HOT WAVE KILLED SCALE

Charles T. Paine of Los Angeles, who is considered an authority of citrus tree pests, has made a survey of the citrus belt since the hot wave and he makes the assertion that fifty per cent. of the citricola and yellow scale has been killed by heat.
