THREE YOUNG WAR VETERANS WERE COMMITTED TO THE STATE HOSPITAL FOR THE INSANE

A pathetic scene was enacted in the courthouse on Tuesday when three young soldiers from the Base Hospital at Menlo Park were committed to the state hospital for the insane at Agnew.

The three men saw service overseas and there from exposure, the trying conditions of the front line trenches and shell shocks so undermined their nervous system that finally their minds gave way and most likely they will spend the remainder of their lives in the asylum.

At the call of the government these young men left their homes,

their all, to respond to their country's demands and went to the front to battle for freedom and democracy. They have practically made the supreme sacrifice, even more for their lives will be living deaths in the asylum. They could do no more. Certainly the county and the people should be grateful to these young men. One of the soldiers leaves behind a wife and young child, aged two years.

It is to be earnestly hoped that they will be cared for and that a grateful country will see to it that they do not want for anything.

CONGREGATIONALISTS HOLD DEMOBILIZATION SERVICES SUNDAY

One of the prettiest and most impressive services ever held in this community took place Sunday night at the Congregational church, when the service flag was demobilized. Louis Uhlenberg in his soldier uniform and Louis Behrens in his navy togs, removed the flag from the position it had held for nearly three years. Earl Ekerenkotter read the names of all the church boys who had served their country. The audience rose and stood with bowed heads in respect to Corporal Lindsey Wilson, Lieutenant Merton Knox, Captain Lloyd Thrush and Corporal Charles Walthers, the four splendid men who gave their lives for America. Taps were impressively played by Lester Mullen. "Old Glory" was sung by O. M. Carrington, was enjoyed by the utmost. After a few well chosen remarks by C. M. Duxson, master of ceremonies, and S. P. McCrea, who had the meeting in charge, the audience dispersed with the singing of the "Star Spangled Banner."

JUDGE BUCK RENDERED DECISION IN SHIELD CASE

Judge Buck yesterday rendered a decision on the motion of the defendant in the case of Richard Shields against the Reed Company asking for a new trial. The court modified the verdict of plaintiff. If the plaintiff would accept \$750 in lieu of \$1000, the verdict given plaintiff he would deny the motion and if this modification was not accepted he would grant defendant's motion for a new trial. A Mansfield for plaintiff immediately accepted the modification.

CITY TRUSTEES MET MONDAY

At the meeting of the city board of trustees Monday evening the matter of disposing of the large oak trees in the streets of the city, especially in Redwood Highlands, was discussed at some length. It was finally decided to have the trunks of the trees painted white so that they could be seen at night. The matter was turned over to Street Superintendent Ed Dearborn.

The Western Union Telegraph company notified the board that in the future the service for the time clock at the city hall would be increased to \$1.25 a month.

The Boy Scouts sent a communication to the board thanking them for their kindness in their drive for funds held recently.

The P. G. & E. Co. was given permission to erect poles on Redwood avenue, near Reese street, for the purpose of supplying current to the home of G. H. Anderson.

Contractor Fred Warden, who has the contract for building the new fire house on Webster street submitted an estimate for labor and material during the month of December in the sum of \$3559. These claims must be approved by the architect before the board can act upon them, this not being done the board instructed City Clerk Price to draw a warrant to the amount of 75 per cent of the recommended amount by the architect.

C. B. Cowden submitted his final estimate, showing \$1420.80 due him on his contract for the improvement of Maple street. After deducting \$56 which is to take care of any follow up work which may appear, the claim was allowed.

Dreyfus Brothers were allowed \$4500 on their contract for the construction of the outfall sewer and pumping plant.

C. J. Lindgren was allowed a payment of \$4000 on his contract for the construction of the Washington street bridge and a payment of \$500 was also allowed him on his contract for the three bridges, including the Broadway bridge.

The matter of census taking was thoroughly discussed and every effort should be made to have a full census taken.

FINE CLASS B BUILDING TO BE ERECTED IN REDWOOD CITY BY PACIFIC GAS & ELECTRIC CO.

A builder's contract was filed in the county recorder's office late last evening by Gus Waller, the well-known local builder, who agrees to erect for The Pacific Gas and Electric Company a story and a half class B building on the lot between the Sequoia theatre and the Drew building.

The stipulated price of the contract is \$16,000. M. E. Ryan, the local electrician, has been given the contract for the wiring of the structure.

