QUEER ALMANACS.
Australian Shepherds Have Odd Ways of Marking Time.

The boundary riders of the great Australian sheep ranches have each a district to look after, in which one must keep the wire fences in repair and see that the sheep come to no harm. It is a hard and lonely life, living, as each boundary rider does, quite alone in the wilderness. A writer tells of some of the curious ways in which these solitary men keep count of the days.

On Monday morning he would take a pebble from "Last week" and drop it into "This week," and each subsequent morning till "This week" had swallowed the seven. ANCIENT BURIALS.
Weapons of Warriors and Trinkets of Women in Their Graves.

A cemetery belonging to a garrison of Lombards has been found near Ascoli, on the Tonto, at a pass across the Apennines, in Italy. The site of the fort is the top of an island of rock now occupied by a little hamlet called Castel Trosino. All the warriors were laid with their faces to the east. Near the head was found a comb made of horn or bone and a round shield with iron boss. On the right lay a long, straight iron sword in a scabbard of hide. Against the right shoulder was laid a long wooden spear and on the left a dagger in a highly ornamented sheath, decorated with gold, as well as a bow and arrows in a quiver.

Generally there was present the buckle of a broad belt, often decorated with gold, silver or bronze. Small gold plates seem to have been sewed to the coat in the shape of a cross. One grave contained a heavy cuirass of plates bound together with iron wire. The horsemen had big shears for clipping manes and a large bronze feed trough with two movable handles. Often bits, saddles and harness were laid beside the dead.

By the women were worn gold hairpins with rounded flat heads, gold earrings of different shapes, finger rings and gold plates. One ring has the names Gerontius and Regina engraved on it. Crosses and necklaces of gold and beads of glass, silver bracelets, pottery vases and plates of the toilet combs and other articles of the toilet accompany the remains of women.

Some Important Resolutions Were Adopted By the Board at Their Meeting.

The Board of Supervisors met in regular session Monday, all the members being present. The following reports of county officers were accepted and ordered filed: South San Francisco, November 30, 1904.—To the honorable Board of Supervisors of San Mateo county:

The health of the county has been fair for the past month. Several nuisances have been reported and the same abated. Several complaints of the uncleanly condition of hog ranches about Colma have reached this office, and I have notified the owners to clean same.

I have issued 681 burial permits, for which I have collected \$661, and five disinterment permits for which I have collected \$50, making a total of \$711 turned over to the County Treasurer as per Auditor's receipt attached.

District Attorney Bullock reported on the application for a liquor license of M. Michelle, who keeps a questionable resort on the San Bruno road, near the county line. A letter was read from Chief Whitman of San Francisco, calling the Sheriff's attention to the resort, saying it was conducted in a disorderly manner.

He said boys and girls went there on Sunday and were served drinks and became intoxicated, and on returning to the city on the electric cars conducted themselves disgracefully. The letter referred to Michelle as "Pork Chop Mike."

Michelle was present and denied the charges in toto. He said a neighboring saloon keeper known as "Beef Steak Bill" inspired the charges through business jealousy.

Sheriff Mansfield was directed to investigate the matter and report.

The application of C. J. Hatch for a license to conduct a saloon at Burlingame was withdrawn at his request.

Two lengthy petitions opposing the granting of a liquor license to J. H. Hatch to conduct a saloon at Burlingame were filed with the Board. Mr. Hatch gave notice that he would apply for a license at the first January meeting of the Board. The protests were filed on motion of McEvoy, seconded by Eikorenkoter, and will be taken up and acted upon at the first meeting in January.

the inspector and superintendent in charge of the construction of the new Courthouse to remain at said building in the performance of his duties during the whole of each day, and that, for any reason, it is necessary for said inspector and superintendent to be absent from said building, that then, in that event, he place a competent person as a substitute in his place during his said absence.

And be it further resolved that the secretary of this Grand Jury transmit a copy of this resolution to the Board of Supervisors at their next regular session.

Resolved, that the members of the Grand Jury, now in session, do hereby recommend to the Board of Supervisors of the county of San Mateo, that said Board immediately procure for the use of the Superintendent at the County Poor Farm, a set of books, in which books said superintendent shall keep a record of all the transactions pertaining to said farm.

And be it further resolved, that said books be immediately procured and a record of the transactions of said farm be kept, commencing with the first day of January, 1905.

And be it further resolved, that the secretary of this Grand Jury transmit a copy of this resolution to the Board of Supervisors at their next regular session.

On motion of McCracken, seconded by Eikorenkoter, the resolutions were received and ordered filed.

The request for the set of books for the Superintendent was granted.

P. A. Russell, superintendent of the new Courthouse, was present and said he had kept close watch on the work and was sure the building was being properly looked after.

He thought his duties had been conscientiously performed. He admitted that he was never on hand all day, but was sure the material and workmanship were fully up to the requirements of the specifications.

The Board took no further action on the recommendation of the Grand Jury.

AFTERNOON SESSION. The Board met at 1:30 o'clock, pursuant to adjournment during the morning session. All the Supervisors answered roll call.

A letter was read from C. M. Miller of Los Angeles, asking to be forwarded to him printed matter relating to the mineral resources of the county. Same was ordered filed.

