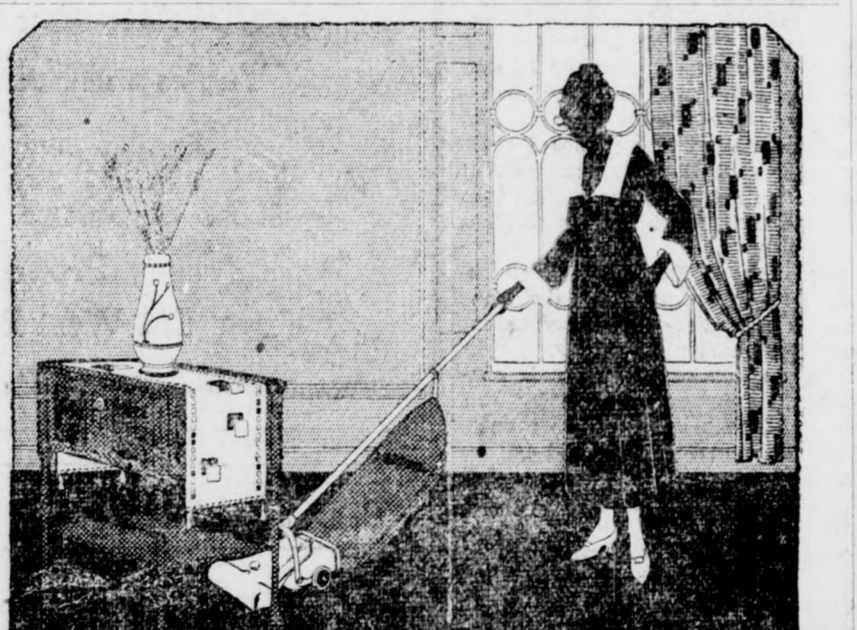

Foreign Markets Needed

Farmers should not expect too much in the way of relief through having congress pass high tariff rates on agricultural products, to make it difficult for Canada or any other country to "flood" America with the surplus of its crops.

It is true that imposition of a higher tax will probably have a temporary effect of raising prices, but consumers will not be patient under artificial raising of prices of foodstuffs.

What farmers of the United States need is a way whereby they can find a market for the surplus of grain annually raised in this country. This market was provided through the unusual demands of the war, but the lack of European credit has excluded the farmer from participation in foreign trade to a large extent.

Millions of children in central Europe are reported on the point of starvation, and the American people are subscribing liberally to aid them. The surplus food in the United States which is depressing prices of farm crops, could be used in Europe to aid the needy if the governments were agreed upon some method of supplying it.

ered and developed; more teachers, and better pay for teachers, that the brainiest and noblest men and women may be kept at the work of tending the greatest crop the country produces: the crop of boys and girls; vocational education as well as cultural education, that the man may find his proper niche, for the man in love with his job is the contented, useful citizen.

With Disciplined Mind
The educated man as defined by Mr. Fox is the man with a disciplined mind—not necessarily the man who has a college diploma, or the man who can tell what he knows. Some college diplomas, if truthfully written, said the lecturer, would read, "This is a receipt for four years' board."

All truth, said Mr. Fox, is sacred; there is no "secular truth." He defined truth as right relationship. In the material world wrong relationship is dirt; jam on bread is right relationship, jam on a boy's face is dirt—matter out of place, in the wrong relationship. In the realm of the intellect, wrong relationship is ignorance; in the spiritual realm it is called sin.

The lecture scintillated with wit and humor, was followed with the closest attention, and was frequently interrupted with bursts of applause.

The decorating committee had adorned the hall in the Masonic Temple where the meeting was held with ferns and an artistic arrangement of pink and white sweet peas.

Relief Work Appeal
Preceding the speaker of the day, F. L. Sims, associate secretary of Judge Wells, who has charge of the Near East Relief work, made an eloquent appeal for help for the 110,000 orphaned children in Armenia. This was supplemented by a brief statement of the need for this work by Mrs. Hutchinson, president of the club, who cited Dr. Lulu Peters, just returned from Armenia, as authority for the statement that conditions in that stricken country are unbelievable.

Mrs. Walter Stamps, secretary, read a letter of thanks from the committee in charge of the Christmas work of the county hospital, to whom the Tuesday Afternoon club had given \$20 for soft candies for the old folks there.

"Our plan," continued Mr. Smith, "does not exclude women from the Chamber of Commerce. On the contrary, we hope to enroll as active members all who are at all concerned with the usual Chamber of Commerce program, and, as reserves, those who are willing to co-operate with the men in civic and social welfare matters."

Concerns Business Men
"City building, I am convinced, is a good deal like home building. It takes a man's strength and a woman's art. And city keeping, like home keeping, also depends, for success, upon the right kind of co-operation between the only natural partners in the human family—man and woman."

"I hope everybody will come early so there will be plenty of time to 'mix' and get acquainted. That is what we need in Glendale more than anything just now—a better acquaintance among those who live or do business here. Why, even in our own committee there were men who had to be introduced to each other, and they were chosen because of their supposed wide acquaintance."

THERMOMETER, DEATH VALLEY

At Greenland ranch, in Death Valley, the air temperature, as recorded by a tested maximum thermometer exposed in a standard instrument shelter, rose to 100 degrees, or higher on twenty-three days during June, and on every day during July, 1920, says a bulletin of the American Meteorological society. The extreme maximum was 125 degrees, recorded on the last day of July. On July 10, 1913, the temperature there reached 134 degrees Fahrenheit, the highest officially recorded air temperature in the world.
