





COMMITTEE OF CITIZEN EXPERTS MAKES AN END OF ESTIMATING CITY LAND VALUES

After several weeks of work and careful and conscientious consultation the committee of real estate experts, appointed to estimate land values in the City of Glendale, has finished its labors and sent in its report to the Board of Supervisors. The proceedings of the committee have always been harmonious. Where differences of opinion existed the disputed point was always settled by a majority vote.

Similar committees have been doing similar work in all sections of the county. When other committees have agreed on the values of buildings in the county, the two estimates will be added together and the Board of Supervisors will determine whether or not to accept the result. Following is a letter accompanying the appraisers' report to the supervisors: To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County, California:

The undersigned, members of the committee in the City of Glendale appointed to appraise the value of real estate in said city under the auspices of The Joint Board of Appraisal, Los Angeles City and County, beg to inform your honorable body that many of the taxpayers of our city are apprehensive that the work of this committee will result in an increase in their taxes next year over and above any increase from other causes. This feeling is prejudicial to the members of the committee, inasmuch as there seems to be a growing feeling of resentment because of the constantly increasing taxes at a time when sources of income to the individual are being in most cases decreased, which feeling was evidenced at a recent meeting of our Chamber of Commerce, when a resolution was passed which referred to the county taxes as "inexcusably high."

The members of the Committee fully realize to what extent our citizens are themselves responsible for high taxes, our rate for school purposes being second to but one other in the county; nevertheless we believe that your honorable board should make every endeavor so to conduct the general affairs of the county as to reduce the burdens of taxation, and in any event not to add thereto.

For the purpose of placing ourselves on record in this matter, we subscribe to the foregoing as representing our attitude.
