BENNY GOODMAN

Benny Gaadman was barn as Benjamin David Gaadman on the 30th May 1909 in Chicago, Illinois, and was to became known as the "King of Swing", the most popular figure of the first few years of the Swing Ero, a great musician who continued to perform and record for more than five decades.

As the san of Russian immigrants David and Dara Goodman who earned their living in the tailoring profession, the young Benny began taking clarinet lessons at the age of ten. With the help of a former musician of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra at a local synagague, Benny Goodman took his first steps in a long and successful career, and just one year loter he was already playing in a pit band at a local theatre. Playing at school donces and ather local events he dropped out of high school ot the age of 14 and made the decision to become a professional musician. In August 1925, at the age of 16, he lond Ben Pallack's Orchestra and made his first recordings with this band in December 1926. The first ever recording under his own name soan followed in January 1928, and in September 1929 at the age of 20, he then decided to leave the Pallack band and mave to New York ond try his luck as a freelonce musician.

After working at recording sessions, radia dates, and in the pit bands, of various Broadway musicals, he played between 1929 and 1931 in the band af Red Nichols , and soon after with Isham Jones, Ben Selvin and Ted Lewis. In these bonds, some of the sidemen included such great names as Tommy Dorsey, Clean Miller, Joe Venuti, Jock Teogorden, Jimmy Dorsey, Eddie Long, Gene Krupo, Dave Tough, and Fats Waller. In January 1931, Benny Goadman reached the charts for the first time with, "Ha's Nat Warth Your Tears" (vacals Scroppy Lombert), and from early 1934 anwards was quite a cregular name in the Top Ten with such hits as "Aint You Glad?" (vacal Jack Teagarden). "Riffin the Sacht" (vacal Billie Holiday), "Ol Pappy" (vacal Jack Teagarden).

After the success of his recordings and on offer to perform at Billy Rose's Music Holl, Goodmon decided to form his own bond and gove his debut performance on June 1934. Just one month later Benny Goodman had his first number one hit with the instrumental "Moon Glow" and two more Top Ten hits followed just o few month later with the instrumentols, "Toke My Word" and "Buale Coll Rog". After performing of Billy Rose's Music Holl for five months, he then signed up to play the last hour of the very successful NBC radio Saturday Night show, "Lefs Donce" ond during the six months he stoyed with the show, hod no less than a further six Top Ten hits! After leaving "Lets Dance", there soon followed five more Top Ten hits, oll in the year 1934. The first national tour in the U:S.A. in summer of 1935 was only a moderate success until he reached the West Coast, (where his hourly broadcost with Lets Donce was much more widely followed). The crowning of the tour become a spectacular concert at the "Polamor Ballroom" near Los Angeles on August 21st 1935, which was later remembered to be the birth of swing, the date on which the Swing Ero begon.

The Goodman success story continued in 1936 with no less than 15 Tap Ten hits including the Number One songs, "It's Been So Long". Gaody-Goody", "The Glory of Love". " These foolish Things Remind Me of You" and "You Turned The Tables an Me" (vocal on all these songs by Helen Ward). In 1937 there were six more Tap Ten Hits including the number one song" This Year's Kisses" (vacals Morgeret M'Crae) and a number one hit featuring Ello Fitzgerold on vocals and Harry James on the trumpet. The year 1938 began with onother great success for him when ofter his concert of the Carneaie Hall on Jonuory 16, he reached the peak of his popularity during the 1930's. He scored a spectacular 14 Top Ten hits in 1938 including reaching the number one slot three times, 1939 brought eight more Top Ten Hits including the number one hit " And The Angels Sing" (vocols Mortho Tilton) and in spite of losing two of his most important soloists. Gene Krupo and Harry James, and the hord competition from the newly formed bands of Glenn Miller and Artie Show, it was a successful year. Apart from appearing in the Broodwoy Musicol "Swingin The Dreom", (where he led a sextet), he ond his bond also storred in their first film called. "Hollywood Hotel" in the same year. Later films include, "The Powers Girl" (1943), "The Gona's all Here" (1944) and "Stage Door Canteen", not forgetting of course." The Benny Goodmon Story", a film made in 1955, depicting his life and music.

1940 began quite well for him with the number one hit in March." Darn That Dream" (vocal Mildred Bailey), but due to illness (a slipped disc) he had to stop recording and touring, having only two more hits in that veor. In 1941 he had two Top Ten hits (including a number one) and in 1942 three more including the number one hits of "Somebody Else is Taking my Ploce" (vocols Peggy Lee) and "Jersey Bounce", In 1943, in spite of Americo's entry into World War II, he had a few more hits including the number one "Taking a Chance on Love" (vocols Helen Forrest), oppearing in 3 films in that year. In the following year he broke up the band but carried on appearing in films and in a Broadway revue with a guintet. In 1945 after reforming his band, he had three more Top Ten hits, including "Gotto' be This or That", (on which he sang the vocals himself). In early 1946 he made the number one position of the newly farmed "Album Charts" with the " Benny Goodman Sextet Session", and hasted a radio series with Victor Borge into 1947.

In between 1947-1949 Goadman produced many so called "small group" recordings mainly in New York and Hollywood (LA.), some of the best ones featuring such names as Buddy Greco, Teddy Wilson, Jimmy Crowford, Red Norvo, Mel Powell, Al Hendrickson, Artie Shapiro, Tommy Ramerso, Ed Kusby, Chuck Gentry, Jake Porter, Allan Reuss, Bill Dauglas, Red Callender. Lee Yaung, Fats Navarro, Wardell Gray, Gene Di Novi, Mundell Lowe, Clyde Lombardi, Mel Zelnick, Daug Meltame, Francis Beecher, Sonny Jaco, amangst others.

In 1950 the olbum "Cornegie Hall Jazz Concert-Vols 1&2" went into the

charts and stayed there for aver a year becaming the best selling jazz album of all times up to that date. A complete list of the great musicians who sided with Goodman would be difficult to construct but just o few include, Lionel Hamptan, Harry James, Geargie Auld, Ziggy Ellman, Chorlie Christion, Red Norvo, Fletcher Henderson, Gene Krupo, Taddy Wilsan, Geage Weltling, Pee Wee Irwin, Miff Mole, Roy Eldridge, Stan Getz, Skip Martin, and Cootie Williams.

After o for east tour in 1956-57, Goodman toured quite frequently in Europe and overseos, and his 1962 tour of the Soviet Union brought the famous album "Benny Goodman in Moscow" and ofter recording the hit album "Tagether Again" in 1964, he recorded less frequently in the sixties. In 1971 his album recorded live in Stochholm, "Benny Goodman Today" hit the charts again and in 1978 he returned to the Cornegie Hall to do a concert, (the tickets all sold out on the first day of sales!)

In January 1986 he made his last studio recordings and the last album released before his death was titled" Let's Donce", a television soundtrack that earned a Grammy nomination for "Best Jazz Instrumental Performance Big Bond." The "King of Swing" Benny Goadman, died an June 13th 1986 in New York, he will be remembered as ane of the most tolented popular instrumentalists and bond leaders of all times.
