SUPERVISORS HURRY ROAD CONTRACTOR

The board of supervisors met in regular session, Monday, July 10, at 10 a. m., there being present, Jos. M. Francis, presiding, Jas. T. Casey, Wm. Brown, John MacBain and C. V. Thompson.

The following bids were opened for the purchase of the \$66,000 bonds of the South San Francisco school district:

E. H. Rollins and Son, \$3705; F. M. Brown and Company, \$4411; Lumberman's Trust Company, \$4676 Bond and Goodwin, \$4114.

On motion, seconded by Thompson the bid of the Lumberman's Trust Company was accepted and the bonds ordered sold to that firm.

The following bids were opened for furnishing the labor and material for all cell work, locking devices, plate work, steel windows, guards, etc., for the new county jail, now in course of construction:

M. G. West Company, \$18,165; Pauly Jail Construction Company, \$17,604; Hermann Safe Company, \$20,359.

The Pauly Jail Construction Company being the lowest bidder, the contract was awarded to that firm, on motion of Thompson, seconded by MacBain.

R. Cloud addressed the board and presented a petition signed by Fred Kendall and others, asking for the reestablishment of the West Union school district, with the school located in San Carlos. The petition stated that there were 12 children of school age living in the district.

The prayers of the petitioners were granted, on motion of Brown, seconded by Casey.

Surveyor Neuman presented plans and specifications for macadamizing the shoulders on a portion of the Redwood-San Gregorio road from the Menlo Country Club to Neuman Bros. store at Woodside. The plans and specifications were adopted, on motion of MacBain, seconded by Thompson, and the clerk was instructed to advertise for bids, said bids to be opened August 7.

Surveyor Neuman presented plans and specifications for oiling and screening the San Gregorio Creek road for a distance of 7.43 miles, said work having been ordered done at the last meeting of the board. The plans and specifications were adopted on motion of Thompson, seconded by Brown, and the clerk authorized to advertise for bids.

At the request of Surveyor Neuman, and on motion of Thompson, seconded by Brown, it was ordered that Contractor Lou G. Hare be instructed to proceed immediately with the completion of the Pescadero road from the Gazos creek to the county line.

Surveyor Neuman reported that Contractor McReynolds was not doing any better in the matter of the construction of the Hillsborough to Halfmoon Bay road from the latter place to the Crystal Springs Lakes, and in an interview recently had with him, the contractor stated that it was impossible for him to proceed any faster with the work, and indicated, according to the surveyor, that he didn't intend to try to. Realizing the seriousness of the situation, the board, on motion of Brown, seconded by Francis, voted to give McReynolds 15 days to put on more equipment in order to get the work under way, with the understanding that if he failed to do so the county would take action.

Supervisor Thompson called the board's attention to the unsafe condition of the bridge over the creek in the town of San Gregorio, owing to the rotting away of the timbers and the piling. He said that the structure was liable to drop into the creek any moment and asked that some immediate action be taken in the matter. On motion of Thompson, seconded by MacBain, Engineer Neuman was instructed to make an inspection of the cost of a new bridge to replace the old one.

The following persons having presented petitions for county aid, were granted assistance in the sum of \$2 per month:

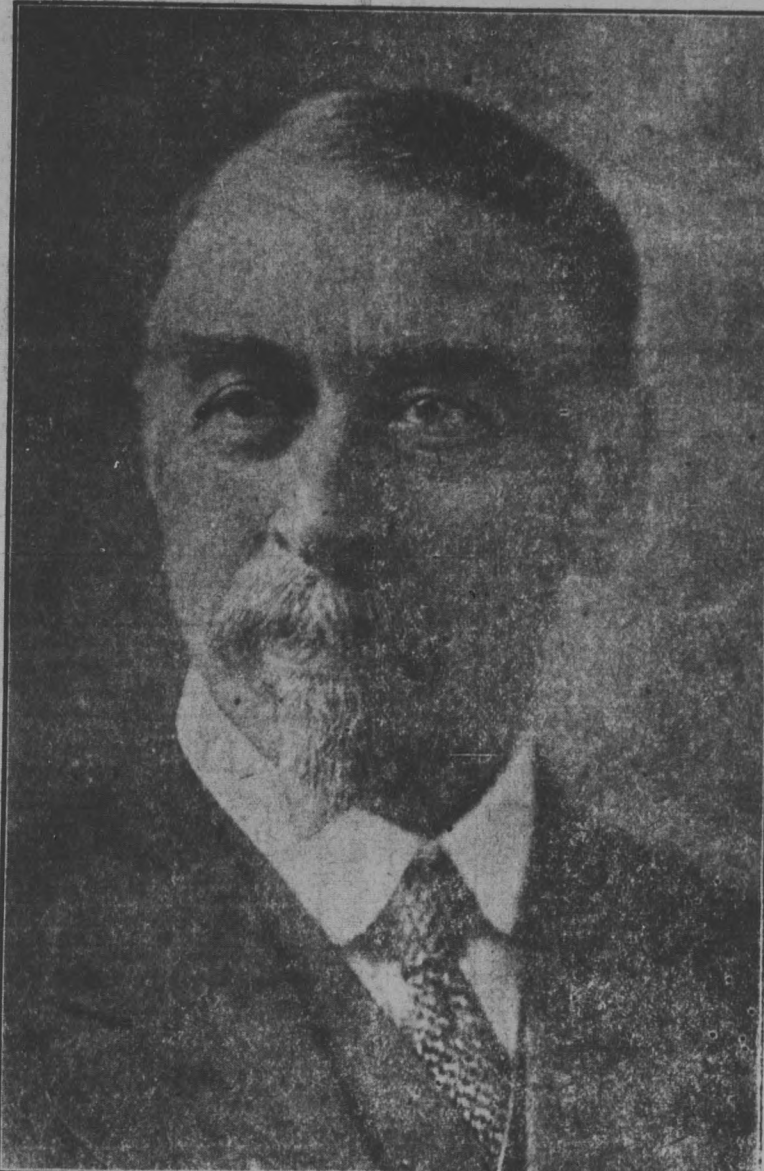
George F. Delaney, aged 62, Visitation; Mrs. Mary Hodges, aged 72, San Bruno; Sophio Levinson, aged 36, Daly City.