The lot was recently purchased by the company from the George A. Merrill company. It is 66 feet by 45. The price received for the property is not known but it is said the site brought a fancy price. The building will have a glass plate front with marble base and a marquee entrance. When finished it will be the most attractive building in town. It is to be beautifully illuminated.

OPINION OF ATTORNEY GENERAL IN THE MATTER OF ATTENDING HI SCHOOLS

By a recent opinion of the Attorney General permitting high school students to attend school in other districts has relieved the trustees of Sequoia Union High School of a very troublesome burden. Some years ago the trustees made a ruling permitting the students of Runnymede and Stanford Park to attend the institution at Palo Alto. Last year pupils from Menlo Park began crossing the creek and at once the trustees protested and brought the matter before the Palo Alto high school board. After some controversy between the two boards the matter was passed up to the attorney general for an opinion. He holds that high schools of California are state institutions and as such are open to all qualified pupils of the state, without regard to any agreement or regulations prescribed by local boards of trustees or by the county superintendent of schools.

The immediate result of the opinion is to throw open the doors of all high schools to all comers who come up to the requirements for entrance. In other words, students living in the Sequoia Union High school district are free to attend the high schools at San Mateo, Palo Alto or any other place, and vice versa. Students living in the South San Francisco district may come to San Mateo, while pupils from here are free to attend there. Each school is thus placed on the same footing.

The opinion of the attorney general in full follows: "San Francisco, Dec. 23, 1919. "Rev. Walter Hays, "President, Board of Trustees, "Palo Alto, Calif.

"Dear Sir: I have before me your communication relating to the right of pupils residing in the Sequoia High school district of San Mateo county to attend the Palo Alto Union High school in Santa Clara county.

"You state that the Palo Alto Union High school trustees have granted permission to the pupils to attend the Palo Alto Union High school on the ground that all the high schools of the State are partly supported by State money and are

therefore bound to render service to all the children of the State, and that this permission was granted subject to any decision which might be made by the attorney general, and you therefore request the opinion of this office as to the right of these pupils to attend this high school.

"In an opinion, No. 5720, rendered by this office under date of February 13, 1919, to Hon. C. C. Coolidge, district attorney of Santa Clara county, it was expressed as the view of this office that pupils residing in one high school district in a county were entitled to attend the high school of another high school district in the same county, neither district being a county high school district, regardless of any terms that might be agreed upon by the respective boards of trustees of the two districts or prescribed by the county superintendent. This view was predicated upon the fact that the only terms which might be insisted upon were those which the statute contemplated might be enforced, and as apparently the statute had not made provision for the enforcement of terms in the case of pupils residing in one high school district of the county which was not a county high school district, and attending a high school in another high school district in the same county, not a county high school district, the pupils were thereby left with the right to attend such high school regardless of any terms that might be agreed upon or prescribed.

"In the case now pending by you the question is raised whether pupils residing in a union high school district in one county may attend a high school in a union high school district of an adjoining county, neither of such districts being a county high school district.

"A further review of the various sections of the political code relating to the question leads me to the view that the same conditions which induced our previous opinion prevail with equal force in the solution of the present question.

"As the legislature has, in certain cases, permitted the imposition of terms as a condition to the attendance of pupils, and has prescribed the manner in which such terms shall be enforced, it should be assured that the legislature intended that no terms shall be imposed which could not be enforced in the manner prescribed by it, nor in a case in which it had not provided a manner of enforcement.

"I cannot find that the legislature has made any provision for the imposition of terms, or the manner of enforcement thereof, in the case of two such high school districts located as are those in the statement of facts now presented, conclude, therefore, that the provisions of section

1751 of the political code do not apply and that we are left with the first and general provisions of that section, with the result that pupils residing in one of such high school districts, and satisfying the requirements contained in such general provisions, are entitled to attend the high school in the other of such districts regardless of any terms agreed upon by the respective boards of the two districts or prescribed by the county superintendent of either county.

SAN CARLOS NOTES

Regardless of the strenuous efforts of the District Attorney supported by the Board of Supervisors, the California Auto Association and the State Railroad Commission and our publicity through the local press there are still some maniacs operating cars down the State Highway through San Carlos with a reckless abandon that indicates these drivers have no consideration whatever for the safety and the lives of themselves or any one else. These people may drive as fast as they like on any other section of the Highway, but the people of San Carlos are determined that they will continue to prosecute the matter until some improvement is made so far as it effects San Carlos proper. The president of the San Carlos Club has also been instructed to petition the Southern Pacific Company asking that they establish an interurban motor car service between San Francisco and San Jose, giving a twenty or thirty minute service in connection with the present steam trains, these rail motor cars to make all stops, taking care of the short hauls now handled by the stages and busses on the State Highway. Mr. J. G. Gibson is here from Canada for the winter and is a guest at the Chas. B. Marvin's.