A petition signed by A. M. Gardner and others, of Belmont, asking that automatic gates be placed at Belmont Crossing and O'Neill avenue, was read.

On motion of McEvoy, seconded by Eikorenkoter, the petition was referred to the District Attorney to confer with the Southern Pacific Company.

The communication from E. T. Barnum of Detroit, Michigan, asking to be given an opportunity to furnish the steel doors, frames and furnishings for the new Courthouse, was ordered filed on motion of McCracken, seconded by Debenedetti.

District Attorney Bullock explained to the Board that he had received a communication from Garrett McEneaney, attorney for the Alvinza Hayward estate, stating that on November 24, 1874, Alvinza Hayward made a deed to the county of a block of land in the Hayward Addition, San Mateo, on condition that a courthouse and jail be erected thereon within two years from that time.

Mr. Bullock said that in the settlement of the Hayward estate, and in order to clear the title to the property in question, it would be necessary for the county to restore the property to the estate. The following resolution, offered by McEvoy and seconded by Eikorenkoter, was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS, by an instrument dated November 24th, 1874, acknowledged on the same date, and recorded November 24th, 1874, in Book 22, Deeds, page 130, of the records of the Recorder's office of the County of San Mateo, State of California, Alvinza Hayward granted, bargained, sold and conveyed unto the Board of Supervisors of San Mateo county, their successors and assigns forever, the real property hereinafter described, for the purpose of a site whereon shall be erected the county courthouse and jail of the County of San Mateo aforesaid, and which instrument contained the express provision that if such buildings be not erected thereon within two years from the date of said present, then said present to be of no force and effect, and said premises then to revert to and again become the property in fee simple absolute, of said party of the first part, nothing therein contained to the contrary notwithstanding; and

Whereas, neither said nor any building or structure were or was erected upon said property within two years from the date of said present or at all; and whereas, it is provided by Section 1109 of the Civil Code of the State of California, "Where a grant is made upon conditions subsequent, and is subsequently defeated by the non-performance of the condition, the person otherwise entitled to hold under the grant must re-convey the property to the grantor or his successors, by grant duly acknowledged and recorded;"

And whereas, said provision of the law, said grant mentioned in said deed from Hayward to the Board of Supervisors has been defeated by the non-performance of said condition, and it is the duty of the Board of Supervisors to re-convey the property to the grantor or his successors by grant;

Now therefore, be it resolved, that the County of San Mateo, the Board of Supervisors of said County of San Mateo, and the several persons now composing and constituting the Board of Supervisors of said County of San Mateo, make, execute, and deliver a deed of conveyance, conveying to W. J. Dingus, as administrator with the will annexed, of the estate of said Alvinza Hayward, deceased, the real property hereinbefore referred to in this resolution and described as follows:

All those certain parcels of land situated in the County of San Mateo, State of California; and bounded and particularly described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at a point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Cedar avenue and the southeasterly line of Fifth street; thence running northeasterly two hundred and fifty (250) feet to the southeasterly boundary of the Southern Pacific railroad; thence at right angles southeasterly along said boundary one hundred and forty-one (141) feet ten (10) inches; thence at right angles southwesterly and parallel

with Fifth street two hundred and fifty (250) feet to said northerly line of Cedar avenue; thence at right angles northwesterly along said last mentioned line one hundred and forty-one (141) feet and ten (10) inches to the point of beginning. Being lots numbers five (5) and six (6) of block number two of the Oak Lawn Villa Lots at San Mateo, as surveyed by F. A. Bishop, C. E., November 1870, as per map on file in the office of the County Recorder of said San Mateo county, and being the same property conveyed by said Hayward to said County of San Mateo, by conveyance hereinbefore referred to.

And that the chairman of said Board of Supervisors, J. H. Coleman, be and he is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to make, execute and deliver, for and on behalf of said County of San Mateo and said Board of Supervisors, said conveyance.

The following resolution confirming the changes made in the plans of the new Courthouse building was presented by Debenedetti and seconded by McCracken, and adopted, McEvoy and Coleman voting no:

WHEREAS, certain changes have been agreed upon between the contractor and Board of Supervisors of the county of San Mateo in the matter of the construction of the new courthouse;

And whereas, said changes have in the judgment of said board been deemed advisable and necessary for the securing of a courthouse which will fill the needs and requirements of the public business of the county, and have met with the approval of the architect in charge, which said proposed changes and alterations, and the cost thereof, are as follows, to-wit:

Now therefore, be it resolved, that the action of said Board of Supervisors of date and the 16th day of November, 1904, authorizing and directing said changes to be made, and the same is hereby further ratified and approved, and the chairman of said Board of Supervisors is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to enter into a contract for and on behalf of the County of San Mateo, with the American-Italian Engineering and Construction Company, the contractors, for the changes aforesaid.

O. C. Wilson, representing E. E. Hewlett, presented a claim against Phebe Hearst Reclamation District No. 754 for \$1500 for legal services rendered. On motion of McEvoy, seconded by McCracken, the claim was approved for the full amount.

McEvoy called the attention of the Board that he desired a clean bill of health before retiring, and asked that the Auditor and Treasurer make a statement of the financial condition of the county up to December 31. On motion of Eikorenkoter, seconded by McCracken, the Auditor and Treasurer were requested to make the statement required.