Mrs. Christine Bacon of San Mateo, whose husband is dangerously ill, and who has a fifteen-months-old baby, was awarded aid, on motion of Brown, seconded by Thompson.

A communication was received from Arnold Foster, secretary of the Union Iron Works, San Francisco, calling attention to two dangerous culverts on the Bay Shore Road. The communication was referred to Supervisor Casey, who stated that he already had the matter in hand.

Resolutions ordering the county auditor and treasurer to transfer the sum of \$3000 from the unapportioned fund to the county highway fund for the macadam contract on the New La Honda road, were presented, on motion of MacBain, seconded by Casey.

CONGRESSMAN E. A. HAYES HAS ESTABLISHED SPLENDID RECORD



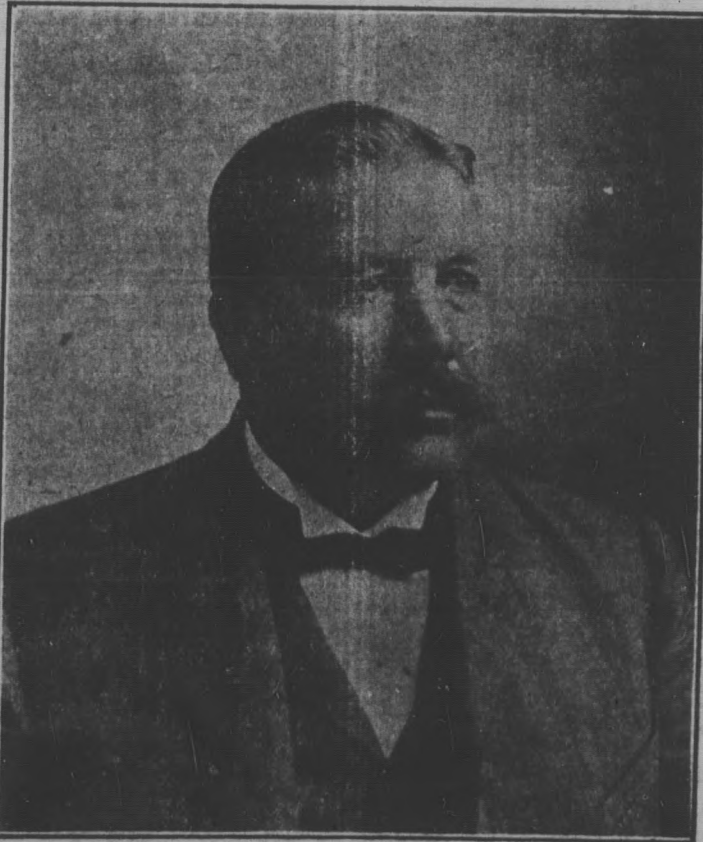
THE HON. E. A. HAYES who represents the Eighth Congressional District will be a candidate for re-election, and needless to say, if his record of accomplishment is appraised at its true value, will be re-elected. Mr. Hayes is one of those Republicans who believe in the free and unrestricted expression of the humblest member of the party. He has ever been opposed to extreme reactionism and is grateful as are other Republicans to the Progressives for the part they played in the remodeling and revitalizing of the older party. He has many old and staunch friends in Redwood City who will be gratified to learn that not only will he accept a renomination but that his constituents clear to Santa Barbara are solidly supporting him.