Mr. Thos. B. Nichols editor and manager of the Mayfield News is company with his boss and her brother, Mr. Conery, of Nebraska, called on the San Carlos gossip last Tuesday. A newspaper man can't understand why San Carlos is building up so much more rapidly than Mayfield when that delightful little berg supports a newspaper, and San Carlos can't yet boast such an appendage.

Mr. Sigmund S. Hoekwald of the Hoekwald Chemical Company of San Francisco was in town last Tuesday for the purpose of introducing their line of wares to the board of school trustees.
Mr. A. A. Horton of Santa Cruz who has charge of this state senatorial district in the taking of the census has appointed Mrs. Mary E. Quinn as one of the census takers for this precinct. Every one should co-operate with Mrs. Quinn and make the work as easy for her as possible, and particularly the ladies should not hesitate too long in giving the correct number of years they have been on this earth, and let their hesitation delay the census taker as little as possible.
Mrs. Wm. M. Bowie and Master Billie Bowie from Newman are here for an extended visit with Mrs. Bowie's mother and sister, Mesdames E. Nye and H. B. Livermore.
Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Gasper and their three children who have been temporarily domiciled in the Hurbit Apartments during their sojourn of

six months have returned to their home in San Francisco. Mr. Gasper has had charge of the work in the extensive improvements which have been made in the military academy at Belmont and moved his family to San Carlos in order to be near them. The Gaspers have rendered themselves very popular during their temporary residence in this vicinity and many regret to see them leave.

After two weeks of unabridged liberty on the Maury Ranch, near Medford, Oregon, Maury Cowgill is back home to six months more of drugery (?) in chores at home and confinement in the Sequoia High school at Redwood City.

THE SUPERVISORS HOLD MEETING

The board of supervisors met in regular session Monday, January 5, 1920, at 10 o'clock, there being present Thos. L. Hickey, W. H. Brown, Jos. M. Francis and Dr. C. V. Thompson. Chairman MacBain being absent.

In the absence of Chairman MacBain, Dr. C. V. Thompson was chosen to preside at the meeting, on motion of Supervisors Brown and Francis.

W. J. Graef, head of the U. S. Public Health Service in the county, submitted his monthly report in connection with the squirrel extermination campaign being carried on. His report showed 42 inspections made, 109 re-inspections, 21,175 acres inspected, 34,335 acres re-inspected and four field inspectors employed during the month one at Redwood City, one at La Honda, one at Halfmoon Bay and one at Colma.

William Regan of South San Francisco appeared before the board and presented a petition asking for the closing and abandonment of Vista-canyon avenue in Vista-canyon, which according to the petition is no longer needed for public traffic.

Regan was sworn and testified as to the validity of the names on the petition, the petition having been circulated by him. Whereupon, in accordance with the law, the hearing in the matter was set for Monday, February 2, 1920.

The following persons having filed their applications, were granted peddlers licenses in the county: Louis Harsh, San Mateo, on motion of Brown, seconded by Francis, Hickey, seconded by Francis; Israel J. Light, South San Francisco, on motion of Hickey, seconded by Brown.

The board officially canvassed the returns of the special election held in the City of Hillsborough last month to annex unincorporated territory showing 43 votes in favor of the proposition and none against.

The board took up at this time the claim of the Southern Pacific company, amounting to \$1006.98, for installing the electric warning bell at Holy Cross cemetery, the claim having been held up for some time on account of it being considered too high.

Mrs. Nash, the clerk, read a communication from the company, going into details regarding the installation of the bell and showing the difference in the cost of materials at the time when the work was ordered and when it was actually done.

E. Heckman, Redwood City representative for the Southern Pacific company, was present at the meeting and asked that definite action be taken with regard to the claim.

Owing to the absence of Chairman MacBain, it was decided to lay the matter over until next Monday, which is regular claim day.

In compliance with a request made several meetings ago by Chairman MacBain, District Attorney Swart submitted a written opinion regarding the length of time persons must be in the county before they are entitled to aid. The law, the opinion recites, states that a person is an actual resident of the place where he resides, or where he is employed, or where he makes his headquarters. The law does not specify any length of time required for a person to live, be employed, or have his headquarters in a place to become a resident of the place. The opinion was ordered filed.

