

One, a mere boy, was thirty feet from where the crime was committed; but had been in bad company and so had to pay the penalty. The Hebraic law was "A life for a life," but even in the time of the prophets they didn't demand three lives for one.

And did the hanging of these boys tend to stop crime? It did not. The papers were filled with accounts of crimes the next day and the day after.

There are other forms of punishment that are more real deterrants than hanging It is inhumane and has no place in the code of punishment and the practice should be discontinued.

Think of it Mr Man and Mrs. Lady, three men hanged in Christian California, and it wasn't to make a Roman holiday but just to punish criminals.

They can of course secure from the legis-lature the increases they desire, but what is the use? Under the budget provision of the constitution the gov-ernor can reduce or entirely wipe out any appropriation made by the legis-lature, and any increase that the legi-lature, and any increase that the legi-lature, and any increase that the legi-listaure may grant is useless unless the governor will approve, and he says emphatically that the appropria-tions shall not exceed the budget. There are already a large number of special bills carrying appropriaof special bills carrying appropria-tions for this or that project, but the overnor does not hesitate to say that he will approve no extraordinary expenditures; which means that most of the "specials" will amount to nothing if passed.

An additional \$15,000 appropriation from the reclamation fund to carry on the investigation of the so-called salt water problem in the Sacramento river-San Joaquin river delta region in California, to be met by a like sum from California interests, has been re-quested of Secretary Work by Senator Shortridge.

Adjutant General R. E. Mittlestaedt has announced the appointment of Davis W. Gooch of Sacramento as auditor of the adjutant general's office, to succeed Howard McIntyre, who held the position for twenty years.

The senate passed a joint resolu-tion sent in from the assembly call-ing on Secretary of the Treasury Mel-lon to make public the opinion of the attorney general on the manner in which income tax payments should be

In March, 1842, Reuben Partridge took out a British patent for a machine for manufacturing the splittin. All these early matches depended upon phosphorus for their lighting by means of friction. Safety matches were first brought out in 1862.