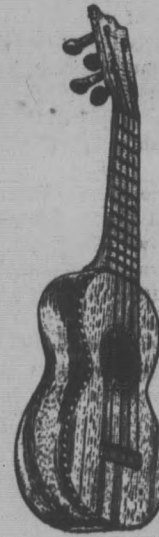

THIS MATTER OF ANNEXATION

Are you a newspaper reader, and do you rely somewhat upon newspaper "scare heads?" If so, you may have already been convinced, from what the San Francisco journals have been publishing, that San Mateo county is clamoring to become annexed to San Francisco.

San Mateo was formerly a portion of the City and County of San Francisco. Through a division of territory the City of San Francisco, and the County of San Mateo, were afterwards formed under separate governments.

The dividing line between the City of San Francisco and the County of San Mateo was not a natural boundary but an arbitrary line commencing at the ocean and cutting straight across hill, valley and mountain until it reached the waters of the bay.

The reality is, that after half a century of pioneering a prosperous community has been built up along the Bay Shore that today practically merges and has become a part of San Francisco, while the fertile valley district of the Coast side is speedily undergoing the same process.

Concerning the Bay Shore, its substantial banks, stores, hotels, factories, suburban homes, schools, churches and influential citizenship bear witness to its great prosperity.

Its railway traffic is unceasing. For twenty-four hours each day and during every day of the year its activities go on—its passenger traffic mostly by day, the freight movement continuously.

The auto traffic over the State highway, both for personal service and for motor freighting, is also continuous, being one straight movement day and night without end.

The different towns growing together along the whole distance, some thirty odd miles, are self-governing, their affairs well administered and each getting along finely under present conditions.

Therefore, why should San Mateo county be clamorous for annexation? This very day the City of San Francisco and the Bay Shore district are, as before stated, practically one city.

The San Mateo towns have separate governments, of course. Shall they be continued or become centralized in San Francisco to all intents and purposes?

Our observation is that San Mateo county is not unanimous and in favor of annexation, but that on the contrary it may be best to let well enough alone. At the same time it has shown real interest in all the proceedings relating thereto and the agitation for annexation continues.

THERE'LL BE ON WEDDING BELL

Some one at the annexation conference held in San Francisco a few weeks ago likened San Francisco to a young man desiring to marry Miss San Mateo. This party has evidently forgotten that Miss San Mateo was united in marriage to Mr. San Francisco in 1850, that the couple was divorced in 1856 on the grounds of failure to provide good roads, etc., for the fair plaintiff by defendant.

BIDS OPENED FOR FINE HOME TO BE BUILT AT ATHERTON

Spanish Renaissance Style of Palatial Home of M. A. Gurola

The following bids were opened Wednesday for the residence of M. A. Gurola, in the Selby Tract. Grace and Berneri, \$11,862.00; Droyfus Bros., \$11,616; E. Waller, \$11,291; F. W. Fox, \$11,179; Elam and Son, \$11,085; R. Glaza and Son, \$10,698; E. E. Ethern, \$10,500.

These bids do not include the heating of the garage, pump-house and servants' quarters, which will approximate about \$2,000. The house will be one of the show places of the peninsula and is situated on a six acre tract in the beautifully wooded land of the Selby Tract.

The architecture is the Spanish Renaissance, in the plastered and well studied ornamental exterior with clay tile roof, having a broad terrace extending along the front. Entering the house through the tiled vestibule, the phone and cloak rooms are right and left. Two steps up from the vestibule the spacious hall is entered.

The dining room is entered on the left through casement doors and is finished in panel wainscoting. The library opening from the hall is lined with book-shelves with an open fireplace at the end. To the right of the hall is the livingroom with a specially designed large mantle in the center, and on each side are casement doors to the screened porch, which has a large clinker brick fireplace. The rear-hall leads to the garden entrance and servants quarters, including servants stairs, pass-pantry, large kitchen, storerooms, servant's chambers and bath and rear porch. On the second floor are five large chambers, two tiled bath-rooms and showers with recessed bath-tubs and recessed lavatories in each room. There are three spacious sleeping porches from the chambers.

In the basement are store-rooms, furnace-room and coal and wood cellar. The plans were prepared by Charles E. Hodges who will superintend the same. Mr. Hodges is associated with W. Garden Mitchell, a San Francisco architect.