A communication was received from the San Carlos Community Club appealing to the board to take some action to regulate the speed of automobile passenger busses and other machines on the State Highway through the town of San Carlos. The communication stated that some of the busses travel at a rate of from 35 to 45 miles per hour through the place and without any regard for the safety and lives of people who have to cross the highway on foot.

District Attorney Swart to whom, as head of the county traffic department, the communication was referred, said that the complaint of the people was entirely justified. "The speeding of automobiles on the highway is a big and serious problem," he said. "The general public is responsible for the condition he claimed. "Speeding is in the air and everybody seems to want to do it. More stringent rules will have to be indulged in, said, to curb this speeding, adding, however, that he didn't believe the exercising of the death penalty would

have much effect on some people. The district attorney stated that he was not entirely satisfied with the results he was getting from all the traffic officers in the way of enforcing the automobile laws and intimating that unless better results were obtained there might be a shaking up in the force.

The letter from the San Carlos Community Club was referred to District Attorney Swart to answer, on motion of Brown, seconded by Hickey.

A communication was received from the contractors on the Halfmoon Bay branch county jail in which they stated that they had completed the building and desired payment for their work. On motion of Francis, seconded by Brown, County Engineer George A. Kneese was directed to make an inspection of the building before the board allowed the claim.

County Auditor J. J. Shields addressed a communication to the board, enclosing two claims passed by the board on December 8 and which the auditor was holding up. One claim was from the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and was for toll and telephone service for Randolph 1146 and in the name of Mrs. S. A. Landini. The other claim was from E. C. Cottier in the sum of \$91.35 and was for repairing the kitchen range at the county hospital. Both claims were ordered rejected, on motion of Brown, seconded by Francis, the first on account of it being in the name of Mrs. Landini, instead of Officer Landini and the other on account of not being properly itemized.

Chairman Protem Thompson reported that the new bridge over New Years creek in his district was practically completed and that it was now necessary to remove the old one. He said from estimates given him the cost of wrecking the old structure would be in the neighborhood of \$150 and as he did not believe that the salvage would amount to that he suggested that an effort be made to sell the material in the bridge as if stood. On motion of Francis, seconded by Hickey, the matter was left in the hands of Thompson for him to do the best he could.

On motion of Francis, seconded by Brown, County Surveyor Kneese was directed to inspect a broken culvert on Whipple avenue in the Second district with a view of making the necessary recommendations to have the same repaired.

The objects of the Order of the White Crane are: To promote a feeling of good will toward mankind and especially that justice be done the Indian Tribes, and that a feeling of fraternal love may be established among the human race in general; but more particularly that a feeling of love and patriotism toward this our Country, be fostered; also that the preservation of family and other historical documents and relics be encouraged, particularly those relating to the Indian Tribes.

Those eligible to membership are the descendants from one or more of the native Kings or Chiefs of America of Aztec, Indian or Toltec origin, or from Colonial Ancestry domiciled in America prior to the signing of the Treaty of Peace with Great Britain, September 3, 1783. Among the members of the Order are Chief Justice Wm. Bailey Lamar and Senator Owen of Oklahoma who is of Indian descent.

Dr. White Wolf is the grandson of Chief Gray Eagle of the Choctaw Nation of Indians, his mother having been the Chief's daughter and his father a French Canadian physician. The Doctor represented his nation

in many conferences in Washington in the negotiation of treaties and other matters, receiving special recognition from President Grant in the present of an inscribed sword which he later presented to the Museum in St. Louis, and also from President Cleveland.

Dr. White Wolf is very proud of his Indian descent; he will accept the invitation to become a member of the Order of the White Crane and will visit Dr. Bulloch while on his trip east.

The William Warren school opens on January 13 for the spring term. Over 40 pupils have already been turned away there being no room for them. The school is popular and cannot handle all the students making application. The owners of the institution contemplate erecting a large three-story building near the present site but closer to the highway. Work on the new building may begin early next summer.

How we handle the milk that is used by over 60 per cent of the people of Palo Alto.
How the Cows Are Handled Before Milking
The cows are kept in thoroughly cleaned stalls. Daily the stalls are cleaned out, freshened up with new straw, and given a hose washing frequently.
Every day, just before milking time, the cows are given a thorough cleaning. They are washed clean of all dirt that they might have gained in the pasture.
