinking pool of potential members), we will have to be skillful at communicating externally; however, we need to raise the level of internal communication, before we take our show on the road.

It is up to the Board to set an example for the group to follow. I know you can do it.

Tabloid Catalog Review: John's Picks

Published by Microcomputer Applications P.O. Box E, Suisun, CA 94585 (707) 422-1465 \$5,00/3 issues

A few months back I wrote of several books that reached into various areas of microcomputer interest. My recent reading list has centered on other areas, but I recieved the above tabloid in the mail a few weeks ago. As part of the annual Christmas snowfall of catalogs that keeps the Post Office in business. John's Picks stands out as a unique and thorough source of books on the current cutting edge of science.

All CATS members have a more than average interest in the engineering side of life. A large percentage ARE engineers, while almost all others have some background in the hard sciences. For such a person, catalogs such as Lillian Vernon have little appeal. But what about a catalog that lists 14 books on chaos on one page?

John's Picks is such a catalog. Most products are books - but there are IBM programs prints, CD's, and various knick knacks as well. Subjects covered incude Escher, Chaos, Fractals, Quantum Mechanics, MIDI, parallel processing, graphics, and hardware design (for starters). Each item is given a short review/blurb, which includes a warning if the book requires advanced knowledge to be of interest.

In short, I'd recommend this catalog to anyone that wants to know what the current range of activity is out on the fringes of science. Even without buying anything, the short reveiws of an incredible spectrum of speculation are rewarding. If you've found yourself slowly leafing through the BNF Entrerprises catalog, you'll LOVE this one!

2068 (Aerco, Olliger, Larken), I believe the Larken has the hands-down edge. The Larken does not pull power out of the 2068 the way the Aerco does. Also, the Olliger interface can be connected to the Larken hoard and the user can switch back and forth between the two. The Larken I/F uses no RAM in the computer. It is a small board and comes in two parts-one attaches to the big port on the back of the computer. and the other goes into the game cartridge dock. This I/F features the uninterrupted transfer of data. Even today, the 2068 is an attractive computer, and one which I personally use a lot. I also have a DOS machine at home, but with my years of experience with the 2068, it is the one I prefer to use. I think this machine is going to be around a long time, and I think we would do well to spend our time learning how to truly use it effectively. To this end, I would like to propose a 2068 special interest group which would meet monthly at

the same time as the hardware group, but in a different room. Watch for announcements activating the November/December special interest group meetings. Always of concern, especially with a machine that is no longer manufactured, is parts availability and maintenance. One of the better repair shops for 2068's is run by RON ELLIOTT in Cabool. a famous town in the gently rolling hills of southtern Missouri, close by the colorful Ozark Mountains. He does "mod's" capably, including internal power supply replacements. Maintenance and repair of the 2068's becomes increasingly critical with the passage of time. It seems that if a CATS member has a 2068 at all, he probably has three. We all need to pool our knoweledge and experience to keep all of those average three up and running!