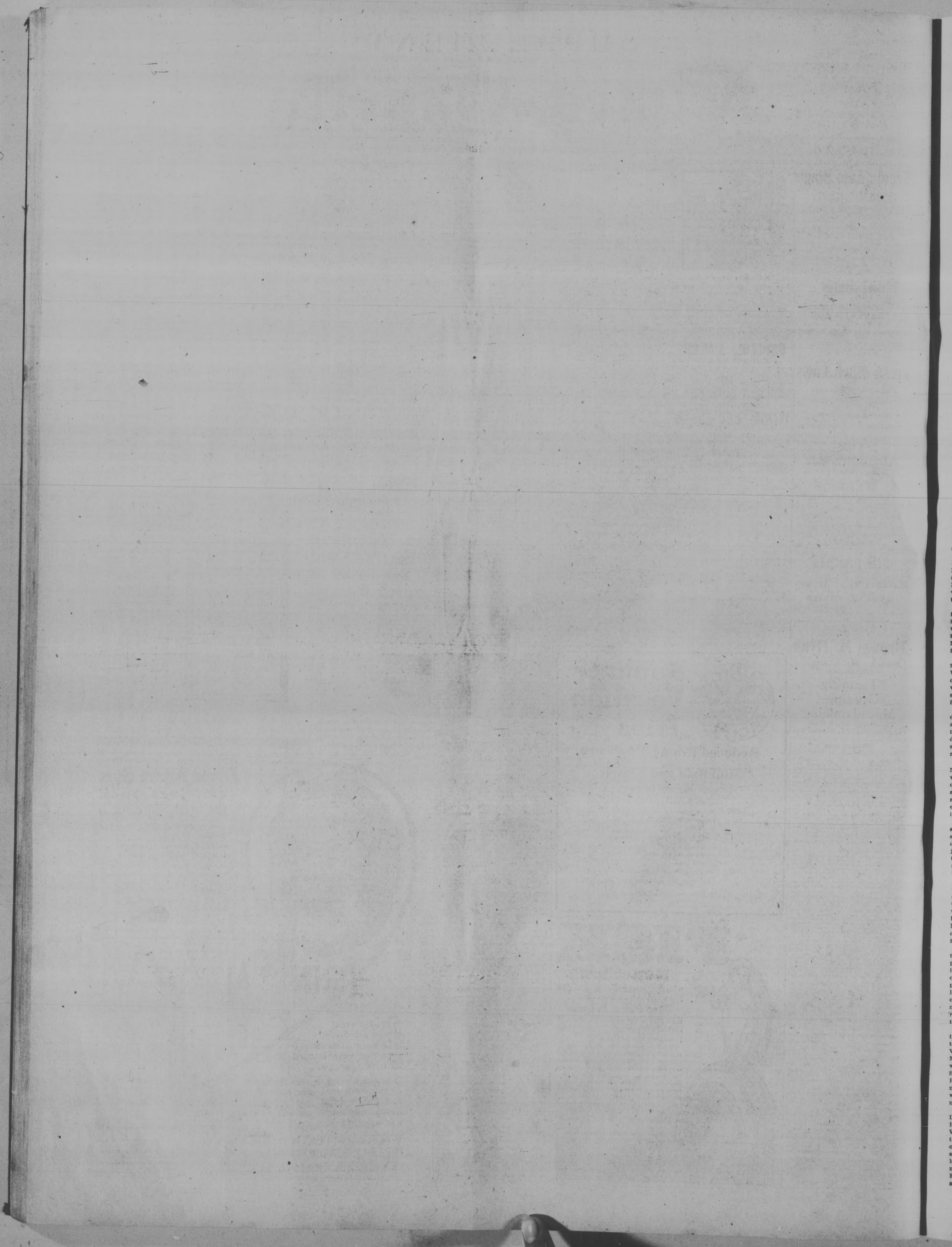

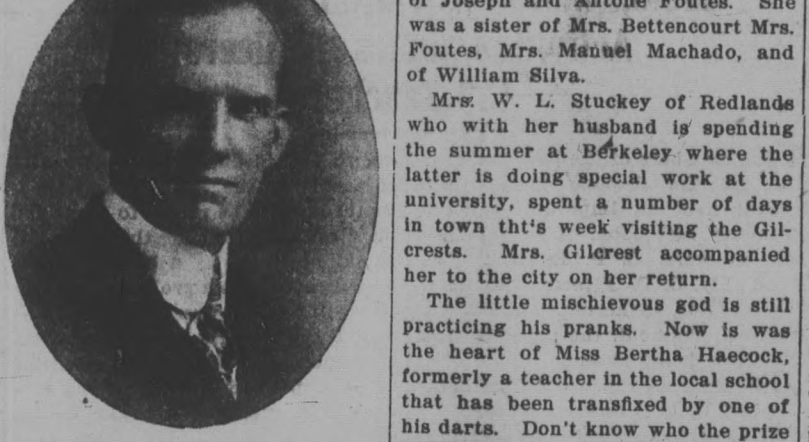
