THE Democratic State Central Committee have made a call for a State Convention at Sacramento, on the 6th August, and we learn the Committee intend issuing an address to the voters of the State. We trust they will take high national ground in favor of sustaining the Government, the Union, and the Constitution-and opposing with all the strength that in them lays, the corruption and abolition tendencies of a major. ity of the Nation's Representatives in Congress. It is time this unholy contest was put an end to; and we blieve the North and South alike, are getting heartily tired of it, and with good conservative men in the counsels of the Government, who display justice without malignaty, and are willing to give to all sections of the country their rights under the Constitution. With the Government in such hands. we believe the time has come when the South would, rather than prolong the contest, amicably settle the dif. ficulties, and come under the old Government as heretofore; but while our Legislatiors goad them on with Emancipation, Confiscation and Abolition, as at present, we see no hope for reconstruction. Then in the name of all that is sacred, let us have a united Democracya party opposed to swindling and corrup. tion in high places-a party opposed to taking property from any of the citizens of this Government without just com pensation-no ultraism-no apology for Disunion-but true, conservative, national Democracy, and we may yet redeem our country from this, her most fearful calamity.

ACCIDENTS .- On Monday last a party went to the sink of Cache creek to gather blackberries, they tied up their horses to the saplings, and proceeded to gather the ripe fruit, which was in abundance on the vines. While a young man named John Blacksom was gathering fruit, a Rattle Snake, probably conceiving his rights were invaded, sprung at, and struck him in the back of the hand with both poisonous fangs, making a deep incission. The frightened man ran for his horse, to get to medical aid, when he found the animal had, in pulling back on the rope, choaked himself to death. He procured assistance, however, and there is some probability of his ultimate recovery. His hand and arm are very much swollen, and his sufferings are intense.

#### Where Shall the Bridge be Built?

In our last issue we undertook to show that a bridge, to be of real benefit to the people of this section of the county, should be built on as near as possible direct line between Woodland and Knight's Landing; for the reason that Knight's Landing was the great shipping point on the Sacramento River for the whole county, and Woodland the county seat, where the people, of necessity, had to go on county business. And not only would the people of Grafton Township be specially benefitted by such a bridge, but every body living on the Sacramento river, from the Landing to the lower end of the county, especially that portion from Washington up, by having the road and bridge to cross Cache Creek at Harbin's crossing. The road leading to Charles Gray's ranch, would intersect the Knight's

Landing road at Curtis' ranch, thus making a nearer route for all the section lying along the river, to get to the county seat; and besides, the question of location should be governed, to a great extent, by not only the nearest and best route, but the free right of way to and from the bridge-for a good and wide thoroughfare -we understand the parties who advocate the lower route have succeeded in securing the right of way for such a road from Knight's Landing to Woodland-and if not free of charge, at least so far so that whatever outlay is necessary, the people especially interested in the matter agree to furnish the funds to open the road, without one dollar of expense to the county; on the contrary, such a road could not be had, were the bridge to cross at Cacheville. We understand the free right of way cannot be obtained, and good roads leading from it are out of the question; in fact the only road leading from Cacheville to the foot hills west, is now fenced up, and entirely closed, and the other one or two means of exit for that point are nothing but circuitous lanes, turning innumerable right angles, and hardly thirty feet wide, in which two loaded teams can

hardly pass. There is of necessity bound to be a great amount of travel, not only from this section, but from all the lower valleys, passing through Yolo county. This constant stream of travel has thus far diverged at the crossing on Putah creek

to different points-some above some below Cacheville-but the country is now getting settled up, and it must hereafter take one channel, that channel is naturally destined to pass through Woodland, adopted : and thence, by a lower crossing on Cache creek, into Grafton Township, where it will diverge, some up, some down, as the destination of travelers require. This natural route may be obstructed for a time, and this travel scattered as before, and the best way to obtain this end, is to put this bridge on the crossing at Cacheville; that for the present will do it-and a more unwise measure, or one that would cause so much unnecessary travel and vexation to the traveling public generally, could not be advanced. We believe the Board of Supervisors will take an enlarged view of this matter, and, when an appropriation is made for a bridge, it will be located for the lasting and best interest of the county, and that point will be from two to four miles by the creek below Cacheville.

### BY OVERLAND TELEGRAPH.

The following dispatches are from the Sacramento Union of June 4th:

CHICAGO, June 1 .--- Dispatches to the War Department From McCleilan, dated noon, on Sunday, says:

"Yesterday at one o'clock the enemy taking advantage of a terrible storm, which flooded the Valley of the Chickahominy, attacked our right flank. Gen. The enemy's must be enormous. Excepting Casey's division the men behaved splendidly. Several fine bayonet charges were made."

The enemy had heard of the movement and had a train of box cars with flying artillery and five thousand infantry running up and down the road, but did not succeed in preventing the complete success of the enterprise. 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
## Bill to Quiet Land Titles in Cal-lfornia.

Mr. Phelps has introduced a bill of considerable importance to a certain class of land-owners in your State. Its object is "to quiet land titles in the State of California," and provides that in all cases where Mexican grants to lands have been confirmed by the land Commissioner or by either of the District Courts in and for that State, and which have been or may be rejected by the Supreme Court of the United States, and where the title to such lands, by reason of such rejection, vests in the United States, all persons who have actually and in good faith purchased portions of such grants subsequent to such confirmation, and before the passage of this act, and who are in actual possession, shall be protected in their possession, and allowed to purchase such land at the price of \$1 25 per scre, without regard to the quantity of land so purchased and held in possession, and without regard to sectional lines; provided such purchase shall be made, and the money paid thereon, within one year after the passage of this act or one year after the rejection of the grant; and provided further, surveys of such lands shall be made at the expense of the purchaser by the Surveyor General of the State, or by one of his deputies and approved by him; and provided further, that nothing in this act shall be so construed as to authorize the pre-emption or sale of mineral lands. This law is intended especially for the protection of purchasers of lands upon the Suscol and other rejected grants and

who have made improvements exceeding in value the Government's price of the lands, and who might suffer great injustice if some protection such as this bill affords, were not extended to them. The bill will undoubtedly become a law, unless it gets lost in the fog which too often envelops worthy acts at the close of a busy session .- Alta Cor.

FREEDOM OF THE PRESS.-The New York World in alluding to the telegraphic censorship, thus alludes to a member of the Cabinet, whom it charges with being anxious for the restriction of the liberty of the press:

Mr. Stanton has read too much law to be ignorant that the rights of the press are among the most sacred gifts of free institutions, and that no public officer can wantonly trench upon them without treachery to freedom itself. He has read too much history not to know the surest way to demoralize a people, and to break down public spirit, is to put the muzzle upon that right which an English historian has so fitly declared to be "the guardian of every other." There is no sacrifice really essential for the suppression of this rebellion which the loyal men of the republic will not willingly submit to; property, constitutional safeguards, life itself they are read to yield on necessity. But they very righteously protest, and with their whole soul too, against all unnecessary inflictions of this sort. The needless squandering of money by unfaithful representatives, the needless throwing away of life by unskillful generals, the needless sweeping down of civil guarantees by uncaring administrators, are all intolerable. They cannot be too plainly oposed, nor too sternly denounced.



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


