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were the first superstars

of rock and roll. Although his stay at the top was relatively brief, Haley's contributions were fundamental. He escorted rock onto the nation's pop charts and into the living rooms of middle America, and it was Haley who provided teenagers of the '50s with their own alternative national anthem in "Rock Around The Clock." In 1955, influential disc jockey Alan Freed reportedly plucked the words "rock" and "roll" from Haley's "Rock-A-Beatin' Boogie" and helped to give the new music a name. In some ways

Haley was also a casualty of history, and many of the performers who rushed through the door he held open had supplanted him in popularity by decade's end. Nevertheless, the genial bandleader with the loud jackets and trademark spit curl bang managed to become a cultural icon in his day, and his best music has lost none of its considerable appeal after more than forty years.

He was born William John Clifton Haley in the Detroit suburb of Highland Park on July 6, 1925. As a youngster he was billed as the "Rambling Yodeler," and gained early experience performing with country and western bands in and around Chester, Pennsylvania. A job at local radio station WPWA exposed Haley to rhythm and blues, and he began incorporating these sounds into his act. He was recording as "Bill Haley and The Saddlemen" for the tiny Essex label when he changed his band's name to The Comets and scored his first national hit with "Crazy, Man, Crazy" in 1953. This success led to a contract with Decca Records the following year, where his debut single, with "Rock Around The Clock" as the B-side, sold modestly. It was followed by a cover rendition of Big Joe Turner's "Shake, Rattle & Roll" that became a gold record and a top ten hit. In 1955, "Rock Around The Clock" was revived in the soundtrack of the MGM film Blackboard Jungle and turned into an international phenomenon that is estimated to have sold over 20 million copies to date.

The glory years were at hand. Producer Milt Gabler, who had worked extensively with Louis Jordan, one of Haley's prime influences, had the good sense to record Haley and his Comets in a similar, concert-like environment at the fabled Pythian Temple in New York. The Comets underwent personnel changes, but by 1956 had coalesced into the classic line-up of Frank Beecher on lead guitar; Billy Williamson on steel guitar; Al Rex on bass; Ralph Jones on drums; Johnny Grande on piano; and Rudy Pompilli on tenor sax, with Haley handling the rhythm guitar and vocals. In 1957, Haley & The Comets caused riots when they became the first visiting rockers to tour Britain. Their steady stream of hits lasted well into 1958.

Unfortunately, Haley began to look increasingly anachronistic as rock came to be personified by young rebels like Elvis Presley and Jerry Lee Lewis. An unwillingness to experiment beyond the tried and true formula that had brought his initial success didn't help matters. He left Decca by 1960 and for a while relocated to Mexico, where he remained quite popular. The enduring appeal of his music was strikingly illustrated when "Rock Around The Clock" returned to the top forty in both the U.S. and Britain in 1974, just seven years before Haley's untimely death from a heart attack in Harlingen, Texas in 1981. He was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall Of Fame in 1987.


