#### RECENT PREHISTORIC DISCOVERIES

If people have a desire to see ancient ruins they can find some of intense interest on the North American continent, and have no need to go to Europe to find traces of ancient races. Dr. J. Walter Fewkes of the Smithsonian Institution, in the course of certain excavating in the Mesa Verde National Park, unearthed ruins of extraordinary interest. In fact the Sun Temple, as it has been named, is an altogether new and mysterious type of ruin; and the discovery is undoubtedly, as Dr. Fewkes calls it, a service to American archaeology.

For centuries the feet of the ancient tribes have traversed this region. The explorer and the pioneer have traversed this spot and yet had no inkling of the secret that lay beneath the surface. Yet there has always been conjecture to the effect that if exploration should be made remains of some o'd tribes would be found. Directly across Cliff Canyon and opposite the celebrated prehistoric ruin known as Cliff Palace lies the new find. What first attracted the attention of the archaeologist was the fact that stones were found on the surface that gave token of having been worked artificially. There, too, was a mound, with cedar and pinyon trees of great age

Excavation showed traces of a large building and the work, iting in Los Angeles. which was begun last summer, gradually uncovered one of the most remarkable prehistoric ruins of the country. Nothing like this well touring car last week. building has yet been uncovered in this country. It is in the form of the letter D. 


