NEW ELECTRIC ROAD

Work is progressing rapidly on the construction of the roadbed of the San Jose-Los Gatos Interurban Railway Company's electric line, which will connect with the United Railroads of San Francisco. Rails are now laid as far as Cupertino, and fifteen miles are yet to be graded. According to President O. A. Hale, a standard broad gauge road will be constructed and every modern convenience furnished patrons of the line. President O. A. Hale was here yesterday and in an interview said: "The greatest difficulty at the present time is to get men to work on the road and to secure material, but when the line is completed we will be well paid, as we will probably get about 80 per cent of the travel between San Jose, Stanford University, Mayfield, Palo Alto and Redwood City. It will only be a question of a few years when the peninsula will be thickly populated with San Francisco people, who will find that it will consume no more time to go to and from the city than it does to go across the bay. "Not only will we get city people, but thousands of others as soon as we can provide the necessary transportation facilities for them. To prove the assertions that I have made, I will state that since the installation of the Interurban road there are about 6,000 more people getting their mail from the San Jose postoffice than before. "We expected to have part of the road in operation before this, but have been unable to get trace of trucks for four cars that were shipped to us from New Orleans a month ago."

SUPERVISORS IN SESSION

BUSINESS TRANSACTED BY THE AT LAST MEETING

The Supervisors met in regular session last Monday. All the members were present. The petition of H. J. Vandenberg asking for a rebate of \$48.00 on the unused portion of his license was granted. It was ordered that Vandenberg present a claim for that amount. He formerly conducted a saloon in 54th San Francisco. MacBain reported that he had received \$40 from Santa Clara county as a recompense for watering a piece of land 600 feet in length just across the county line at the lower end of Portola valley. He was directed to turn the money over to the treasurer for credit to his district. The claim of P. J. Maloney for \$1500 was on motion of MacBain, seconded by Elkorenketter continued indefinitely. The applications of Mr. and Mrs. Cencio for liquor licenses were deferred to the next meeting of the Board. MacBain stated that there were a number of places between Redwood and Menlo Park where the trees on private property so shaded the road that it was kept in a muddy condition. A considerable part of the season he wanted to know if a remedy could be offered and the matter was referred to the District Attorney, who he communicated with the proper owners on whose premises the condition existed and ask for the removal of the trees. The Hensley Green Company presented a map of the proposed road between San Bruno Park and San Jose, which was adopted on motion of Elkorenketter, seconded by MacBain delegating the streets on the map to public use. A. Hensley and R. Mason Smith are the owners of a certain tract of land known as "Blocks 7, 8, and 9" San Bruno Park, 5th Addition, which land is situated near San Bruno in the County of San Mateo. WHEREAS, the said Alfred T. Green, Geo. A. Hensley and R. Mason Smith have caused the said tract to be laid out and subdivided into lots for the purposes of sale and have caused to be made an accurate map or plat thereof, particularly getting forth and describing all the ground within such subdivision reserved for public purposes, by their boundaries, courses and extent; and also lots intended for sale by figures and their precise length, width and dimensions, said map being designated as "Map of Blocks 7, 8, and 9, San Bruno Park, 5th Addition" in the County of San Mateo, and, WHEREAS, the said Alfred T. Green, Geo. A. Hensley and R. Mason Smith did duly acknowledge the said map before Fred Hudson a Notary Public in the County of San Mateo, State of California, upon the 15th day of December 1906; and said Notary Public did, on said day duly affix thereto his certificate of such acknowledgment in due form of law, and, WHEREAS the said map or plat is now presented to this Board for acceptance; Now therefore be it resolved that Atlantic Avenue and Hough Avenue as delineated and designated on said map be, and the same are hereby accepted on behalf of the Public by the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Mateo, State of California, as dedicated to public use in accordance with the law in such cases made and provided; and the Clerk of this Board is directed to endorse, acceptance on said map as follows, to-wit: Atlantic Avenue and Hough Avenue as delineated and designated on this map are hereby accepted by the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Mateo on behalf of the Public dedicated to Public use in accordance with and subject to the terms of a resolution of said Board adopted this 17th day of December, 1906. Resolved that this Resolution be adopted and said map accepted upon and subject to the express condition that the County of San Mateo does not hereby become responsible or liable for any expenses, cost or charge as to such Atlantic Avenue and Hough Avenue or any part thereof, either for grading, macadamizing, or for any road purposes. This condition, and the incurring of any expenses, cost or charge being left to the discretion of future Boards of Supervisors, no one of said Board of Supervisors, nor any member thereof, nor said County of San Mateo, shall ever be liable to damages in any suit or amount arising or through any defect of any kind in said streets and avenues. Wm. H. Hooper of Woodside appeared before the Board of Supervisors Monday as an advocate of good roads. He found fault with those of the First Township, and particularly with that portion of the Mission road that extends from the town of Colma to the top of the Daly hill near Ocean View. The total length will be about forty miles. The capital stock of the company is \$5,000,000, of which \$500,000 has been subscribed. The directors are J. C. Campbell, E. M. Rea and W. H. Metson of San Francisco, and J. F. Parkinson and Frank D. Dorman of Palo Alto.

which corporation had torn up the road to change the grade of its tracks but had failed to place it in its original condition. 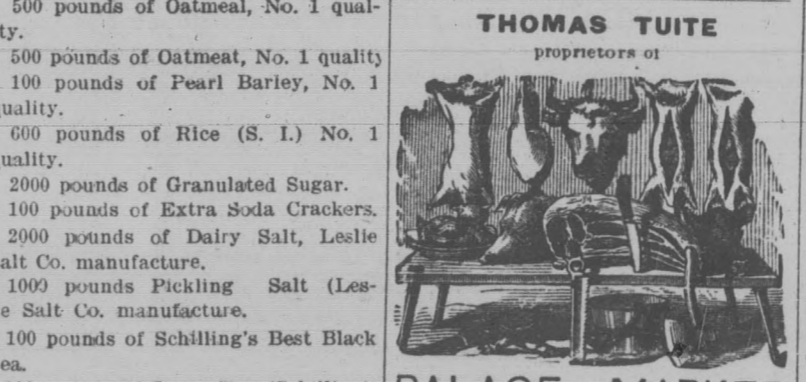
