REFUGEES IN CONSTANT TERROR OF NEW DANGERS FROM FLOODS

Pueblo at Mercy of Rampaging River; City in Dire Need of Food, Clothing and Medical Assistance

BY SAM I. FREED, United Press Staff Correspondent PUEBLO, Colo., June 6.—A river gone mad today held the suffering refugees of Pueblo's flood in constant terror.

Pueblo's population, its nerve already shattered from three days of fighting the flood, which took a toll of approximately thirty lives and millions of dollars worth of property, was ordered to stand by at every threat of a new rise in the water.

Engines raced up and down the valley as far as rails had been prepared, their sirens sounding the shrill notice of the new danger.

The city was in dire need today of food, clothing, water and medical assistance. For three days Pueblo has been without electric light, power, water, gas, telephone or street car service.

The city fathers, who have hardly slept since Friday, have divided the execution of different phases of the flood relief work among the five councilmen.

On the other hand many were so anxious to leave the city while the flood was at its height, that fear drove them to take many desperate chances.

**SALARY ORDINANCE  
IS EXPLAINED BY  
TRUSTEES' HEAD**

DWIGHT W. STEPHENSON GIVES  
REASONS FOR MEASURE AND  
WHERE INCREASES MADE

(Continued from Page 1.)  
The increase is not effective until July 1. The city recorder was granted an increase of \$50 per month, making his salary \$150 per month. For the month of May, 1921, the city recorder turned over to the city treasurer the sum of \$1,367 in fees, and we cannot see wherein we can be criticized for granting this deserving increase. The chief of police and the chief of the fire department were each given an increase of \$15 per month, making the salary of each position \$175 per month, and any fair-minded citizen will agree that the offices are worth it. The building inspector has heretofore occupied a dual position; i. e., building inspector and city forester, and received salaries for both positions. He will now receive one salary for one position, serving as city forester without salary. His rate was increased \$15 per month. The secretary to the city manager was granted an increase of \$10 per month and is worth it. The fact that laborers and others are rated at \$4.25 per day does not necessarily mean that they will receive that much. It establishes a maximum rate, but if they can be hired for less they surely will be paid less.

**Many Deserving Employees**  
There are many deserving employees of the city of Glendale who should receive higher salaries than they do. They are all conscientiously doing their level best and the board regretted very much that they could not recognize their worth in a substantial way, but because of the fact that wages and salaries are now being reduced in nearly all walks of life, it would be unwise to grant any general increases at this time, with the exception of the police and fire departments, which amounted to a \$10 per month raise for the captain of police and captain of firemen respectively and a \$5 per month raise for each patrolman and each driver of motor fire apparatus. Let it be noted in this connection that the pay of our police and fire department is still under the usual rate fixed by other cities of our size.

**Total Monthly Payroll**  
The total monthly payroll of the city of Glendale under the new ordinance will be \$9,750. The total monthly increase in the payroll amounts to the sum of \$490. Of this latter sum \$275 per month will be paid from direct taxation and the balance will be met from revenues other than direct taxation. In other words \$215 per month of the raises provided for in said ordinance will be taken care of out of the revenues of divisions that are self-supporting.

In conclusion let me once more call your attention to the fact that there has been no general increase in salaries, with the exception above noted. The principal raises were in the heads of divisions. These raises are amply justified when the increased responsibility carried by these heads of divisions are taken into consideration. Instead of censuring the Board of Trustees for this ordinance, the citizens should commend it, for it managed to save enough money out of the salary allotment to increase our police force by three men and our fire department by one man. Trusting that this statement may clear up the misunderstanding relative to the new salary ordinance and sincerely urging an investigation by any man who may doubt the truthfulness of this statement, I am respectfully yours,

TO CHURCH DUTY,  
PASTOR'S PLEA**

REMEMBER CALL OF GOD WHEN  
LURE OF COUNTRY COMES,  
URGES DR. C. M. CRIST

A large audience gathered at the First Methodist church yesterday morning and listened to an earnest sermon by the pastor, Dr. C. M. Crist, from the lofty declaration of the Apostle Paul, "I am crucified with Christ, nevertheless I live yet, not I, but Christ liveth in me."

"This experience of the Apostle Paul," said Dr. Crist, "is the embodiment of a practical Christianity, which, in fact, is the only kind of Christianity that counts. It is a grave mistake to feel that our Christian ideals can only be realized in some future sphere. Not by scaling the heights of time and space, but right here on the levels can they be attained. Where the people are, and in the ordinary activities of life. If you will notice Jesus had very little to say about heaven while he was here, but he did have a great deal to say about earth and our earthly duties and relations. His teaching fulfilled in our lives will bring heaven right down here where we are."

**Should Challenge World**  
"We need to get Christ and his word so deep into our lives that we will challenge the world and attract men to Christ. I am wondering if we are not sometimes afraid to try out our Christianity and somehow we are so near and so like the world that there is apparently not much difference. To be successful the Christian life must be lived in three spheres—the home, the business and social life and in the church. Home is a testing place. The first place to apply and live out our Christianity. If we can convince our family that we are genuine we can convince others. I would rather that my wife should approve of my profession than anyone else. A truly religious home is the house of God."

"No place so sacred as the home; and no agency so helpful in the home as the family altar. The children's greatest heritage is not gold. For oftentimes it acts as a curse. But the greatest heritage that any parent can hand down to the child is a divine influence. The holy associations that clusters around the Christian home with its family Bible reading and prayer. Especially is this needed in our times when so much distracts and allures. Then how much we need to live true Christian lives in our daily association."

**Church's Great Opportunity**  
"Here is the church's greatest opportunity as it mingles in the busy walks of life. Not only to act honest and upright in all our dealings, but to exalt Christ everywhere and in everything. This opportunity of presenting Christ equals the power of the pulpit and wonderfully supplements its efficiency. 'For me to live is Christ,' should dominate our lives in the seven busy days of each week. Christ liveth in us in our church life: first, by attendance, putting the church first; being careful to make no engagements that will conflict with the church services, which includes Sunday night service and the prayer meetings."

"We are now coming to that time of the year when the call of country trips and week-ends takes us away from the house of God. But kindly bear in mind that our spiritual life is in great danger and needs more careful guarding than our physical health. An obligation rests on each and every one of us to help evangelize the world and the Sunday evening service is our greatest opportunity. Christ can live through us in our church life by supporting the church. Tithing would solve the financial obligations. But we can support the church in other and even more important ways. By a spirit of service; an attitude of prayer; by enthusiasm. We get out of the service as we contribute to it. Methodism stands for freedom in worship. I plead for more earnestness and zeal—realizing that if Christ lives in us we will be fruitful, happy and successful Christians."

In the evening Rev. H. G. Claycomb, a retired minister and member of the church, preached and delivered a very helpful and tender discourse.

His topic was "The Face of Christ," text, Second Corinthians, 4-6, "For God who commanded the light to shine out of darkness hath shined in our hearts to give the light of knowledge of the glory of God in the fact of Jesus Christ." Dr. H. V. Brown gave a "minute man" address at the morning service and Dr. C. R. Lusby at the evening.
