## COUNTY FATHERS HOLD REGULAR SESSION

### BOARD AWARDS CONTRACTS FOR MILLBRAE CULVERT AND SAN PEDRO MOUNTAIN FENCE

Returns of Special Election Held on November 26th on Constitutional Amendments are Canvassed

The board of supervisors met in regular session Monday, November 1st, at 10 a. m., there being present Jos. M. Francis, presiding, Jas. T. Casey, Wm. H. Brown, John MacBain and C. V. Thompson.

The minutes of the meeting of October 18th were read and approved. The report of County Horticultural Commissioner Newton A. Peck showed that he had inspected during the month 14,599 trees, shrubs and plants of which number 2000 were found infested with common "Mealy bug" and were disinfected by fumigation.

On motion of Brown, seconded by MacBain, it was ordered that Mr. Peck be allowed to use his own judgment in the matter of attending the meeting of the State Association of the County Horticultural Commissioners, also the Fruit Growers' Convention.

The Horticultural laws of the State require the county commissioner's presence at these meetings, and owing to the many importations arriving at the present time, requiring inspection, the duties of the officer would suffer considerably if the commissioner were absent.

The report of Traffic Officer M. F. Brown was received and ordered filed. The report of J. H. Eubanks, superintendent of the County Farm and Hospital, showed that he had taken care of 52 inmates during September, ten of whom were discharged, and four died.

The following named liquor dealers having complied with the county ordinance and furnished the required bond, were granted licenses:

Second township—Forrest J. Vanderluth, Belmont.

Third township—Julius Schenkel, Portola; A. A. Neuman, Woodside; Neuman Bros., Woodside (Class B); John Beltramo, Menlo Park, (Class C).

Fourth township—Henry Schult, Halfmoon Bay.

The following applications will be acted upon a month hence:

Fourth township—Manuel Lewis, Halfmoon Bay; Maymie Cowley, El Granada, (Class C).

The application of Daniel Scantena of Colma for a first class liquor license was laid over for two weeks, on motion of Casey, seconded by MacBain.

A communication from John Flynn, superintendent of Holy Cross cemetery in regard to the delay in the completion of the county road leading up to the cemetery, was ordered filed.

A communication from the Raisch Improvement Company of San Francisco, notifying the board that a claim held against Sonnichsen and Ritchey, the contractors, had been fully paid, was ordered filed.

A communication from the State Board of Control relative to a renewal application for State aid for a half orphan, was ordered referred to the county auditor.

A communication was received from the Inland Waterways Association of California, asking for a renewal of the county's membership subscription of \$50.00 for 1916. The communication was ordered filed.

The Chamber of Commerce of San Diego county addressed a communication to the board, inviting them to attend the annual convention of the California Development Board, which is to be held in the above city on November 12th, and 13th. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was received from the George H. Irving Company, petitioning the board's permission to open and replace a trench across the county road for the purpose of laying a twelve-inch sewer pipe in continuation of the sewer line from the Redwood Highlands property on James street to connect with the sewer main of the Town of Redwood.

On motion of MacBain, seconded by Brown, the matter was referred to County Engineer Neuman.

The following bids were opened for the construction of a concrete culvert at Millbrae:

Harry Morey & Sons—\$808.75.

On motion of MacBain, seconded by Brown, the contract was awarded to Morey & Sons, they being the lowest bidders.

The contract was awarded to Bryant and Ritchey, the lowest bidders, on motion of MacBain, seconded by Brown.

L. B. Jones, in charge of the squirrel extermination work in the county, submitted a lengthy report, showing the progress of the campaign carried on, the number of acres inspected, the number of demonstrations given and the cost of conducting the campaign.

## HENRY FORD DELIGHTED WITH NEW SCENIC ROAD

Last Sunday's Chronicle contained the following article concerning Henry Ford's trip down through the Santa Clara valley, on his recent visit to the Pacific coast:

"One of Henry Ford's most pleasant recollections of his visit to the Pacific Coast accorded to the celebrated millionaire automobile manufacturer, will be a trip down through Santa Clara valley, which he made last Sunday in a KesselKar, accompanied by William L. Hughson, president of the Pacific KesselKar branch, and J. B. Lund, the retail Ford automobile distributor in this territory.
