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OR A MAN WHO HAS GIVEN US SO MUCH WITH HIS INNOVATIVE, THOUGHT PROVOKING AND GREATLY - inspired music, it is a tragedy that Curtis Mayfield should be lert with so little. Only two years ago "The Return Of Superfly" movie and soundtrack album saw a resurgence in THE VETERAN SOUL MAN'S CAREER, CURTIS JOINING FORCES WITH PROLIFIC RAPPER ICE-T FOR THE SINGLE "SUPERFLY 1990" AND AN ALBUM OF NEW SONGS FOR CAPITOL RECORDS. TODAY HE IS BOUND TO A WHEEL CHAIR AT HOME IN ATLANTA, PARALYSED FROM THE NECK DOWN FOLLOWING AN APPALLING accident on stage in New York where he was hit by a lighting rig.

C
urtis was born in Chicago in1942 where he formed a vocal group The Alphatones before he had even reached his teens. Like many great artists he nurtured his vocal skills in church, but it was the secular R \& B music of groups like The Drifters that had a greater influence on the direction of his music extremely early on in his career.

In 1956 he met Jerry Butler with whom he formed The Roosters, later to become The Impressions. While Jerry gave the group their first hit as lead singer on "For Your Precious Love" (actually promoted by Vee Jay records as a solo Jerry Butler record), it was Curtis who fronted the group from 1961 to 1970 with his distinctive high tenor voice for a string of American hits including "First Impressions", their one Top 20 UK chart hit when issued here in 1975.
n 1968 Curtis launched his own label, Curtom Records, in order to cultivate local talent and give himself a better vehicle to express his strong views on the black issues of the day to which he had become very consciously aware. In 1970 he made Leroy Hutson lead singer with The Impressions and embarked on a solo career where he further pursued the socially conscious depictions of urban black street life he had first explored with The Impressions on songs like the classic "This Is My Country" (1968). A social commentator, his songs became sermonettes on drugs, war, racism, the environment and religion, deliberately sung without metaphors to

hit issues head on in a language everyone could understand. While Marvin Gaye is often credited as laying the matrix to the whole spectrum of socially conscious music in the 70s, Curtis was preaching about the concerns of the civil rights movement and other political issues on songs like "A Change Is Gonna Come" and "People Get Ready" with The Impressions back in the mid-60s.
"Curtis" was his debut album (1970) and was musically an extension of the sound he cultivated with The Impressions, a fusion of complex rhythms, busy drums, funky synths, and wah wah guitar washed with strings which definitely inspired producers like Norman Whitfield on songs like "Papa Was A Rolling Stone" (1972). It included "Move On Up" which became Curtis' biggest British solo hit (reaching No. 12 in July
1971), and "(Don't Worry) If There's A Hell Below We're All Going To Go". This album is now extremely rare.

His next album was "Roots" (1971) which caused enough of a stir to bring him to England for his first solo concert performance without The Impressions.

Inn 1972 Curtis was commissioned to write, perform and produce the music to 'Super Fly' - (a 70s expression meaning hip, high fashion, etc), a movie about a drug dealer with a heart of gold. In fact it came not long after "Shaft", the Isaac Hayes scored movie, and was the second of only two successful blaxploitation movies between 1970 and 1973 that set out to project images of black men as larger than life super studs and super heroes. While the film tended to lack credibility and look very dated today, Curtis excelled himself musically and gave himself two timeless top ten national hits in America with the title track and the fierce attack on the drug culture on "Freddie's Dead" (although only the instrumental was featured in the film itself). Curtis has always been an anti-drugs man, anti-alcohol and smoking too for that matter. The soundtrack album, meanwhile, also featured his version of "Give Me Your Love", later a Motown classic and 'rare groove' for Sisters Love (recently re-recorded by the group's lead singer Vermettya Royster), and the popular "Pusherman" (an expression for a hustler with a super fly ego!). The album was one of a number of soundtracks Curtis scored during this era (which also delivered hits like "Let's Do It Again" for The Staple Singers).

His solo albums, meanwhile, continued with "Back To The World" (1973), a Gold album in the States; "Got To Find A Way" - including the American hit "Ain't No Love Lost" (1974), "There's No Place Like America Today" (1975)-including the laidback groove of "Hard Times" and the classic ballad "So In Love" , "Sweet Exorcist" (1976), "Give, Get, Take \& Have"(1976)-including the UK modern soul favourite
"Soul Music" and "In Your Arms Again (Shake It)", "Do It All Night" (1978), and his duet album with Linda Clifford "The Right Combination" (1979).

In 1981 the Curtom label ceased its affiliation with Warner Brothers (having earlier been distributed by Buddah and then RSO), and after the release of the "Something To Believe In" album (which features "Tripping Out" and the incredible "Never Stop Loving Me", later covered by Keni Burke), Curtom closed shop and dispersed with its impressive roster which had delivered so many special moments for artists including Leroy Hutson, Linda Clifford, Natural Four, Mavis Singers, Mystique and The Jones Girls. Curtom had become to Chicago what Motown was to Detroit, while Curtis had earned himself a reputation as both an exceptional artist and writer/producer for both his own label, other labels and major record companies. Any true Curtis fan will include his work for Patti Labelle ("Trusting In You") and The Fascinations ("Girls Are Out To Get You") among his finest of all time, not to mention the many great sides for his protege Major Lance.

It has been impossible to include every great song in the time this compilation allows, but I believe you have an indispensable selection here that offers the hits (both UK and stateside) together with much that is particularly sought after on the 'rare groove', 'two step' and general soul scene in the UK where we've always had good ears for real talent and sensational music.
